### First Wheat Is Harvested

HAMLIN, May 24 (UP)—First wheat of the nation's 1951 crop was cut today at the Willard Mabery farm seven miles south-west of here and delivered to the Fred B. Moore Grain Company of Hamlin.

The new grain tested 58 pounds per bushel with 19.50 per cent moisture content on the first load, and 59 pounds and 15.50 on the second.

Yield was about 11 bushels per acre.

The grain, cut by C. C. Robertson of Hamlin, was guided by Moore to be the first cut in Texas, therefore the first in the country.

The harvest is several days later than the first in the Hamlin area last year, and Mabery said he would keep it for seed.

of about 35,000 acres sown to wheat in the Hamlin area, only 2,000 acres will be cut, Moore said. The rest was plowed up for cotton after drought killed prospects.

### Reopening Today Of Dallas Cafe

DALLAS, May 25 (UP)—Re-opening of former sheriff Steve Ehrlich's bomb-damaged cafe was set for 5 p. m. today as police reported no clues uncovered in the mysterious attack.

A bomb was thrown or planted atop the restaurant and detonated Wednesday midnight, blowing a hole in the roof and heavily damaging interior of the rear dining room.

Guthrie said the restaurant would do business in its front dining room, which was not damaged.

The ex-sheriff, who said he has no idea who blasted his place, reiterated today he would return to law enforcement work in "about six months" but declined to say in what capacity.

### Gorman Youth Is In Japan

Sergeant Forrest D. Caudle, son of Mr. and Mrs. Forrest Caudle, Route 3, Gorman, arrived recently at this 314th Air Division Base in Japan.

Sergeant Caudle, a fire fighter, will be assigned to the base crash crew which is on call 24 hours a day to save trapped crew members or burning equipment of the Far East Air Forces Bomber Command, which flies daily sorties against the Communist forces in Korea.

Enlisting in the Air Force at Eastland, in June 1948, Sergeant Caudle completed basic training in September 1948, and was sent to Scott Air Force Base, Ill., where he started training as a fire fighter.

Leaving Scott Air Force Base in March 1949, he was transferred to Hensley Air Force Base, Tex., where he served in the Fire Department until July, 1950, when he was sent to the Far East.

Going directly to Korea in July, Sergeant Caudle was assigned to the 18th Fighter Bomber Wing and served with the crash crew until May 1950, when he was rotated to Japan and assigned to the 616th Air Base Wing.

He has been awarded the Korean Service Medal and the Republic of Korea Presidential Unit Citation.

Sergeant Caudle graduated from Desdemona High School, Desdemona, class of '48.

### Negro Bowlers Roll High Score

ST. PAUL, Minn., May 25 (UP)—The Allen and Son team of Detroit, first Negro squad ever to compete in an American Bowling Congress tournament, rolled a creditable 2,910 last night.

The Allen squad got off to a slow start, but followed with 989 and 1,035. The score was good enough to give it second place among the day's competitors, but wasn't enough to place among the top tournament ten.

The Detroit men have been bowling together only one year at the Joe Louis Paradise Bowling establishment. Their sole superior yesterday was the Cecil Ward Five, also of Detroit, which rolled 2,922.

Virgil Foster, Dallas, Texas, caused the only major change in the standings with a 705 series that tied him for seventh place in the singles.

### Truck Driver Kills Another Traffic Victim

OKLAHOMA CITY, May 25 (UP)—Truck driver Rex Lee Tidwell walked away unscathed from his third traffic accident within a year yesterday and summoned aid for the fifth person he has seen die after a collision with his truck.

The latest victim, Lloyd Ava Smith, 33, of Oklahoma City, was also the state's 10,000th traffic death since Jan. 1, 1921.

In an almost identical accident to one in which Tidwell was involved a year ago, Smith's car skidded head-on into the driver's loaded gasoline truck.

The collision tore three wheels from Tidwell's truck but he was unhurt. Smith died a few minutes after the wreck.

One year ago, two Lincoln County couples skidded into his truck in similar fashion near his home at Chandler, Okla. The couples' automobile was split in half and all four died instantly. Tidwell walked away, shaken but unhurt.

Only a week later, Tidwell had even a closer brush with death. While unloading more than 5,000 gallons of gasoline at a Nash, Okla., plant, the gasoline burst into flames. The blaze destroyed his truck and four huge storage tanks within minutes.

Tidwell was nearly engulfed in flames as he sat in the cab but dived out of his truck and snuffed out the fire in his clothing before he suffered critical burns.

### Corpus Christi Advised To Drill

AUSTIN, May 25 (UP)—The City of Corpus Christi was advised today it can continue drilling for water on land it owns at Camp Bellton in Atascosa County.

