Most of the cattle were sold this year and a large number of the registered quarter horses. But there are still a lot of horses on the Lazy K. America Suspects Russian Tricks

TOKYO, June 25 (UP)—The U.S. State Department suspects Russia's cease-fire proposal may be just an attempt to dupe the Allies into withdrawing south of the 38th Parallel in Korea, it was disclosed today.

A memorandum prepared by State Department representatives in Tokyo questioned Russia's good faith in making the truce proposal and suggested it might be "a cover for military advantage."

The Russian proposal included a call for establishment of a "buffer zone" along the 38th Parallel. This would entail an Allied withdrawal of more than 30 miles in Central and Eastern Korea.

At the same time, the South Korean cabinet at a meeting in Pusan unanimously rejected the Russian proposals.

The American attitude toward the proposals advanced by Soviet United Nations delegate Jacob Malik leaked out through Gen. Matthew B. Ridgway's supreme Allied headquarters.

Officers Stage Investigation

ANGLETON, June 26 (UP)—The Brazoria County Sheriff's Department said today it was continuing its investigation into the stabbing of Wrestler Sonny Myers Saturday night at the fairgrounds.

The unscheduled and unrehearsed climax to the evening wrestling card came shortly after Myers completed a bloody victory over Elito Romero in the main event and while he was on his way to the dressing room.

He told Sheriff's Investigator K. D. Kyle that two unidentified assailants attacked him. One of them opened a deep gash in his abdomen with a sharp pocket knife or razor.

He was rushed to the Angleton clinic where 150 stitches were required to close the 18-inch gash in his stomach and side. He later was sent to Houston by ambulance for treatment, and a doctor there said today his condition was good.

However, the doctor said it probably would be three or four months before Myers could wrestle again.

Witnesses said Myers and Romero staged a bloody rematch of an earlier bout in which Romero had been disqualified for slugging. Both men opened up cuts on each other and had kept spectators in an uproar throughout.

RIDGWAY FLIES TO FRONT FOR KOREA INSPECTION TOUR

By Earnest Hohrecht United Press Staff Correspondent TOKYO, June 26 (UP)—Gen. Matthew B. Ridgway flew to the stalemated Korean front for a personal inspection tour today while foreign capitals buzzed with speculation on the prospects for a cease-fire.

The Supreme United Nations Commander found his troops locked in see-saw battles with the Communists for possession of dominating hills and ridges along the 38th Parallel. UN forces recaptured one hill south of Kumsong at noon after losing it to a Communist counter-attack earlier today.

Eighth Army Officers told Ridgway that the Communists appeared to be building up large forces for a possible new offensive, but a spokesman said a major assault did not appear imminent.

Houston Negro To Die In Chair

AUSTIN, June 26 (UP)—Morris Bessard, Houston Negro sentenced to die for rape, is scheduled to go to the electric chair at Huntsville early tomorrow.

Bessard was convicted of raping a girl after clubbing her male companion with a hammer. Two other Negroes, Nathaniel Edwards and Eugene McFarland, have been convicted and executed in connection with the same offense.

The offense occurred on Chocolate Bayou Road near Houston on May 13, 1949.

Bessard had received a customary 30-day stay of execution and an additional three-day reprieve because the previous scheduled execution date fell on a Sunday. However, the Board of Pardons and Pardon indicated that it did not plan any further clemency action.

Proposal Is Being Considered By Special UN Session Today

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y., June 26 (UP)—Russia's proposal for a Korean cease-fire will come before a special session of the UN General Assembly tomorrow afternoon, UN Secretary General Trygve Lie announced today.

Lie made the announcement in Oslo before departing by air for New York to participate in peace negotiations. He will arrive here at 7 a.m. EDT tomorrow.

The Soviet proposal, made last Saturday by Russian UN delegate Jacob A. Malik, brought these swift world developments today:

1. The U. S. State Department was disclosed to suspect the Russian proposal may be a ruse to force UN troops to retreat 30 miles, to below the 38th Parallel, giving the Communists a military advantage.

