Late Rally Fails As Ranger Loses, 25-19

An explosive first half display of line power hurled the Hamilton Bulldogs past Ranger, 25-19, for the visiting team's third conference win over their toughest barrier blocking their try for the district crown.

The ball game was won in the first two periods. Ranger's vaunted fleet-winged backs were stopped cold in those initial quarters. Dropped passes hurt—an intercepted pass was costly—and Barnett's sweeps around left end behind perfect blocking were the three reasons Ranger came out on the short end of the important contest.

Coach Warden's team came back the second half and played a vastly improved game but Hamilton had iced the game with that 19-7 half-time score. Ranger couldn't catch up even though they threatened with their passes with seconds left in the game.

As if sensing that "He who scores first in this game will win," the Hamilton squad turned an intercepted Ranger pass into a score early in the first quarter. Arbutle snagged Cunningham's pass that was bounced up by a defensive Hamilton back.

Two passes brought the ball to Ranger's 10 yard line. On second and 10 after an incomplete pass, Winkles sliced over right tackle for the 10-yard score. Hamilton went ahead 6-0 after the point was missed.

Ranger smashed back in eight plays from their own 35-yard line for a 65-yard scoring drive, climaxed by a 45-yard pass and run from Cunningham to Comacho for a touchdown. Comacho converted and Ranger went ahead for the first and only time, 7-6.

Hamilton got the ball for the second time and ate up 50 yards for a touchdown. Their off-tackle tries were smeared by Yung, Davenport, Hummel and Mendoza. But end sweeps, behind vicious blocking, were always good for a first down. From Ranger's 6, Tension passed to Streger for the touchdown. Extra point was good and Hamilton took the lead again and never was headed, 13-7.

So, turning to the air, Cunningham completed a pass to Cantrell, who wrestled the ball away from his opponent, gaining 27 yards down to the Hamilton 43.

Now, Ranger pulled their "secret play"—Comacho doing the passing but the aerial fell incomplete. Two first downs found the ball on Hamilton's 21 but on fourth with one to go, Woods was stopped for no gain and the ball went over to Hamilton.

After an exchange of the ball, a second Hamilton interception proved costly to Ranger. Brannan stole the pass on his 40 yard line and rambled 60 yards for Hamilton.

Flowing Well In Ranger Sand May Mean New Pool

The recent oil strike on the Smith farm northwest of Eastland is doubly important.

The well, owned by Bert Fields, is a mile and a half extension of the Briggs Owen pool, which was discovered a few months ago and now has 13 producing wells, with others drilling. The Briggs Owen production is from the Lake Eastland sand and the Smith well was as favorable in the Lake sand, oil men say, as the Briggs Owen wells were before they were given hydraulic fracture.

But the operator decided to find out what there was lower down. After all, he could always come back to the Lake sand. And in the Ranger sand, he got a flowing well. As the nearest production in the Ranger is a mile and a half southwest, the Smith well could mean a new pool.

So the well extends the Briggs Owen Lake sand pool a mile and a half and, at one and the same time, promises a new Ranger sand pool.

Extra point was good and the score began to shrink, Hamilton 25, Ranger 19.

Ranger got the ball twice before the game ended. On their first try to tie the score, the drive was halted when Cole dropped a pass on the Ranger 40 forcing Ranger to punt.

The second time, Ranger worked on their passes but Cunningham hardly had a chance to throw. Ranger's final chance died on their own 25 as Hamilton took over in the last seconds of the game.

Peanut Acreage Cut

Texas Allotment For 1951 Drops 123,141 Acres

(EDITOR'S NOTE: The proposed reduction of peanut allotment acreage drew sharp protest from Eastland County's peanut growers. T. C. Wylie, manager of the Ranger Peanut Co., said that "it was a dirty shame" that acreage would be slashed. County growers would not like the news, Wylie said. Eastland County has the second highest peanut acreage in the state.)

COLLEGE STATION, Tex. Oct. 27 (UP)—Texas peanut growers will vote December 14 on whether marketing quotas on that crop will be extended to cover the 1951-52-53 crops, the production and marketing administration announced today.

The state FMA committee set the 1951 acreage allotment at 376,732 acres as compared to 499,873 acres this year. The national allotment was set yesterday by Secretary of Agriculture Charles F. Brannan at 1,771,117 acres. The allotment this year was 2,100,000 acres.

"The state acreage allotment will be apportioned through community and county committees among the farms on which peanuts were grown in any of the three years, 1948-50," state FMA committee chairman B. F. Vance said. Folling places will be provided in each peanut growing community, he said, and any farmer growing peanuts in 1950 will be eligible to vote.

Brannan said a referendum will be held among growers Dec. 14 to determine whether the rigid controls are used. If growers vote them down, price support guarantees would be reduced sharply.

