Indians bred the Appaloosa in preference to other horses brought by the Spanish to America because of the speed and stamina of the horse. The Indian chiefton's were reported to have favored the markings of the animal which vary with each individual horse.

Ratliff's stud, Quannah, has been bred several times and sired a baby stallion this spring. Ratliff purchased a mare early this year and plans to establish a small herd. Quannah is well marked with a white blanket that starts about the middle of the horse's waist and extends over his haunches. The white is relieved with black polka-dots. Most of his breed are marked similarly Ratliff said that all Appaloosas have white encircling the eye, parti-colored skin and parti-colored hoofs.

The horse will be one of the featured attractions in the parade which will start the rodeo.

Feature Of Rodeo Presented As Original West Texas Deal

West Texas' original calf scramble to be presented at Ranger Jaycee Rodeo.

Three years ago the Ranger Jaycees originated a unique attraction at their annual Rodeo together with undertaking a great step in advancing the quality of livestock raised within this area.

For the performances of the 1948 Ranger Jaycee Rodeo, a local and county merchants and business men purchased ten pure bred Angus and Hereford steer calves to be presented to ten outstanding FFA and 4-H Club boys of this area. Twenty qualified boys were allowed to scramble for these ten calves. On catching a calf and taking him across a designated line each boy catching a calf was awarded that calf to feed or raise as his own, showing him in local livestock shows, under the guidance of his Vocational Agriculture teacher or County Agent.

In 1949 this calf scramble was changed to what probably should be called a greased pig scramble. Local and county merchants went to great expense in securing ten high quality registered Jersey heifers to be awarded to ten outstanding FFA and 4-H Club boys. Instead of scrambling for these Jersey heifers in the rodeo arena, to avoid possible injury to these valuable animals, the boys scrambled for greased pigs which correspond to certain Jersey heifers. Each boy fortunate enough in catching a pig was awarded one of these heifers. In return each boy getting a heifer was to care for, raise and breed his heifer and return his first heifer calf to the Jaycees and this calf in turn would be presented to another boy at the next annual rodeo in another calf scramble.

In 1950 one heifer calf was returned to the Jaycees and five additional calves were purchased and awarded at the 1950 annual rodeo.

For the 1951 performance of the rodeo at least five heifer calves are being returned by the boys receiving heifers in previous years and possibly several more calves due in the near future.

This greased pig scramble not only make a hilarious act at the performance of the rodeo, but enables a boy to establish himself with the highest quality registered Jersey cattle and promotes the development of better livestock within the area.

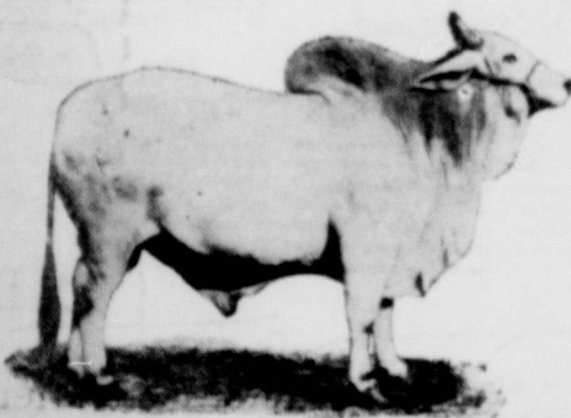

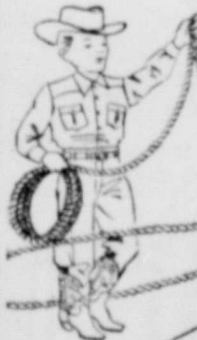

Brann Garner Ain't No Cowboy

One has not seen Ranger until they have seen Brann Garner, according to the reknown Hoyce House. Brann said that he will show talking movies as a special during rodeo week and that his Axiada Theatre wants the rodeo visitors to enjoy the rodeo.

Approximately 20 per cent of the turkeys marketed in Texas during 1950 were, after processing, graded B or lower. Bruises were the number one cause for low quality.

Livestock Leads The Big Parade

Texas is the leading state in number of livestock auctions and in the number of cattle, sheep and hogs marketed by this method according to a new bulletin released by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station. The greatest growth in numbers of auctions has occurred in the past 15 years.

Several reasons are given for the increased growth. Farmers and ranchmen like the ease and convenience of selling and buying through auctions. They like the social and educational aspects of the auction. It provides an opportunity to meet friends and discuss the merits of the animals sold in relation to the prices paid.

According to the Livestock Sanitary Commission of Texas, 168 auctions were operating in Texas on October 20, 1950. Thirty-seven of these auctions in various parts of the state were included in a study made recently by Dr. John G. McNeely, Charles B. Brotherton and Travis M. McKenzie, research agricultural economists.

This study of livestock auctions is mainly descriptive. It does not attempt to point out any advantages this method of sale may have over other methods, McNeely said. It is an introductory step in what is hoped to be a continuing study of the various types of market outlets available to Texas livestock producers.

Upsurge Of Insects Menacing Trees

STAMFORD, Conn. (UP)—Insects that war on shade trees have built up enormous armies this year, says Dr. F. A. Bartlett, tree expert.

He blames it on the weather. "Two mild winters," Bartlett said, "have permitted the pests to build up, particularly in the eastern half of the United States. Now hundreds of thousands of trees, weakened by last fall's big storm, are prime targets for invasion."