CHECK BEING MADE FOR A RAPE-SLAYER

TULSA, Okla., June 26 (UP)—A door-to-door check was made today for possible clues in the rape-slaying of an expectant mother whose body was found in an area where four unsolved sex crimes were committed in 10 years.

Police speculated that all the offenses might be the work of a sex maniac living in the neighborhood.

They appealed to residents to come forward with any information they might have about "peculiar" persons.

Five police patrol cars moved slowly through the alarmed neighborhood during the night as nine detectives assigned to the case hauled in a dozen police characters for questioning.

The ravished and garroted body of Mrs. Dorothy Waldrip, wife of a taxi driver, was found yesterday on a hillside by three children hunting blackberries.

Police said her clothing had been disarranged and that she had been raped.

Detective Mid Leavel said a piece of cloth resembling a scarf had been used to garrot the woman. She was six months pregnant.

But despite the methodical search for clues, Homicide Lt. Red Elliott said police lacked anything definite.

One of the men picked up had scratches on his face, Elliott said, and "he hasn't been able to explain them." They were unable, however, to tie him in with the slaying.

WITNESSES REFUSE TO TALK FEAR SELF INCRIMINATION

ENGAGEMENT IS BROKEN

ATLANTA, June 26 (UP)—Brunette Betty Thompson, who is dying with cancer, finished breaking off her romance with sailor Tom Amburn today because their engagement had upset his ailing mother.

The curly-haired bluejacket had already announced after a brief visit with his mother in Sioux Falls, S. D., that the wedding was "indefinitely postponed."

Betty made it definite last night by breaking the engagement. She did so without bitterness toward young Amburn or his family and with hope "this may help Tom's mother's health."

"I don't want anyone to criticize Tom, for I know that there was a lot to consider in his case," the 18-year-old beauty said. "I certainly wish him well."

Amburn told the United Press by telephone that "this is her decision I never had a chance to be with her and explain my side of it. I guess she's braved me."

"I don't know what to say about it, but I've talked with my commanding officer and he understands my side of it. As long as I'm square with the Navy, I don't have anything to worry about. She could have waited for me."

Doctors say Betty doesn't have long to wait. She already has lost a leg to the ravages of cancer, which is now spreading through her lungs.

Amburn came to see Betty last month on a special leave from the Naval Air Station at Norfolk, Va., so they could make their wedding plans. However, when he heard that his mother was taking the news hard, he immediately caught a plane for Sioux Falls. He then returned to Norfolk, saying the wedding was "indefinitely postponed."

RED DEAN WANTS TO ACCEPT RUSSIA'S TERMS FOR PEACE

WASHINGTON, June 26 (UP)—Secretary of State Dean Acheson said today stopping the Korean War at the 38th Parallel would be a "successful conclusion" of the war.

Acheson told the House Foreign Affairs Committee that it is "not the policy and should not be the policy to unify Korea by armed force."

Rep. Lawrence H. Smith, R., Wis., asked Acheson if the fighting is stopped at the 38th Parallel, would he consider that the Korean war was "successfully concluded, in the absence of unification?"

Acheson replied "yes, sir, I would say we have had a successful conclusion."

Taft Blasts US Foreign Policy

WASHINGTON, June 26 (UP)—Sen. Robert A. Taft declared today that President Truman has had a swollen head since 1948 and uttered an "absolute untruth" on how American Foreign Policy is made.

The Ohio Republican leader said Truman's election victory in 1948 so went to his head that every since he has snubbed Republicans in developing a United Democratic-Republican front on world affairs.

Taft's tart remarks were touched off by Truman's address yesterday at Tullahoma, Tenn. Truman claimed that the nation has had a bi-partisan (without political) foreign policy since Pearl Harbor despite "sordid efforts" by some persons to make political hay out of criticizing American policy abroad.

"That's an absolute untruth," Taft said. "The late senator Vandenberg pointed out repeatedly that he never was consulted in any way so far as the disastrous China Policy of the administration is concerned, and that he opposed it."

