Reds Fall Back Deeper Into Own Lines In Surprise Korean Withdrawal Today

Test Due For Allmon Today

Preparations were being made to run a drill stem test on the A. D. Clemens et al No. 1 Allmon, on the northwest outskirts of Olden, Tuesday morning.

The well was to be tested in the lower Strawn which was topped at 1832 feet. Operators drilled 7 feet into the sand and reported a good show of oil was recovered.

Twenty-two feet of sand was discovered at 1457 feet. Eighteen feet of the sand was cored and was fully saturated with oil, but bottom hole pressure was zero.

Operators reported that pressure was apparently good at the 1832 foot level.

In other operations in the county, Bankline Oil Co. and Bolsa Chica Oil Co., have staked location for the No. 1-A George P. Fee, a wildcard, about six miles northwest of Eastland.

Depth is slated for 4,000 feet with rotary. The test will be located 1,355 feet from the south and 1,175 feet from the east lines in the northeast quarter of Section 26, Block 4, H&C Survey.

Copey and Hemphill have completed the Hart No. 2 in the Bankline-Owens field with a potential of 550 barrels in a 24 hour test. J. J. Lynn has moved to location on the Noble No. 1 in the same area.

Failures in the area include the S. D. Johnson Mize 3 and Fee 3.

Youth In I-A-P May Volunteer

All youth classified as I-A-P by their local draft boards have a 30 day period in which to choose the branch of service they desire. M-Sgt. Frank Lockman, Eastland recruiting officer, reminded this week.

At the end of that period, July 1, they will no longer be eligible to volunteer for the branch of service they desire. This does not mean that the student will necessarily be called at the end of that time, but that he may not volunteer after that period.

Sgt. Lockman said that Elton O. Guenther of Eastland has recently volunteered for duty with the ordnance department of the U. S. Army. He enlisted at the Eastland station.

FINAL ADJOURNMENT NEARER AS LEGISLATURE STALEMATES

AUSTIN, June 5 (UP)—Final adjournment was a step nearer today for the 52nd Texas Legislature after a tax stalemate between House and Senate was broken in conference committee.

In its essence, a compromise program was reached that will:

1—Leave the production tax on natural gas at 5.72 per cent of the market value at wellhead. This is the current rate.

2—Freeze the amount allocated from the state's road bond assumption fund to counties at \$7,300,000. Any surplus will be handed to the State Highway Department, earmarked for rural road construction and improvement. Counties use their allocation for the same purpose.

3—Slap a gathering tax on natural gas—IE, on pipeline companies. The tax rate is still to be determined.

The State Comptroller's Office held the key to the taxation rate on natural gas gathering. It was asked to study the Omnibus Tax Bill—the big catch-all measure designed to raise funds for state government in the next two years—with an eye to determining how much revenue will be needed from the gathering tax.

Given that answer, the legislators then will determine the gas collection tax rate, on a schedule to supply the need.

RANGER EXPECTED TO OFFER BID FOR LIVESTOCK SHOW

June 22 is the tentative date set for a hearing on the selection of a permanent site for the annual Eastland County Livestock Show which is sponsored by the Eastland County Livestock Raisers Association.

During a meeting held in Eastland recently, a number of members backed a movement to have the show held permanently in Cisco. It has been held there for the past five years. At first, Morris Newnham, Ranger rancher and frozen food locker operator, was the lone voice who protested a quick decision. Then others took it up and his group won out.

It was decided that the organization's board of directors choose the site at their meeting the 22nd. Judge Milburn Long of Eastland, president of the group, said that the directors alone will decide the matter, since it is the type of decision they were elected to make.

Following the discussion, a number of Ranger people have pointed out that a good deal of money has been spent on the Ranger show barn and that Ranger had facilities to put over a good show. Ranger, many of them contend, is located in an ideal spot and close enough to Fort Worth to draw a crowd from that area as well as from all over Eastland County.

Backers of the Cisco show countered that the show was first voted to Cisco on a five year deal and that it would "only be right" to continue the show there each year.

Association members from other parts of the county said that the Cisco group knew they were getting the show only on a five year basis, and other communities should be given a chance to put in bids for the show on a permanent basis if they wished.

Ranger is expected to put in her bid for this show at the meeting June 22. It is considered likely that Ranger will make the association an attractive offer.

GREENVILLE, S. C., June 5 (UP)—Air Force officials at Donaldson Field here released the names of crew members of a C-52 "Flying Boxcar" which crashed near New Boston, Tex., Sunday killing eight men.

