PLUG 'N TRIGGER

This year's duck season could be a whopper, a summary of early reports indicates, and the wise hunter will get ready by taking care of a couple of chores now.

Ducks unlimited offers a detailed report in which qualified observers unanimously agree that more ducks are breeding in nearly all districts than in several recent years.

More birds returned to the Canadian breeding grounds and there is little danger of drought upsetting the prospects.

Despite usual natural setbacks, ducks have made good and there should be more than the ordinary number moving south this fall.

The two preparatory steps every

hunter should make soon concern looking after the old blind-erhus, and obtaining the new duck stamp.

Most able gunsmen are over-own with work and if your shotgun needs attention, it's not too soon to put it into the shop.

As for stamps—every year there is a last-minute rush which inconveniences the hunter, and inevitably some of the late comers are left out because there simply are no more stamps available.

The post office has the new stamp for sale now, and they may be available at your sporting goods store. You can duck a headache, and guarantee your shooting privileges, by making an early buy.

Fishing, like almost every other outdoor sport, has taken a beating from the heat wave. Few anglers have braved the day time heat, but night fishing has shown an increase.

The catches reported have been few and scattered, and many of these show bass taken from depths of forty or fifty feet. Minnows seem to have been the best hot-weather bait. But few favorable fishing reports with any bait may be expected until we have a change in weather.

In Louisiana, a fishing practice which rates solidly as a conservation measure is gaining popularity. "Rodless" aimed at destroying garfish are being conducted. The result is to bring the gar population into better balance.

With the near-extinction of alligators and other factors which native provided to hold the gar in his proper population, action to control the spike-nosed destroyer is badly needed.

Such action is needed in Texas as many man-made lakes as sorely as in any section of the country. The warm waters of Texas with their heavy fish stocks have an amazing gar population. Lake Texoma, especially could be used as a "gar cove" of long dura-

Airport Near Truman Home Causes Trouble

WASHINGTON, Aug. 11 (UP)—A House Republican drive to block a new Air Force Base near President Truman's Missouri home stalled action today on an urgent \$5,768,720,000 project for Grandview, Mo.

However, supporters of the measure predicted that the GOP move would be beaten. They forecast easy passage when the bill comes to a vote in the House Tuesday.

The bill had been set for passage yesterday, but action was delayed when Rep. H. R. Gross, R-Ia., demanded a roll call vote on his motion to recommend the measure to the Armed Services Committee with instructions to knock out the \$19,019,000 project for Grandview, Mo.

Democratic leader John W. McCormack, Mass., pointed out that the House had agreed to take no controversial roll calls yesterday. He moved that the issue be put over until next week.

Gross labeled the Grandview project a "glorified WPA project." He said \$22,462,000 is to be spent by the Air Force at Sedalia, Mo., Air Force Base, 50 miles away, and that the Grandview project would be a needless duplication.

Said election shall be held at the City Hall, and the following named persons are hereby appointed Managers thereof, to-wit:

Said election shall be held under, and in the manner provided by the Laws of the State of Texas regulating General City Elections, as provided by Section 9, Article 5, of the Charter of the City of Ranger, Texas, adopted April 3, 1919.

No person shall vote at said election unless he or she is a qualified voter under the Constitution and Laws of the State of Texas, and a resident of the City of Ranger for the length of time required by law.

Notice of said election shall be posted in the place designated for holding said election, and at three public places in the City of Ranger at least thirty days prior to date of said election, and notice of said election shall be published in the Ranger Daily Times once each week until date of said election.

Jail Inmates Eating Deer

Fishing License Sale Set For Last Of Month

AUSTIN, Aug. — Fishing and hunting licenses for the fiscal year beginning September 1 will be in the hands of Texas agents the last week in August, according to the Chief Clerk of the Game, Fish & Oyster Commission. He said 1650 persons in practically every community in Texas will help distribute the licenses. Approximately 315,000 individual resident sport fishing licenses and roughly 310,000 individual resident hunting licenses will have been issued to Texans for the current fiscal year ending August 31.

The Chief Clerk visits a small increase in the sale of both hunting and fishing licenses for the next year.

All of the 36 licenses issued by the Game, Fish & Oyster Commission must be renewed for the new fiscal year, advised the Chief Clerk.