On the front—internally—Dr. Bartlett reported an upsurge in borers and bark beetles which bore and tunnel beneath the bark and often carry with them deadly fungus diseases. At the same time the trees are fighting a heavier than usual number of caterpillars, beetles and leaf-miners which attack the leaves.

Dr. Bartlett's advice to tree owners this summer is to water lawn trees when dry weather sets in, feed them judiciously, and spray.

SHORT BOSTON STREET BRINGS HISTORY ALIVE

BOSTON (UP)—One short street in Boston probably has more avenue of comparable size in the nation.

Many of the men and events that helped shape the early destiny of America are commemorated in bronze or brass plaques on the office building along Court Street.

There are at least a dozen of these memorials in the few hundred yards down the hill from Pemberton Square to the Old State House, near where the Redcoats fired on colonists at the Boston Massacre.

In colonial times, Court Street was Boston's newspaper row, now off Scollay Square a plaque marks the place where Benjamin Franklin's older brother, James, founded the New England Courant. It was there that Ben served his apprenticeship in the printing trade before he ran away to Philadelphia and fame.

Right next door to the Courant, where a large, modern restaurant now stands, the presses of the famed Boston Gazette, once ground out grist for the revolutionary mill.

Under the guidance of the patriot newspaperman, Eddes and Gill, the Gazette became the leading publication of independence in the colonies. The Gazette's outspoken editorials provoked one of the earliest legislative proclamations of freedom of the press in America. Having served its purpose, the Gazette passed out of existence in 1798.

Just across the street is the City Hall, one the site of the Court House. There a plaque hangs in memory of the man who started the court probation system in the United States—John Augustus. Starting as a humble shoemaker, Augustus devoted his life to rehabilitating criminals and others sentenced to prison.

Further up the street, another bronze memorial reminds passers-by that on that spot the first free school in America was founded in 1636. The school was run by Daniel Maude, who conducted classes in his Court Street home.

Near the top of the hill stood a house where two early colonial leaders lived—Sir Henry Vane, who became governor of Massachusetts Colony in 1636, and Rev. John Cotton, vicar of Boston and minister of the First

Church from 1633 to 1652.

Another early settler, John Leverette, made his home on Court Street. Leverette, made his home in Boston, England, in 1616 and lived to become the first citizen of Boston Massachusetts. He was named governor of the colony in 1672.

Many a Harvard man probably has looked askance at a court plaque displayed on a Court Street building. This one commemorates the birthplace of none other than Elihu Yale, the founder of Yale University.

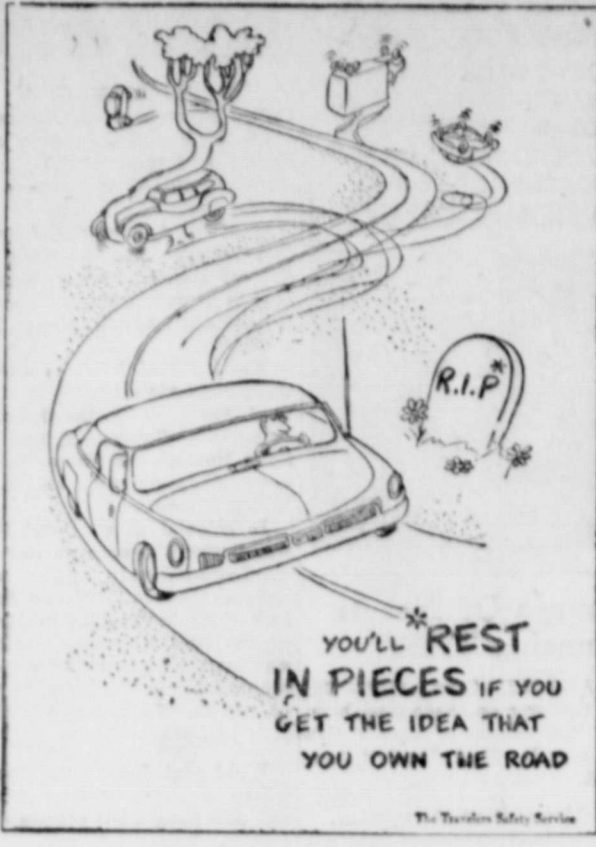

A capacity crowd is expected to attend the four performances. Top hand cowboys are in town, the Jaycees have put the finishing touches on the arena, and the stock for the show has arrived. Brahma bulls, calves, broncs, and pickup horses have already arrived.

Cowboy boots can be heard on every sidewalk, wide-brimmed hats dot the air, and gay rodeo color is everywhere. Numerous stores have put up rodeo signs or window decorations. Everyone is all ready for the big four days.

A number of features in connection with the annual homecoming will also come to light at the evening performances of this big affair.

Rodeo officials have asked that all persons who intend to ride in the parade and all contestants be at the intersection of Walnut and North Marston at least 45 minutes before the parade. This will allow

ample time to have everything ready for the parade.

More people enjoy the colorful parade every year and this year's crowd is expected to exceed all previous ones.

Huge Earthen Dam Planned in West

VANCOUVER, B. C. (UP)—The newest link in the West's expanding chain of hydroelectric projects will be a 1,300 foot long earthen dam in the upper Fraser River Valley of British Columbia.

The squat, broad-based dam will be built at a cost of \$900,000 and an estimated 250,000 man-hours of work as part of the \$10,000,000 Wahleach Lake Hydroelectric project of the B. C. Electric Co.

An 80,000 horsepower generating unit will begin humming in August, 1952 company officials said.