AUSTIN, June 26 (UP)—Galveston City, County, and civic leaders were to testify today before the House Crime Committee probing the Maceo Island City gambling empire.

This delegation was headed by Mayor Herbert Y. Cartwright who promises to "pull all stops and embarrass some state officials."

Cartwright has not revealed what he will tell the committee.

Fifteen non-talking witnesses, all Maceo associates, appeared before the committee yesterday and were dismissed after doggedly refusing to tell even their names without a consultation with attorneys.

All the witnesses refused to talk on grounds that they might incriminate themselves, but the committee got its information about the Maceo Syndicate.

Sam (Brooks) Serio, who identified himself as a "general accountant and sort of overseer" of the business affairs of the late Sam Maceo, talked freely to the five-man committee.

Serio confirmed that the Maceo Galveston Enterprises last year netted \$2,511,176 from gambling and other illegal operations.

Questioned in detail about photostatic copies of receipts for gambling fines signed by the Galveston County Sheriff, Serio admitted that the Maceo Organization "usually" paid all fines resulting from any "raid."

He also said the Maceos contributed \$100 in 1949 to the State Democratic Executive Committee, and in 1947 gave \$100 both to the Democratic and Republican Executive Committees.

He said he and Rosario Maceo made the decision to "close up" the organization's slot machine operation June 15. He admitted that the slots were stored, but under questioning, refused to tell where.

Rep. Fred W. Meredith of Terrell, committee chairman asked Serio: "Are you concerned whether Galveston can survive without your illegal operations?"

"We haven't thought about that," Serio answered.

Earlier, State Auditor C. H. Cavness recited figures showing that gross profit of the Maceo Enterprises for the years 1949-1950 totaled \$5,607,887, of which \$4,646,831 came from gambling and related operations.

Anthony J. Fertitta, "greeter" at the Swanik Ballroom, followed Serio to the stand and led the stream of Maceo Associates.

Each remained on the witness stand about five minutes, giving their names only after conferences with their attorney, Louis Dibrill of Galveston.

The committee hammered question after question at them, but each got the same reply: "I refuse to answer."

The Amarillo Gold Sox beat Borger in a heavy hitting affair at Amarillo. The Sox won 9 to 8 with a run in the overtime 10th inning.

Saga of the Baby Sitter and Dad-of-the-Year Kefauver



WASHINGTON—(NEA)—Selection of Tennessee's crime-busting Sen. Estes Kefauver as "Father of the Year" has brought to light a baby-sitting story. It happened on a Sunday afternoon in the very hottest part of the Senate's crime investigation. Chairman Kefauver had come home for a quiet week-end after a particularly strenuous series of hearings. But three daughters and a son, and a dog and a constantly ringing telephone were too much for him.

Vice President Alben W. Barkley came back on the job wearing dark glasses, following his eye operation. Photographers immediately pounced on him and asked him to pose. The Veep refused.

With the crisis in the Middle East, especially the Anglo-Iranian oil dispute, rapidly nearing a climax, Russia might be angling for a breathing spell in the Far East and West. That note charged that the U.S. deliberately excluded Russia and Red China from Japanese treaty negotiations. The Russians insisted that not only their country but also Communist-dominated Mongolia and North Korea be given a voice in all future Japanese deliberations.

There is little new on the surface in the latest "peace move." But well-informed Western diplomats believe the Peiping Chinese are weakening. They continue to hold out for membership in the United Nations prior to negotiations for a "full peace" in Korea.

The British are anxious to keep a bridge open between Red China and the West. Communist China's participation in the Japanese treaty negotiations would appease the small but loud group of leftists in the British Labor Party, led by die-hard Marxist Aneurin Bevan.

