Brooks Re-enters Race for Sheriff Castro County

I. B. Brooks, who withdrew from the sheriff-tax collectors race some time ago, announces in this issue of his re-entrance, subject to the Democratic primary next month.

In his announcement, Mr. Brooks states that after the solicitation from many of his friends over the county, and due to the fact that he has disposed of his real estate and insurance business, he has made the decision to re-enter.

He expects to make an active campaign during the few remaining weeks before the election, and announces that he will, if favored with the office, conduct its affairs in a business-like and fearless manner, favoring no one, and looking after all law violations of the county, as well as the collection of all taxes.

Charles H. Dean, present county attorney, announces in this issue of the News as a candidate for re-election, subject to the action of the Democratic primary next month. In his announcement to the News Mr. Dean promises to conduct the affairs of this important office as he has in the past, and to adhere at all times strictly to the law in all matters.

Denver Prepared With Plenty of Car Facilities

J. W. Mode, superintendent of the Fort Worth & Denver, with headquarters in Amarillo, was in Dimmitt a short time last Friday, and while here informed the News that the Denver had 3,000 cars ready to move the 1930 grain crop from the Plains section. This, according to Mr. Mode, is 1,200 more cars than were in readiness at the opening of the 1929 season, and is, we believe, assurance that the Castro County grain will be handled as promptly and efficiently as it was last year, when the local situation with reference to cars and dispatching of trains, was excellent, and the envy of many larger towns in this section.

When asked by the News representative what he thought of the Castro County crop, Mr. Mode stated that it looked encouraging, and compared most favorably with other counties of this section, which he had seen.

Plainview Road Bonds Are Sold

Announcement was made by Judge M. R. Avery Wednesday that the road bonds, providing for the Dimmitt-Plainview road, to parallel the Denver into the Hale County city, thru Hart, had been sold. The price received was 97½ net to the county.

It is understood that work has started on the Plainview end, and work on this end, it is thought, will start soon after the harvest season is over.

HARVESTING TO BE STARTED NEXT WEEK

Combines Will Start on 1930 Crop in Castro County During the Next Week.

Harvesting of the 1930 wheat crop of Castro County was delayed probably a week on account of recent rains, nevertheless welcomed by the farmers. The rain of Monday evening, while not benefiting wheat to any great extent, was very valuable to the farmers in planting their row crops. Recent dry weather retarded somewhat the wheat as well as planting of row crops, in many sections of the county.

It is estimated that slightly over an inch of rain has fallen in the county within the past six days.

A number of farmers have announced that they would start harvesting next week, weather permitting, and it is expected that the work will be in full swing by the last of this month.

While the crop in Castro County will not be as heavy as expected a few weeks ago, it is generally conceded that the wheat in this county will make a good yield, taking a county-wide average.

Hail has damaged a portion of the crop, but it has been small, as compared with last year.

Several Counties Report First Grain

Reports from Plainview state that two loads of 1930 wheat were marketed there on last Saturday. The gran graded No. 1, and brought \$1.00 per bushel, in addition to a \$25 premium for the first received this year.

At Petersburg, also in Hale county, the first load was received Saturday, and reports from there say that harvesting was started last week by a good many farmers in that section.

Floyd county reported the first load on Tuesday of last week, which was sold in Floydada for \$1 per bushel, with the market at 85c. A total of five loads were delivered in Floydada by one farmer on Tuesday, all testing good and a good yield is expected from that section this year.

Maples Withdraws From Sheriff Race

Sheriff Clem Maples, who is at present confined in a hospital at Temple, has withdrawn from the race for re-election to the office he now holds, according to an announcement appearing in this issue of the News.

This leaves J. H. Flanagan and I. B. Brooks, both of whom have served as deputies under Mr. Maples, in the race.

