## Battered Red Troops Are Knocked Back

### Many Little Problems Arise In Entertainment For Hero

AUSTIN, June 13 (UP)—There are many little problems in arranging big entertainment for a top drawer war hero.

Some hurried Texans could vouch for that today as Gen. Douglas MacArthur began a four-day speaking tour in Texas.

Despite elaborate planning, some knotty little problems arose. For instance, the State Legislature invited MacArthur to address it in a joint session.

The Legislature then finished its work and adjourned, sine die. Technically, MacArthur's speech at Austin today was before a joint session — and most of the Legislators were on hand.

But before they finished their constitutional labors and adjourned.

### Officials Call News Conference

WASHINGTON, June 13 (UP)—Officials who conducted a two-day spring atomic tests at Eniwetok called a news conference (at noon today) to report on results of the tests. A Senator said he was even more than expected.

Sen. Brian McMahon, D., Conn., gave a preview yesterday of what Lt. Gen. Elwood R. Quesada, who commanded the military task force at Eniwetok, and Dr. Alvin C. Graves, technical director of the operation, were expected to report.

McMahon's joint congressional atomic energy committee received a briefing from Quesada and Graves and Chairman Gordon Dean of the Atomic Energy Commission. Afterwards McMahon said:

"I think I can say that the tests lived up to the theoretical expectations of them and in some cases exceeded these expectations."

Dean said last week that part of the experiment contributed to the development of the hydrogen "super" bomb. But officials have made it clear that while the tests were concerned, among other things, with the H-bomb there was no chance that even a "baby-sized" H-bomb was detonated.

Several official releases, for publication at 5 p. m. CST, will be distributed and discussed at the press conference.

All other information made available at the conference also will be for release at 5 p. m. CST.

Mayor J. B. Adoue, Jr., whose was his final voice of authority, will ride with MacArthur, it was decided.

### Congress Stages An Investigation

WASHINGTON, June 13 (UP)—Congressional investigators called an inquiry today to find out whether cattlemen are striking against the public.

Beef started moving back into the stockyards yesterday but neither Price Controller Michael V. Disalle nor the congressmen would predict that the shortage touched off by his beef price roll-backs was definitely ended.

The joint congressional "watchdog" committee on economic controls scheduled hearings for tonight and tomorrow night to get the full story on the shortages that have almost emptied butchers' shelves.

The committee planned to question representatives of the big meat packers, cattle growers, and possibly some feeders, at tonight's session (starting at 5:30 p. m., CST).

Committee members had only one question: "Where is the beef?"

Committee sources said they were prepared to issue subpoenas, if necessary, to get witnesses who could answer that question.

### Gloria Rogers To Act In Play

Miss Gloria Rogers of Ranger will play the role of the maid in "House of Bernarda Alba," to be presented June 15 and 16 at Texas State College for Women.

Set in a rural Spanish town, "House of Bernarda Alba" is a pictorial drama depicting life of women in Spain. The play is one of three full length dramas scheduled for production in the summer theatre program at TSCW.

### Pair Charged With Murder

SPARTA, Wis., June 12 (UP)—Sgt. Walter Blantz, Lancaster, Pa., and Jose Rodriguez, 22, Rio Hondo Texas, today were charged with second degree murder in the beating of Michael F. Marx, 56, in a Sparta hotel room.

Marx died yesterday in a few hours after he was found unconscious at the foot of a fire escape leading from his bloodstained hotel room.

Neither of the Camp McCoy soldiers entered a plea when they were arraigned before Justice Henry Fanning.

Preliminary hearing was set for June 26 on request of Dist. Atty. William Gleiss and the men were placed under \$10,000 bond each.

Rodriguez was placed in custody at Camp McCoy. Blantz was held in County Jail.

The exact date will be announced later.

Fort Worth's civic pride took a jolt. The city had arranged not one, but two, 17-gun salutes for "old soldier" MacArthur.

However, the Army team which was to fire the salutes was withdrawn from the ceremony by a late change of military orders. The team will fire salutes for MacArthur at Dallas Friday night and then return to duty in Oklahoma, leaving Fort Worth with neither guns nor ammunition for a booming welcome.

The MacArthur arrangement's committee at Fort Worth announced the change with regret and urged the citizens to compensate for the lack of booming guns by throwing lots of confetti at the General.