The dam itself will be 60 feet high and 380 feet wide at its base, tapering up to 20 feet wide at the top. Some 250,000 cubic yards of rock and earth will fill the dam, which will have a clay core to make it watertight.

Water from the lake behind the dam will rush down a 13,000-foot tunnel to a powerhouse 2,000 feet below the Fraser River. A \$2,000,000 high-tension line will bring the electricity to Vancouver.

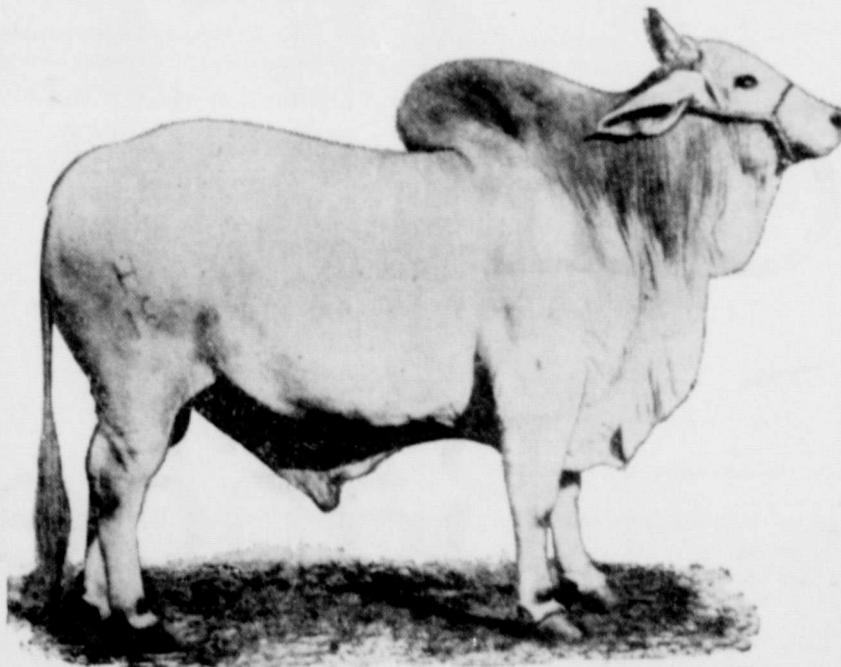

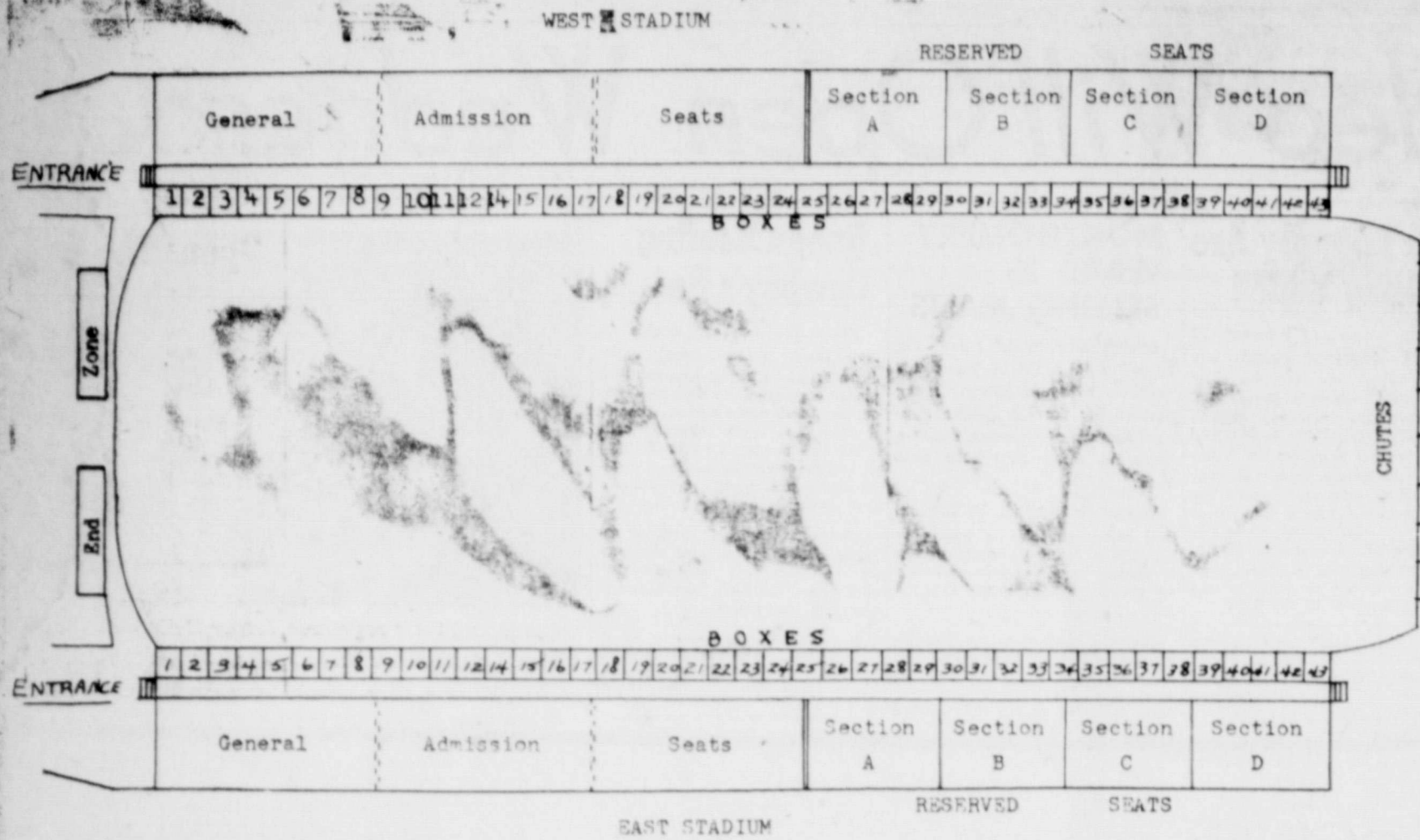

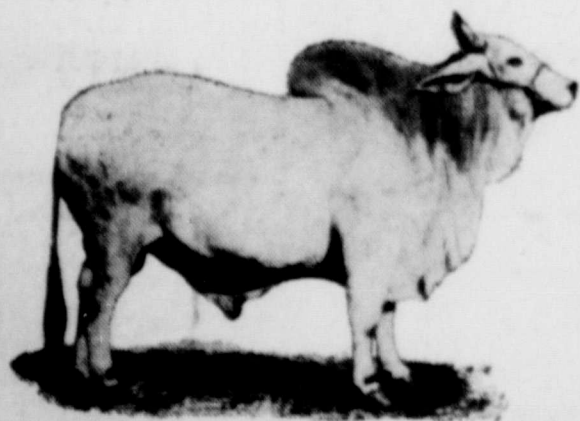

The skipper of the dhow landed them on a small island in the Dhalac Archipelago, telling them they had reached the Arabian coast, and then left them.

Marooned on the lonely island with little food and no water, death began to claim the pilgrims. Day by day their number grew less until only four remained—

a man, a woman, a boy and a girl.

When all hope had been abandoned, a passing dhow sighted their distress signals and took the emaciated pilgrims to Massawa.

After police had visited the island and found the 22 skeletons, the skipper of the dhow and his assistant were arrested.

Correctly dressed Frenchmen of the 1820's wore two waistcoats on formal occasions—a vest of white pique over one of black velvet, with the velvet edge rolling over the white.

U. S. BUILDING DEFENSES FROM AZORES AIR BASE

TERCEIRA ISLAND, Azores (UP)—This tiny Portuguese island, which for centuries thrived on its fishing and its vineyards, has become one of the key bases in the Atlantic Pact plan for the defense of Europe.

Terceira's importance is largely an accident of geography. It is two-thirds of the way across the Atlantic from North American air bases in Europe. Its importance is growing daily.

Heavily laden cargo planes of the U.S. Military Air Transport system take off from American

the work is done to the rear of planes overhead. Besides army planes, civilian airlines use the Azores as an important stop in their round-the-world schedules.

For MATS Langes Field has become one of the biggest bases on its Atlantic division. Planes arrive around the clock for flights to England, to Port Lyautey or Tripoli in North Africa or to Germany. The field is a Portuguese air base but the planes are mostly American.

Terceira is on the scheduled routes from the United States but planes put down here from many non-scheduled flights.

Many Sea Rescues
The field under command of Col. George S. Cassidy, is mainly a re-fueling stop. There are maintenance workers and a large air sea rescue group equipped with the latest devices for rescuing those down at sea. The Portuguese sailors who have fished the stormy Atlantic waters for centuries are valuable assistants.

