# Bobcats vs. Abernathy In Bi-District Friday at Plainview

The Dimmitt Bobcats will take another whack at Abernathy Friday afternoon at Plainview—this time for the bi-district championship of conferences 1-AA and 2-AA. Game time is 2:30 p.m. Abernathy presented the Dim-

mitt team with one of its two defeats this year, a 12-16 thumping in the fourth game of the season. Dimmitt went into a game with Canyon Friday night hoping for a three-way tie with Canyon and

Dalhart. When the smoke cleared Dimmitt had gained a 14-6 victory and shortly thereafter learned for sure Santa Claus had come a little early this year. It seems the usually hapless Friona Chiefs had risen up to smite the mighty Dalhart

Wolves 13-6. This delightful bit of happenstance meant that Dimmitt had tied only with Canyon and since the Bobcats had defeated the Eagles Friday night, they would have the honor of trying to wrest a bi-district championship from

the on-again, off-again Abernathy Antelopes. The game Friday promises to be one of the best of the year from a fan standpoint. Abernathy is rated slightly ahead of Dimmitt, mostly on the basis of their previous narrow win. However, if the Bobcats show some of the sparkle that has marked their outstanding wins this year the Antelopes will have their hooves full.

The winner of the Antelope-Bobcat game will play the winner of the Crane-Spur tilt the following week. Dimmitt wound up the regular season with a fantastic defensive record. Only 44 points were scored against the Bobcats all year. During this time the Dimmitt team ground out 216 points. The game Friday will pit one of the best offensive aggregations on the

High Plains in Class AA football against what is probably the best defensive record. In Friday night's game against Canyon, the Bobcats ruled the roost during the first half, but apparently a halftime pep session was held in the dressing room of the Canyon team because they came out fired up and it was all Dimmitt could do to keep the Eagles from scoring more than one touchdown in the second half. While the Eagles ground out almost twice the yardage and kept possession of the ball most of the time during the second half,

they were unable to even the score. Dimmitt's scoring came first at the end of a drive that set up a plunge by Norman Nelson from the one-yard line to score early in the second quarter. The try for extra point was good. Five minutes later Jerry Hyatt wound up another drive that started when Canyon was forced to punt. He went over from the four and the extra point try was no good. Dimmitt had 16 first downs and 189 yards rushing and Canyon made 13 first downs (11 in the second half) and gained 158 yards rushing.

Dimmitt citizens dropped their usual coffee cup and backfence banter this week in favor of a new and controversial subject—whether or not we want city postal delivery.

Most of the reasons against the proposal were involved with people wanting Sunday and holiday mail as well as more than one batch of mail per day.

We also suspect that a good many people will feel disappointed that they will have no excuse to drop by the post office every day to see their friends and acquaintances.

But none of the reasons we have heard would be worthwhile unless a new post office building were constructed. The city delivery issue is discussed in detail on this page in the news columns and we don't have anything additional to say except that everyone with one of the post office's questionnaires should hop quick like a bunny down to the post office and poke it—answered—into the letter slot.

If the local citizenry are indifferent it might be the post office department will be indifferent too. So unless the local patrons want to stand shoulder to shoulder with the masses inside our little post office building during the next umpteen years they had better get the questionnaires answered. It is also noteworthy that somebody someone's going to be looking up at one of those little stainless steel pulleys that go to make up a traction rig at the hospital after getting run over in front of the post office. It hasn't happened yet, but the laws of survival and chance won't let us off so easy forever. So do yourself and everyone else a favor by returning your questionnaire—pretty please.

## Post Office Seeks Answers To City Delivery Questions

Dimmitt postal patrons found questionnaires in their boxes this week from Postal Inspector R. S. Bawson inquiring as to whether or not they desired city delivery.

More than ten percent had been returned to the local post office by closing time Wednesday. Of these there was an overwhelming majority of some 6-to-1 in favor of city delivery.

These questionnaires have no legal status. They were issued merely to let the postal inspector know how users of the post office in Dimmitt feel about city delivery.

Dimmitt Postmaster Tom Bice has urged that all postal patrons return the questionnaires as quickly as possible. They will be compiled at the end of next week.

Most people apparently agree with the proposal to install city delivery here. Random questioning during the week has shown that postal patrons would probably prefer a larger post office building with better parking facilities, but since there can apparently be no change in the present setup for many years then city delivery is the best way to handle the situation.

Most of the problem revolves around a postoffice building that was obsolete within weeks after it was completed. At present there are 736 boxes all in use and no more can be added. This means that everyone else who moves to Dimmitt must receive their mail general delivery. The lease contract on the present building does not expire until seven years have elapsed. Under this arrangement it would appear the only way to offset the increased traffic due to city growth would be city delivery.

