SCHOOL TO OPEN MONDAY WITH COMPLETE FACULTY

According to an announcement today by Mr. R. S. Vestal, superintendent, the Dimmitt Schools will open Monday, September 8, with a complete faculty. In making the announcement the superintendent declared that following registration, which will begin at 9 a. m., Monday, the day will be spent in regular session. Under the new arrangement the fifth and sixth grades will be in the new annex directly behind the high school building and the seventh and eighth grades will continue to use the high school building. The first four grades will continue to meet in the old grade school buildings. All buses will make their regular runs Monday.

Good Session Expected
"Everything points to the best year in the history of Wayland," stated Dr. Marshall. The number of applicants received at the college office indicates a record enrollment for the fall semester. The addition of new courses of study inaugurates Wayland's development into a fully accredited senior college offering work for the standard bachelor's degree.

"What I have seen this summer," declared Dr. Marshall, "has re-emphasized to me the world's need for Christ. Wayland College, a Christian school, is engaged in the most important work in all the world: namely, preparing young men and young women for positive Christian citizenship in every area of life."

MEMORIES OF OLD WEST RECITED BY OLD TIMER

Mr. Oscar Caudill, a colorful character of the old west, and now a resident of Quemado, N. M., was a pleasant caller at the News office Friday afternoon. He was accompanied by an old acquaintance, Mr. W. P. Schooler, of Hereford. After attending the old XII Cowboy Roundup at Amarillo with Mr. Edwin Ramey and Mr. Ira Sweagga on August 27 - 28, Mr. Caudill returned to Dimmitt to renew old acquaintances. He first came to this area in 1884, from North Carolina, before Castro County was organized, and established residence just north of Dimmitt.

In describing his connection with the X. I. T. ranch, Mr. Caudill declared that he was "Outside Horseman," whatever that implies, and in that capacity he worked as far west as the Pecos River in New Mexico. Mr. Caudill, though probably not engaged in exactly the same pursuits as some of the other cattlemen during the early days of ranching in the Panhandle, certainly did his part, according to reports, to lend color to the history of what was then the frontier of America. In commenting on his experiences (which won him a wide reputation) Caudill declared that all Panhandle lawyers in the early ranching days were gentlemen of an understanding nature, as they usually showed him leniency when his fate was in their hands. He left here in 1894.

A top hand with cattle, Caudill proved his prowess with a rope in 1911 when he took first money in the cow roping event at the Cheyenne Rodeo. The Plains Pioneer recalls that in 1891 a county seat election was held in Castro county with Dimmitt receiving 25 votes and Castro City, about three miles east of Dimmitt, receiving 3 votes. Dimmitt was sponsored in the election by Henry Bedford, an old cattleman, who received the support of local cowboys in making Dimmitt the Capitol City of Castro County.

At the age of 76 Mr. Caudill is still active in the cattle business near Magdalena, N. M., where he now brands his own calves on his ten section ranch. He stated that he attended the recent reunion at the request of Mr. Edwin Ramey who kept him posted on the event.

News From The CASTRO COUNTY WIND EROSION DISTRICT

Mr. M. L. Simpson, who lives three miles west of the Jumbo community, reports that he has been successful in growing sweet clover for soil improvement on his irrigated farm two miles west and one mile south of Jumbo. This clover is named Hubam clover, and is an annual, or one-year variety. Mr. Simpson planted this clover the last of April this year and has made one cutting for a hay crop which yielded two hundred and eighty bales from the ten acres. He now expects to get a seed crop before frost kills the clover. The normal practice in other areas using this soil-building crop, is to plant the clover in February in wheat fields. The clover then comes up, but does not produce much growth until after wheat harvest. when it may be put to any one or a combination of three uses, as follows:

(1) Turn all the growth under as a green manure crop for highest benefits as a soil-builder at least two weeks before planting the next

COUNTY FAIR ENTERTAINMENT

At a meeting of the entertainment committee of the county fair held in the Chamber of Commerce offices on September 3, 1947, the general chairman, Harold Stephens, announced the day's tentative program of a parade, rodeo, and in the evening a big square dance in the street beside the court house.

If it can be arranged, Mr. John Blaine, a member of the Committee will have the Dimmitt - Morton Football game transferred here. The game would be played Friday night and would be the opening attraction of the fair. Such a move is entirely at the discretion of the Morton Officials and as yet no definite word has been received on this.

On the day of the fair, and after all exhibits have been judged, a parade will form at the west end of town and move east to the rodeo grounds. Any organization desiring to enter a float or other type attraction in the parade should advise the Chamber of Commerce office. The rodeo, which is being held under the sponsorship of the Fair association this year, will begin promptly at 3:00 o'clock. Mr. E. D. Newton, Deroey Cates and Gerald Dorough are on the rodeo committee and are working out final details. Publicity will be distributed early next week concerning the events and prizes. The committee promises us one of the best rodeos ever held.