This report of Angl-Chinese negotiations sheds new light on the discussions in London between John Foster Dulles, special representative of President Truman, and British Foreign Secretary Herbert Morrison. Although "full agreement" was reached between Britain and the U. S. on a draft

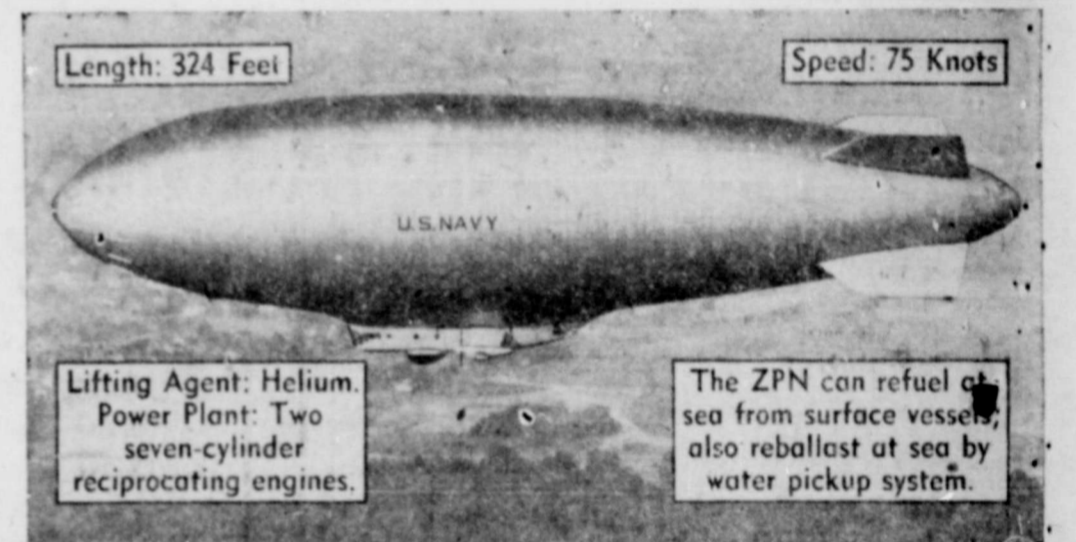

Warren Fights Back With Both Hands Swinging

TALLAHASSEE, Fla., June 26 (UP)—Gov. Fuller Warren of Florida, under subpoena to testify before the Senate Crime Committee, challenged Committee Chairman Herbert O'Connor today to clean up gambling in his own state of Maryland.

Warren released a bitter, 12-page attack on O'Connor who made him the first governor in history to be ordered to account for his office before a Congressional committee.

The Governor asked O'Connor to face him in a debate on gambling and threatened to go to Maryland next year and stomp that state

against O'Connor's bid for reelection.

Warren charged that Maryland "reeked with gambling corruption" while the Democratic senator was governor of that state. He said O'Connor "might well clean up the mess" in his state before bringing "his TV road show" back to Florida for a fourth time.

The Florida governor also castigated Sen. Estes Kefauver, D., Tenn., while he was chairman of the Senate Crime Committee. He accused Kefauver of using the committee to further his ambition to be president of the United States. He also challenged Kefauver to a public debate on gambling.

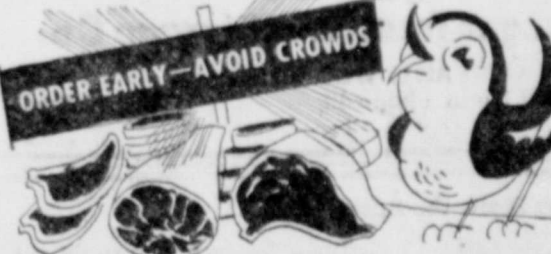

They indicated they would stick by their guns even if it meant a court test.

