# Pheasant hunters draw fire

The most hunters Castro County has ever seen in one day declared war on pheasants Saturday morning - and now many land owners seem ready to declare war on the hunters.

ESTIMATES on the number of pheasant hunters in the county on opening day ranged as high as 5,000 - the equivalent of half the county's population. However, setting an accurate figure isn't possible since hunters aren't required to register here or buy local pemits.

Anyone walking the county's stubble fields or lake bottoms Saturday morning and listening to the shotgun blasts from every direction wouldn't doubt the 5,000hunter figure, however,



THE helicopter's landing skids buried themselves 12 to 14 inches into the soft ground during the impact. The copter received heavy







## State cites Jones for second time

An official State Health Department citation for work proficien cy has been awarded to E. M. Jones, director of public works for the City of Dimmitt, This is the second such citation to be awarded Jones this month, ac cording to state officials.

SIGNED by the State Health Commissioner and authorities of the Texas Water Utilities Association, the certificate of competency is awarded only to those utility plant operators who have successfully demonstrated their skill and knowledge in modern principles of plant management.

To qualify for certification, a plant operator must have accumulated a prescribed amount of actual work experience. He must also have attended both regional and statewide short schools at which the techniques of water treatment and waste water dis posal are taught, and must have passed an examination given by State Health Department sanitation engineers.

State law requires that at least one operator per shift be certified for competency by health department engineers, but many operators seek certification on their own time and at their own expense to increase their effici-