As an added feature a big square dance will be held on the Court House square during the evening. A huge crowd is expected to attend. Preliminary arrangements are in the hands of Mr. George Burns, who also will no doubt do some of the "calling."

During the day and evening the fair will not be complete without a miniature mid-way. Concessions such as Bingo, toss the rings, shooting gallery if possible, soft drink, hot dog and hamburger stands are desired. It is hoped these and similar concessions will be taken over by the various clubs and organizations of the county. Applications for the concession should be made at the Chamber of Commerce office as soon as possible.

NEW SPLIT SEASON FOR DUCK HUNTING IS ANNOUNCED

A new split season on duck hunting in Texas has been fixed by a presidential proclamation in Washington, and the state game commission stated in Austin last week that the split will be a break for both the hunters and the ducks.

Howard Dodgen, executive secretary of the game, fish and oyster commission, said it would improve the opportunity for Texas hunters especially by stretching the season out over a longer period and allow weather variations.

The open season on ducks in Texas will be from November 4 through November 17, and then from December 16 through December 29.

DIPHTHERIA DANGER POINTED OUT

AUSTIN, August 28 — Education of the public to the value of diphtheria immunization has resulted in lowering the incidence of this dread disease, but Texas still had over 1500 cases of this preventable disease last year according to records in the Texas State Department of Health.

"It is a generally accepted fact among public health authorities," Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, said, "that any community may control its death rate from diphtheria. Immunization has been proved a safe and effective preventive measure. Wherever immunization treatment has been extensively used, diphtheria has steadily decreased."

"The most forceful weapon in the control of diphtheria is prevention through immunization rather than cure of the disease after it has happened. Children can be protected against diphtheria by the use of what is known as toxoid. Young children are particular susceptible to the disease. Accordingly, as soon as a baby is six months old, the parents are advised to take it to the family physician and have it immunized — protected, by the use of toxoid. Older children in the family who have not had the protective treatment, should be immunized also, and this should be attended to now before the school season begins. This immunizing agent is absolutely safe to administer; there is only a slight local reaction, and practically no constitutional or troublesome after effects. It confers a lifetime immunity in the majority of cases. To be certain that immunization is complete, however, the child should be taken back to the physician six months after the toxoid was administered, and given the schick Test.

"It is within the power of the parents of this state, cooperating with their physicians and public health departments, to eliminate diphtheria from Texas."

IS IT POTTER'S FIELD?

Memory is a wonderful thing. It stores up the past and enables us to live, from time to time, the events that have long since passed away. Undoubtedly if our memories were acute enough or trained properly to the task one could set of an evening and unroll in his mind's eye the whole story of his life in motion picture fashion. We as yet have heard of no one able to do this, but we all have had sharp, definite memories of the past return to us for a moment or two because of our present association with someone or something. We recently had this experience after having examined the Dimmitt cemetery.

During our early youth, in the town in which we were born and raised, lay an old cemetery called Sandvyle. In the middle of the last century it had been a beautiful spot and the graves of its honored dead well cared for; but by the time we were cognizant of it the two lumber yards and slaughter house on one side had squeezed it farther and farther toward the river on the other, and its two ends were effectively cut off by a railroad yard and a dead end street. As time passed the headstones molded and fell over or sank deeper into the earth; the grass grew tall and rank and weeds came to stand and take over; and the flowers and shrubs withered and were no more. It became in short a desolate, lonely, haunted spot and no one seemed to care. For us it became a short cut between two sections of town and we always hurried through. Finally, but only after we had grown and moved away, some public spirited persons and patriotic organizations of the town moved all the bodies to the new, beautiful and perpetually cared for cemetery on the hill. Now Sandvyle exists only in our memory.

If you have seen Dimmitt Cemetery lately perhaps you can understand why this memory came back to us. We don't believe it is as unkept and as uncared for as Sandvyle in its latter days, but it is well on its way unless a beautification project is undertaken immediately. Memory is a wonderful thing, especially when we perpetuate the memory of our loved ones in their last resting places.

VETERANS ALERTED ON COLLEGE RULES

Huntsville, Tex. August 28, (spl) — Veterans who plan to attend college this fall should make sure all their necessary papers are in and up to date so that there will be no delay in receiving subsistence checks, according to C. L. Chandler veteran's training officer at Sam Houston State Teachers College.

The veteran who has not attended school, Chandler says, should secure forms 7-1961 and 7-1950 from any veterans contact office, and forward them with a certified or photostatic copy of his discharge papers and form 686, if married, to the regional office which has jurisdiction over the school he plans to attend.