Peanuts Build New Homes

A large number of new farm homes built recently in the sandy area of Eastland county reflects the favorable price of peanuts for the past two years, says J. M. Cooper, Eastland County agricultural agent.

Cooper believes more new farm homes and improvements have been built on the sandy land area, which makes up over half of Eastland county, in the last 18 months than in the previous several years.

While visiting the southern part of the county recently, Cooper counted 19 new homes. He also noticed other new screened porches and other evidences of prosperity.

Peanuts have been the principal source of income on the sandy land farms for many years. In addition to the support price of \$3.10 a bushel last year, many buyers offered a bonus of \$3.50 to \$7.50 per ton and hauled the nuts free of charge from the farms to the shipping points.

High yields for the past two seasons, coupled with the favorable prices, paid off many land notes, and resulted in better living for the farm family, says Cooper.

He reports that many new homes and improvements are also noticed on the tight land area in the northern part of Eastland county.

### Man Found Shot In Yard Of Home

R.S. Glenn, 82, was found shot in the temple, sitting in a chair under a tree in the yard of his home, 1318 South Seaman at about 9:30 a. m. today.

Neighbors heard the shot and immediately called for an ambulance. Glenn was rushed to a doctor's office immediately where he was still undergoing treatment at about 11 a. m.

A fully loaded .41 Colt pistol was found by the chair in which Glenn was sitting. One shot had been fired from the gun.

Crutches which Glenn, who had been in ill health for some time, used were lying by a tree near the chair.

Glenn lived with his daughter, Miss Elsie Glenn, at the South Seaman home. Miss Glenn was out of town on business.

A note addressed to his daughter was found in a typewriter in a back room of the house by policemen who investigated the incident.

Second Division Kills 48,000 Men

TOKYO, June 13 (UP)—The U. S. 2nd Division traded 12 miles of territory for 48,000 Chinese, its commander said today.

Maj. Gen. Clark L. Ruffner said the division killed or wounded 4,000 Chinese for every one of the 12 miles it yielded during the second Communist spring offensive May 16 through 21.

The offensive was turned into a Communist rout by U. S. defensive strength more powerful in some respects than any in World War I or II, he said.

He said the 38th Regiment alone fired 11,000 rounds of artillery during one 24-hour period—more than ever was fired in a single engagement in either World War.

The concentrated artillery fire combined with a B-29 "Carpet Bombing" raid broke an attack by four Chinese Divisions, he said.

SAN ANTONIO, June 13 (UP)—A mixed 25-year-old divorcee claimed today that her ex-boyfriend admitted to her that he was one of the nine bandits who staged the \$1,500,000 Brinks Robbery in Boston.

### Government To Announce New Price Rollback

DENVER, June 13 (UP)—Government rollbacks on clothing prices will be announced in "a day or so," Michael V. DiSalle, Federal Price Administrator, said today.

"The order will come out in a day or so and will cover all forms of wearing apparel," DiSalle said. "It will provide a base period of three months in the pre-Korea range."

"Manufacturers will be allowed to select the three consecutive months on that basis, and will be granted markups for rises in materials and labor costs."

DiSalle exuded confidence as he arrived in the western cattle country where livestock price rollback orders have brought down the wrath of cattlemen.

He made it plain that the government isn't backing down on the meat orders, but wouldn't claim a victory over the ranchers although stockyards resorted to an upsurge in receipts.

"The meat orders will stick," he said bluntly.

DiSalle said consumers haven't been worried about the possibility of a beef shutout.

He was backed up in this by his wife who pointed out, "we haven't been able to buy steak for a long time anyway."

### Official Will Confer With Consul Today

SAN ANTONIO, June 13 (UP)—An official of the Texas Council of Human Relations will confer here today with Miguel Calderon, Council General of Mexico, on removal of Texas counties from a blacklist on Mexican labor.

Tom Sutherland, director of the council, said he hoped to find out "what the Mexican Government expects and where we're going to go."

### Allied Advance Recorded Yesterday Of One To Nearly Three Miles

TOKYO, June 13 (UP)—Battered, demoralized Red Armies reeled back deeper into North Korea on a 76-mile front today and already may have abandoned strategic Pyongyang, 29 miles north of the 38th Parallel.

Communist rear guards sought to delay the cautious United Nations pursuit in some sectors, but elsewhere in their sagging central and eastern fronts offered no opposition.

Allied advances of one to nearly three miles were recorded yesterday.