In the referendum, growers will have an opportunity also to vote in favor of quotas for the 1952 and 1953 crops. A 2-1 vote is required to put quotas under force. Brannan said he reduced the allotment for next year because of the decline in the domestic market demand for edible peanuts is not expected to be offset entirely by population increases and increased military requirements.

BOMBERS STAY ON GROUND; NO MORE TARGETS TO BOMB

TOKYO, Oct. 28 (UP)—Two Allied columns broke through strong Communist defense lines on the northwest Korean front today and plunged on toward the Manchurian frontier without opposition.

Red troops were reported falling back toward the Yalu River frontier under heavy air attack. U. S. planes destroyed at least eight tanks, 19 vehicles and a number of supply and ammunition dumps.

Second Storm Hits Northwest, 10 Persons Die

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 28 (UP)—The second big storm in as many days battered the Pacific Northwest today, and the toll of dead and maiming in nature's first major autumn assault rose to 10.

Winds of near hurricane force churned coastal waters and lashed cities far inland in northern California, Oregon, Washington and British Columbia.

Off northern Washington, a third low pressure area appeared to be dividing for a two-pronged attack on the rain and wind whipped coast.

Three persons were killed in highway accidents attributed to the storms, and two persons drowned.

Four men were feared dead in the presumed crash of an Air Force transport plane missing since Thursday night, and an elk hunter was lost in the rugged mountains of northeastern Oregon.

More lives were endangered at sea. The Coast Guard at Seattle reported that at least two craft were in distress.

Guests yesterday reached a recorded peak of 80 miles an hour at Richland, Wash., home of the Hanford Atomic Project. But the weather bureau forecast slackening winds today.

Rain and winds were estimated to have caused more than \$500,000 damage to late crops. Fire whipped by the winds added to the property toll.

Texas Game Agency Amends Two Regulations

AUSTIN, Oct. 29.—Two regulations affecting fishing in Texas were recently amended at the last regular monthly meeting of the Game, Fish and Oyster Commission, according to the Executive Secretary of the Commission.

The first of these regulations affects the taking of minnows from waters in the Panhandle area. Under the amended regulation not more than 1,000 minnows may be taken or possessed at any one time by any one person from the waters of the following counties: Dallam, Sherman, Hansford, Ochiltree, Lipscomb, Hartley, Moore, Hutchinson, Roberts, Hemphill, Oldham, Potter, Carson, Gray, Farmer, Wheeler, Deaf Smith, Randall, Armstrong, Donley, Collingsworth, Castro, Swisher, Briscoe, Hall, Childress, Cottle and Motley.

This regulation, prior to amendment, provided that not more than 200 minnows could be in the possession of any one person at any one time.

The second change in regulations acted upon by the Game Commission affects the North Bosque River below the Waco Dam to where the Bosque River flows into the Brazos River. All nets and seines, other than the 20 foot minnow seine and fruit jar type trap for taking minnows for bait, are prohibited in this two mile stretch of the Bosque River.

The Executive Secretary announced that these new regulations go into effect November 19.

Havana Troops Alerted For General Strike

HAVANA, Cuba, Oct. 28 (UP)—Troops were ordered into Havana bus sheds today as a nationwide 12-hour general strike set for 5 a. m. began shaping up in rail and bus lines.

Labor leaders called on workers in every industry in Cuba, as well as on national, state and city government employees, to join a "show of strength" work stoppage. The strike was billed as a protest against alleged management plans for nine pounds.

to lower wages and increase working hours.

The first response came as early as midnight, when departure of a train from Havana to Santiago de Cuba was suspended. It was the first of two daily trains along that route.

As the strike spread to other transport lines, the military controller of the Havana Bus Company ordered reinforcements placed in every bus shed in the capital.

Domestic and international airlines cancelled all flights until noon, with the exception of the Dutch KLM Airlines, the National Airlines, and the Braniff Line. Executives of these three companies will handle luggage and perform other duties, it was announced.

However, the International Airport at Rancho Boyeros was scheduled to close down until 1:30 p. m. Electricity was cut off for 10-minute periods in several of Havana's 43 districts last night, as a prelude to the general strike.

All hospitals, clinics and emergency wards were maintaining special watches. The workers' confederation said it would continue distributing ice to hospitals and funeral homes.

Secretary-General Eusebio Mujal of the CWC said the stoppage was intended to impress management and the government with labor's strength.

He said labor opposes employers' plans to band together in a national federation, this, he said,

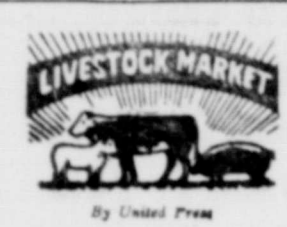
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PLUG 'N TRIGGER

 For a meal and plenty of sport in the fall of the year, you can't beat small, red fish that abound on the Texas Coast.