Upon registration, the first time veteran student must turn in college officials form 7-1950 if it has been returned to him from the regional office. Some colleges are admitting a veteran without the form, however, subject to his receiving is later, Chandler pointed out.

Veteran's who plan to return to the same school this fall need only fill out an estimate of earnings and re-enrollment papers at registration time, the Sam Houston official said.

If a veteran has attended one college, and plans to transfer to another, he must secure a supplemental letter of eligibility from a regional office which has jurisdiction over his first school. Chandler advises. In addition, he should request his regional office to transfer his file to the regional office in which the school he plans to attend is located.

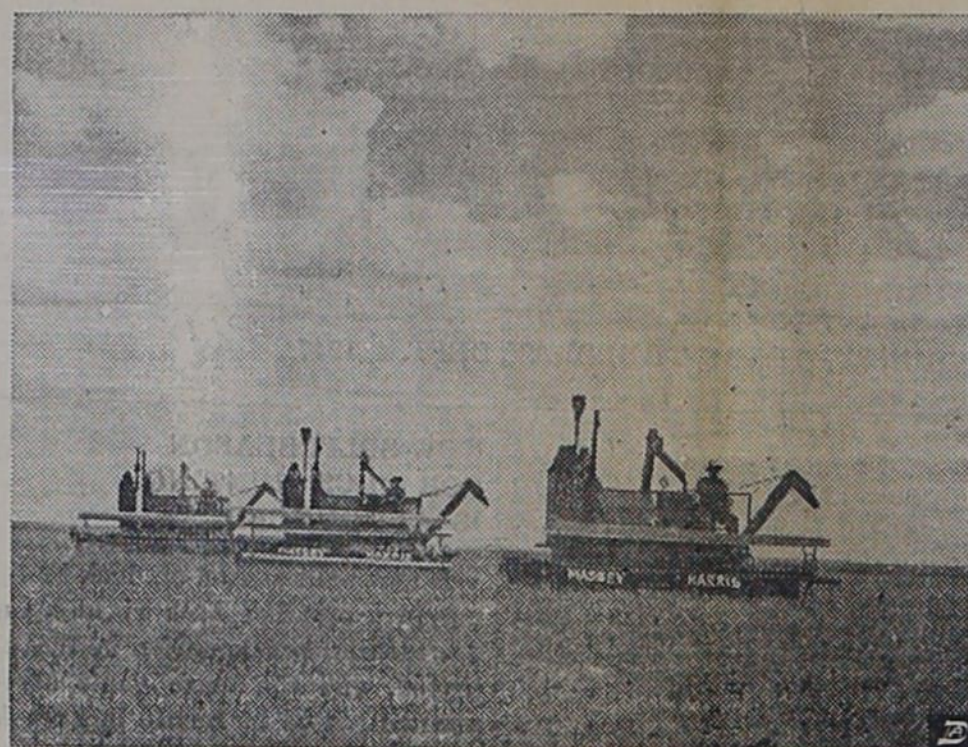

Kansas Hits Another Jackpot



DODGE CITY, KAN.—Fifty acres in a 10-hour day . . . wheat making 30 bushels to the acre . . . that's 1,500 golden bushels—the result of one day's harvest with a self-propelled combine and a couple of busy grain trucks. Still to be reckoned with, but not nearly so disturbing a factor as it once was, bad weather may slow up operations here and there along the way, but time lost is soon made up when skies clear. The self-propelled combine, since its mass demonstration in the Massey-Harris harvest brigade during the critical harvest years of 1944-45, is the rule today wherever wheat is grown. By the hundreds they work their way up from Texas, through the panhandle, to arrive in Kansas about mid-July; then into Nebraska, the Dakotas, Montana and Minnesota. Many cross the border into Canada.

With winter wheat crop estimated at more than a billion bushels (Kansas alone is expected to yield 284 million bushels) there will be wheat aplenty for the U.S. and a sizeable surplus available for the hungry world.