House Unroofed Here Saturday In Wind Storm

The home of Mrs. Lizzie J. Duree, located in the west part of Dimmitt, was completely unroofed during the severe wind storm which struck Dimmitt about 6 o'clock last Saturday evening. In the house with Mrs. Duree was the small son of Mayor A. M. Brownlee, who lives just north. Damage to the roof plaster and furnishings will amount to about \$1,000. The roof was completely demolished and blown over on the highway and west for several hundred feet. Mrs. Duree received a severe shock as a result, but was recovered Monday.

Just before reaching Dimmitt the heavy clouds assumed the proportions of a young cyclone, but aside from the dip made at the Duree home, no further serious damage was done.

A small hole was torn in the roof of the Brownlee home, and all telephone and light wires in that immediate vicinity were torn down.

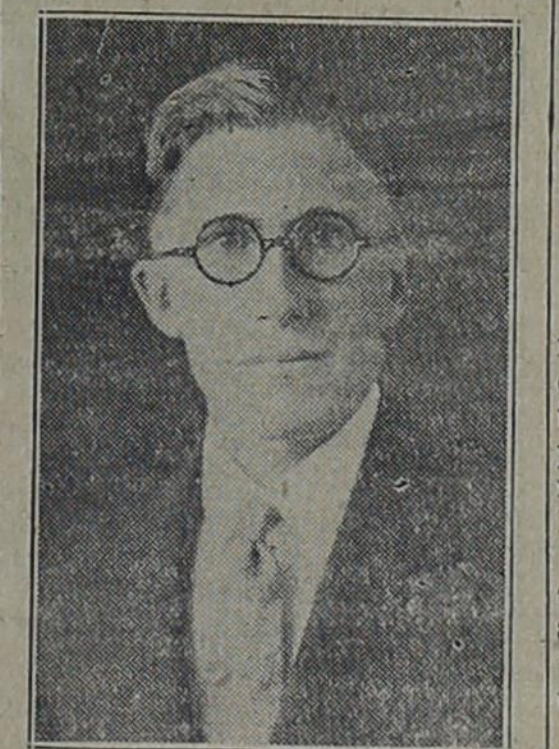
A light hail accompanied the wind and rain in Dimmitt, but reports from Hart, Tulia, and points south, indicated that considerable damage was done to wheat in those sections, as well as in spots just east of Dimmitt.

It will be remembered that just one year ago, on June 6, this section was visited by a severe wind and hail storm, doing considerable property damage in the vicinity of Flagg, and the accompanying hail damaging wheat to a great extent over the entire county.

N. M. GILBERT TO LEAVE HERE NEXT WEEK

Leaves Next Week to Attend School and Do Special Work at Brownwood.

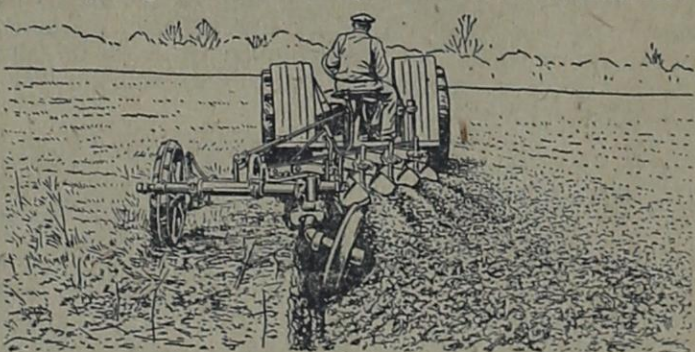

The trade name of this machine is DELCOGAS and it is handled by Blythe Bros., local Delco-Light dealers of Hereford. It is composed of a Delco Gas compressor and a fuel tank containing a special liquid distilled from natural gas. The tank is buried outside of the home. Operation of the compressor converts the liquid into vapor gas containing the same quick heating elements found in natural gas or artificial gas in the city. This vapor is carried to the gas range, water heater, radiant heater or similar appliances in the home, and burns with an intense blue flame.

The cost of operation is about the same as the average cost of city artificial gas. Two of these machines have been recently installed by Blythe Bros. in the Dimmitt neighborhood for W. R. McElroy, one mile east of Dimmitt, and O. C. Axtell, 22 miles south of Dimmitt.

