Army Braces For All-Out Red Attack

Communists Believed Probing For Weak Spot Before Powerful Attack

By Earnest Hobercht TOKYO, Dec. 14 (UP)—U.S. defenders of the shrunken Allied beachhead in northeast Korea beat off 300 more attacking Chinese Reds today and braced tensely for an expected all-out offensive by 10 Communist divisions—more than 100,000 men.

The Chinese hit the Hungnam-Hungnam beachhead defense line a few miles north of Hungnam early today for the second time in 24 hours. They were repulsed by U. S. 3rd Division troops in a two-hour battle.

(Gen. Douglas MacArthur's headquarters has clamped a security blackout on all reports of the evacuation by sea of Allied troops in the beachhead.)

A front dispatch tonight reported "all quiet" around the half-moon front being held by 3rd and 7th Division troops before the port of Hungnam after the early-morning Chinese attack.

However, it was noted that the latest enemy thrust was made in two-company strength, twice the size of forces which made the initial attack against the beachhead perimeter nearly 24 hours earlier.

The Reds were believed probing the Allied line for a possible weak spot before launching a powerful assault designed to overwhelm the outnumbered United Nations forces and drive them into the sea.

A Communist reconnaissance plane flew over Hungnam last night for the second straight night.

The Chinese were reported steadily reinforcing the 10 divisions, which already pen the United Nations forces against the northeast coast.

Carrier and land planes fanning out from the beachhead today blasted one 100-truck convoy moving south from the Manchurian border toward the coast.

United Press war correspondent Jack Burby reported from the front tonight:

"Inside the perimeter, UN forces are sweating out the Chinese next move and it is most difficult

to separate the facts from rumors growing from the mounting tension. "Hungnam's civilians caught that tight feeling, too. I saw half a dozen vicious fights among crowds of Koreans quarreling over possession of a bag of rice or flour.

"Elsewhere civilians mill around aimlessly, padding silently along muddy roads carrying bundles of food and belongings. "Through all the waiting runs just two questions: When will the Chinese hit and how hard?"

However, dispatches from correspondents with both the U.S. 3rd and 7th Divisions reported American GIs in the beachhead confident they can hold off Chinese forces up to 10 times their size.

The increase in enemy air effectiveness and activity indicates that, intention, the Air Force said.

"The pattern now unfolding may reveal a steadily increasing tempo of air activity as additional aircraft become available from Communist China or the Soviet Union," an Air Force spokesman told a 10 a.m. EST news briefing.

His statements were in connection with a summary of enemy air activity from June 25 to December 8.

New Air Buildup Expected Of Reds

WASHINGTON, Dec. 14 (UP)—The Air Force said today that the Communists in Korea may be building up to strong new air operations with forces from Red China and Soviet Russia.

Included in the program will be a few novelty numbers and Folk Songs which are characteristic of the pre-Christmas season, but are not yet widely known or sung. It is possible that several students of the chorus will take part in other portions of the show, but due to technical clearances necessary it is impossible to announce who will be included.

Dr. Boswell announces that the chorus has also tentatively accepted an invitation to appear before the Association of Southern Colleges which meets in San Antonio next spring.

Currently, in addition to the television show, the chorus is preparing for their part in "The Messiah" which is to be sung in Ranger this Sunday evening at 8 in the Methodist Church under the direction of Mr. Charles Kiker, faculty member of the college.

Chinese Radio Gives Own Terms For Peace Settlement

HONG KONG, Dec. 14 (UP)—The Chinese Communist radio rejected the peace bid of President Truman and British Prime Minister Clement R. Attlee today and blasted hopes of a Chinese halt at Korea's 38th Parallel.

The Reds at the same time laid down their own terms for a peace settlement. As broadcast by radio Peking, they are:

- 1. Withdrawal of United Nations troops from Korea. 2. Withdrawal of "American aggressive troops" from Formosa. 3. Cessation by the Western Powers of all "armed expansion" and war preparations.

Only a peace on these terms would be acceptable to Communist China, Asia and "the whole world" the Peking broadcast said.

It said Communist troops in the meantime intend to press their military operations in Korea until UN forces are driven into the sea.

The broadcast was based on a lengthy editorial which appeared in the government's official newspaper Peking People's Daily News.

As a reply to the joint Truman-Attlee communique of Dec. 8, the communique had appealed to Red China to negotiate a peaceful settlement of the Korean war on the basis of "a free and independent Korea."

The editorial said the President and the Prime Minister ignored demands for the withdrawal of all foreign troops from Korea.

"For this reason," it said, "Chinese volunteers and the Korean People's Army must continue with unrelenting effort to deal heavy blows to the enemy."