1st Lt. William Dudick, pilot, Belle Vernon, Pa.; 1st Lt. Ronald O. Faust, co-pilot, St. Clair Shores, Mich.; 2nd Lt. Franz G. Kortum, co-pilot, Kenosha, Wis.; S. Sgt. John L. Butterfield, radio operator, Syracuse, N. Y.; S. Sgt. Richard E. Watson, engineer, E. Liverpool, Ohio.

The other three victims were passengers on the aircraft and were stationed at Camp Campbell, Ky.

Straight Eight Gets 30-Day Execution Stay

AUSTIN, June 5 (UP)—The 40-year-old Negro woman who said God would find a way to spare her from Texas' electric chair found at least partial fulfillment today in an executive order granting her a 30-day stay of execution.

Emma (Straight Eight) Oliver, condemned to die for a San Antonio knife slaying, was scheduled to go to the chair tomorrow morning as the first woman executed in Texas.

But Gov. Allan Shivers granted the stay until July 6 shortly after receiving from the Board of Pardons and Paroles a recommendation for delay.

The Oliver woman's attorneys, meantime, will continue their fight to save her. They contend she was deprived of her constitutional rights by being sentenced without her counsel present. If their plea falls before the Texas Court of Criminal Appeals, the attorneys still may take the case to the U. S. Supreme Court.

At Huntsville recently she said, "God has found a way to spare me."

She has a 20-year criminal record listing 59 offenses and investigations, including two previous knife murders, in which she won acquittal.

4-H Club Boys Receive Durocs

Nine Eastland County 4-H Club boys received registered Duroc pigs Saturday, June 2, according to C. V. Whitaker, Assistant County Agricultural Agent.

These pigs are sponsored by the Sears-Roebuck Foundation and is a revolving fund. Each year eight gilts and one boar are awarded as prizes in a contest conducted each spring. The subject of the contest this year was "Why the Sow is Important to Eastland County Farmers." Each boy that received a gilt pig this year is expected to return a gilt pig next year.

The boar pig went to Wayne Cozart, Scranton club this year. The boys receiving gilt pigs were: Vernon Stewart, Desdemona; Roy Nelson, Olden; Jimmy Sandlin, Carbon; Dale Swindel, Eastland; Ralph Berry, Cisco; Charles Steel, Rising Star; Don Jobe and Clyde Douglas, Scranton.

TIC's 8th bulletin of the harvest season noted "wheat has shown an improvement since the general rains" three weeks ago "but they came too late for maximum benefits."

"With the limited improvement," it continued, however, "there is a possibility that the state may produce a crop of 15,000,000 bushels as compared to 22,712,000 bushels in 1950 and the 10-year average of 63,486,000 bushels, if favorable conditions exist between now and harvest."

It said hail caused heavy damage in some parts of the wheat belt during the past week "but that damage has been confined to small areas."

Plane Crashes Near Jackson

JACKSON, Tenn., June 5 (UP)—Three surviving crew members said today an explosion ripped apart their giant C-119 "Super-carrier" during a training flight last night and caused it to plunge to earth with four airmen still aboard.

The cause of the explosion could not be explained by the dazed crewmen who were blown clear of the plummeting Air Force troop carrier and parachuted to safety. They were brought to a hospital here for treatment of minor cuts and shock.

Rescue workers recovered the bodies of the four victims in or near the wreckage early today in rugged hill country some 18 miles southeast of here.

Capt. Russell D. Brewington, Nashville, Tenn., the pilot, said the accident probably was caused "by some kind of explosion. All I know is I suddenly found myself in midair and pulled the ripcord." Sgt. Joseph W. Blondo, Buffalo, N. Y., and S-Sgt. Elmer Horvath, Toledo, O., were the other survivors. Names of the dead were withheld.

The plane from the 314th Carrier Wing at Sewart Air Force Base near Smyrna, Tenn., was on a night flying mission to Oklahoma City.

This was the third crash in two days in involving "supercarriers." Two went down in Korea Sunday when caught in an allied artillery barrage and a C-82, prototype of the C-119, crashed in Texas the same day.

General's Son Receives Wound

TOKYO, June 5 (UP)—Capt. William D. Clark, son of Gen. Mark Clark, World War II hero, was wounded in the leg last week when he stayed in the front lines to evacuate wounded GIs after his patrol had withdrawn, it was revealed today.

"There isn't much to tell," young Clark said. "It was just a routine patrol."

The 26-year-old commander of Company G, 9th Infantry Regiment, 2nd Division is recovering in a hospital here.