Attorney General Price Daniel ruled, in response to a request by the Commissioner's Court of Atascosa County, that the commissioner's did not have authority to prevent the city from taking underground water in the land,

### JUDGE CRIES DURING TRIAL

CHICAGO, May 25 (UP)—Judge Wilbert F. Crowley broke down and cried in the midst of a murder trial yesterday and then declared a mistrial.

The judge burst into tears after twice criticizing the defense attorney's opening statement.

"It dawned on me that, whatever I did in this case, I would have to hurt this young lawyer," he said. "I felt so bad about doing this that I couldn't help crying."

Crowley's distress ended the trial of George Lettrich, Jr., 36, on charges of raping and killing 10-year-old Roberta Rinearson on Dec. 17, 1948.

Lettrich himself shed a few tears as he accepted Judge Crowley's offer of a new lawyer.

Crowley challenged the opening statement of Defense Attorney Edward Lane that "if you think Lettrich is guilty, send him to the electric chair."

He questioned Lane's wisdom again when the lawyer told the jury that Lettrich had been convicted of a sex crime against a young girl before the Rinearson case.

He wept when Lane, on behalf of his client, refused Crowley's offer of a public defender's aid.

He excused the jury and left the bench. He declared a mistrial when he returned.

### COMMUNIST ARMIES IN KOREA SUFFER HARDEST BLOW OF WAR

Balance sheet for the week between good and bad news in the hot and cold wars:

1. The Communists armies in Korea suffered their hardest blow of the war when they were defeated in the second round of the spring offensive. They suffered heavy, almost crippling, casualties but the important thing was once more the United States Eighth Army demonstrated again that its firepower and defensive capabilities could cope with almost any number of enemy attackers.

2. The Air Force revealed that two new jet planes—an attack bomber and an all-weather interceptor—have been tested in Korea. If and when they go into action, they will widen the air superiority of the United Nations Army which already is one of the decisive factors in the Far East.

3. Nobody is likely to sit down and try to settle the Korean War at a conference table tomorrow, next week or even next month, but there are signs that International Communism is softening toward the idea of a negotiated peace. Sweden reported some direct overtures from a Russian source this week, and there seems to be grounds for thinking may-be the Communists might talk about a settlement based on again making the 38th parallel the divid-

ing line in Korea.

Bad News

1. The Iranian oil crisis grows worse. The western democracies are finding it difficult to find some basis for negotiating with the Tehran government. The worst thing that could happen would be that Russia move in at the psychological moment and get all the oil for her own uses. The next worse would be that Russia wouldn't get the oil, but neither would Britain. It would be a crippling blow to the rearmament of Western Europe.

2. Russian satellite armies are engaging in a small-scale maneuver. There is no indication that they plan an immediate attack, but the maneuvering causes nervousness in vital parts of Europe.

### Proclamation Iran Premier Wants End Of Oil Dispute

TEHRAN, Iran, May 25 (UP)—Premier Mohamed Mossadegh said today he hopes for an "amicable" settlement of Iran's oil dispute with Britain, but warned that the west will have to get out of the east and middle east if it interferes with the oil nationalization program.

Mossadegh told a news conference that if Iran fails in its attempt to nationalize the British-controlled Anglo-Iranian Oil Company, "the western powers should not only wash their hands of the Middle East, but of the whole East."

"We want the oil dispute settled, of course, and we prefer it to be settled amicably," he said.

"The company has no alternative to handing over the property to its rightful owners. But if the company has legitimate claims, these will be justly looked into."

Mossadegh promised that Iran would do nothing to stop the flow of oil.

### Cook Well Is Estimated At 150 Barrels

The J. C. Cook et al No. 1 Shook and Fox was completed Thursday as a 150 barrel well about 5 miles southeast of Eastland.

The well is located in Block 25, McLennan School Land, and was the second outstanding well brought in this week in that area.

Stapper's No. 2 Canet which was completed Sunday, flowed strongly and was estimated at 250 barrels.

In other activity in the county, the McElroy Ranch Co. has staked location for the No. 1 Maggie V. Dyer, a 3,700 foot rotary wildcat northwest of Cisco.

Location will be 467 feet from the north and 1,500 feet from the west lines of Section 2053, TE&L Survey.

R. D. Snyder's No. 1 Verner W. Chamblis, Lot 48, leagues 3 and 4, McLennan County Survey, was completed this week in the area about six miles East of Eastland.

The well gauged 42 barrels of 42 gravity oil and 49 per cent water in 24 hours. Completion was through 33 perforations at 1,534-36 feet. Gas-oil ratio was 300-1. The well was treated with 500 gallons of acid.

