Congress Asked For China Aid

WASHINGTON, Aug. 8 (UP)—The administration has asked Congress to approve a \$307,000,000 aid program for Chinese Nationalist forces on Formosa, it was disclosed today.

The program—including \$217,000,000 in arms shipments—aims to help Generalissimo Chiang Kai-Shek modernize an army of between 25 and 30 divisions. It was reported that guns, ammunition, armored vehicles and perhaps planes are included in the plan.

The program would be a further sharp reversal of U.S. policy toward the Nationalists. President Truman insisted only 18 months ago that the United States "would not provide military aid or advice to Formosa."

Administration sources explain that American policy toward the Nationalist regime, now confined to Formosa is an outgrowth of the Communist attack in Korea.

The new Formosa program has been described in secret session to the Senate Foreign Relations and Armed Services Committees by Dean Rusk, assistant secretary of state for far eastern affairs. It never has been mentioned in perfunctory "briefings" given newsmen by chairman Tom Connally, D., Tex., of the Foreign Relations group.

Rusk, scheduled to continue testimony on the administration's \$5,500,000,000 foreign aid program today, has insisted that the increased assistance to Chiang is for the defense of Formosa, rather than to build up Chiang's forces for attacks against the Communist-held Chinese mainland.

Police said that his silence was hampering their search for the killers.

Capt. Bob Crowder of the Texas Rangers admitted that the clue were slim.

"We don't have the license number of the pick-up truck," he said. "But we are hoping to find out who sold that battery we found connected with the detonating wires."

Crowder and other officers sifted through the Fort Worth underworld last night, but they found nobody of interest there.

"Everyone was laying low," Crowder said.

They turned their attention to the Dallas gangland today with a roundup of all known criminal figures ordered.

District Attorney Henry Wade told a conference of Texas law enforcement officials last spring that underworld gossips reported there was a \$10,000 price tag on Noble's life.

These sources, Wade said, reported the money was put up by "another gambler eager to have Noble out of the way."

Noble was killed in a neighborhood whose quiet contrasted with his violence-ridden career.

His final act of life was braking his car to a halt at the mailbox. Suddenly, the blast of a tremendous charge of explosives shattered the silence.

The automobile was torn in two parts and its mechanism showered down over an area of several acres. The mailbox was blown 80 yards.

Noble's body likewise was torn apart and portions were found as far removed as 60 yards.

The explosion tore a crater in the road.

The killers strung wires from the bomb to a clump of bushes 80 yards away where they took up their vigil, waiting for Noble to approach.

A new automobile battery was found attached to the detonating wires leading to the road.

"Two or three" men were seen lurking in the vicinity of the ranch shortly before the 1:35 p. m. (EDT) slaying. They were believed to have parked a blue, Chevrolet pick-up truck about 200 yards from the mailbox.

Shannon Francis, working on a nearby farm, said he saw the truck drive away at "high speed" within a minute after the explosion. He did not obtain the license number.

Denton County Sheriff Ones Hodges said officers found a deck of cards and \$556 in Noble's pockets. The twisted barrel of an M-1 Carbine was found nearby. Hodges said it apparently had been blown from Noble's car.

Noble virtually lived with a gun at his side because of the numerous attempts on his life.

Two of the most spectacular attempts occurred last spring when jellied nitroglycerine was wired to the engines of his personal plane.

One charge went off as Noble, who was a pilot, idled the ship on the ground. The blast shattered the engine, but "The Cat" escaped when the heavy firewall shielding the cockpit absorbed the force of the explosion.

Another charge planted in his plane a short time later failed to detonate.

Noble's wife was killed Nov. 29, 1949 when she pressed the starter of her husband's car in front of their modest Dallas home. Police said the bomb, attached to the ignition, obviously was intended for Noble.

Even then, Noble refused to name his would-be assassins.

A pretty 20-year-old nurse named Gertrud, interviewed while on a clandestine window shopping tour in West Berlin told the United Press:

"We get only a half a pound of sausage, some bread and cracker early in the morning. This keeps early in the morning. We get some beans or cabbage we get at nighttime are supposed to carry us through the day."

Sympathetic West Berliners bought young visitors ice cream, chocolates and cakes—tidbits unknown to most Soviet children. Thousands of the young delegates to the rally were disobeying orders not to visit West Berlin.
