### Own Beauty Parlor Aids Women In Mental Hospital To Recovery

By Frank Jordan, Jr. United Press Staff Correspondent HUNTINGTON, W. Va., (UP) — A simple appeal to female vanity — a beauty shop — has done what doctors and psychologists at Huntington State Mental Hospital couldn't accomplish.

It has convinced many woman patients of the advantages of keeping themselves well groomed. This newest wrinkle in care of the mentally-ill also is credited by hospital officials with providing

woman patients a contact with the "outside" which is valuable in most long-range programs of mental therapy.

Details of this pioneer method of rehabilitating mental patients in West Virginia and of the kind-hearted woman who runs the beauty shop were disclosed by the hospital's superintendent, Hiram W. Davis.

#### Shop Donated

Hospital officials thought of the beauty shop idea months ago but had difficulty finding the right type of person to take over the operation. Then Mrs. Ola Robinson, a mother and a 4-H club leader, volunteered to give up her own shop in Huntington to move into the hospital.

On Nov. 1, 1950, she opened shop with a hair dryer and enough other equipment to give finger-waves, shampoos and other minor beauty operations. Some of the equipment was her own.

Then began the difficult task of persuading female patients, some of whom would not touch their own hair, to make use of the facilities. Davis said Mrs. Robinson's kindness and tact were responsible for winning over the naturally-suspicious woman inmates to the idea of improving their personal appearance.

#### Women Instructed

Most of the "customers" had to be told what was happening and how they were to act. This initial phase of the program proved so successful that Mrs. Robinson started to instruct selected women on how to care for their fingernails so that they could, in turn, teach other patients.

On Dec. 12 Mrs. Robinson began giving permanents after receiving the equipment necessary to administer cold waves. She added some other of her personal equipment against the day when permanent supplies arrived.

Superintendent Davis said many patients in a mental institution automatically refuse to have anything to do with a program that involves regular employees of the hospital.

With Mrs. Robinson, he explained, they associate the normal world and that conquers many fears and prejudices.

#### Like Normal Life

Toward this end the shop is open eight hours a day and patrons come for treatments by appointment just as they would in normal life. Mrs. Robinson plays her part, too—the role of a chatty, slightly gossipy beauty operator who always knows the latest news of the customer's limited world.

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### Blizzard Rages Across Midwest

MINNEAPOLIS, Minn., March 3 (UP) — The second blizzard this week raged across the upper Mississippi Valley today, trapping hundreds of persons in giant snowdrifts and almost paralyzing transportation.

The storm was the worst of the winter. Its intensity was far greater than that of a similar storm two days ago which had been the worst of the season to that time.

"This blow is like a big brother to the one that hit Wednesday and

Thursday," a weather forecaster said. "It's sweeping along the same track as the earlier one but it makes the other storm look like a baby."

The storm spread as much as 15 inches of new snow over much of a six-state area. Winds of 50 miles an hour piled the flakes into big drifts that blocked roads, stopped trains, and halted take-offs and landings at airfields.

The storm center, located early today near Des Moines, Ia., was sweeping northeasterly on a line through Dubuque, Ia., Green Bay, Wis., and Traverse City, Mich.

Heavy snows fell north of the storm center's path. South of that line, a vast area was pelted with sleet, snow and freezing rain.

The worst-hit areas were the Dakotas, Iowa, Minnesota, Northern Wisconsin, and Northern Michigan.

Arriving as it did on the heels of the earlier storm, the new snowfall virtually smothered the northland.

## Another Arrest In Cage Scandal Reveals Gamblers' Threats To Players, Invasion Of Fieldhouse

NEW YORK, March 3 (UP)—The mushrooming college basketball scandal reached a new high for chicanery today when the arrest of a former Long Island University star disclosed that fixers had invaded dressing rooms, passed "dumping" instructions to players on the court, and threatened the lives of players who did not cooperate.

Lou Lipman, 26-year-old former L. I. U. scoring leader for the 1947-48 and 1948-49 seasons, made the disclosures yesterday after his arrest for accepting a \$500 bribe to help dump a game against Duquesne at Madison Square Garden, Jan. 1, 1949. Duquesne won the game, 64 to 55.

Lipman's confession immediately started a search by District Attorney Frank Hogan and his detectives for two other former L. I. U. players and two gamblers also involved in the fix. Lipman was the 13th player arrested for dumping games this year. In all, Hogan has uncovered a total of 16 games that were fixed during the past three seasons.

Meanwhile, at Chicago, the N. C. A. A. council recommended to its member schools that they told their athletic competition on campus fields and in campus buildings in the future and avoid playing

The council also indicated that future N. C. A. A. championship basketball tournaments will not be held at the Garden. However, because of "previously committed contractual and lease arrangements," this year's tourney will be played at the Garden as scheduled.

