SAYRE, Okla., May 19 (UP) Heavy rains lashed Oklahoma families homeless today, but dininished in Texas and Kansas.

A week of violent weather the southwest left eight dead, cluding two killed yesterday i tornado at Olney, Tex., whic' jured 75 others and damaged hore han 300 homes.

Water from cow creek poured into a large share of Sayre today, chasing more than 200 families from their homes. Officials said it was the worst flood in the town's history.

**Near Seoul But Were Halted There New Red Attacks Broke Out Today** 

By Earnest Hoberecht United Press Staff Correspondent

TOKYO, May 19 (UP)-American Dutch, French and South Korean troops halted the Chinese Communist breakthrough in Eastern Korea today.

Troops of the U.S. 2nd Division gave ground only in one where flooding streams left 500 sector, where they were forced to fall back to protect their right flank.

The massive human sea assaults of the Reds wavered during the day under terrible pounding of massed Allied artillery, but were resumed near evening.

New Communist attacks broke out around Seoul. Communist troops occupied abandoned Uijongbu, 11 miles North of Seoul, and sent patrols within six miles of the capital. They were stopped by barbed wire entanglements. Twenty miles Northeast of Seoul the Reds tried again

to storm the Pukhan River but were thrown back in a nine hour battle.
