This teen-ager was almost casualty in the squad's first action in Korea. A water can fell on him from a plane.

It smashed his Browning automatic rifle but did not injure him. Then, in the Obangi ridge fighting, he was wounded by a grenade. It took him just three day to recover from that.

On Sept. 3 Mateo was hit by 90-milimeter shell fragment.
