HONG KONG, China, Dec. 18 radio said today that Chinese "volunteers" would not halt their military operations in Korea until all other foreign troops had been withdrawn from the country.

The broadcast, quoting an editorial in the government newspaper Peking Daily News, said the United Nations proposal for a cease-fire in Korea was "against the best interests of the Korean peo-

The cease-fire request was not a proposal for peace, but for a truce to give UN armies "breath-ing space to strengthen their positions," the editorial said.

"It obviously serves the aggressive policy of the American imperialists," the newspaper contended.

Nations supporting the ceasefire proposal were the same ones which "launched the original illegal aggression in Korea," it said.


