Perhaps 500,000 Communist Youth To Participate In Berlin Ceremony

BERLIN, May 26 (UP) - The United States, Britain and France challenged Russia tonight on the eve of a long heralded "peace" demonstration here to cooperate in holding free elections to unify all Germany.

The reopening of the all-Germany election issue was calculated to take some of the wind out of the sails of the Communists who were massing young people in East Berlin for the touchiest demonstration here since the tense days of the Russian blockade.

Britain rolled armored cars in to Potsdammer Platz, the Times Square of Berlin, to guard against any violence during the rally of perhaps 500,000 Communist youths. Allied commanders have omised that any Communist at empt to cross into West Berlin will be repulsed.




Sabbath Day to keep it HOLY





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that our colleges are losing 29 percent of the members of their faculties holding doctor's degrees, Worse yet, only 60 percent of hose are being replaced with other teachers holding doctor's degrees. Dr. Barton compared salaries

paid in Texas colleges to others. "A comparison of salaries with those in state-supported institutions in California, Connecticut, Illinois, Arizona, Colorado, Massachussetts, Indiana, Michigan and New Jersey, most of which are teacher training institutions, shows Texas badly lagging.

"The minimum salaries for in-structors in Texas is \$1,,913, whereas the minimum in those nine states is \$3,000.

"Skipping assistant professors and associate professors, we find that the minimum salary for professors in Texas is \$3,700 where as it is \$4,780 in those nine states. "Out of fifteen Texas colleges studied, nine had a top salary of \$4,850 for full professors while the top salary range in the other states is from \$5,000 to \$7,400.
