Good Friday Rites To Be Held Tonight At First Christian

Two special Holy Week services will be combined into a single service Friday night at the First Christian church at 7:30 p. m. The first is the annual Holy Week or pre-Easter Communion service which will be celebrated during the first half of the evening special service.

The second part of the meeting will consist of the beautiful Service of Tenebrae. This is the season of darkness signifying the death of Christ. Twelve candles in memory of the 12 at the Lord's Table will be extinguished until only the final candle in memory of Christ is burning. At the climactic moment of the service the candle is extinguished at the time of the death of the Lord and the congregation leaves the sanctuary in silence and darkness. This service was observed for the first time last year and it has been requested that it be repeated this year because of its high spiritual nature.

You will want to be present for this special service in the First Christian church and a special welcome is thus extended to the entire community for this spiritual fellowship. Members of other churches are especially invited to share in the communion and Tenebrae services, all at the church promptly at 7:30 p. m. so that the service may begin on time.

Dr. Tribble On CBS Church of Air Broadcast

Dr. Harold W. Tribble, president of Wake Forest College, Wake Forest, N. C., will be featured as speaker on the Columbia Church of the Air broadcast on the CBS network Sunday morning, April 12, at 10:00 a. m., EST. Music will be provided by the Wake Forest College choir, under the direction of Dr. Paul S. Robinson.

A native of Virginia, Dr. Tribble received the B. A. degree from the University of Richmond; the M. A. degree from the University of Louisville, T. M. and T. D. degrees from Southern Baptist Theological Seminary, and a Ph. D. degree from the University of Edinburgh. He served as professor of theology at the Southern Baptist Seminary, Louisville, Ky., for twenty-two years, and in 1947 became President of Andover Newton Theological School in Massachusetts. He has been president of Wake Forest College since the fall of 1950.

Dr. Tribble has written a number of books, including: "Our Doctrines," "From Adam to Moses,"

"Salvation," and "The Baptist Faith." He holds honorary degrees from Stetson University, Union University, Wake Forest College, University of Richmond, Duke University, and the University of North Carolina.

R. 16, which will permit women to serve on juries in Texas courts, has now been passed by the House of Representatives and is awaiting action in the Senate. In the interest of all the potential female jurors, I suggest that every interested party write his or her senator for encouragement for the passage of this bill.

Traffic Regulation in Smaller Towns: For people who live in towns of less than 2500 population—H. B. 43 will give the Highway Department the power to set the speed limits, fix stop lights and to generally regulate all traffic in town of 2500 or less population. In district 76, Albany, Moran, Baird, Rising Star, Cross Plains, Gorman, Carbon, Clyde, and Putnam will be effected.

Vote for President: It looks as if Texas Democrats will at last have a chance to vote for the man they want to appear on their party ticket (Republicans, too). S. B. 2 provides for a presidential primary to allow the people of a political party to say who they want

Pay Hike for Teachers: Governor Shivers recommends H. B. 3 which will in effect give Texas teachers a raise of \$240.00 annually. At the same time, Rep. Zivley's H. B. 216 allows them a \$600.00 pay hike annually. Both bills rest in the hands of the committee of education. One of the biggest fights of this season is predicted over this issue.

As most of you diamond fans already know, big-league ball clubs boast more promising second-year men this season than at any time since the end of World War II.

Outstanding in the wave of rookie talent is Cards' pitching sensation Wilmer "Vinegar Bend" Mizell. Says Giants' Bobby Thomson, "There's probably more raw material in that Mizell than in any of them. He's faster than Warren Spahn. The only thing that kept him from winning more was his control." Mizell's record: 10-8, 146 strikeouts (4th in National League), but his wild streaks cost him 103 walks. Mizell thinks he can overcome this flaw. "Ah ought to win 25 games this year," he declares.

But the biggest headache of the ball clubs is finding good catchers. "Very few young kids like to catch. You get hit a lot," Bill Dickey says.

1952, though, was a surprisingly good year for young catchers. Two in the American League caught Dickey's eye: Browns' A. L. Rukie-of-the-Year, Clint Courtney, and rangy, power-hitting Sam White of the Red Sox. Says Soxox Manager Lou Boudreau of White's hitting, "Right now I wouldn't trade him for any catcher, and this includes Yogi Berra. Sammy will be another Bill Dickey."

The National League also has two fine soph catchers: Phillies' Smokey Burgess and Cubs' Toby Atwell. Jackie Robinson, in an interview said, "Atwell's got an accurate arm and he's quick. He's going to get a piece of the ball all the time." (His .301 batting average attests this.) Continued Jackie, "Burgess (.296 with 27 doubles), he'll hit for more power."

Two more players talented enough to defy the Nemesis of Soph Year are the Senators' rookie shortstop Jimmy Runnel, and the Braves' Johnny Logan who made the fewest errors or regular shortstops in the N.L. last season.
