Dies Hasn't

REDS RETREAT ALONG LINE BUT FIGHT IN WEST AND EAST

TOKYO, May 7 (UP)-United Nations forces attacked at both ends of the 100-mile Korean front today and sent a tank patrol rumbling unopposed into strategic Chunchon at the center.

The Communists stood and fought only at the Western and Eastern ends of the front. They still were retreating elsewhere, presumably to regroup for the second round of their Spring offensive.

However, intelligence reports from the Western Front above Seoul quoted captured North Korean Officers as saying there would be no further Communist offensive.

"The war is about over." they were quoted as saying. Eighth Army Headquarters sources were skeptical. They said more enemy vehicles than ever before wer spotted last night as Communists moved reinforcements and supplies to the front.

The 8th Army seized the initative all across Korea in a series of limited attacks and aggressive patrols.

South Korean Infantry on the Western Front drove Northwest of Seoul behind a tank spearhead against the last remaining Communist force menacing the city. U. S. artillery and fighter planes supported the attack.

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Taft Speech Clarifies Stand **On Far Eastern Policy** BY PETER EDSON NEA Washington Correspondent

WASHINGTON-(NEA)-The great debate between Secretary

WASHINGTON-(NEA)-The great debate between Secretary of State Dean Acheson and Sen. Robert A. Taft before the U. S. Chamber of Commerce convention in Washington never came off. They were separated by a band concert and another speech by the Chamber's retiring president, Otta A. Seyferth. Shucks. They were never even in the hall at the same time. Secretary Acheson spoke first and his speech fell flatter than a crepes suzette pancake. Before a picked audience of 1000 Chamber of Commerce officials from all over the country, he passed up the opportunity to answer criticisms that have been raised against the President's and his foreign policy. And he muffed the chance to answer the policy of General MacArthur, point by point. All he did was read a dull, prepared text while the polite audience as on its was read a dull, prepared text while the polite audience sat on its

On the other hand, Senator Taft wowed 'em. He spoke from notes, freely and with good emphasis. He drew laughter and frequent applause. If any of his audience had any previous doubts about what may now be known as the MacArthur-Taft line, they're gone now.


IN perhaps the clearest exposition of his views he has made to date. nator Taft put forward the idea that the thing bothering him

Senator Tait put forward the idea that the thing bothering him most was the cost and America's ability to meet that cost. A second major point that seems to be bothering Senator Taft is the possibility that the President and State Department will negotiate a cease-fire agreement with the Chinese Communist. This goes back to last January when the United Nations Good Offices team proposed a five-point armistice. It would have provided for withdrawal of all non-Korean troops, UN administration of Korea during the truce, and a four-power conference of U. S., Britain, Russia and Red China to settle Far Eastern issues. This was admittedly a screwy proposal as the U. S. would have been outvoted three to one on some issues like recognition of Red China. U. S. Ambasador Warren Austin opposed the offer and considered it futile. He was instructed to go along with the proposal, however, as an act of good faith with the rest of the United Nations. He believed it would be turned down by Red China and it was. He then began the moves which ended in having Red China branded as an agressor.

BUT what Senator Taft now says he is fearful of is that this old cease-fire proposal may be revived. He fears that Congress may wake up some morning to find such an offer accepted, unless the Congress now takes action to prevent any such appeasement. With respect to General MacArthur's policy on Korea, Senator Taft

As early as last June 28, three days after the Korean war began, Senator Taft declared, ... if a joint resolution were introduced ask-ing for approval of the use of our armed forces in Korea . I would vote in favor of it."

On Jan. 5 Senator Taft declared, "It is far better to fall back to a On Jan. 5 Senator Taft declared, "It is far better to fall back to a defensible position in Japan and Formosa than to maintain a Korean position which would surely be indefensible in any third world war." Two days later the Senator took an even stronger position on this point by suggesting that the U. S. should pull out of Korea and set up a new defense line based on Formosa and Japan. Now, however, Senator Taft seems to be taking still a third position — the MacArthur position — in favor of bombing Red Chinese communications and supply lines in Manchuria. On General MacArthur's proposed blockade of the China coast, Senator Taft told the Chamber that he had his doubts as to its effectiveness. Anyway, Senator Taft not be statist the bombing of Manchurian bases and the use of Chinese Nationalist troops will not bring Soviet Russia into the war. This is a chance we will have to take.

They aren't going to run in the big race at Pimlico, May 19, because they aren't eligible. A n d they aren't eligible because their owners weren't willing to gamble \$2,500 to enter them before the deadline was reached on April 16. Add this to Count Turf's victory at odds of 14.60 to 1, and you get a picture of the confusion that reigns in the turf world.

First of all, all the experts were caught "looking out the windows" when they made their Derby selections. They ignored the fact that Count Turf's daddy, Count Fleet, won the Derby in 1943 and that his grand-daddy, Reigh Count, won it in 1928. And they ignored the fact that Count Turf had been "closing fast" in his recent races. For how could you pick a horse which had won only four of 20 previous starts to win the Derby

Only Jockey Conn McCreary, desperate for anything to ride in his comeback attempt to prove he's not "washed up," was high on Count Turf's chances. He said he 'thought" his horse would win, but admitted he didn't make even the res a \$2 bet on him.

As for the losers, like 5 to favorite Battle Morn, there were no real excuses offered. Typical was the reaction of Battle Morn's rider, famed Eddie Arcaro, who said his mount "stumbled a little, but not enough to matter."

There were wide differences of opinion on just how good Count Turf is. Most horsemen point to his poor overall record and say he merely proved the best of a mediocre field.

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
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
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
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