Swarms of Allied planes roared out ahead of the UN spearheads and smashed at heavily camouflaged Red columns trying to escape north over highways and through mountain passes. The rain of steel and explosives killed hundreds of enemy troops.

The official picture of the front was given by an 8th Army communique which said:

1. Light to moderate enemy contact was met by 8th Army patrols on the western front southwest of Chorwon, former southwestern anchor point of the shattered triangle.

2. Task forces probed north and

3. Light to moderate resistance was met by patrolling and attacking 8th Army forces on the remainder of the front.

There were indications that the Communist already have or soon would abandon Pyongyang, last and northernmost bastion of the enemy's once-impregnable central Korean "iron triangle."

The northern tip of the former assembly and stockpile triangle was a virtual no-man's-land within easy range of Allied guns and under ceaseless pounding from the air.

Capture of Pyongyang would put the hard-driving 8th Army astride the main highway to the east coast port of Wonsan, 50 miles farther north and probable hinge of the next Communist defense line.

Allied forces also were near Kumsong, 16 miles east of Pyongyang on another road running to Wonsan.

U. S. Shooting Star jet fighters caught an enemy column moving north in daylight along a trail amid 1,500-foot mountains near Sudong, 13 miles southeast of Kumsong and 14 miles north of the Hwachon Reservoir.

The Reds had camouflaged the column carefully with green boughs in a futile attempt to screen it from the air. The Shooting Stars killed or wounded at least 140 enemy troops and 30 pack animals and destroyed 25 wagons loaded with supplies.

LOS ANGELES, June 13 (UP)—Mrs. Virginia Sherry Guiberson, 33, has accepted a \$250,000 property settlement from Samuel A. Guiberson, Jr., 78-year-old Texas oil millionaire, and dropped her separate maintenance suit.

Mrs. Guiberson, a former stenographer, submitted the settlement to superior court for approval yesterday. Under the agreement, she receives a \$75,000 home here and oil royalties paying her an estimated \$1,250 to \$2,000 monthly.

The oilman divorced Mrs. Guiberson last December in Dallas, while her separate maintenance suit was pending here. She charged him with cruelty and asked \$3,470 a month temporary alimony in the suit, but a court ordered Guiberson to pay her \$650 monthly pending trial of the action.

Mrs. Guiberson estimated her husband's fortune at \$7,000,000. They separated last Oct. 12 after being married five years.

Patrolman Alerted Along Mex Border

ROMA, June 13 (UP)—Patrolmen along the Texas-Mexico border today were alerted to be on guard against beef smuggling from Mexico, in the face of a possible U. S. shortage of meat.

Two Mexicans from Ciudad Aleman, just across the Rio Grande, were arrested earlier this week with 116 pounds of smuggled meat in their possession.

They were being held today at Brownsville, pending filing of charges.

of British technicians. There is nothing to prevent us from having the advice of foreign technicians. We need their advice to improve the industry, but we will in no way allow them to interfere with our affairs."

Mossadegh said Iran had no alternative but to take over the company. But he said Iran wants to remain friendly with Britain.  
Those sentiments were echoed by Kazem Hassibi, the "brains" behind the oil Nationalization move. He said that while the British controlled oil resources are being taken over despite British protests, Iran needs the service of British technicians in exploiting the vast petroleum resources.  
"We need the help of the civilized world to run the industry," Hassibi said, in an interview. "We will continue to have the services

## Texas Woman Is Murdered

BOSSIER CITY, La., June 13 (UP)—Mrs. Edna Matthews, about 50, Kilgore, Texas, nightclub operator, was shot to death in a nightclub here early today. Police held her bodyguard for questioning.

Chief Deputy Sheriff Steve Norris of Bossier Parish said John W. Tarlton, 35, also of Kilgore, was in jail and would be held until after a coroner's inquest.

Harry Bumgardner, operator of the bar where Mrs. Matthews was killed, told Bossier City Police that he knew of no argument preceding the shooting. He said he heard Tarlton ask the woman if she was "finished", and before she could answer a shot was fired. Mrs. Matthews died in Shreveport Sanitarium. She was shot in the left chest.

She was owner-operator of the Palms Nightclub in Kilgore, and Tarlton had worked for her about a year as bodyguard.

## Confederate Vet Is Dead

HECTOR, ARK., June 13 (UP)—The last of Arkansas' Confederate veterans, 103-year-old John Green Chisum, died yesterday, leaving only 10 of the boys in Grey still living.

