

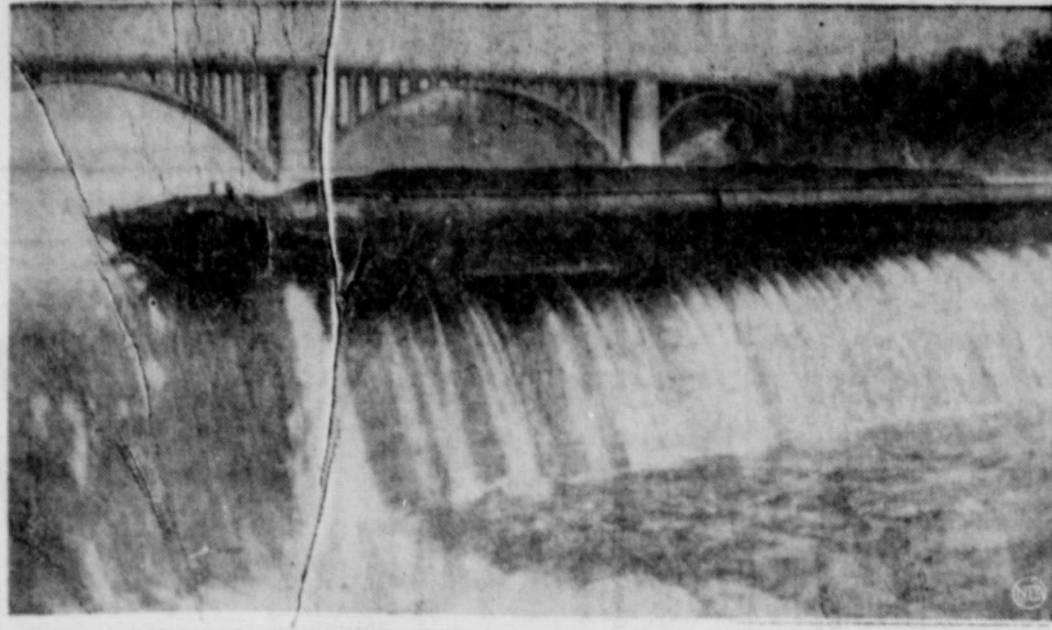

FORT WORTH, April 11 (UP) Cattle 900. Steady. Good and choice slaughter steers and yearlings 32-36, two loads steers 34-50. Most beef cows 25-28, canners and cutters 18-25, some shelly canners under 18. Bulls 25-30. Medium and good stocker steers yearlings 30-35, few choice 37-40, load 450 pound yearling heifers 40. Stocker cows 25-30.

MAC'S FINEST HOUR IS NOW

TOKYO, April 11 (UP)—"I think this has been his finest hour." That was the comment of Maj. Gen. Courtney Whitney, military secretary to Gen. Douglas MacArthur, when the news reached here that the supreme commander had been relieved of his duties.

MacArthur sat down to a late lunch at his home in the American embassy. He arose from it—a five-star general without a job. Apparently he had no advance notice of the action Truman had taken. One high official denied that the removal order came to MacArthur through military channels.

ARCHER CITY, April 11 (UP)—Questioning continued today of two Wichita Falls ex-convicts charged with the sensational burglary of a huge Archer County Explosives Storage Magazine. Simultaneously, search continued for most of the loot in the March 2 break-in—350 quarts of nitroglycerine, 14 cases of dynamite and four boxes of electric blasting caps.

