Medical Journal Warns Scientists To Watch Love And Radiation

LONDON, June 2 (UP)—The Lancet, authoritative medical journal, advised atomic scientists today to watch their hearts as well as their radiation.

The journal noted that radiation often produces long delayed reactions "which are usually serious." So what happens if two atomic scientists fall in love and get married? The Lancet didn't profess to know, but it made clear its trepidation.

The comment was based on a study of the effects of radiation on victims of Hiroshima and Nagasaki, and on American scientists exposed over a period of years to a cyclotron.

The Lancet said scientists "have drawn attention to the danger that lies ahead for future generations of their forebearers now living are exposed to radiation."

The changes in heredity caused by this radiation may be passed down from generation to generation, the journal warned.

Pointing out that most atomic workers are exposed to only a small amount of radiation, the Lancet went on:

"But men and women doing work which exposes them to larger doses should perhaps find their life partners in other professions."

Volcano Erupts In Hawaii; None Hurt Or Killed

HONOLULU, June 2 (UP)—Flaming lava shot from famed Mauna Loa volcano today, slithering 15 miles across Hawaii Island, plunging steaming into the Pacific ocean.

The bubbling molten rock swept across the island's main arterial highway near Hookea village, jamming traffic for miles, but caused no casualties. No towns or villages were in its path.

The island's main town of Hilo, 200 miles southwest of Honolulu, is on the opposite side of Hawaii.

The violent eruption began last night from a single crater about 20 feet below the summit of Mauna Loa. It sent smoke and flames 20,000 feet into the air and its glow was clearly visible in Honolulu.

A dozen streams of lava rolled down the volcano's southwest slope, giving off flames 20 feet high that turned night into day. The flow steadily gained momentum and seemed to be moving at more than five miles an hour when it hit the Pacific.

Geyzers of steam shot nearly a mile into the sky along the Jona coast as the boiling stream rolled into the ocean.

Ex-Marine Held After Widow's Body Is Found

PORTLAND, Me., June 2 (UP)—A youthful ex-marine was seized in a blood-plattered automobile here early today and directed police to the body of a Melrose, Mass., widow he allegedly slew and dumped by the roadside after a 100-mile ride.

"Yeah, I killed her," police quoted William L. Elwell, 19, of Brunswick, after directing police to the Oak Hill section of Scarborough nine miles from here where the battered body of Mrs. Viola L. Tully, 56, was found.

A stepson of Mrs. Tully's brother, Elwell had been working for her three days as an odd job man and was driving her 1950 automobile when arrested.

Aid To Chinese Reds Discussed Office Reports

Ambassador Cabled Amerasia Digest

WASHINGTON, June 2 (UP)—The state department confirmed today that a "restricted" cable was sent to the American ambassador in Chungking in 1944 which discussed proposals by the magazine Amerasia to give aid to Chinese Communists guerrillas fighting the Japanese.

The cable was sent July 28, 1944, and was marked "Hull to Chungking." But there is no information that former Secretary of State Cordell Hull saw or signed the cable. All outgoing cables from the state department are signed by the Secretary of State.

It has been charged that the cable was among those seized in the Amerasia offices in New York in 1945. The FBI and the Office of Strategic Services made the seizures.

Assistant Attorney General James M. McInerney has denied that the cable was among the documents seized.

A state department spokesman said the cable contained a digest of an Amerasia issue and was prepared by the department's press section and sent to missions abroad for their information.

He said that the department still digests publications of interest and sends such to field missions concerned.

The cable quoted an Amerasia article which suggested the possibility of using a Japanese, Susumo Okano, as the "Tito of Japan." It suggested that he could help the Japanese people "establish a government which will discard aggression and the present ruling oligarchy."

The same issue proposed, the cable said, that opposition to Japan throughout Eastern China "should be strengthened by the Allies through establishing a close working relationship with the guerrilla Communist forces now operating behind the Japanese line and to bolster the activities with material and financial aid."

Secretary Of State Gives President His Support

Defendant Says He Gave Atom Secrets To US

PRAGUE, Czechoslovakia, June 2 (UP)—A defendant in the trial of 13 Czechs on charges of plotting to overthrow the Communist government testified today that he turned over Czech uranium secrets to agents of the Western powers.

Frantisek Prucek, 43, former National Socialist member of Parliament, said he got reports on uranium production and handed them to a newspaper editor who in turn sent them out of the country by the diplomatic communications channel of a Western embassy.

Prucek and Miss Frantiska Semanova, 68, member of parliament for 20 years, were the fourth and fifth defendants to plead guilty before the state court in Pankrac prison.

Drifting Fog Dampens Fire

HALIFAX, N. S., June 2—Dense fog drifted in from the Atlantic today and put a damper on flames that had roared unchecked through 15,000 acres of valuable Nova Scotia timberland since Monday.

But firefighters watched the skies and prayed for rain.

Chief Forester David S. Dyer, directing operations of some 2,000 volunteer and regular firemen said a heavy downpour was the best thing that could happen.

"Rain, and plenty of it, is the only thing that will stop a fire that's still smoldering in the Musquodoboit district and has threatened three villages," Dyer said. The forecast was for intermittent showers.