Terceira second largest of the Azores group, is deceptive. It appears to slumber in the summer sun, remote from Europe and remote from the United States. The constant drone of the planes heard from the distance add to the somnolent effect.

The field is busy, however, approaching the state of activity it reached during the last war. Already more than 550 American civilians and 1,200 civilian Portuguese employes work here.

American-Born Young Nazi Now Student At Annapolis Academy

WASHINGTON (UP)—Thanks to two American GI's a former Nazi seaman and member of the German Youth Movement is now a midshipman at the U.S. Naval Academy.

In fact, Frederick William Knops, Jr., first realized he was an American citizen after the United States took over the Munich Seiberuf-fachschule—trade school for seaman—in 1944.

An Army sergeant captured Knops as he tried to escape, checking his papers and told him he was an American citizen. Another asked: "What are you doing here? You belong to the States." Knops then began to earn what being born in Modri, Vernon, N. Y., could mean.

Long Long Road

It was one year after his birth that Knops' parents, both native Germans, decided to return to their old home in Dusseldorf, Germany. That was in 1931. Only after hard work and perseverance did their son 18 years later begin the long road of service to the United States at the Naval Academy.

The hard work came in when Knops, returned to the United States at the age of 16, decided to switch to an American naval career.

More than two years of study at night school and by correspondence courses preceded nine months of intensive study at an academy preparatory school before the young German could qualify for entrance to Annapolis.

Knops was brought up as an average German youth in Dusseldorf. In 1940 his father was drafted into the German Army, but his son remembers the war's start in 1939.

Wrong Idea

"Those of us living there didn't think much of it then, he recalled. "The day the German army over-ran Poland we thought the wars was over before it started."

When Allied air raids began in earnest, Dusseldorf became a flaming city and a "terrible sight." Knops' mother moved first to Bavaria, then to Austria. Her American son, meanwhile, was having his first direct contacts with the German Youth Movement.

He left three camps—at Reichenthal, Zirkelstein, and Prenau—after only short stays to rejoin his mother. When they were both living in Mondsee in Austria he

entered the seaman's school 40 miles outside Munich.