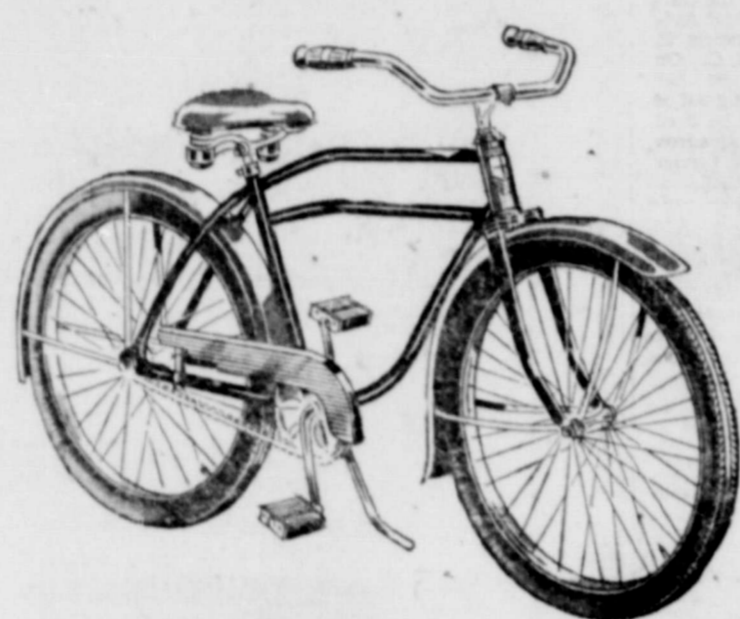
The women sent a letter to Snyder curtly requesting him to stop to become "tax collectors without sending tax agents to their homes. It drew a "no comment" from Snyder's office.

