## **Formosa Defies Truman's Cease Fire Request**

By Victor Kendrick United Press Staff Corespondent HONG KONG, Nov. 27 (UP) -Chinese Nationalists are raiding the Communist mainland and threatening to invade it in apparent defiance of President Truman's cease-fire request, reports reaching here said today.

Both naval and air forces wer reported in action against the Communist coast. A Nationalist plane also was said to have dropped leaflets on Liuchow peninsula promising that a Nationalist counter offensive against the mainland would begin soon.

A Formosa report said Nationalst warships were attacking the amunist garrison on Yuhwan Island in Wenchow Bay, 220 miles south of Shanghai. Nationalist marines were reported awaiting the signal to swarm ashore for a hit-and-run raid.