Tough Course

"The course was calculated to turn the cadets into the toughest kind of seamen," Knops explained.

After Knops' first year there, the U. S. Army arrived, bringing with it the knowledge of his American citizenship. He and his mother moved to the American zone in Austria and the young boy was given a civilian job with American forces.

He soon applied for passage to the United States and after slightly more than a year's wait got it and left Germany to join an aunt and uncle in Brooklyn N. Y. His parents remained.

Missing Heir Business Pays Off Provided You Have Right Name

NEW YORK (UP)—There's money in a name if it's the right name.

Say it's Campbell or Branson or Pearl. You could be entitled to a chunk of the billions of dollars lying around without anyone to claim it.

Simply check in with Theodore W. Roth, a busy little man who makes it his business to get money and people together.

Say your name is Campbell. You could be entitled to a \$36,000 fortune. There's \$50,000 due to the right Branson. More than \$40,000 goes to a person named Pearl, if he or she is the heir of Abraham Barney Pearl.

Roth heads one of several missing heirs bureaus in the nation.

He hunts for the people legally entitled to money left by those who died leaving fortunes but no will.

Many Such Cases

There are many, Roth said. "It's impossible to say how many people die intestate and leave wealth behind. We do know the money must total \$8,000,000,000 to \$10,000,000,000."

Roth said most of the big cases involving perhaps around \$1,000,000, usually go to court for settlement. His files hold thousands of cases, however, in which missing heirs can collect anywhere from \$5,000 to \$100,000.

Take the Campbell case. Roth for three years has been searching for the missing heirs of Mrs. H. A. Campbell, who he said is believed to have been born in

Michigan, later migrated to New York, and finally to California, where she died, leaving \$30,000.

Roth said he'd followed clues in several states and located families, each of whom claimed an ancestor named "Mrs. H. A. Campbell." All proved the wrong heirs and the money goes begging. It eventually will revert to the state, unless the heirs are found.

Roth also is hunting for heirs to the \$50,000 left by Samuel Branson, who lived and died in apparent poverty although he got rich from his junk business.

Under Assumed Name
Roth said, "We've learned that Branson is an assumed name, which makes the search even more difficult. We do know Branson had two sons and we hope to find them."
Or, there's the case of Abraham Barney Pearl, who was born in Austria but came to this country as a young man. When he died, he left \$40,000 but no beneficiary.

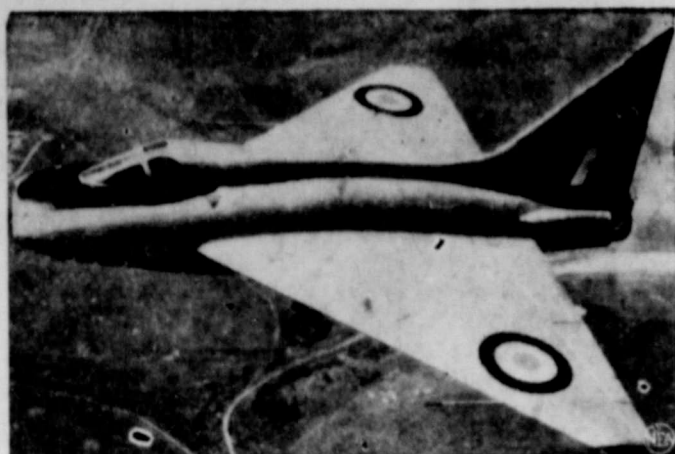

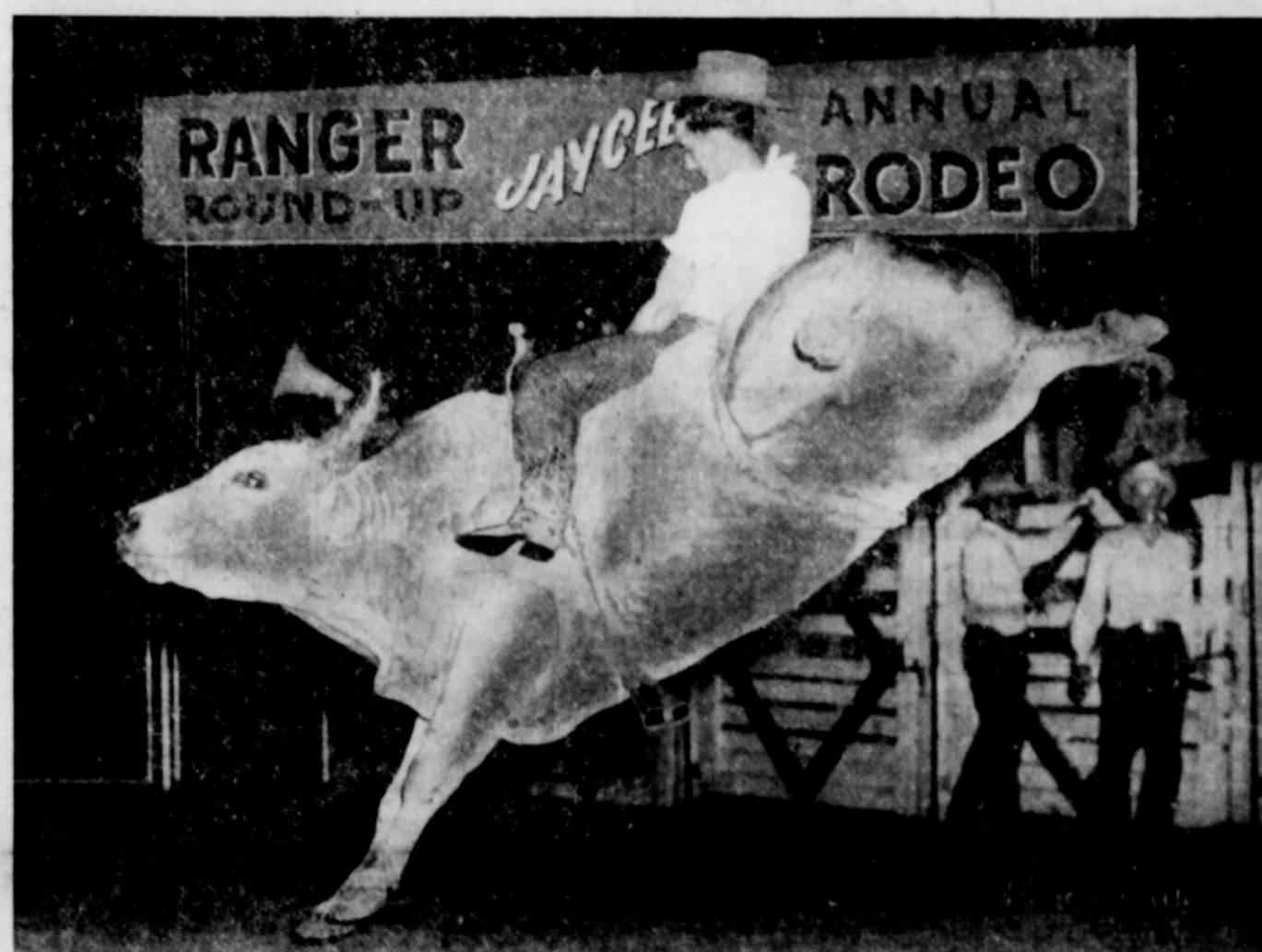
He says he will not be surprised if some of these untamed bulls doesn't send some one to the hospital before these four rodeo performances are over.

