Deputy Sheriff Happy That Times Has Called For Police Radios

Deputy Sheriff Joe Faircloth said last night that he is happy to see the Ranger Times standing behind the county and local law enforcement agencys in a drive to install police radios in the police and sheriff department vehicles. Faircloth urged the other papers in Eastland County to follow the "example set by the Ranger Times and strive for better law enforcement which can be obtained only through the installation of these needed radios.'

All of the county officers have stated need for the radios. This includes the sheriff's entire department, and members of the Ranger, Eastland and Cisco police departments. A number of Ranger citizens have called by phone, written letters, and called in person to the office of the Times to say that they could be quoted as saying that they wanted the officers to have every thing which was needed for efficient law enforcement including the radios.