"You see," he said, "The Reds had zeroed in on us so I ordered the patrol to withdraw to safer positions. Then they started hitting when we ran across an open field. I stayed back to help get the wounded out."

Clark was wounded, but managed to evacuate a fallen GI.

UN FORCES ADVANCE WITHOUT MEETING TOUGH RESISTANCE

TOKYO, June 5 (UP)—Chinese Reds fell back deeper into their Central Korean mountain redoubt in a surprise withdrawal today.

The Communists suddenly gave up their bitter resistance on the West-Central Front during the morning and pulled back to new positions closer to Chorwon, western anchor of the enemy's "iron triangle."

United Nations forces followed up the limited withdrawal with advances of 3,000 yards or more against light, scattered resistance.

Farther east, stubborn Communist resistance limited Allied gains toward Kumhwa, eastern anchor of the "iron triangle", to 500 yards. Heavy fighting raged all along Kumhwa's southern approaches.

Other bloody fighting was reported above Yanggu, Inje and Hangey, five to nine miles north of the 38th Parallel on the East-Central and Eastern fronts. The Communists threw battalions and regiments across the path of the UN advance.

The Reds hurled murderous fire and vicious counter-attacks against the Allies from deep, rock-lined fortifications erected under Russian supervision just after World War II.

An 8th Army communique tonight reported the limited enemy withdrawal on the West-Central front, but did not make clear whether it involved abandonment of any of the concrete and steel bunkers that comprised the Communist pre-war frontier defense line.

Some 450 attended last month's rally at Rising Star.

A technicolor film, "The Great Achievement," will be one of the main features of the rally. The film is a story of the life and ministry of the late Dr. George W. Truett, for many years pastor of the First Baptist Church in Dallas. It includes a portion of his sermon on the subject, "The Greatest Achievement."

Youth Evangelist Billy Hogue, a student at Southwestern Baptist Seminary and new pastor of the New Hope Baptist Church near Ranger, will be the featured speaker. Hullen Hazard of Howard Payne College will lead the singing and Miss Verna Wheat of Morton Valley will be at the piano. Robert Cox, Baylor University student from Rising Star, will give his personal testimony.

Paul Stephens, pastor of the East Cisco Baptist Church, will be in charge of the rally.

Russia Fears Atomic Bomb

All Americans who are looking over their shoulders for fear an atomic bomb is about to fall on them can take comfort from the fact that Stalin and the Russians are worrying about the same thing. They don't discuss it in the newspapers, on the radio and in the living room like we do, but it is a genuine fear.

Deputy Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko of Russia handed a note yesterday to the representatives of America, Britain and France. Stripped of diplomatic language, what it said was: "If you want to end the cold war let's talk about getting rid of the bases the United States has established in Europe."

He didn't say so, but primarily he meant air bases—places from which our planes, carrying atomic bombs, could take off for Moscow, Leningrad and Stalingrad. The Russians saw enough of America's military aviation in World War II to have a healthy respect for the ability of our pilots to make their way to a target and unload their bombs.

Gromyko and representatives of the western powers have been talking in Paris for almost three months in an attempt to start the wheels turning for a truce in the cold war. Britain, America and France proposed that they stop talking and call a meeting of the foreign ministers of the four powers in Washington next month to get down to business. Gromyko came back with his proposal that Russia would be glad to do that provided the American bases in Europe could be brought up for consideration.

pressive in expensive clothes, drives a Cream 1950 or 51 Cadillac. Dillard is a narcotics runner, manages a number of call girls, knob-knocker, gunman, and Confidence man. Both Dillard and Davis are dangerous and should be approached with caution.

Tom "Blackie" Fultcher was seen hitch-hiking through Ranger recently about 8:30 p.m. Fultcher is one of the biggest criminals in Texas today. Subject was in jail in Snyder in January after being picked up hitch-hiking thru Snyder. Subject poses as hitch hiker and robs his victims after being picked up by motorist.