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Acheson Says Administration May Need More Than \$1,222,500,000 If Russia Continues Present Way

WASHINGTON, June 2 (UP)—Secretary of State Dean Acheson said today that the Administration may have to ask for more than the \$1,222,500,000 it has requested to arm our friends next year if Russia continues her present policies.

President Truman asked Congress yesterday to put up \$1,222,500,000 for a virtual global military assistance program for the fiscal year beginning July 1. Western Europe would get the lion's share of \$1,000,000,000.

Testifying in support of the request before senate committees today, Acheson was asked if Congress could count on cutting down spending to provide free arms.

Acheson replied that the United States might have to increase its spending "in the immediate future." He said the \$1,222,500,000 might not be enough.

He told members of the Senate foreign relations and armed services committees that "an honest answer" required him to state that arms sending might have to be increased.

Despite agreement at the London meeting of the Atlantic Pact powers for a "balanced, collective defense force," Acheson said the West is "a long way" from what he called an adequate defense posture.

Unless, he said, there is a "very considerable change" in the attitude of some aggressively-minded powers, the West is going to have to put "more rather than less effort" into defense planning and spending.

The Administration, meanwhile, which would continue the arms aid program of last year. That program would cost \$1,314,000,000. The new bill would broaden President Truman's authority to back free nations with American armaments by:

- 1. Permitting him to use up to \$122,250,000 for arms aid to any nation whose defense against aggression he found "vital to the security of the United States."
- 2. Authorizing the president to sell, not give, arms to any nation whose increased defense strength he found to be "important" to U. S. security.
- 3. Removing a prohibition against U. S. shipment of machinery and other equipment for European arms factories.

While in Ranger, Jameson was engaged in the grocery business. He was city secretary for a number of years. He is the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. D. L. Jameson.

Regent Prexy Says UT Needs Public Support

AUSTIN, June 2 (UP)—Chairman Dudley K. Woodward, Jr., of the University of Texas board of regents said today that the university needs public confidence new more than it has at any time in the past.

Woodward, speaking at convocation exercises for the Air, Force and Army, said:

Sen. William F. Knowland, R., Cal., asked whether some countries are "shifting part of the burden" of their defense costs onto the United States. Acheson replied some countries are increasing defense spending and that he would give the committee the details in secret session.

Acheson gave specific reasons for helping all of the nations which would receive free American arms, and laid emphasis on the dangers in the Orient and the need for keeping the program flexible.

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Those who would receive military assistance in the next fiscal year beginning July 1 are our 11 Atlantic Pact partners, Iran, Philippines, Korea, Greece and the "general area" of China.

President Truman made the \$1,222,500,000 request yesterday and Acheson followed with supporting punch arguments today. Chairman Tom Connally, D. Tex., of the foreign relations committee told reporters he expects Congress to give the Administration "substantially what it wants," he conceded the total might be cut down a "little." How much, he didn't say.

Acheson said President Truman's request for \$75,000,000 for the China area, would enable the President to take "rapid action when and where the opportunity exists to advance our interests thereby."

Red-Haired Woman

Georgia Piney Woods Crawling As Posse Seeks Machinegun Toters

DALTON, Ga., June 2—A posse of state troopers threw a tight ring today around a dense mountain thicket where two machinegun toting desperados and a red-haired woman ducked out of sight at the end of a hair-raising chase.

About 15 patrol cars from Georgia and Tennessee cruised around the piney woods section two miles west of Fairmount, Ga., in belief that the heavily-armed three some had scurried into the North Georgia hills on foot.

Gordon County Deputy Sheriff H. H. Prater said it was possible they had slipped out of the trap under cover of darkness last night but "it's my idea they are still in the woods."

The plan to send foot patrols into the thicket after the fugitives was abandoned because of the heavy undergrowth.

"You could walk within 10 feet of them and still not see them," Prater said.

Bloodhounds from nearby prison camps couldn't pick up their trail because so many posse members had milled around the area before the dogs arrived, he said.

The troopers and county officers converged on Fairmount last night after they had engaged desperados in a running gun battle down the winding mountain highway from Chattanooga, Tenn. The gunmen fired at their pursuers through the rear window of a stolen automobile. One of them was believed to have been wounded.

Patrolmen threw roadblocks across all roads in the vicinity, brought in trucks with floodlights to use during the pre-dawn hours and organized what was described as "one of Georgia's biggest manhunts."

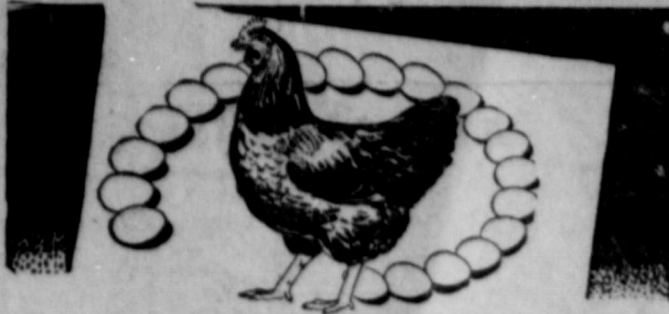
