'Smiling Bob' Taft's New Smile Is a Pretty Good Indication

WASHINGTON-(NEA)-Sen. Robert A. Taft of Ohio has already started to wear his presidential candidate's smile, and apparently wants to be known as "Smiling Bob." He has confided to a number of people that he has definitely decided to run for the Republican nation next year, and he's doing everything in his power to further that ambition.

He has admitted that his greatest rival is Gen. Dwight D. Eisen-

hower. Analyzing Ike's great popularity, Senator Taft has decided that the secret lies in the general's warm personality and infectious smile. It wins people over from the very minute that he stands up, or steps on a platform to speak. Senator Taft has never been able

to be like that.

But he is now taking steps to overcome the handicap. He is doing everything he can to make himself more likable. He has even gone to the extent of stretching his mouth wider so that his smile will be more winning. And he's training himself to open his mouth to smile the moment he stands up to speak.

Next trouble spot where the Commies may try to give the business to the anti-Communist countries is Berlin. 


