Texas U. To Get 4,000,000-Volt Atom Smasher

AUSTIN, Sept. 30 (UP)—The University of Texas will have a 4,000,000-volt atom smasher by 1951 or 1952, a spokesman said today.

The huge machine, a Van De Graaf electrostatic generator, will be "as large as any of its kind ever made."

The atom smasher, part of the university's off-campus research center, will be built under the terms of four research contracts signed yesterday by the university's board of regents with the Atomic Energy Commission.

Dr. C. P. Borer, university director of government sponsored research, said construction of the machine will begin with a \$50,000 university appropriation.

The AEC contracts total \$75,186. They call for training of graduate students in nuclear physics; basic research in bacteriology, zoology and chemistry, and the atom smasher.

Borer said university scientists will explore new fields in nuclear reactions experiments.

Buffalo Tail Gets Recall To Take Up Slack

By Harman W. Nichols; United Press Staff Correspondent; WASHINGTON, (UP)—The big question at the interior department is—how far should a buffalo's tail sag?

Some say the buffalo's wagger on the seal of the 1650-page minerals yearbook wags too low. The book sells for \$4.25 per copy. A rumor was floated not long ago that the first 10,000 copies were recalled—at great public expense—so that an artist could crop the buffalo's tail, and do the whole print job over.

The government printing office admitted that the big blue book was late hitting the stands, but doesn't say why.

The Wall Street Journal, ever alert for a chance to plug the need for economy in these trying times, carried one sentence in a column out of Washington—that the Buffalo's tail was too long and the books had been recalled.

The public relations department for interior finally broke down and admitted it had a good kidding coming. What had happened, it said, was that the original seal didn't carry the date of the founding of the department, which was March 3, 1849.

"All of this was corrected, however, before the book went to press," a spokesman said. "It didn't cost much."

The spokesman added that it was sort of an office joke—that stuff about the sagging buffalo tail.

I called Dr. William Mann of the Washington zoo and asked him how far the tail on a buffalo should sag. He wasn't quite sure.

"Some of our buffaloes have tails this long and others tails that long," he said. "It's hard to tell."

"What assistant secretary is in charge of the sag in the buffalo's tail?"

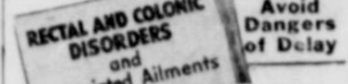
"Under Washington protocol, where would he sit at the banquet table?"