### TWO PERSONS MISSING AS FLASH FLOOD HITS ABILENE

Ranger's water supply in Hagaman's Lake was boosted almost to a capacity this morning after a terrific rain storm sent several inches of water racing over several blocks of residential Ranger and through the gutters down town.

The cloudburst dumped three feet and four inches of water into the lake and a 1.56 inch rain was recorded here this morning. Hail fell on a number of farms and ranches West of here and a number of windows were broken. Most of this occurred near the Callahan County line where it was reported that hail slashed the hides of farm animals.

Three persons were killed and four more persons were missing in a flash flood that struck Abilene from three sides last night and early today, driving 25 families from their homes as it spilled into an estimated 50 blocks in three residential districts.

One of the missing was Roscoe Wigfall, about 30, who was 1.4 m in rushing Cedar Creek. A search was underway for his body.

Charles Fuller, Jr., 15, who left his home last night shortly after the rain was unaccounted for.

Other rescue workers said Wigfall fell into Cedar Creek after losing his grip on a safety rope. He could not swim.

The rain was accompanied by a hail storm so vicious it cut the hide of farm animals near the city.

The water, measuring two and three feet deep in parts of Abilene, poured out of Cedar Creek on the east and Catclaw Creek on the north in the wake of a 2.05 inch downpour within an hour. The rain measured eight to 10 inches fell in some sections of Taylor County around the city.

Squads of National Guardsmen and police and sheriff's officers manned eight motor boats rescuing some 12 families from the West and East sections of town.

Hardly had the water in those two sections of the city reached a peak when water from streams outside the city began backing into the north edge of town.

Rescue workers hauled another 12 or 13 families from the north side early today, but they reported the flood receding on all sides at dawn.

Sheriff H. T. Fleming said damage would be high. The Hendrick Orphan home counted 600 windows knocked out in one three-story building by the hail.

Police said they were swamped with calls for help from families when the water poured into town. Both streams began falling last night but runoff from the heavier rains in other sections of the country apparently sent Cedar Creek on another rise.

In addition to the 10-inch rains south of here, the small town of Tye, seven miles to the west reported a five-inch rainfall.

### Man Is Shot In Fort Worth Bar

FORT WORTH, May 25 (UP)—A Ft. Worth bartender was being held today in the shooting of a Minerals Wells man over a bowl of beans.

Police said Cecil Jester, who gave his address as a Mineral Wells tourist court, suffered a superficial wound in his left side when shot with a .25-caliber automatic by the bartender.

Officers said an unidentified man in the United Recreation Club left last night without paying for a bowl of beans. They said witnesses related that Jester, who had been sitting next to the unidentified customer, then grabbed the bartender and asked "why don't you make me pay for it?"

The bartender said Jester then began chasing him around a pool table. He said he fired in the floor once to make Jester halt. A second shot grazed Jester's side.

### Moore Named Athletic Boss

ABILENE, May 25 (UP)—Wilford Moore, for the past five years head football coach at McMurry, was named today as athletic director to succeed Vernon Hilkirk.

President Harold G. Cooke said Moore would also continue as head grid coach.

Mei Howell was named head basketball coach. He had been coaching the team in the capacity of an assistant.

Hillard recently resigned the athletic directors post after serving at McMurry for six years.

### Unemployed Man Identifies Wife

NEW YORK, May 25 (UP)—An unemployed truck driver yesterday identified as his wife the body of a nude, shapely woman who was garrotted with her scarf and thrown into the underbrush of Staten Island's "death hill."

William Fogarty, who lives in a Manhattan hotel, said he was "positive" the woman was his wife, Mildred 23, missing since last Saturday.

Fogarty was taken to the Sea View Morgue on the Staten Island to view the body and confirm the identification, police said.

Police had issued a 14-state alarm giving the description of the garrotted woman whose nude body was found yesterday in a lonely wooded area of Staten Island by a 12-year-old boy. Panties and a brassiere found beside a bride path some distance from the body were stencilled with sexy sayings.

The woman, a snappy brunet, apparently had been strangled by a peasant-type scarf which was knotted around her neck.

Richmond County District Attorney Herman Methfessel said the woman possibly had been raped in the thickly-wooded section near Todt (which means "death" in German) hill, a favorite spot for picknickers and lovers.

He said she had been stripped of her clothes except for her brown stockings and one green shoe. Her other shoe, a print dress which had been ripped down the side, and a pair of pink panties on which were lettered "Tuesday my love," had been wrapped in a woman's brightly colored raincoat found about 1,500 feet away.

Rain-coated detectives found her white brassiere, stamped "deep 'N' dark," a man's bloody handkerchief, a New Jersey department store purchase slip and a bundle of green vouchers wrapped in a Saturday newspaper in an abandoned cellar near the bride path.
