OKLAHOMA CITY, March 28 UP)—The governors of Oklaho-na, Kansas and Texas will ask eading natural gas distributors to the Southwest" instead of sendng it to eastern areas.

WASHINGTON-(NEA)-Because the U. S. Bureau of Animal Maintana once recommended the feeding of chicken heads, feet and entrails to mink, as a substitute for scarce horse meat, Henry J. Krenger, a mink rancher of Elgin, Ill., is to be permitted by Congress to file a court of claims test case against the government for The match, attended by some

If this doesn't seem to make sense, read it again to be sure you're right. Then read on for one of the dizziest science and sex stories that ever bothered Congress. Involved in these cases are what happens when you:

1—Implant synthetic sex hormones (Stilbesterol, or "capette pellets" in the necks of young chickens to make them have big breasts with lots of white meat;
2—Feed the scrap—after the chickens have been killed and dressed

-to the mink, as a substitute for horse meat or other protein diet; 3-Cause the female mink to become sterile. This is due to a "hormone hangover" which adversely affects the delicate reprodu

processes of the mama mink and prevents her from whelping as many kittens as she normally should. THERE'S a possibly serious, human link to this chemical chain reaction, too. Dr. Robert Enders, Department of Agriculture research specialist at Swarthmore College, Pennsylvania, has gone into this business pretty thoroughly. He has just told Congress that human

beings shouldn't eat chickens doped with these hormones. Young and even old roosters treated in this manner lose most of their male characteristics, and their flesh becomes soft. And even strong men—prisoners who have voluntarily submitted to treatment with this hormone as human guinea pigs—have lost much of their masculinity, developing feminine traits. Under proper administration by physicians, doses as small as one-tenth of a milligram (a thou-

That's how potent a compound is this "diethylstillosterol"—to give its full name—that a few poultry raisers have been monkeying with. Their dose for one young broiler has been 15 milligrams.

It was some of this highly doped poultry scrap which Mr. Kreuger innocently fed to his mink in the fall of 1949 and the spring of 1950, and that brings you hack to his close.

Mink Rancher Kreuger read an article on "Comparative Value of Poultry Waste and Horse Meat for Feeding Mink" in a trade paper, the "American Fur Breeder." It was by Dr. Charles F. Bassett, director of the Fur Animal Experiment Station of Bureau of Animal Industry, Saratoga Springs, N. Y.

NO mention was made of the danger of hormones in such scrap because at that time capette pellets were little known about.

Dr. Theodore C. Byerly of Bureau of Animal Husbandry had written in other publications that, "We must postpone practical application of these results until we have removed the remotest possibility that the flesh of such treated birds, when eaten by men, will have a feminizing effect upon them."

But that escaped notice by the mink trade. Also, Department of Agriculture Circular 801, on "Mink Raising," said "Chicken or turkey heads (with the beaks chopped off) make good mink feed."

Rancher Kreuger bought 1560 pounds of this scrap in December 1949 and 1000 pounds the next month. He didn't know they were loaded with synthetic hormone remnants.