The fees range from 50 cents for a duplicate individual fishing license, replacing the original, to \$200 for a wholesale fish and oyster dealer permit.

One important change to sportsmen is the new combined \$2.15 resident hunting license which is good for both big game and small game, barring antelope which requires a special \$5 permit. All persons over 17 years of age hunting beyond their home county must have a hunting license.

The resident licenses for sports fishing in fresh water cost \$1.65. It must be used by all persons over 17 years of age who are fishing beyond their home counties or adjoining counties. Licenses must be possessed even when artificial bait is used in the home county or artificial bait or live bait or used in adjoining counties.

"Hot Oil" Case Moved To Texas

SHREVEPORT, La., Aug. 11 (UP)—Federal Judge Ben Dawkins removed himself yesterday from hearing a motion in connection with an indictment against U. S. District Attorney Harvey Carrie of Shreveport.

The motion was entered by defense attorneys seeking dismissal of charges that Carrie accepted a bribe in connection with a "hot oil" case.

The attorneys' claim that Judge Dawkins made prejudicial statements before the grand jury that returned the indictment last March.

The motion will now be heard by Federal Judge Allan J. Hannay at Houston.

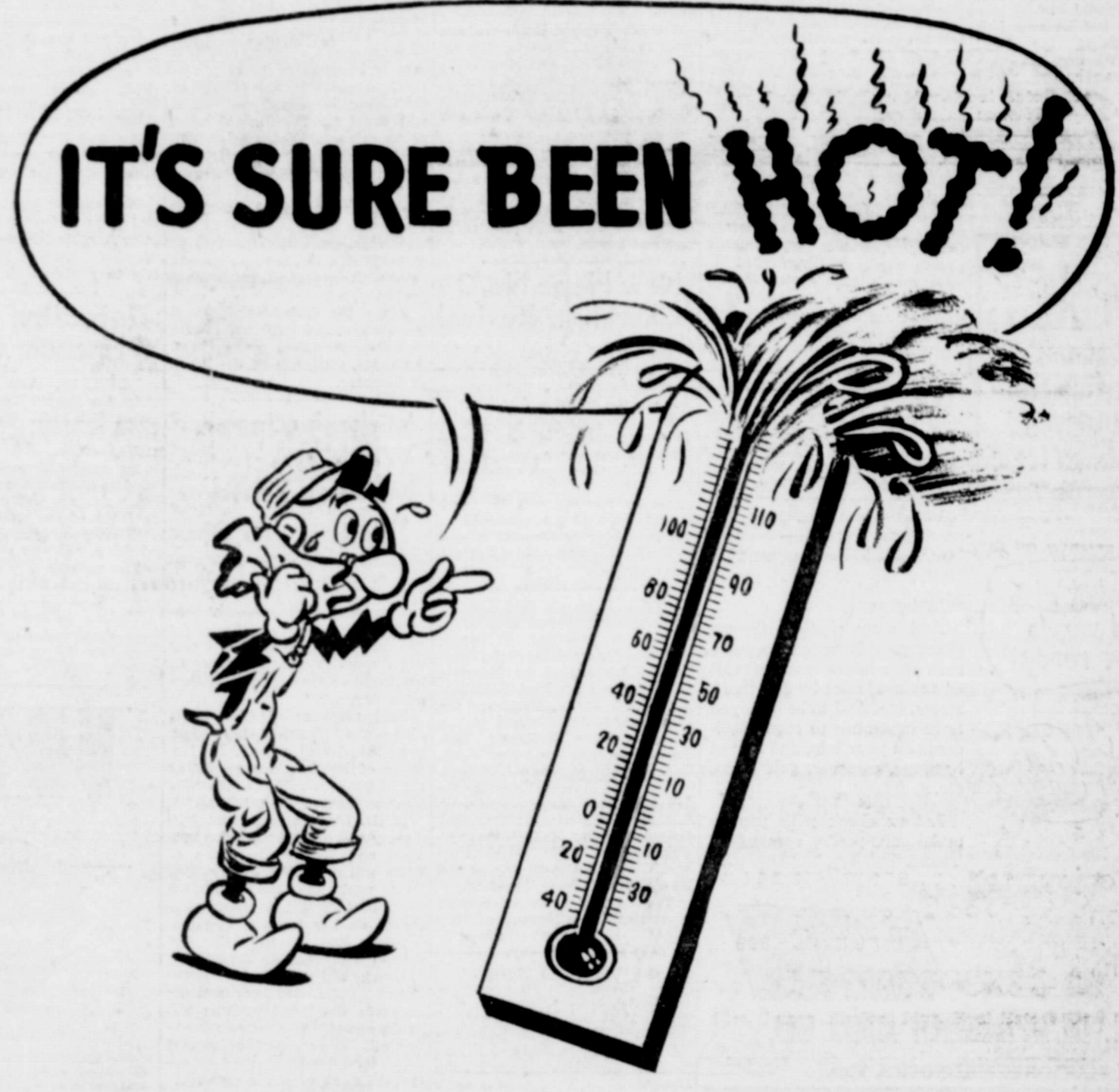

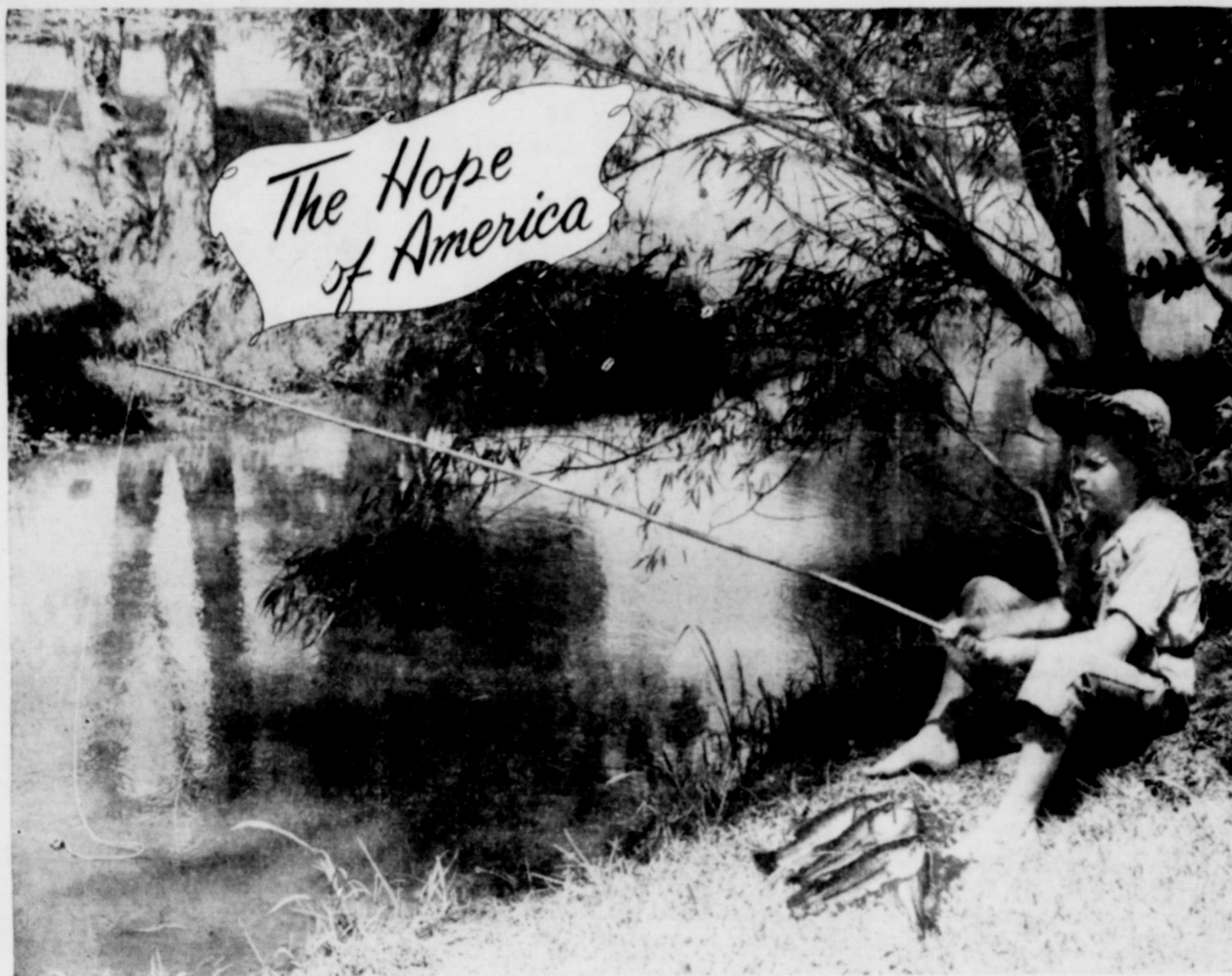

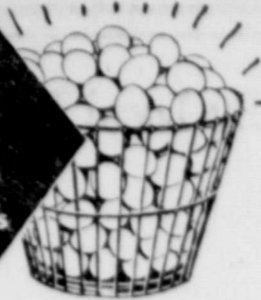

Upholstery By Mail Now

NEW YORK, Aug. 9 (UP)—Seems odd that a housewife in California and a man in the Belgian Congo are both interested in learning how to upholster furniture in their spare time.

There's also a fellow in Puerto Rico who wrote for information on a correspondence course in upholstering and chair building because "it really is something to have a field that makes the life easy."