Hereford has city delivery and according to postmaster Bice, there are fewer post office boxes there than in Dimmitt. Since Hereford is considerably larger than Dimmitt it would appear that the present post office here would be adequate with city delivery until Dimmitt reaches the size of Hereford. Dimmitt law enforcement officers have indicated their agree-

ment with the city delivery plan. They feel that sooner or later a serious accident is bound to occur in the congested area in front of the post office and that the only solution to the problem at present is city delivery. Under this program most of the parking congestion would be eliminated, although the 125 general delivery patrons and some businesses and individuals would still receive their mail at the post office.

City delivery would mean that two more men would be added to the list of employees at the post office. No one would lose their employment as a result of city delivery, Mr. Bice said.

Homes qualifying for city delivery would be those situated on a block with houses on at least fifty percent of its lots. There must be an approach to the home, either sidewalk or pavement, so the postman would not have to walk through mud in case of a rain. Apparently about 75 percent of the city would thus qualify for city delivery. The remainder would still use post office boxes.

Postal patrons may receive their mail through either city delivery or through a post office box. Mail will go where it is addressed, either to a box number or a street number.

According to the questionnaire, city delivery service is established on a one-trip basis. The trip would begin at about 9:30 a.m. and would end at about 3:30 p.m. This would mean that about half the patrons would receive their mail by noon, and the remainder after that time. Delivery would not be made on Sundays or holidays, other than special delivery matter. A post office box cannot be used for Sunday and holiday delivery only.

The only increased cost involved in the measure would be an increase in city mail rates. Presently statements and other mail sent from one place to another in Dimmitt goes for three cents under the local delivery rate. With city delivery, however, this rate would be increased to four cents.

For persons retaining the use

of their post office box exclusively, the service will remain essentially unchanged.

### Summarizing the Problems

Two main and pressing issues stand out in discussions on city delivery. While Dimmitt is not a large town and could easily be served by an adequate post office, the fact is that the present building is not satisfactory now and the situation will not improve. There are not enough boxes to go around and chances are the general deliver lists would get ridiculously long before the post office department could arrange for another building at the end of seven years. The other point is the traffic problem. Super markets with considerably fewer patrons daily than the post office provide spacious parking lots, but three cars are all that are provided for in front of the present building. This is augmented by street and vacant lot parking but there is still considerable congestion and with a growing Dimmitt the situation could get out of hand in a few years. Local officers feel it is only a matter of time until someone is seriously injured in front of the post office.

City delivery should remedy both of these situations for quite some time.

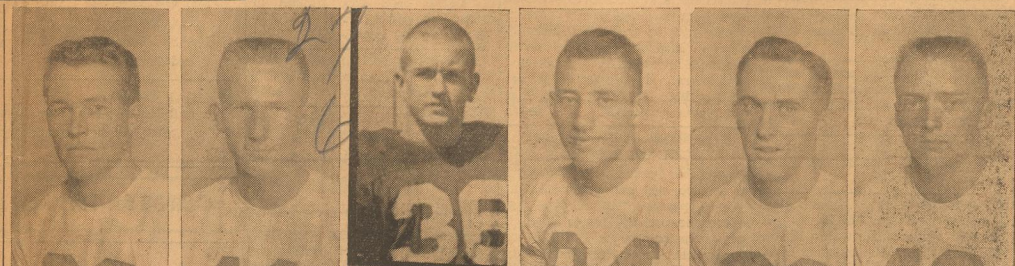
## Churches Plan Thanksgiving Worship Service

The first Community Thanksgiving Service in Dimmitt for several years will be conducted at the First Baptist Church, Wednesday evening, November 26 at 7:30.

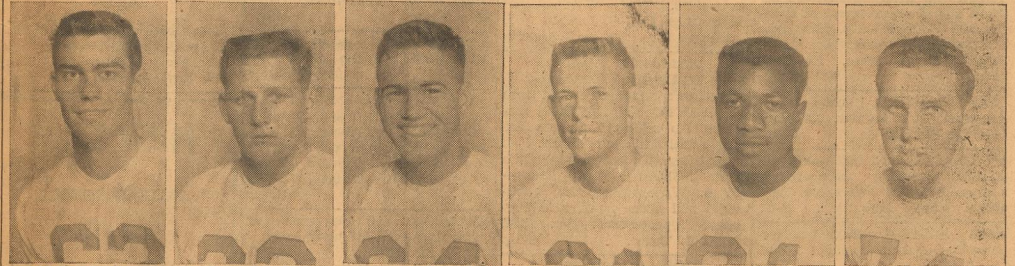

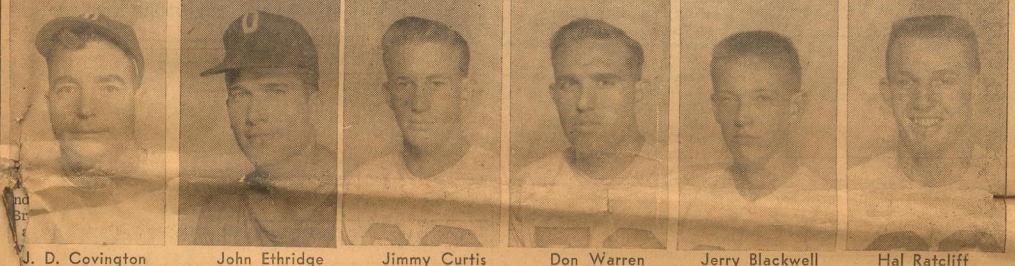
Ministers of all the churches will participate in various numbers on the program. The entire community is invited to attend this Thanksgiving Service.



