## US Wins \$400,000 PROJECT SET At Both **Red Ends**

### **WAEGWAN FALLS TO COMBINED** US, SOUTH KOREAN FORCES; **REDS FLEEING FROM SEOUL**

United Press Staff Correspondent TOKYO, Sept. 19 (UP)-Americans and South Koreans recaptured Waegwan and entered the outskirts of Pohang today as the enemy began a series of surprise withdrawals at Seoul and all around the Pusan beachhead.

Carrier planes blasted and almost completely destroyed a column of trucks pulling out northward from Seoul. American reconnaissance planes reported it appeared the Communists were withdrawing to escape U. S. Marines massing in the southwest suburbs for an imminent assaut on the former South Korean capital.

Men of the American 24th division, shifted secretly from the northeastern end of the Pusan perimeter, took bitterlycontested Waegwan, while at Pohang a battalion of the South Korean third division entered the southwest outskirts of the ruined port.



Smoking and matches, 91,000 fires

— Never throw away lighted matches or cigarettes. Have ash trays handy. Never smoke in bed or near combustibles. Another 20,800 fires are caused by children playing with matches, Keep matches in metal containers, out of the reach of small children.

Misuse of electricity, 70,200 fires — Don't substitute a penny for a fuse. Make sure capacity of circuits is adequate to carry electricity safely to all appliances. Never try to operate defective direction electrical equipment. Replace frayed cords immediately, Keep motors clean and repaired.



Flammable liquids, 41,800 fires — Never use gasoline or any other explosive clean cloths. Non-flammable cleaners are available. A spark from a cat's back is enough to ignite vapors.

Sparks on roofs, 23,500 fires—A flammable roof is a big, vulnerable target for a flying spark. Recover warped, weather-beaten flammable re-beaten flammable roofs with asphalt shingles or similar fire-resistant material.

Defective heating equipment and chimney, 75,300 fires—A flammable rate, 75,300 fires—A flammable target for a flying spark. Replace worn and defective parts promptly. Don't stack combustible material of any kind near the furnace.







#### Your Health

AUSTIN, (Special)-At least four different types of radioactive detection instruments and com puters are available for measuring radiation particles if and when an atomic bomb is ever exploded over a Texas community.

This encouraging bit of infornaton was revealed by the state's chief health official, Dr. Geo. W. Cox. He's state director of health Dixon Circle and Mrs. Jim Houghand emergency medical services, part of the Texas civil defense