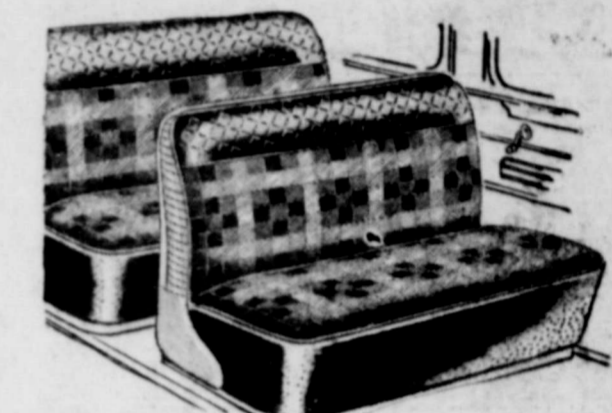

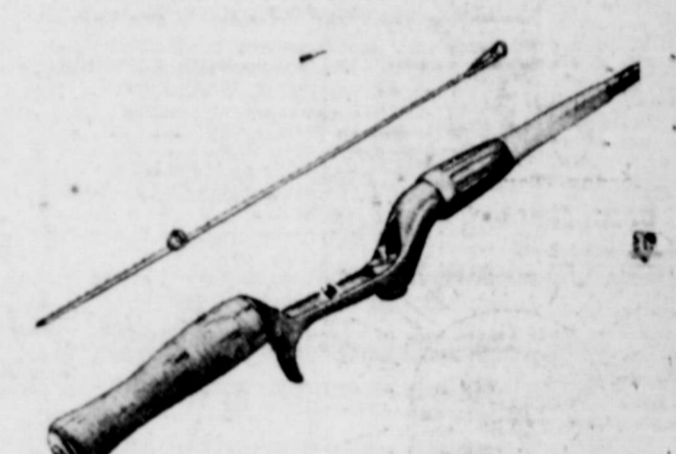

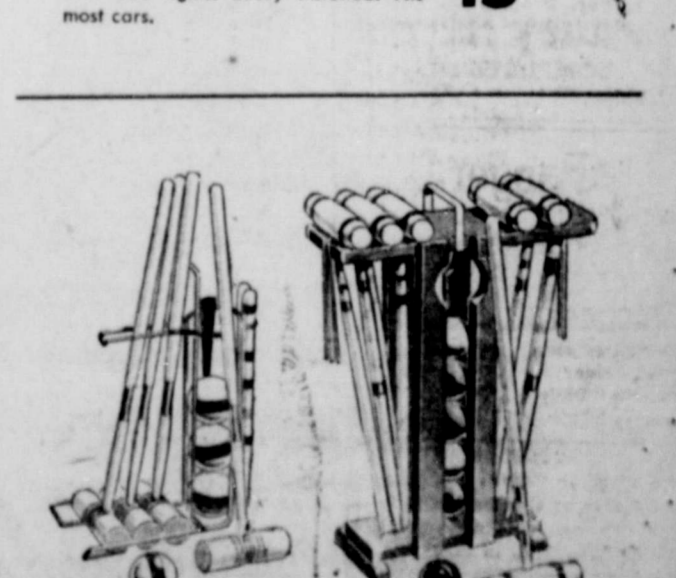

Soviet Paper Sounds Off

MOSCOW, June 26 (UP)—The official newspaper Pravda said today that the Soviet people see every possibility of a peaceful settlement of the Korean war.

Chief Soviet United Nations delegate Jacob Malik's proposal for a Korean cease-fire also is attracting wide support in Democratic circles in all other countries, the newspaper said.

"Some reactionary, malicious voices are raised against the proposal," it said, "but these cannot drown the sober voice of the people who understand the full disaster and danger of the further prolongation of the war."

Pravda said a peaceful settlement in Korea would eliminate one of the most important causes of present world tension and enable Koreans again to regulate their own affairs.

The Soviet press also carried a two-paragraph report on President Truman's speech, which touched on the Soviet cease-fire proposal.

"The president devoted a conspicuous part of his speech to the Korean conflict," the official Soviet News Agency Tass commented.

"He said nothing especially new about the war in Korea. But he had to concur in the proposal of the Soviet representative to the UN, Jacob Malik, about peaceful regulation of Korea and cessation of hostilities."



ONE FOR THE 4TH—Readying a nice "firecracker" for a Fourth of July salute to the Chinese Reds in Korea is Chief Aviation Ordnanceman Francis S. Mahaly, of Salisbury, N. C. On the anti-tank rocket he has chalked "You'll get a bang out of this!" The rocket will be fired by a "Starbuster" jet squadron pilot from the aircraft carrier Boxer, operating off North Korea.

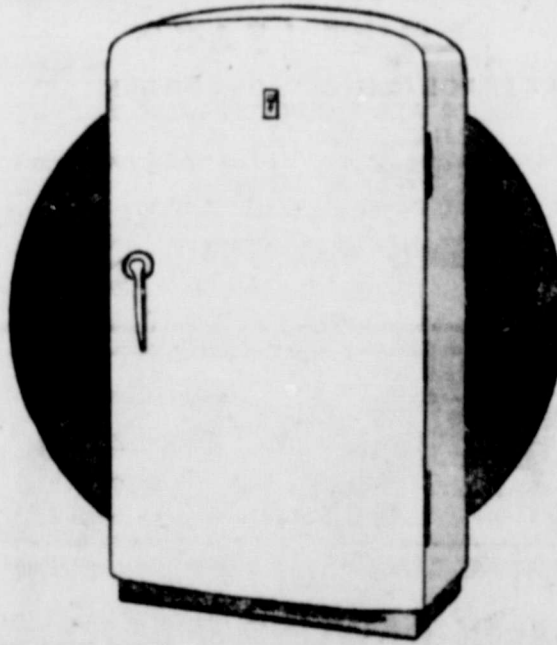

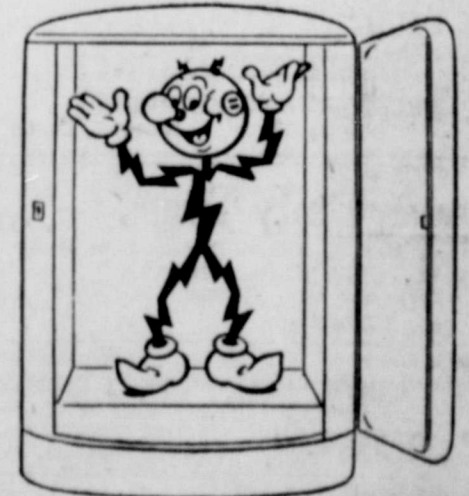
