Dewey's Far East Trip Might **Get Political Tongues Wagging**

WASHINGTON-(NEA)-New York Gov. Thomas E. Dewey's trip To the Far East was made at the suggestion of Ambassador John Foster Dulles, who has been chief negotiator of the Japanese peace