Irwin Wexner and George Edelman opened their field school of upholstery here three years ago, figuring a lot of veterans might be interested in learning the skilled work of furniture construction. The home extension course is only six months old. And all in all, it seems there is no danger of the fine art of furniture handicraft dying out in this mechanized age for want of young people willing to go into the field.

"Now that G. I. bill benefits have ended for many veterans, we have been surprised to discover the variety of men as well as women who sign up for the course," said Wexner, who holds a master's degree in vocational education from Columbia University.

The sound of hammering came through the glass-walled partition separating his office from the classroom workshop as he talked.

"I didn't think an extension course was possible until I saw an ad for diesel engine and meat cutting courses by mail," Wexner said. "I figured if they could teach that we could teach upholstery. Now we show how to build and upholster a footstool, a boudoir chair and a Larson chair by mail. The second and third pupils we signed up were women. They're just finishing their footstools now."

The mail students send photographs of their handwork every so often for instructors to check as well as filling out regular questionnaires. The tool kit and materials for the three pieces of furniture go along with the course.

So far, Wexner is just a little puzzled over how to handle the requests from places as far as the Belgian Congo, Alaska and Brazil. Duty on the materials would increase the cost too much, he said, but he and his associates are hoping to work out another course for the pupils who supply their own furniture for the course.

CHRISTIAN SCIENCE SERVICE

Texans Like Jersey Cattle Survey Shows