Jimmy Gains, aka Jimmy Myers is in jail at present but often hangs out at the Victor Hotel in Cisco. Gains is a big time hoodlum who has beaten over 100 Grand Jury indictments. Gains takes and runs dope, runs houses of ill fame, breaks into drug stores, hospital medical cabinets and other places carries a pistol in boot, will resort to armed robbery and is considered dangerous. 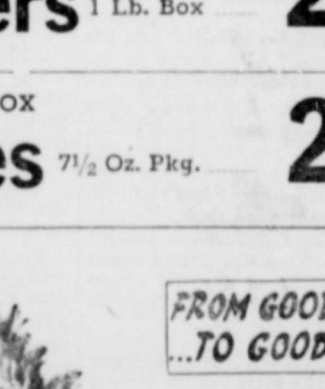

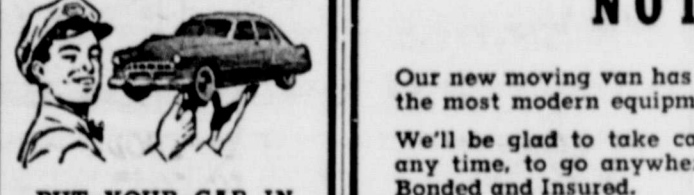

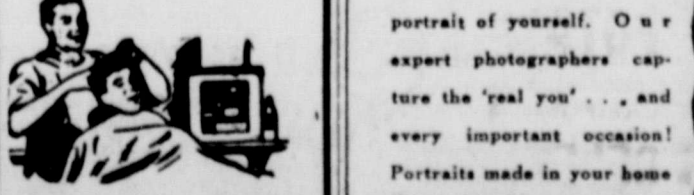

Britain Will Accept Terms

LONDON, June 5 (UP)—The Cabinet decided today to accept in principle Iran's nationalization of the Anglo-Iranian Oil Company on the condition that Britain has a say in the processing and distribution of oil supplies, it was learned.

The compromise plan also stipulates that Britain has a right to intervene in the oil dispute because she holds most of the stock in the oil company, informed sources said.

The chief concern is to maintain a free flow of oil from Iran to the West and to assure "a certain degree of control" over the Abadan Refinery, largest in the world, these sources said.

As the cabinet discussed the crisis, the British Foreign Office, treasury and the oil company conferred on appointment of a mission to be sent to Tehran to try to negotiate a settlement.

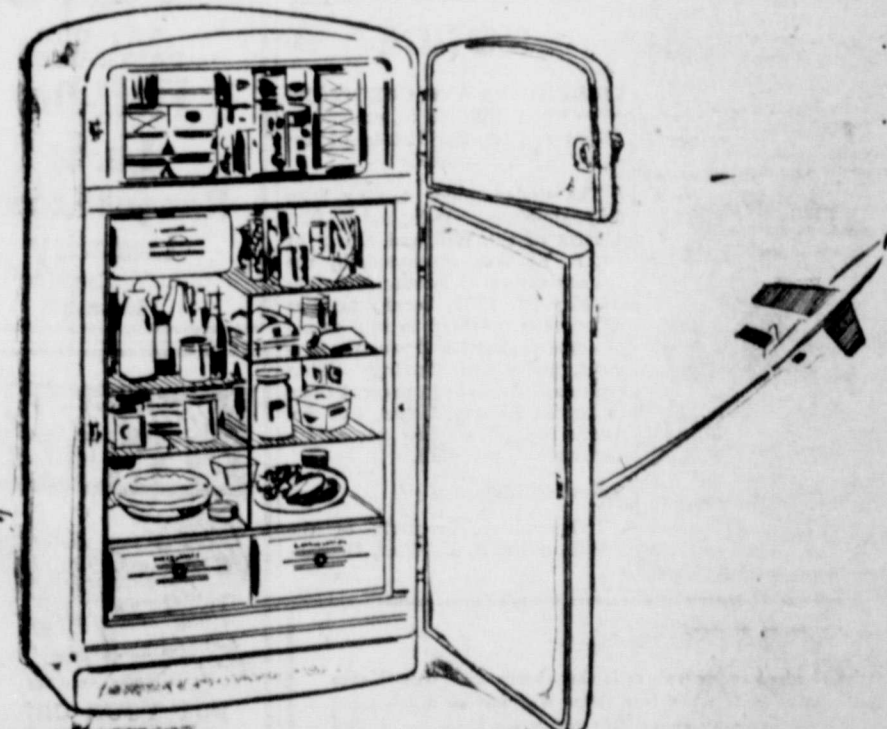

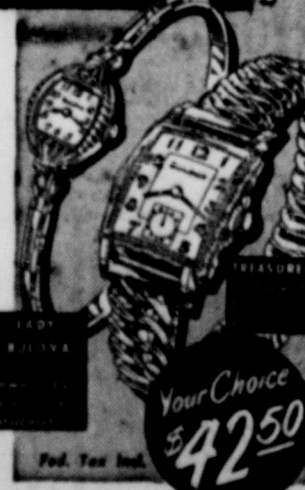