Mom and Pop Can See How Junior Looks

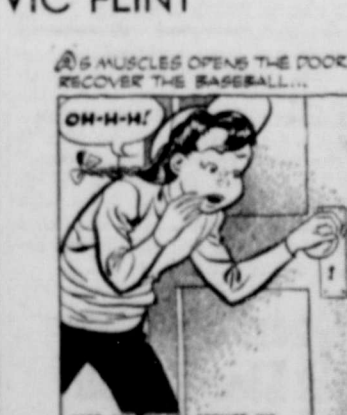

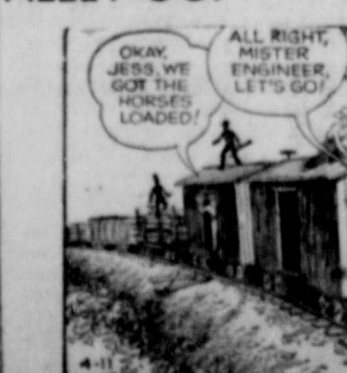

Movie Star Calls His Joining Red Party, "Stupidist, Most Ignorant Thing I've Ever Done"

WASHINGTON, April 10 (UPI)—Sterling Hayden, six-foot four-inch movie star and Marine hero, testified today he joined a Hollywood Communist Cell in 1946 when he came back from war imbued with the notion of righting the world's wrongs.

Hayden revealed that he had submitted to the committee staff a list of people who he believes "by conjecture" are Communists in Hollywood. He would not tell reporters how many he listed.

And then he recited off names of the cell members from the movie lots of the film capitol. Most of them, he said, were "back lot" workers such as carpenters and "grips" but he said one of the Hollywood Communists was former actress Karen Morley, who dropped her career to become a labor organizer.

"I only knew their first names and everybody called everybody else comrade," he said.

Hayden, a towering he-man type in staccato phrases, said it was his admiration of the Partisans of Yugoslavia, tough Communist-led fighters against the Nazis, that impressed him so much he decided when he came back to join the Red party. But his membership lasted only from June to December, he said.

 HONOLULU, April 11 (UP)—This I wouldn't believe. Even if you told me I was here I'd probably deny it. Hawaii is just too incredible to be believed. Korea was nothing like this. Not for an instant.

True, both places have air to breathe. But the Korean air is not scented with orchids. It seems impossible that less than a month ago I was in Korea.

On some license plates in Honolulu there is the simple legend: "Paradise-Hawaii." It's an understatement.

Outside the screen of the porch on which I'm sitting birds are squawking romantically. The dust-blowing wind is whispering soft something to the coconut trees.

Take it from a guy who has visited many countries on every continent, Hawaii is the only true never-never land on this earth. The sky is the skyiest, the surf is the surfiest, the double rainbows are the bowiest, the moonbows are the gossamerest. When it rains, it just seems like heavy-handed humidity.

The expression "out of this world" was invented for Hawaii. I'm sitting here barefooted, wearing shorts, and chomping lotus, of course.

The tourist trade is booming. Below my porch a little native Hawaiian boy is telling a visiting kid: "My father has never been in the Waikiki Water." Your old man is normal, son. I've lived in New York 14 years and I've never been to Coney Island or the Statue of Liberty.

You have to see Hawaii to believe any part of it. Hawaii is the place where, during the last war, this correspondent was awakened one morning from a deep dream of peace by a steady plunkety-plunk, plunkety-plunk. Looking out the window, I beheld a lady beating the whey out of a punching bag.

Turned out she was a lady taxi driver, getting in shape for the day's work.

Hawaii is the place where the weather beams alike on Doris Duke and J. Akuehead Pupule. It's the place where a soldier or a sailor standing on Waikiki Beach will turn to you suddenly and say, "Pardon me, bud, where's Waikiki Beach?"

They've been dumping sand for three months on Waikiki Beach. The sand comes from fine beaches on the other side of the island and is hauled 16 miles. Now the tourists are complaining that the imported sand is too fine and clinging.

Hawaii is the place where the big juke box hit is "Kan Kan Musume", a Japanese song which has been high on the Japanese hit parade for months.

But, don't get me wrong. "Paradise of the Pacific" is a misnomer. The place is plain paradise. It's the one spot on earth where the weatherman ain't mad at nobody.

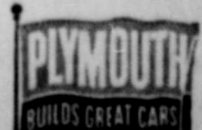