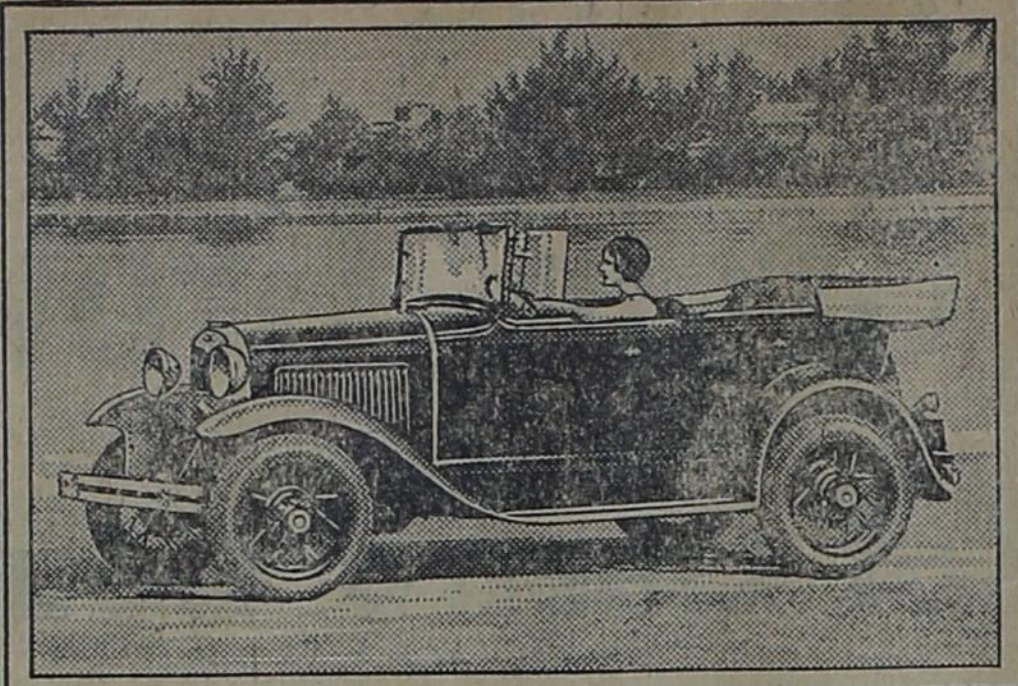

New Ford Car Wins Favor

The top is of the quick collapsing type, easily handled by one person, and folds flat. The windshield, of Triplex shatter-proof glass, is of the folding type and can be laid flat forward. The windshield wings fold over it, emphasizing the sport effect of the car.

Machine Picks Up 1,555 Pounds Iron North Hereford

The new nail picker of the highway department passed thru Hereford Tuesday, and when it had arrived here at noon from Amarillo it had picked up no less than 1,555 pounds of nails, staples and other small pieces of metal capable of puncturing auto tires.

"Between here and Umberger was the foulest road I have ever seen," said T. W. Zeigler, official for Division No. 4 of the highway department. "We picked up 739 pounds of nails and loose metal traveling the 18 miles, or 41 pounds to the mile." The nail picker was recently assembled in Amarillo by the highway department. It will pull nails from a depth of three inches under loose dirt. It will often pick up weights to 50 pounds and is capable of lifting from the road 100 pounds of metal if lying just right.

The picker will traverse about 20 miles a day. When the metal is dumped it first falls on scales on the machine to that accurate record may be kept of the work that is done.—Hereford Brand.