COLLEGE STATION, Aug. 11—If there's any doubt how Texans feel about Jersey cattle, the figures released by the American Jersey Cattle Club for the year ending on March 1, 1951 should clear up the picture.

According to A&M Meekins, associate extension dairy husbandman of Texas A&M College, Texas Jersey breeders ranked at the top or very near there in at least eight different categories. They led the nation in total registrations with a total of 6,440 head or almost 10 percent of the nation's total of 70,110 head. Jim Wells county ranked second in the nation in the number of registrations with 869 and Hopkins county seventh with 423 head registered last year.

Texas ranked first in the total number of transfers by states and also in the total number of new buyers of registered Jersey cattle. Johnson county ranked third

in the nation in the number of new buyers with a total of 59.

In the matter of herd and individual animal classifications, Texas topped the nation with 1,212 cows classified and ranked fifth in the number of herds classified with 58.

In the nation ranking with the Club's Herd Improvement Registry, Texas ranked third in the number of cows on test and fifth in the number of herds on HIR test.

One Texas cow, Volunteer Winsome Victory, owned by J. Chester Elliff, Victory Jersey Farm, Tulla, was one of seven in the nation to become a member of the Club Register of Merit Thousand Pound Club during the year. Victory, as she is known to her bovine friends, at five years and one month of age produced 18,302 pounds of milk and 1,174 of butterfat in 365 days on a twice-a-day milking schedule. She holds the type classification of Excellent, the highest of the breed; also the distinction of being the highest living butterfat producer of the breed among cow, with the Excellent classification.
