AIR FORCE MAY NEED WAR II VE' **ARMED** FORCES **RUSH CALLING OF RESERVES**

WASHINGTON, July 21 (UP)—The armed forces indicated to a fastmoving congress today that they want at least 600,000 to 700,000 more men in a hurry.

Their spokesmen did not give figures, except to say that the present legal limit of 2,005,000 will be exceeded. It would take 550,000 to reach the limit,

The military men testified before the senate and house armed services committees. After hearing their brief explanations of the situation, the committees in rapidfire order approved bills to re move the present 2,005,000-man limit on the size of the armed forces and to extend all ex-piring enlistments for one year. The military spokesmen said their mobilizition plans call for a hurry-up expansion of the armed forces from the present 1,458,-000 officers and men to well Two pretty misses sitting on the fence on their preferences above 2,005,000



US Must Brace For Big Taxes

United Press Staff Corresponder WASHINGTON, July 21 (UP -Americans must brace themse ves now for the heaviest tax but dens ever imposed upon them.

The alternative of reducin, other classifications of govern ment expenditure as hot-cold wa costs zoom has been firmly reject ed by President Truman.

It appears now that he will as Congress for authority to spen approximately \$57,500,000,000 i the current fiscal year. That re presents the \$42,400,000,000 budget for spending before fighting began in Korea, plus a \$10,000, 000,000 emergency national defenarm our Allies.

That rate of expenditure would bably will be as great or greater.
