

OKLAHOMA CITY, Feb. 8 (UP)-There's no "ocean in Texas" and the Oklahoma legislature wants the world to know about it.

So they passed a resolution yesterday, which among other things, called Texas the land where "men are men and women are governors," an obvious reference to the Lone Star State's . Mrs. Jim "Ma" Ferguson.

The Oklahoma lawmakers be came incensed by an article in "Ford Times" which refered to Lake Texoma as a "new ocean in Texas." The lake lies principally in the Sooner state.

Miss Elsie Glenn, Field Worker State Department Public Welfare, Eastland, Texas, has asked this paper's cooperation in locating the mother of any preschool deaf child who would like to be, in company with the child, guest of the Texas School for the Deaf for 10 days beginning June 6, 19.

There will be instructions and lectures primarily to aid the child before the child is eligible to attend school, and a general orientation with mother and child to the prospects of entering the

This instruction will help to comfort the little deaf child who is suddenly torn from the warm family circle life with little understanding of what the purpose may be. This instruction will also help give the mother an understanding of what the institution can do and how it works; and it will give the child an understand ing to the end that he will eagerly anticipate the beginning of his first school term.