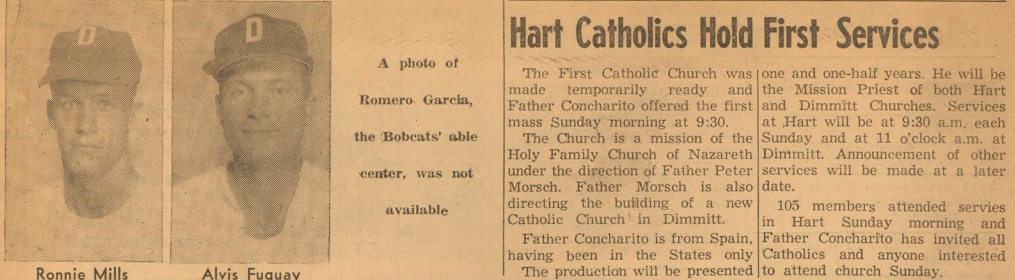

**Travis Campbell To Head ACC Drive**

**Dimmitt Boy Gains Degree and Fame**

A Dimmitt High School graduate, Wayne Smithson, has gained considerable fame around the campus of Fresno State College in California as a manager of the football team. The 24-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Ben Smithson of Dimmitt started to school at Fresno State after visiting California with a relative and deciding he liked the country well enough to go to school there.

What does a guy get out of coming out six days a week, three and a half hours per day, without pay, to carry yard markers and tape and turn on field lights for practicing footballers?

"I've got thousands of miles of travel out of it, for one thing," said the stocky six-footer. "Made two trips to Hawaii, the nearest place to paradise after Texas, and I met people who taught me a lot I couldn't have learned in a more enjoyable way."

An injury while playing at Orange Coast ended his football career but it did not stop him from first going into wrestling and second becoming a manager. "I'd rather wrestle than play tackle anyway," he volunteered. Smithson also managed the varsity basketball team at Frisco last year for the first time. The first game he missed in three years was the Bulldogs losing effort against Santa Barbara State.

This year Smithson is playing an almost part time role as manager. A career that began as an animal husbandry major and changed to general agriculture has turned into just plain work. A 30-hour a week job and twelve units of graduate study have trimmed his social sails with Sigma Alpha Epsilon fraternity considerably.

A graduate of last June's class with a B.S. degree, Smithson managed a 3.2 average which isn't exactly scholastic hay when one spends so much time working and guarding practice session pigskins from marauding groups of strong lunged football enthusiasts.

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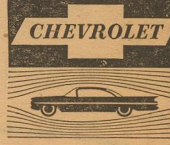
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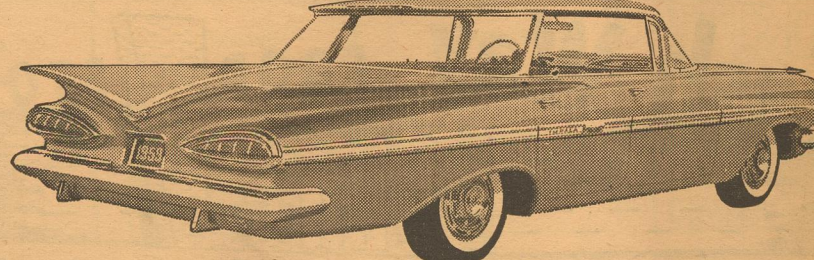
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**Bethel 4-H Club Gets "Quick Fudge" Lesson**

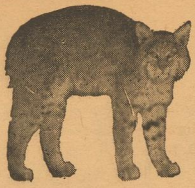

The Dimmitt Bobcats thrilled their Homecoming fans here last Friday night and won the right to meet Abernathy in the Bi-District game Friday, November 21, at 2:30 p.m. in Plainview. They did this by defeating the Canyon Eagles 14 to 6. This left the Bobcats tied for the 1-AA District Championship with Canyon, but since the Bobcats had won, they automatically gained the right to represent District 1-AA in the State Play-offs.

The first score of the game was made in the second quarter when halfback Norman Nelson plunged over from the one-yard line. For the extra points Carlos Barnes threw to Nelson to make the score 8 to 0 for the Cats. This had followed a drive after an Eagle punt. The final Bobcat tally came only four minutes and forty-five seconds after the first touchdown. Fullback Jerry Hyatt drove over from the three-yard line. The extra point try failed.

Canyon's only score of the game was made by halfback Chuck Nester from the four-yard line. The try for the extra point was no good. In the fourth quarter the Eagles drove to the 7-yard line before they were stopped.