Mrs. Pearson, 31, was questioned by police but not placed under arrest.

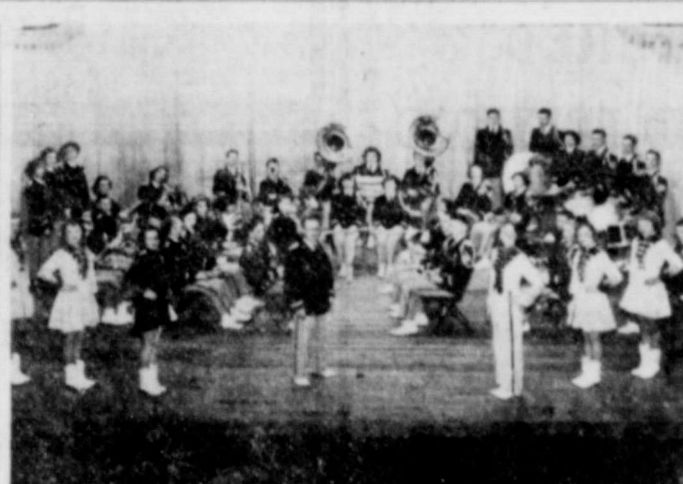

Reds Must Move Troops From Kaesong

By Earnest Hobericht United Press Staff Correspondent UN ADVANCE BASE BELOW KAESONG, Korea, July 13 (UP)—The Communists rejected tonight the United Nations' ultimatum which broke off Korean cease fire talks and the Communists permit newsmen to enter the seclusion city of Kaesong.

A Peiping radio broadcast at 7:40 p.m. (5:40 a.m. EDT) announced the Red rejection of the UN ultimatum and said that the Communists had invited the Allied armistice team to resume talks at 9 a.m. today (7 p.m. Thursday EDT) but were "ignored."

The rejection statement was by North Korean Gen. Nam Il, chief of the Red armistice delegation. Peiping radio said his message was "ignored" today.

There was no indication whether the Red had received the Communist message but the UN team did not show any signs of preparing to resume negotiations until word comes agreeing the latest UN demand listing the conditions necessary before the talks reopen.

Gen. Matthew B. Ridgway, UN supreme commander, demanded earlier today in a broadcast to the Communist generals that all Red troops be pulled out of Kaesong and that "unreasonable" restrictions on UN parties be lifted before armistice talks can resume.

Ridgway's statement, which threw all blame for the breakdown of the talks in the Communist's laps, superseded Joy's protest of Thursday. But at the hour that Nam Il's reply to Joy was broadcast, no word had yet come from the Reds in answer to the UN commander.

Nam Il's rejection of Joy's protest and the Communist silence on Ridgway's demands seemed to shove hopes for a quick resumption of the negotiations a step back.

Nam Il's statement told Joy that "coverage by newsmen of the conference will not be permitted until a mutual agreement is reached."

THERE'S DANGER TO SPARE IN WILD BRAHMA BULL CONTEST

"Ee-ee-ee-Yowee!!!", yelled the tall, tanned, lean, and weather-beaten, puncher as he took a pitch and hung to the raging Brahma bull for make his ride. He had entered the rodeo and won in the most dangerous sport in the game. Now he was ready for the big Ranger rodeo where he knew the men were wilder and the bulls meaner, bigger, more rugged, and hazardous.

That's the type of men and boys who will compete in the bull riding in Ranger. They know that riding a wild bull is the most dangerous cowboy contest at the Ranger rodeo but they kinda like the danger.