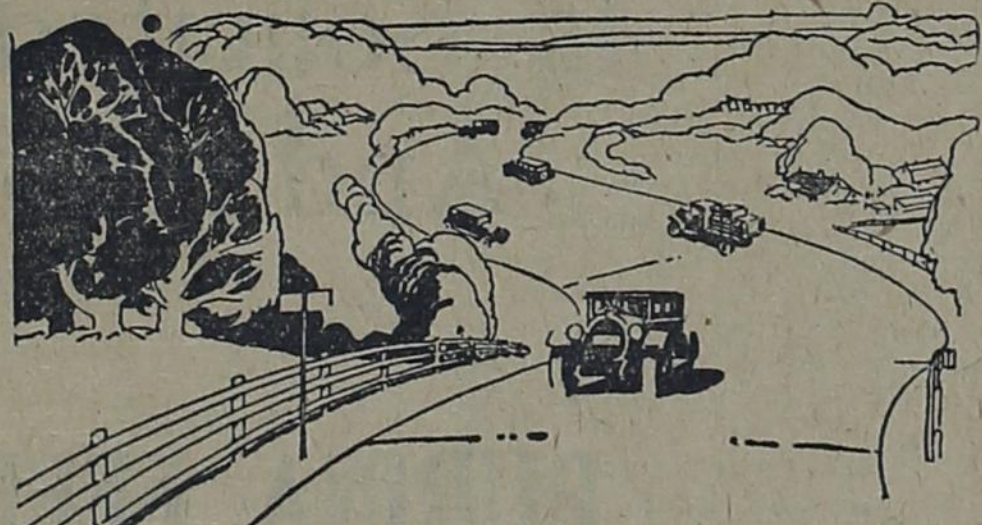

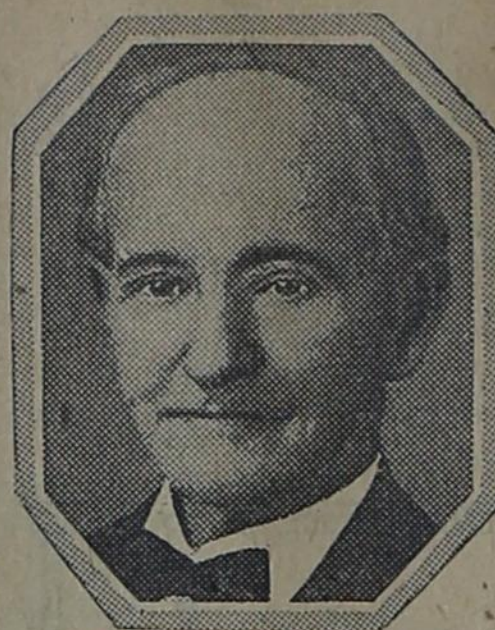

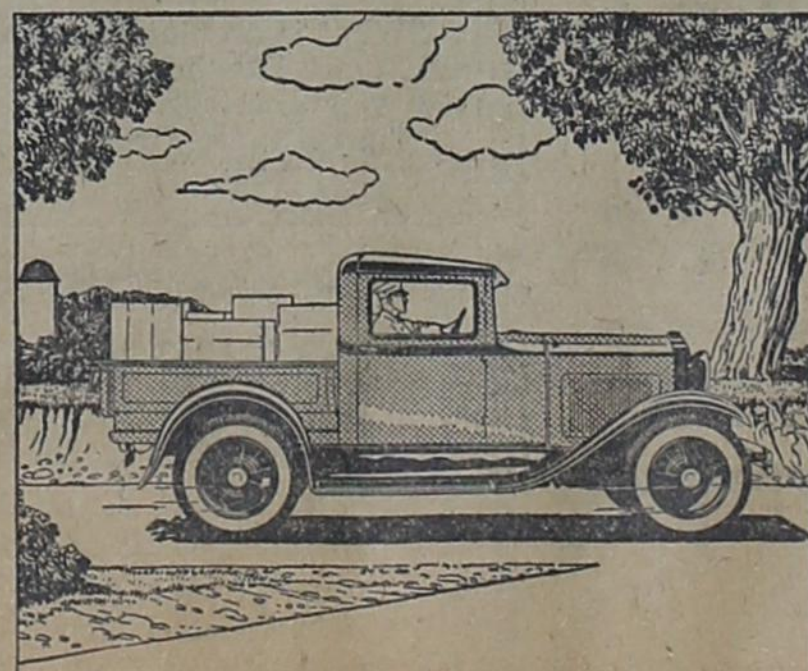
