The presidential orders require deferment of all men living with their wives or children and o ents. The law, however does not require this, It leaves dependency deferments entirely up to the

The law authorizes, and the re gulations require, deferment also of men who are essential to the national interest, safety or health, because of their positions in agriculture, science, industry "or other endeavors." Local boards decide who is and who is not in this

With few and small calls to be filled, local boards have interpreted the occupational deferment provisions very broadly, giving the registrant the benefit of the doubt. With a big demand for men, they , could be a lot tougher.

The only limit in the law on the number of men to be drafted is that total strength of the Army men respectively.

Practically, there is a much tighter limit, set by the amount of money Congress appropriates. Appropriations for this year allow for the three services maximum strengths of 639,000, 499,000, and 417,000 men respectively.

All three services are somewhat under this strength. However, the Navy and Air Force don' like the draft and aren't likely to use it. The Army, short abou 36,000 men, hopes to get them by voluntary recruitment.


Because a couple of thoughtless drivers threw a newspaper out of their car yesterday, Miss Gilbert, our school principal, nearly had a bad accident.

He pointed out that those men aren't criminals. Just careless, like a lot of us seem to be getting these days, judging from the trash you see along roadsides. From where I sit, this near accident may be the lesson we need to make us stop littering our roads-and start showing a little tolerant consideration for our neighbors!
