



JAPANESE BOMBS at Pearl Harbor on December 7, 1941, opened hostilities for the 25th Infantry division which occupied defensive beach positions and was charged

with defending naval installations on Oahu island. The division had been activated only two months previously from the old Hawaiian division, two of its infantry regiments—the 27th and the 35th ments—the 27th and the 35th—having been assigned to the new division. The 101st Infantry regiment, enroute to the Philippines at the time of the Pearl Harbor attack, was stopped at Oahu and joined the 25th. For a year it garrisoned the Hawaiian islands and trained in jungle warfare and amphibious tactics.

General J. Lawton Collins, now Chief of Staff of the Army, commanded the division in training

manded the division in training and led it into its initial action at Guadalcanal in January, 1943.

at Guadalcanal in January, 1943.

Heroic action on Guadalcanal
started a combat record for the 25th which saw that unit triumph over
the Japs on New Georgia, during the bitter fighting on Vella LaVella
and on Luzon. When Guadalcanal was conquered the division spent
five months in garrison duty, and in July, 1943, arrived off New
Georgia island where the 161st Infantry regiment went into the fight
for Munda air field. Later the division took part in the historie
19-day march through jungle mud to secure the important harbor
of Bairoko. Units of the 25th helped to take Arundel island while
other elements secured Vella LaVella island despite intense Jap air
raids.

experience in fighting the chemy in the open furnished valuable training for the eventual campaign for the liberation of the Philip-pines. In January, 1945, it arrived on Luzon and soon was engaged in taking the gateway to the Cagayan valley and three months of almost continual fighting followed. After the capitulation of the Japanese the division moved to Japan for occupation duty.

The Distinguished Unit Citation was awarded to aix components of the division and five of its personnel were presented with the Congressional Medal of Honor,

The 25th is commanded by Major General William B. Kean who was born in Buffalo, New York, and graduated from the U. S. Military Academy, and was commissioned a second lieutenant of infantry in 1918. He was chief of staff of the II Corps in the Tunisian and Sicilian campaigns in 1943 and served as chief of staff of the 1st Army from the Normandy landing throughout the European

The shoulder patch of the 25th is in the form of a taro leaf in red on which is superimposed a flash of lightning in gold. Use of the taro leaf signifies that the division stems from the old Hawaiian division. The lightning flash represents the speed with which the division carries out its assignments.