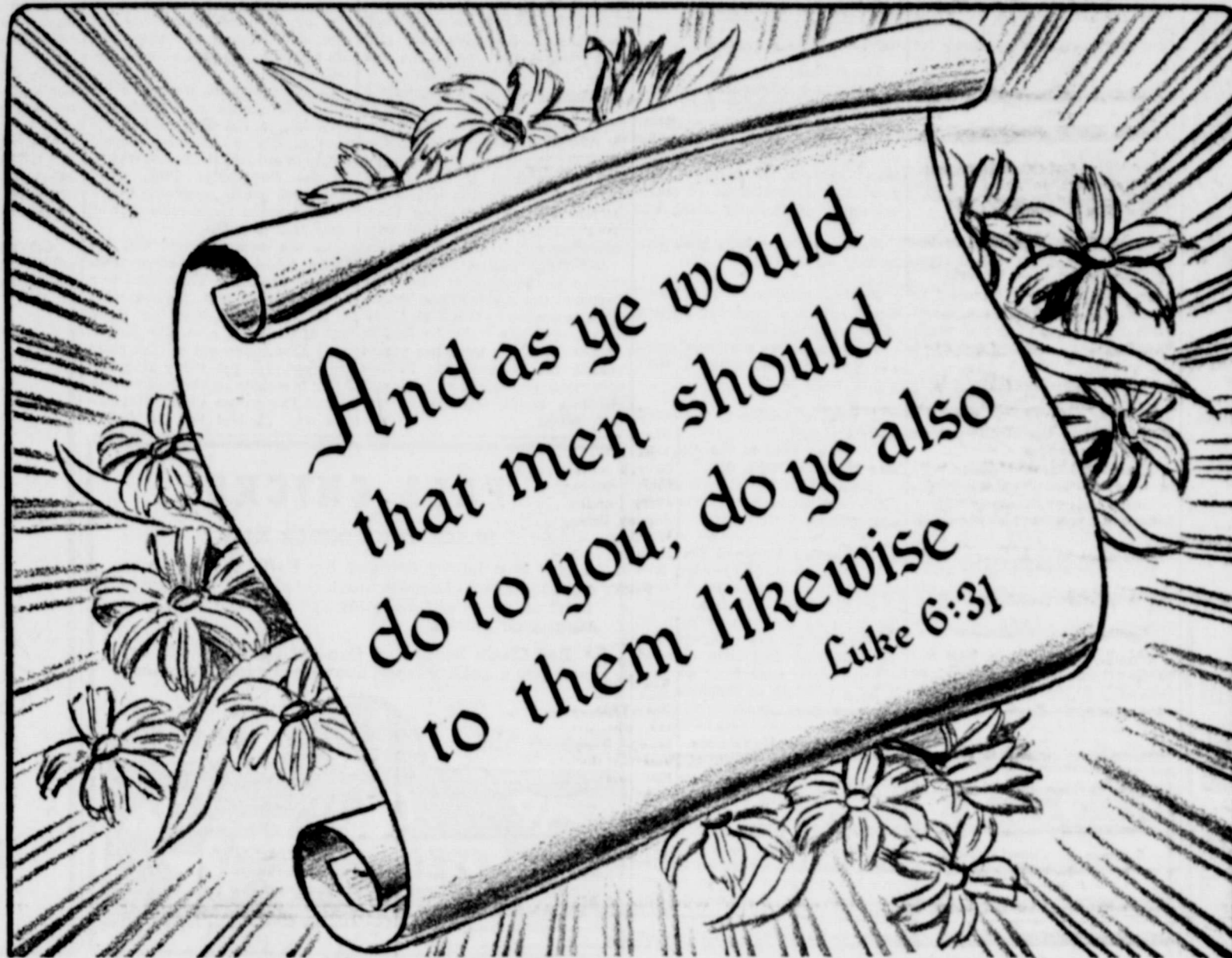

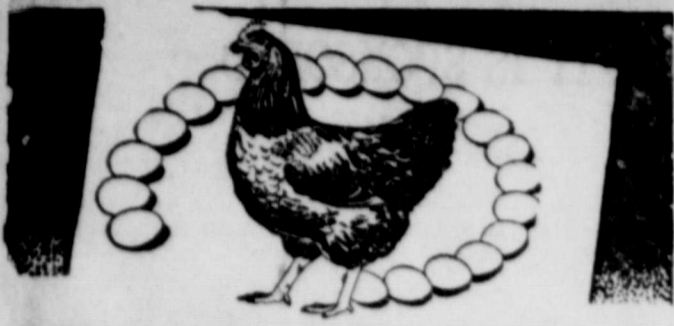

PLUG 'N TRIGGER

United Press Outdoors Consultant tells you that fish can't distinguish between colors.

Here's proof. On a recent fishing trip for tuna, one member of the party rigged up a bright red feather lure, and just as the feather hit the water a 50-pounder took it. Two more anglers switched to red feather rigs and got the same gratifying results.

Altogether, the party took 39 tuna with the red feather rigs. They weren't little ones either. They ranged from 45 to 75 pounds.

And here's the clincher. Other fishermen in the same area came in empty handed because they had no red feather lures aboard.

The tuna weren't interested in anything but red feathers. White feather lures didn't get a single strike.

Cool weather and rising waters on lake Texoma have produced nice black bass catches recently, with some of the fish weighing five to six pounds.

The black bass are being found in newly-flooded areas of weeds, willows and anywhere there is foliage or water plants. Black top-water lures have been most effective.

Sand bars are lurking in water 30 feet deep or more, and are being caught with small deep-running, light colored plugs and spoons.

Crappie in the huge lake are being taken on minnows and occasionally on casts of small pieces.

Howard Dodgen, executive secretary of the Texas Game, Fish and Oyster commission, announces the fall session of the marine laboratory seminar an field study of marine sciences. It will be held Oct. 27-29 at the marine laboratory in Rockport, Tex.

All arrangements of the program are under the direction of the chief marine biologist.

The seminar is designed to give colleges and universities an opportunity to acquaint their students with the marine sciences.

While the session is basically planned for biological and closely allied subjects, it should be of value to representatives of many industries, particularly along the Gulf coast.

Fans Are In Store For One Of Maddest Finishes In Major League Baseball As Phillies, Bums Race

NEW YORK, Sept. 30 (UP)—Gang-way fans for the maddest finish of them all and don't bet against those Dodgers because anything can happen in Brooklyn and that is just where the next important bit of baseball history may be made.

The way ahead was strewn with shoals for the Dodgers, who still have to win two straight and four out of five altogether to stave off extinction. Today in National League president Ford Frick's office, someone will toss a coin to determine where the first of three playoff games will be, provided the Brooks beat the Phils two straight.

It was the Dodgers against the Phillies today with the National League pennant and a possible three-game playoff at stake, and even though the odds were still long against the brooks, no one could shrug off their chances.

The madness in the American League has subsided. The Yankees, as usual, are the champions by virtue of their lobby-sitting clinching yesterday. They rested in their hotel at Boston as the Cleveland Indians dug it into the Detroit Tigers, eliminating them from further mathematical consideration with a 12 to 2 triumph.

But there was string-snapping tension in the national where, the Dodgers came roaring from behind twice yesterday to win 7 to 5 and 7 to 6 decisions from the Boston Braves. Brooklyn went two games behind the pace-making Phillies with just two more to go—and the two teams squared against each other.

By National League rules the team winning the toss gets the site of the first game and the next two (if two are necessary) are played in the park of the other team.

Figuring that the Dodgers could win both games and throw the race into a tie, they still would have to win two of three playoff games to get into the series, whereas the floundering Phils could blow both games remaining in the regular season and survive by winning the playoff.

As the teams squared off, the Dodgers had to be rated as "day-to-day" favorites. They have won 12 out of their last 15 games whereas the Phillies have lost seven out of their last nine. The Brooks were nine games out of first place on Sept. 18, yet today they are hotly breathing on the Philly necks—just two games away. Brooklyn has won 19 and lost 14 during

the month of September while the Phillies haven't even played 500 baseball, winning 12 and losing 15.

For today's episode in this baseball drama, manager Burt Shotton of the Dodgers nominated right-hander Ery Palica, one of his most consistent hurlers in recent weeks. He will face Philly right hander "Sluggo" Russ Meyer, who distinguished himself yesterday by clouting a photographer in the jaw because he objected to having his picture taken while watching the Dodgers beat the Braves.

In the only other major league games, Walt Dropo's ninth-inning triple gave the Boston Red Sox a 7 to 6 victory over the Washington Senators in the afternoon and Alpha Brasie pitched a four-hitter after relieving Cloyd Boyer in the first inning to give the St. Louis Cardinals a 5 to 1 night triumph over the Chicago Cubs.

Yesterday's Star — Bob Lemon of the Cleveland Indians, who knocked the Detroit Tigers out of the pennant race with a six-hit, 12 to 2 victory.
