The American troops have thus sliced the Korean front into two parts and virtually isolated Red forces in Korea's northeast corner (dotted area). On east coast, South Koreans reached vicinity of Chuchonjang (2) and Red resistance was reported decreasing. On northwest front, Communists completed new defense line (fagged symbol) on approaches to vital Yalu River power plants (3). Big new battles in that sector loomed as "considerable" enemy armor was reported moving down from the frontier toward the new line, U. S. Marines circling around Chosin Reservoir (4) reported no contact with enemy. In Samin (5) area, east of Pyongyang, Allies were moving in against by-passed guerrillas. (NEA Telephoto).