No domesticated animal is the Brahma bull. No sir, they are more at home with wild jungle beast. These brutes are the quickest of action of any beast of creature their size in the world, their tremendous power give them a bucking potential unapproached by a horse. The Brahma apparently enjoys turning on a fallen cowpuncher and giving him a ride that he will long remember—if he lives.

Only about a dozen years ago, bull riding as it is known to today's rodeo fans began. It had been a minor event for years because a less turbulent type of steer from the range herds had been used.

Then some smart rodeo producer got the bright idea of introducing a revengeful Brahma from the Gulf Coast country. From

there on in, thrills, casualties, and attendance increased and the sport was immediately given a major rating. Seldom do you hear this event referred to by its original name, "steer riding." It's always bull riding now.

Like bronc riding contest, the bull rider must have one hand free at all times. His other hand will hold the loose rope without hitches or knots of any type. A real rodeo-loving cowboy will never cheat or fail to make an honest attempt to ride his best. That is the most grievous rodeo sin a cowboy can make.

Watch the rodeo riding at Ranger this year. From the bull riding to the saddle bronc, the spills will be many, hard and rough. The cowboys, like the stock, will be tough and everyone will have, to say the least, a wild time.

Shivers Grants McMurrin Stay

AUSTIN, July 13 (UP)—Richard S. McMurrin, sentenced to die for rape, found Friday the 13th a "good news" day. The condemned Galveston man learned that Gov. Allan Shivers had granted him a 30-day stay of execution. The reprieve moved the date from Aug. 6 to Sept. 5.

19 Texas Cattle Trails Used

During the closing decade of the nineteenth century, some 19 trails were used to move cattle as far south as the Rio Grande and take them as far north as Canada.

The trails were originated by the Spanish overlords of Texas and Mexico. Mexican cowboys continued the drives over the cattle trails; but it was the Texan of the late 1800's that made the cattle drives to the northern ranges and markets a part of our American history. Texas cattle were finding their way to Chicago stock markets as early as 1850. Trail drives over the Goodnight-Loving Trail and the Main California Trail were bringing high profits to ranchers, and established the Texas cattle empire.

Much of the meat for the Confederate Army was supplied over the Vicksburg, Old Contraband, and the Old San Antonio Trail. Perhaps one of the most used trails, and one that has become world famous, was the Chisolm that ran from the mouth of the Rio Grande to Abilene, Kan. To the men of the west, the Chisolm Trail offered companionship, employment, security from both outlaws and Indians.

Oliver Loving and Charles Goodnight established the Goodnight-Loving Trail to California. It followed the old Butterfield Stage Line to New Mexico, up the Pecos River to Fort Sumner and on into California.

Many similar trails crossed Texas going in all directions to markets.

These trails enabled the settlers to come to Texas; allowed Texas to build, making it the state it is today.

Spare parts for Army jeeps are to be dipped in oil wrapped in cloth, hermetically sealed in wax, then packed in huge boxes at the Willys-Overland plant here.

A box will contain hundreds of identical parts, each protected for an indefinite period against the ravages of salt water, extreme heat or cold, and rain or dust. The boxes will be shipped to Army posts throughout the world.



BAREBACK BRONC RIDING IS AN ORIGINAL SPORT OF OLD WEST

Bareback bronc riding is perhaps the original sport of the west. Starting back in Indian and frontier days, when saddles were rare and costly and horses yours where you found them, if you could ride them.
 The fast, snappy, thrilling event is among the major contests scheduled for professional rodeo cowboys at the annual Jaycee Rodeo, July 18-21.
 It is one of the more dangerous events of the rodeo, because the rider has no control of the horse and the latter has his head all the time.
 The contest is a risky proposition even after the rider completes his 10-second ride on the back of the Mustang. The pickup men can only ride herd on the bronc until one of them can lift the cowboy from the back of the bucking horse. The pickup men must be sure handed so that the rider will not fall between the horses in the way of flying hooves.
 Bareback bronc riding has definite rules. It is a one-handed contest.

The rider must keep one hand in the air at all times. The rider must leave the chute spurring the mount, and must continue this all during the ride to urge the horse to its most energetic effort.
 Constants are penalized for failure to spur or "scratch." They are also rated on the violence of the bucking they undergo. If a man draws a mount that does not make at least one jump the judges will permit him to draw another mount.
 The bareback bronc riding will be one of the fastest contests of the Ranger rodeo. Horses are released in rapid succession as there are no halters or saddles to adjust before the rider climbs aboard.

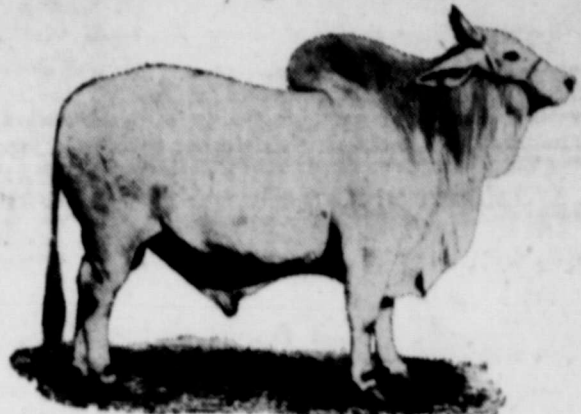

BULLDOGGING ORIGINATED BY NEGRO COWBOY IN 1903

Bulldogging—or steer wrestling, one of the time events at the Ranger rodeo, is not as much an accomplishment of the ranch hands as some of the other events in the rodeo, but it is one of the most spectacular events of the show.

