### Chemist Tells Parents That He Didn't Kill

BRIDGETON, N. J., May 25 (UP)—John Albert, 31-year-old chemist questioned in the strangling of a high school girl, protested his innocence to his parents in a dramatic courtroom scene last night.

Mr. and Mrs. Louis Albert came here from their home in St. Albans, N. Y., last night and, accompanied by Albert's wife, Grace, visited the suspect in the Cumberland County jail.

"We want the truth," the parents demanded.

"I never saw Lorraine Hess in my life," Albert said. "If I ever saw her, I never knew her. I'm all in the dark. I don't know what it's all about."

Albert was seized after a friend of the dead girl identified him as the man who held secret tryouts with Miss Hess.

Lorraine was found strangled with a coat belt and a pair of socks in Millville, N. J., May 13, several hours after she parted from two classmates who walked her part way home from a school play.

Albert's father, a New York attorney, and the mother came here in answer to the suspect's telegram that he was "held in jail on a bailable offense. Like to see you for help and advice." The suspect was arrested for questioning in the slaying, but after denying any knowledge of the crime for 72 hours, he was held on a charge of possessing obscene pictures. He pleaded guilty to the morals charge and was held without bail. County Prosecutor George H. Stanger said last night, however, that he would agree to bail of \$5,000.

## FLUORINE ADDED TO WATER COULD SAVE U.S. BILLION DOLLARS YEARLY

PHILADELPHIA, May 25 (UP)—Fluorine, added to public water supplies in the form of a water-soluble salt, could save the American people \$1,000,000,000 yearly in dental bills, the 70th annual conference of the American Waterworks Association was told.

Dr. J. L. T. Appleton, dean of the University of Pennsylvania's Evans Dental Institute, warned however against unqualified endorsement of fluoridation of public water supplies pending "adequate and convincing" evidence from

three controlled studies now in progress.

Charles R. Cox, New York state department of health, reported that tentative results of fluoridation studies in the Newburgh area of New York caused sharp modification of restrictions formerly imposed.

Tooth decay in children using Newburgh's fluoridated water since 1945 has been reduced 30 per cent compared to Kingston children using non-fluoridated water in the same period. The reduction eventually may reach 60 per

### Ways — Means Committee Deals With Co-Op Tax

WASHINGTON, May 25 (UP)—The House Ways and Means committee came to grips today with the politically touchy question of whether to tax the earnings of farm and other cooperatives.

Rep. Noah M. Mason, R., Ill., contended that "tax-exempt coops do a \$14,000,000,000 to 15,000,000,000 a year business in competition with tax-paying private business firms.

He said they should be subject to business taxes and estimated this would add \$600,000,000 a year to treasury revenues.

Many members of Congress are wary of disturbing the tax-free status of cooperatives. In many parts of the country they speak with authority at the ballot box.

The committee is seeking ways to make up some of the anticipated loss in revenue through excise tax reductions. It tentatively has approved cuts totaling \$1,100,000,000 a year in taxes on travel tickets, cosmetics, toilet goods, luggage, movie tickets, and other items.

President Truman threatened to veto any bill which does not provide for offsetting the loss. Mason proposed that the government levy a 10 per cent withholding tax on the dividend or patronage payments cooperatives make to their members or stockholders.

The committee already has agreed tentatively to apply a 10 per cent withholding tax to the dividends paid out by corporations.

Mason also has asked the committee to tax the undistributed surpluses of cooperatives at the regular corporation tax rates, which now range up to a maximum of 38 per cent. Cooperatives are not now required to pay such taxes if their surpluses are accumulated as a "reasonable reserve for any necessary purpose" or to fulfill requirements of state laws.

So far, the committee has approved proposals to make up about \$350,000,000 of the expected \$1,100,000,000 excise loss.

### Memorial Day May Kill 290

CHICAGO, May 25 (UP)—A total of 290 persons may be killed in traffic during the four-day Memorial Day week-end, the National Safety Council estimated today.

Ned H. Dearber, council president, said good weather would bring 30,000,000 vehicles onto highways. The death toll will be especially heavy, he said, if many persons are released from work on Monday.

The council's estimate of casualties applies only to injuries suffered during the holiday.

The toll could be cut in half if motorists met the holiday hazards with extra caution and courtesy, Dearber said. "This year, motorists ought to honor the dead on Memorial day by protecting the living."

### Posse Hunts For Crazy Killer, In Pennsylvania

PITTSBURGH, May 25 (UP)—A posse of detectives, state police and coal miners searched abandoned mines near Clinton today for a crazed, armed killer who has already taken one life and "might go on a murder rampage."