These fish, weighing from one to five pounds, are known to fishermen as rat reds. All summer they have been in shallow water, scattered from here to yonder feeding on young shrimp.

As the shrimp move out in the fall, they find that the rat reds have anticipated their move and are schooled up in the mouths of bays and bays waiting to continue eating shrimp.

The reds will be found in guts or depressions, sometimes by the hundreds, in water that usually is not over a foot to two feet deep ready to pounce on anything that comes off the flats.

The lucky fisherman who finds these concentrations and who knows his business can catch a fish on every cast until he cleans or scares them out.

The boys who know this type of fishing leave their boats some distance away and carefully wade up to the holes.

These holes are easily seen because they usually are in white sand surrounded by moss. When a gut or a series of holes

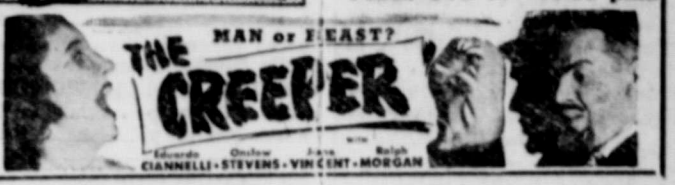

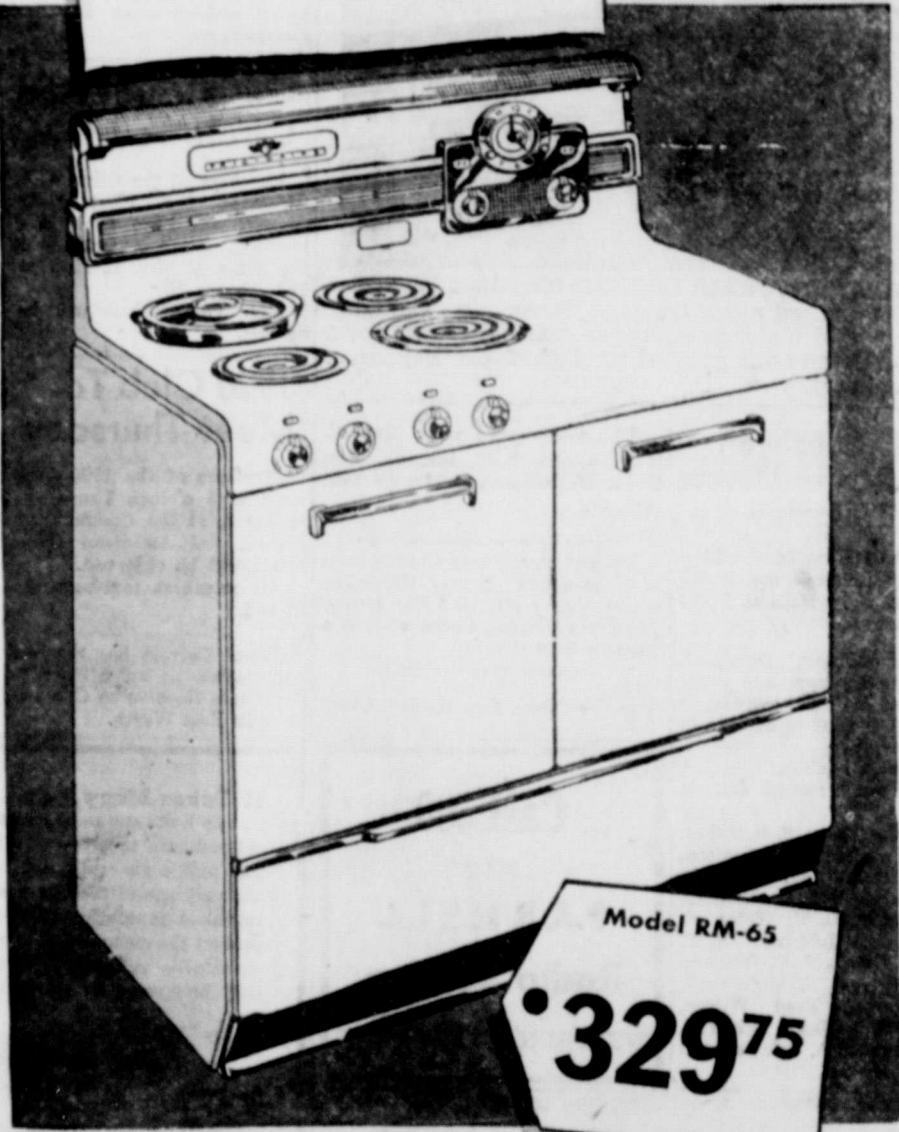