Bulldogging, daring and dangerous, was originated in 1903 on the range by a famous Negro cowboy, Bill Pickett.

The event was first called bulldogging for the method in which Pickett and the pioneers of the sport used in downing the steers. The cowboy would sink his teeth into the steer's lip in the process of throwing the steer down; this was changed to steer wrestling after the cowboys started using scientific wrestling holds to down

the steers. How bulldogging originated on the range and how it got its name is interesting. It's a far cry from Bill Pickett's stunt, as part of his livestock work, to the speedy event as it is staged in the arena today.

Bill Pickett was working on a ranch at Taylor, near Austin. The ranch was covered with blackjack and 1 owb.

The ranchers had cowdogs to help work the stock out of the thickets. The dogs were sent into the brush to bring out the wild cattle that would take refuge during round-up.

If the cattle would not leave the dogs were trained to attack the cow. The dogs would hold the cow until a cowboy could get a rope on the animal and drag it from the brush.

In the spring of 1903 Pickett was told by the ranch boss to ride into a thicket after a cow that had a calf by her side. Pickett overtook the "brusher" and tried to drive her out on the flats where the cowboys were holding the other cattle. The old cow would not leave the thicket and the brush was so thick that Pickett could not put a loop on her.

The mad critter charged at Pickett's horse and he reached down and caught hold of her horns to keep his horse from being gored. The Negro cowboy gripped the horns so tightly the cow pulled him from the saddle. When he hit the ground he still had the frightened cow in his grasp, his horse had run off.

Seeing nothing else to do, he wrestled the cow to the ground by twisting her head and neck. He was so angry when the cow finally hit the ground that he sank his teeth in the animal's lips as the dogs had done.

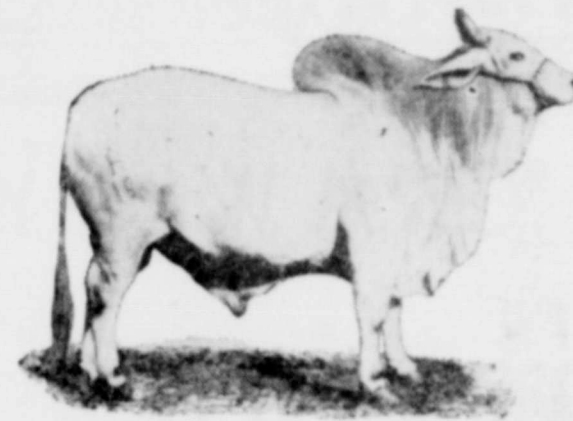

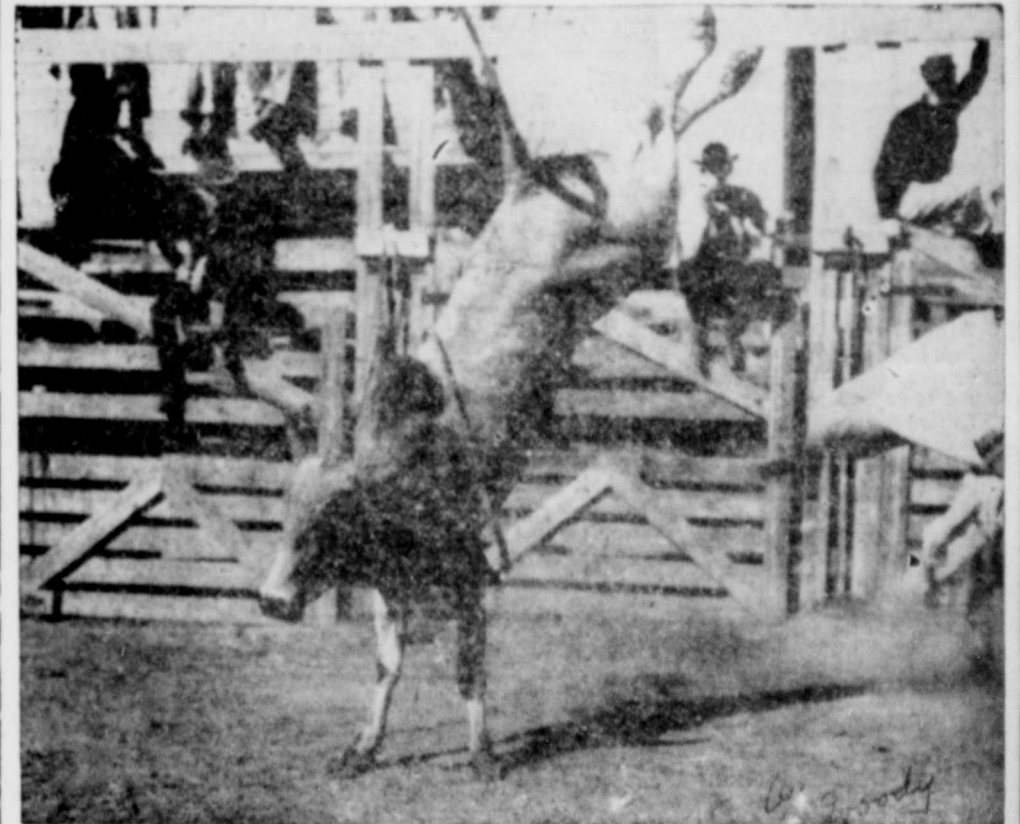
