Starved Bodies Of 80 S. Korean Orphans Found

ANYANG, Korea, Feb. 9 (UP) The emaciated, frozen bodies of 80 South Korean orphans between the ages of two and four were found yesterday stacked like cordwood in the yard of an orp' anage.

The children, found by Allied patrols seeking by-passed Recs apparently had starved to death. The ommunists had left them no food.

Another 80 almost starved children of the same age group cowered in filth on the floor inside the orphanage. Two Korean women, one apparently in her late 60's, and the other younger, were doing what they could to keep the children warm. But they had no food.

The orphanage apparently was named the "Emma" or "Eva Underwood," according to what little information the two women could give. It was believed the home was supported by American protestant ionary funds.

Military intelligence officers were trying to find out how long the children had been abandoned without food.

Burial details dug graves for the dead children. Other Americans took the thin, peaked starvelings who survived to an aid station. Then they were to be sent to the rear for further attention.

"It was one of the most pathetic things I have ever seen in my life, and I've seen lots of war," said an

CHICAGO, Feb. 9 (UP)-Doc ors watched in astonishment to day a 24-year-old woman staged an "impossible" fight to recover after being frozen "as stiff as perature of only 64 degrees.

The physicians said Mrs. Dorothy Mae Steven's temperature crept up to the normal 98.6 degrees by 2 a.m. and climbed to 100.5 by 5:15 a.m. as they thawed her out and administered plasma and cortisone in an effort to save her life.

TOKYO, Saturday, Feb. 10 (UP)-Tank-led American roops smashed to the Han River southeast of Seoul Friday and began closing a pincers around 20,000 Communists eaught in a 30-square-mile pocket below the river.

The right arm of the pincers hit the Han 3 1-2 miles southeast of Seoul. Ten miles west, another tank task force swept within one mile of Seoul's big industrial suburb of Yongdongpo. Here they were 3 1-2 miles southwest of the Red-held capital.