Three weeks ago, Chisum's only other comrade in Arkansas, John Marcum, 98, died at his home in Birta.

Members of the 60-year-old farmer's family said the victim might have been knocked off the mower by lightning, but hospital attendants discounted the theory.

Phone Service Is Restored

ORANGE, June 13 (UP) Felix Demary, who two weeks ago was called before the House Crime Investigating Committee at Austin, today had a court order allowing him a telephone in his cafe but he was still without his private line to the Maceo interests in Galveston.

District Judge F. V. Hustmyre yesterday ordered the Southwestern Bell Telephone Co. to restore business telephone service to Demary's border cafe in east Orange, La.

Judge Hustmyre's order followed a mandamus action filed by Demary in 128th District Court.

The order required restoration of service to the business telephone but not to the public telephone formerly connected in the cafe or the private line connecting the cafe with Galveston.

A hearing on a permanent injunction to restore the telephone was set for June 22.

The original injunction suit against Demary was filed by Attorney General Price Daniel who obtained an injunction to halt use of phones in transmitting horse race information.

Gangster Changes Statement Regarding Murder Of Officer

BROWNWOOD, June 13 (UP)—The state's star witness, Maxfield (Bill) Pomeroy, today denied that Marvin Eugene Johnson shot Dallas Policeman Johnny Sides to death last Jan. 22.

This was a complete reversal of Pomeroy's previous testimony given in the murder trial of "Uncle" Robert Johnson, 33, leader of a California Hill-Billy Band of four accused in the shooting.

Last March, Pomeroy took the stand in a Dallas Criminal District Court and said that Marvin fired the shot which killed the youthful policeman.

It was a different story today. He said that Marvin, 21, "never had a gun at any time during the shooting" after officers stopped the four in South Dallas.

He said from the witness chair that Dallas officers "told me to make the statement about Robert. They told me it would mean the electric chair if I didn't."

"I didn't think my life should be given to save another."

Pomeroy, 19, admitted that he agreed to "tell the truth about the shooting" after a conference with his lawyers. He said "Uncle" Robert had both pistols and had fired all the shots.

During Robert's trial, Robert testified that he shot at Sides and his partner, Harold Dawson, only after the officers shot at them.

Pomeroy today bore this out. He said he was on the opposite side of the car from Marvin. He said the shooting started after one of the officers had told Marvin to "stand still, you dirty rat, or I'll killyou."

He said Marvin brushed aside a policeman's gun which was pointed at him and it fired, the bullet grazing Marvin's head. He said Marvin had a "red spot" on the head after the quartet had fled the scene.

Pomeroy refused to identify the guns found in the car by Arkansas policemen at the time of the arrest in which an officer had shot from his head.

"They look like the guns," was all he would say.

He denied that he had given Dallas Police any signed statements—

some of you can copy pretty good," he accused.

He said the statements were like a "bunch of detective stories" that he had read about in magazines.

Before Sides was shot, he identified Marvin as his killer and gave a death bed statement to fellow officers. Dawson named "Uncle" Robert as the gunman who shot him in the arm.

A jury took less than 10 minutes to give Robert the death penalty. His case is now being appealed.

Robert is the uncle of Marvin and J. W. Johnson, 23, who is also being accused in the crime.

The case is being tried in Brownwood's 35th District on a change of venue.

Pomeroy was still on the stand at noon as District Attorney Henry Wade of Dallas cross examined him about his story.

Airlift Gets Underway Here

BROWNSVILLE, June 13 (UP)—The lower Rio Grande Valley's wetback airlift, designed to fly illegally-entered aliens from Brownsville to the interior of Mexico, was well underway today.

The first of two government-chartered planes took off here in its inaugural flight yesterday with 60 aliens ordered deported four days ago.

A second plane will arrive tomorrow, after which the two cargo planes will make two round trips daily, transporting about 240 wetbacks a day. Destination of the first two flights is Durango and San Luis Potosi.

W. F. Kelly, assistant supervisor of the enforcement division of the Bureau of Immigration and Naturalization, was acting head of the airlift. He supervised a similar airlift at the other end of the U.S.-Mexico border in El Centro, Calif., a week ago.

Kelly explained the airlift is the government's answer to the border patrolman's old problem of deporting a farm worker to the Mexican border, only to find him back at work in the valley the next day.

The government has chartered the planes from the flying tigers company, and will bear the entire cost, Kelly said.
