"This summer, I have put in a great many extra hours of work for my customers every day.

High temperatures, lack of rainfall and many nights without our usual cooling breeze have combined to make it an exceptionally hot summer. Electric refrigerators have had to call on their reserve power to keep food fresh and wholesome at constant temperatures under 40 degrees and to maintain ready supplies of ice cubes and cooling beverages.

"Some electric bills may be higher during such extreme hot weather because of this extra work but now - when you're able to stay cool and comfortable in spite of the heat - is when your electric service really proves to be the biggest bargain in your home."