Lipman, a team mate of two other confessed bribe-takers—Eddie Gard and Nat Miller—on three L. I. U. teams between 1946 and 1949, said he first suspected the "blackbird" games were being dumped when a team mate began "flashing a roll" of money. He was asked by Gard to join in the fixing, but refused at first.

The holding Lipman, an Army Air Corps veteran and father of two children, disclosed that he once threatened to "rough up" a teammate for not trying in the game.

"He told me," Lipman related, "that if I laid a finger on him he would see to it that they put me in a sack and dumped me in the river."

Lipman finally agreed to join the fix ring later in December of 1948 after being approached by a former L. I. U. player, who also is being sought by police.

According to Lipman, Gard called a time out soon after the Duquesne game, started and informed him that the fixer had come to the dressing room and relayed the instructions that L. I. U. was not to win by more than the four-point "spread" quoted by book-takers.

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## Nosebleed Is Common Type Of Hemorrhage

Nosebleed is probably the most common type of hemorrhage, the one least conducive to panic and yet accompanied by a not-so-secure-it's-all-right attitude. Persistent or heavy nosebleed, just like any other irregularity of the body should be considered a possible signal of distress, but the rare or occasional discovery that the nose is bleeding is not usually anything to get excited about.

Nosebleed usually originates in the lower front part of that ridge that divides the nostrils. Picking the nose, blows on the nose, pushing things in the nose, or any action that might be too rough on those small varicose veins in the nose may cause a nosebleed.

Many people have experienced a sudden nosebleed in high altitudes. Mercury and phosphorus may create sufficient irritation in the nose to cause it to bleed. Any acute inflammation of that mucous membrane lining the nose, such as during influenza, may cause it to show blood, and the various disorders of the composition of blood as well as high blood pressure may be accompanied by nosebleed.

You can't usually tell where the nosebleed originates until it stops bleeding. A tiny wad of cotton or gauze is normally sufficient to stop the bleeding unless it is heavy back in the nose; then it is necessary for the doctor to pack the whole nasal cavity until the bleeding stops and he can locate the spot to be treated.

## Four Seamen Safe Following Dramatic Rescue

CORPUS CHRISTI, TEXAS, March 3 (UP)—Four crewmen whose trawler ran aground during a Gulf of Mexico storm were safely aboard another fishing vessel today following a dramatic sea rescue.

The trawler MP went hard aground Thursday night on a shoal 110 miles northwest of Campeche, Mexico. The craft heeled dangerously under the impact of huge waves, propelled by a 35-mile-an-hour wind.

The trawler lashed itself to the shore while the crewman clinging to the MP and radioed the Coast Guard to send a PBY plane to the scene with rubber life boats.

The Oro Baca, trawler out of Port Isabel, Tex., went to the scene and stood by, but was unable to remove the MP sailors because of the heavy seas.

However, the crewmen lashed themselves to buoyant mattresses as they began a perilous journey to the Oro Baca when the seas subsided somewhat at mid-afternoon.

They were picked up and are expected to be landed at Port Isabel tomorrow morning.

### PLUG 'N TRIGGER

BY J. FRED EDER

Some Texas problems will occupy a prominent part in the program of the 16th annual North American Wildlife Conference opening in Milwaukee, Wisconsin next Monday.

Always foremost on the agenda of this three-day meeting are such items as waterfowl regulations, management problems and the future of waterfowl in an industrialized America.

The meeting, sponsored by the Wildlife Management Institute, will be devoted to the study and examination of the future of waterfowl and the conflict between waterfowl and agriculture.

An example of this latter conflict crept into the news only this week from the lower Rio Grande Valley where geese made heavy raids on broccoli and other vegetable crops.

Another item sure to be of interest to sportsmen will be the complete report on the duck research program of ducks unlimited.

Then, too, there will be a complete report on the few cholera which has hit the Texas Panhandle severely the past few

seasons. Thousands of ducks have been lost to this malady. Dr. George Petrides of Michigan State College will make known the results of his exhaustive survey on the cholera attacks.

Sports writers and radio sports announcers across the nation have made great strides in educating the sportsman with the advantages to be gained by proper conservation and co-operation with game management officials.

The state of Montana offers good example. Last fall, outdoor columnist John A. Willard suggested in his column that wildlife planning be written into the blueprints for all future water projects in the state of Montana. Results were immediate.

Within 10 days, Montana Governor John W. Bonner had invited Willard to visit his office and, as a result of their conference, instructions were issued to the state's water conservation board and fish and game departments to get together and co-operate on the idea.

Formerly, water development projects in the state had been undertaken by the conservation