The editorial said the Truman-Attlee communique proved the United States and Britain are "resolved to speed up the organization of their aggressive military forces" under the "American imperialist centralized command" of Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower.

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BULLETIN

WASHINGTON, Dec. 14 (UP)—President Truman has definitely decided to declare a national emergency before the end of this week.

He now plans to do so on Saturday after explaining in a nation-wide broadcast tomorrow night (9:30 p. m. CST) that this—and other—action is necessary to meet the grave crisis facing the country and the world.

This was the word that circulated after Mr. Truman held a second day of conferences with Democratic and Republican Congressional Leaders on steps to meet the emergency.

The emergency plans contemplate a faster build-up of the nation's armed forces, partial mobilization of the home front, and perhaps some price-wage controls.

Wildcat Train Strikes Spread To Washington

CHICAGO, Dec. 14 (UP)—Wildcat strikes by railroad trainmen crippled or slowed rail service in four major cities today despite a U.S. court order here demanding that their union get the men back to work.

The wave of strikes, in which the men reported "sick," began Monday at Birmingham, Ala. Yesterday it spread to Chicago, Midwestern rail hub, and today to Washington and St. Louis. Effects of the Washington walkout were felt at nearby Baltimore, Md., although the Army at Washington had no word that trainmen were off the job in the Maryland city.

The walkouts spread despite Army warnings that the nation's war effort was hampered by any slowdown in rail service.

In Chicago, the strikers, members of the Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen, walked off their yard jobs at 17 railroads. In Washington, seven railroads were hit.

Officials of the Belt Line of Chicago, mainly a switching line, reported that 5,000 freight cars were idled and that 75 per cent of them carried materials for the war effort in the Pacific. The New York Central late yesterday, called a partial embargo on west-to-east shipments routed through Chicago.

The trainmen were warned that the government will try them for contempt citations—which could subject the union to the possibility of fines if it were found guilty—unless their members end their strike. Karl Bendetsen, assistant army secretary, issued the warning at Washington. Federal officials at Chicago also indicated that would be the government's course.

Those who urged him to take those actions were ranking Democratic and Republican members of the House and Senate banking committees, the joint atomic energy committee and the joint economic committee of the House and Senate.

New Braunfels, Kermit Picked In Class A

Mark up slim votes for the Kermit Yellow Jackets and New Braunfels Unicorns to move into the Class A championship finals.

Kermit tackles Arlington at Abilene tomorrow afternoon in the upper bracket semifinal and New Braunfels meets Wharton at El-Campo tomorrow night in the lower bracket semifinal.

All four are unbeaten and Kermit and Arlington are untied as well. The Unicorns and Tigers played to a scoreless tie in a mid-season game for the only blots on their records.

A terrific 177-pound line and Rick Spinks, one of the most touted backs in West Texas football history, give Kermit the edge over Arlington's Colts, who have not had to play as rugged a schedule as the West Texans.

New Braunfels' edge is based on their margin in the statistical column in that scoreless tilt.

The Unicorns piled up 13 first downs to four for Wharton; gained 114 yards rushing to 35 and 60 yards passing to Wharton's none. The Unicorn's passing game, en-

gineered by Sam Howard, seems to have improved considerably since then.

They used it most of the time in beating tough Brenham in the playoffs.

Too, New Braunfels is play-off wise, having been to the finals two seasons ago and to the quarterfinals last year, and will be determined to go all the way this time.

New Braunfels beat the highest scoring team in the state, La Vega, last week mostly on the ground with Bill Kneuper, Gary Pittman and Merlyn Murphey carrying the load in the 18-6 verdict.

Wharton's touchdown twins, Bill Cline and Lloyd Shoppa, and Marvin Felder ran wild against Pearsall to win 48-20 and Cline kicked in with one scoring pass.

Meanwhile, Spinks was the whole offensive show for Kermit in its 33-0 shellacking of Levelland. He scored three touchdowns and kicked two extra points, while the Jacket line held Levelland to 21 yards rushing.

Arlington, which has now gone 25 games without defeat, got its stiffest test against Mount Vernon and barely eked out a 21-20 verdict on Rusty Gunn's three extra points and slashing runs by Gunn and Charles Marshall.

Writer Tells How To Wrap Xmas Packages

WASHINGTON, Dec 14 (UP)—When it comes to wrapping a parcel of pretties around Christmas time, I'm about as awkward as a man trying to kick field goals in a telephone booth.

So I did a little research. Come Christmas Eve, my next of kin should note an improvement over past performances.