Your Home

Isn't it amazing the amount of real knowledge small children accumulate and retain? The other morning my two sons helped me to prepare breakfast, and when I started making toast, I asked 8 year-old John to put the rest of the bread away. Well, David — only 5 years old — very importantly took the loaf from John, carefully re-closed the waxed paper wrapping, and then put the loaf into the bread box.
 As he did so, I was amused to hear him explain to John that the waxed paper wrapping kept the bread fresh and moist... and that it should always be carefully re-closed after the loaf has been opened. David told John that "Mike" — the man who delivers for the bakery — had told him all about it. Well, I've explained it to my children dozens of times — but it took Mike — idol of every child in the neighborhood — to turn the trick!
 Later, at breakfast when the boys served our cereal, John noticed the inner wrapping on the cereal box and I explained to him that while waxed paper keeps moist products moist (such as bread) it also keeps dry products dry (such as cereals). Therefore the lining in the cereal box should be just as carefully closed as the bread wrapper. I went on to tell the boys that food manufacturers and bakers do their utmost to insure freshness in foods — but, of course they can't guarantee freshness to us after we open our packages, therefore it is extremely important that we properly re-close the wrapper. It is important, too, that we remember airtight re-closure can only be made when the package has been opened carefully without being torn.
 Well, when I had finished explaining, the boys concluded (as all we housewives already know) that waxed paper plays a very important role in helping to protect our foods and in saving money, too.

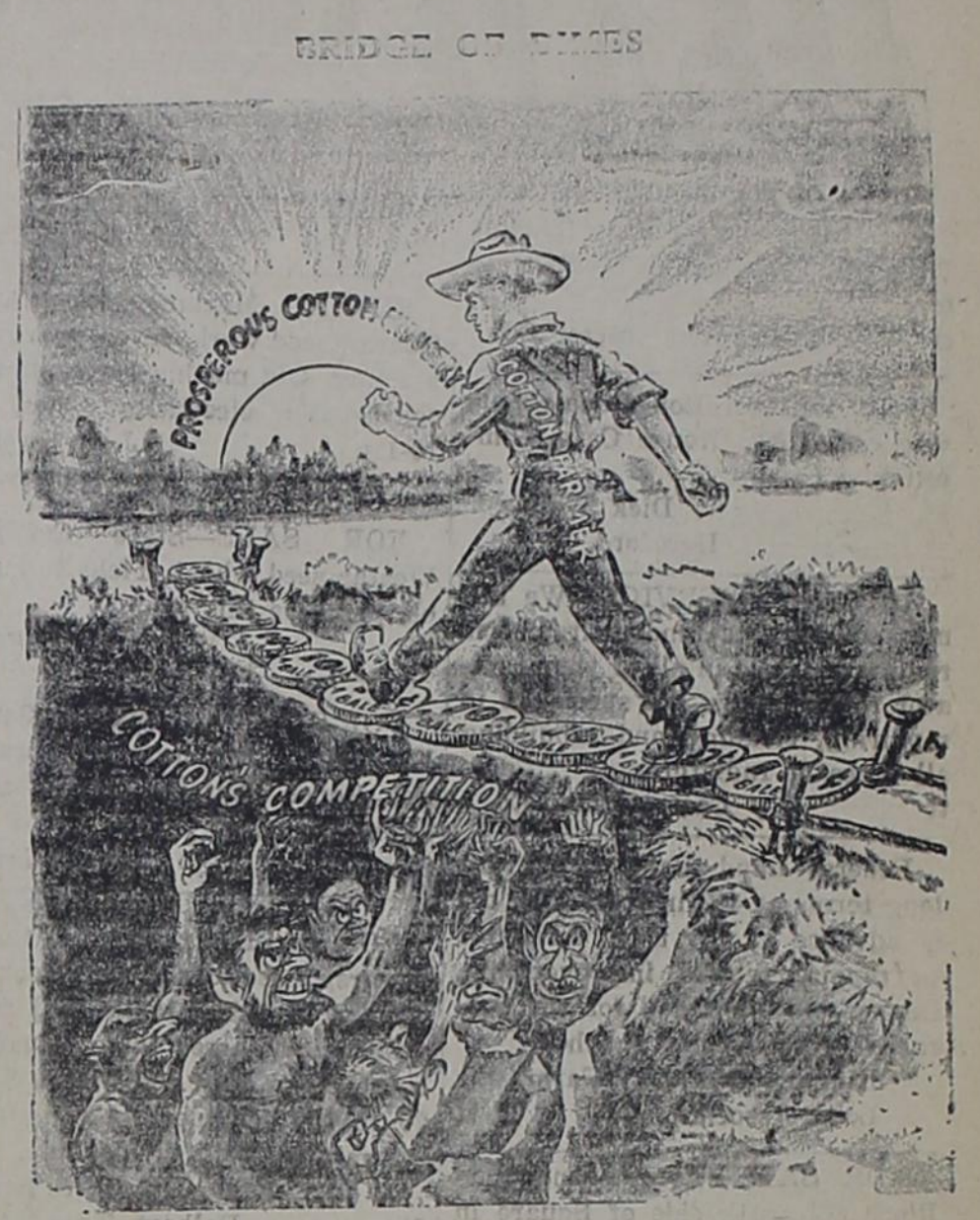