The pursued man, Dewey McLaughlin, killed his sister-in-law, Mrs. Alphonsa McLaughlin, 41, with a shotgun blast yesterday then took to the woods in the out mines in the vicinity of his home.

Allegheny County Detectives said McLaughlin took the shotgun and shells when he fled and they fear that when he is cornered, or comes out of hiding to get food, "He might shoot anybody and everybody."

### Eight Million Acres Ready To Plow In Plains

PORT WORTH, May 25 (UP)—Farmers in the Plains area were urged today to put forth their best conservation efforts to forestall a return of dust bowl conditions like those of the 1930's.

Louis P. Merrill, Regional Soil Conservation Service director, said nearly 8,000,000 acres of land in the Plains region were "ready to plow."

Almost 7,900,000 acres of the total are in Texas, Oklahoma, Kansas, Colorado and North Dakota, Merrill said. The overall acreage represents an increase of more than 2,000,000 acres in the past year, he added.

Merrill said the damage of wind erosion next fall and winter could be lessened by top conservation measures, plus a break from the weather.

The federal soil conservation expert blamed the threat from cultivation of millions of acres of land too shallow or sandy to grow crops safely.

Such land, he said, should be retired to permanent cover as soon as possible.

LONG BEACH, Calif., May 25 (UP)—A scientist who helped assemble the first Atom bomb says the United States should tell how many of the bombs it has on hand.

### Truman Hails Move As Step That Should Promote Peace, Security

WASHINGTON, May 25 (UP)—The United States, Britain and France announced today agreement on arming the Arab nations and Israel. President Truman hailed it as a step that should promote peace and security.

The agreement on a unified policy is designed to ease Arab-Jewish tension, prevent a new outbreak of war and bolster the area against Communist aggression.

The Arab nations and the new Jewish state are pledged to use the arms only for their own internal security, and not for aggression against any other state.

The Big Three agreement was announced simultaneously here, in London and in Paris. President Truman made the American announcement and said our participation in the plan "emphasizes this country's desire to promote the maintenance of peace in the near east."

"It is the belief of the United States government," Truman said, "that the declaration will stimulate in the Arab states and Israel increased confidence in future security, thus accelerating the progress now being made in the Near East and contributing toward the well-being of the peoples there."

Shortly before the agreement was announced, the state department called in the chief diplomats of the six Arab states and Israel to inform them of the pact.

The agreement was made at the recent London conference of the Big Three foreign ministers. At this time, the President said, the foreign ministers reviewed the security and armament situation in the Near East and considered what action to take to provide greater stability in the area. The arms-shipping agreement was the result.

### Ag Leaders Look To New Texas Pasture Program

AUSTIN, May 25 (UP)—Texas agricultural leaders looked today to a newly-created "10-year pasture program" as a means of providing enough grass and forage to feed their cattle at home.

The program was set up last night by Gov. Allan Shivers, who appeared as a keynote speaker at a dinner of some 150 agricultural leaders.

The governor announced creation of a state pasture improvement committee, and proclaimed the inauguration of the long range pasture program.

Shivers noted in his talk that Texas ranks 40th in the nation from a yield-per-acre standpoint in harvested forage. That means that Texans have to sell or ship their feeder cattle to Kansas or Missouri or elsewhere to be fed on grass, he said.

"I would like to see us produce enough grass and forage so that we could feed them right here in Texas," he said. "I want to see this program reach every farm and ranch in this state, whether it's a 50-acre or a 50,000-acre place."

Texas now produces about 127 pounds of hay per animal each year, or enough to feed a cow for about six days, the governor said. Aim of the pasture improvement committee will be to carry soil conservation work into all the state's 254 counties.

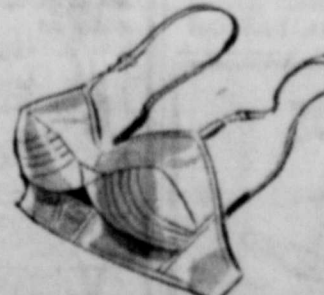

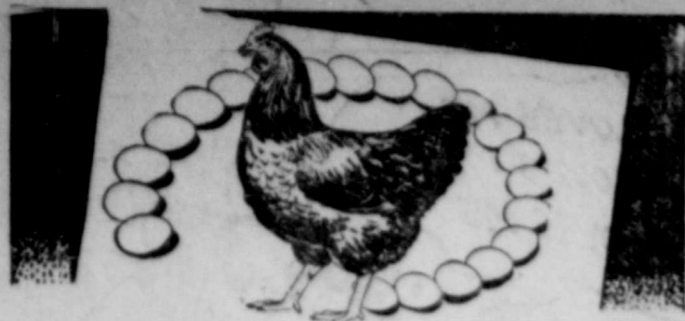