At the Hecht Company store, I found a man who knows a man who invented a bow-tie. The gimmick is about the size of a big jewel box and turns out the fanciest bows you ever saw. All you have to do is take the finished bow, jab a pin through it and fasten it onto your package.

At Julius Garfinkle & Co., there's a gang of professional wrappers of things. I learned from them, too.

Hardest things to wrap, it seems, are bottles and wastepaper baskets.

Best way to put a pretty cover on a bottle is to buy some tin or lead foil. All you have to do is wind it around, twist it at the top and doll the whole business up with a ribbon.

The wastebasket is a little more complicated. If you do this logically, you start at the bottom and put the tissue up to the inside and then cover the whole business

with a big bow. Why anybody would be silly enough to (1) give a wastebasket for a present in the first place or (2) want to wrap it up fancy leaves something to the imagination.

Everybody, it seems, thinks he knows just how to do up an ordinary square box. But few realize how the appearance of the package is improved simply by making sure the paper ends just at the edge of the box — where you don't notice it.

After folding back the edge, rubber cement is the handiest and quickest way to fasten the paper. You can get real personal if you follow a suggestion offered by the Hallmark Greeting card folks.

Take any fancy package. After you get it bundled so that a ribbon forms a diamond on the top or front, you can draw a monogram-style outline of the initials of the person to whom you send the present.

Then go over the pencilled lines with a thin layer of rubber cement. You can use common yarn to follow the outline.

Maybe you have trouble with round boxes, but they are no trouble at all—if you know how. Just trace an outline of the box on gift paper and then scissor-cut, making it a quarter of an inch bigger than the outline. Place on top of the package and fold over the edges.

To make the paper snug up against the sides, press it down tight-like while you put on sticker tape.

SCENES AROUND RANGER

Wish the weather would stop playing tag with our feelings and hopes. What looked like a healthy group of clouds, carrying buckets of badly needed moisture, gathered over Ranger Wednesday morning. But not a drop of water relieved the parched earth.

Breckenridge's action requesting suspension of a federal housing project in order that money be re-allocated to national defense has drawn attention from all over the nation. The town is to be applauded for its unselfish action and concern for national defense.

But I doubt if the money will be used for national defense. In all probability it will be given to some other city requesting a housing project. Now, if every city turned back the project, the end result might be effective in aiding national defense—if the re-allocated money was used for that purpose.

It might have been better if Breckenridge had specifically requested that the housing project be switched to finance a plan for civil defense in Breckenridge. However, it would have been best if Breckenridge had gone ahead with its plans for a housing project.

Even though every one of the houses were to be blown out of existence by enemy bombers tomorrow, we can't just drop everything in the way of civic improvement. However dark the war situation looks, we have to carry on in some semblance of normalcy.

If we carried Breckenridge's action to its logical conclusion, we would turn all money contributed to the Community Chest, March of Dimes, etc. over to national defense. When we strongly sup-

port the Community Chest and then turn back a housing project, it is like giving a family dinner with no place to eat it. If a large army camp or munitions plant were to open near Breckenridge, the town would be forced to ask for the housing project because of the population influx. This would be in the name

of national defense. But national defense also includes the morale and well-being of a nation's people. Whether a housing project is nationally or locally sponsored, it certainly adds to the morale and feelings of the people which, in time of war or peace, is a matter we can't afford to overlook.

Navy Reserves Can Join After Draft Notice

Seaman recruits and seaman apprentices who were members of the Naval Reserve prior to September 1, 1950 can now volunteer for active duty in the Navy after they have received draft induction notices, Eighth Naval District headquarters announced.

The Commandant of the Eighth Naval District said the new ruling will effect approximately 14,000 men in the district who are in the above category.

Until now, he said, regulations had prevented men in the Naval Reserve's two lowest pay grades from volunteering for active duty unless they had at least six months' previous full time duty on their records. Under those regulations, a number of these men have been drafted for lack of required re-

gular duty. The Navy cannot now take draftees.

These reservists may now be placed on active duty in the Naval Reserve while they are being processed under selective service, at any time prior to the actual selective service induction date, the Navy ruling stated.

The procedure is as follows: The reservist wishing to volunteer should contact his nearest Naval recruiting station or sub-station. He must meet the same mental, physical and other standards as the regular Navy recruit.

He will be required to sign an agreement to serve 24 months on active duty.

He will then be sent into recruit training with regular Navy recruits, but will maintain his identity as a Reservist in Class V-13 of the Naval Reserve.

Reservists in the rates of seaman and fireman, and petty officer in certain ratings, still are being accepted as volunteers, the Commandant pointed out.
