

Effort Being Made To Improve Public Eating Places Sanitation

"Texas health officials are making every effort to improve the sanitary condition of public eating places, and in addition schools are conducted to instruct foodhandlers. Moreover there are laws, rules and regulations requiring the use of approved equipment and methods in such establishments. Nevertheless, one of the most forceful influences for sanitation is not being used and that is the public's unfavorable reaction toward dirty and insanitary places," states Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer.

"The public cannot do the job entirely, nor can health departments bring about desirable and essential practices without the help of the public. As for hygienic practices, persons serving food and drink should be clean; should not cough and sneeze over the utensils and material served; should keep their hands away from their mouth and nose, hair and face; should handle all utensils by the outside instead of putting their fingers on the inside of service utensils. These are conditions persons can see, and unless these safeguards are practiced, disease may result."

Also milk served can be appraised by the patron. Texas law requires that a milk bottle cap state

grade-of milk and whether it is raw or pasturized. However, if milk is brought to a patron in a glass, he cannot know whether it is from a graded supply or whether it is raw or pasturized, but if served properly in its original container, with covered cap and legal label, the patron can secure from the label the information he should have before ever being willing to drink strange milk.

The patron should note sanitation conditions in food establishments. Are the floors, walls, ceiling clean? Are tables and counters clean? Are pies and other ready-to-serve foods protected from dust, dirt and flies? Are flies prevalent?

"Be assured that what can be seen as a patron at the table or counter usually will be much better, cleaner, and safer than conditions in the kitchen and other places out of sight of the patron," Dr. Cox warns.

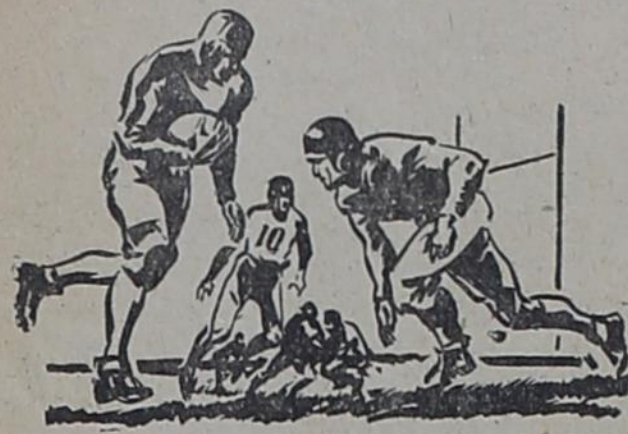

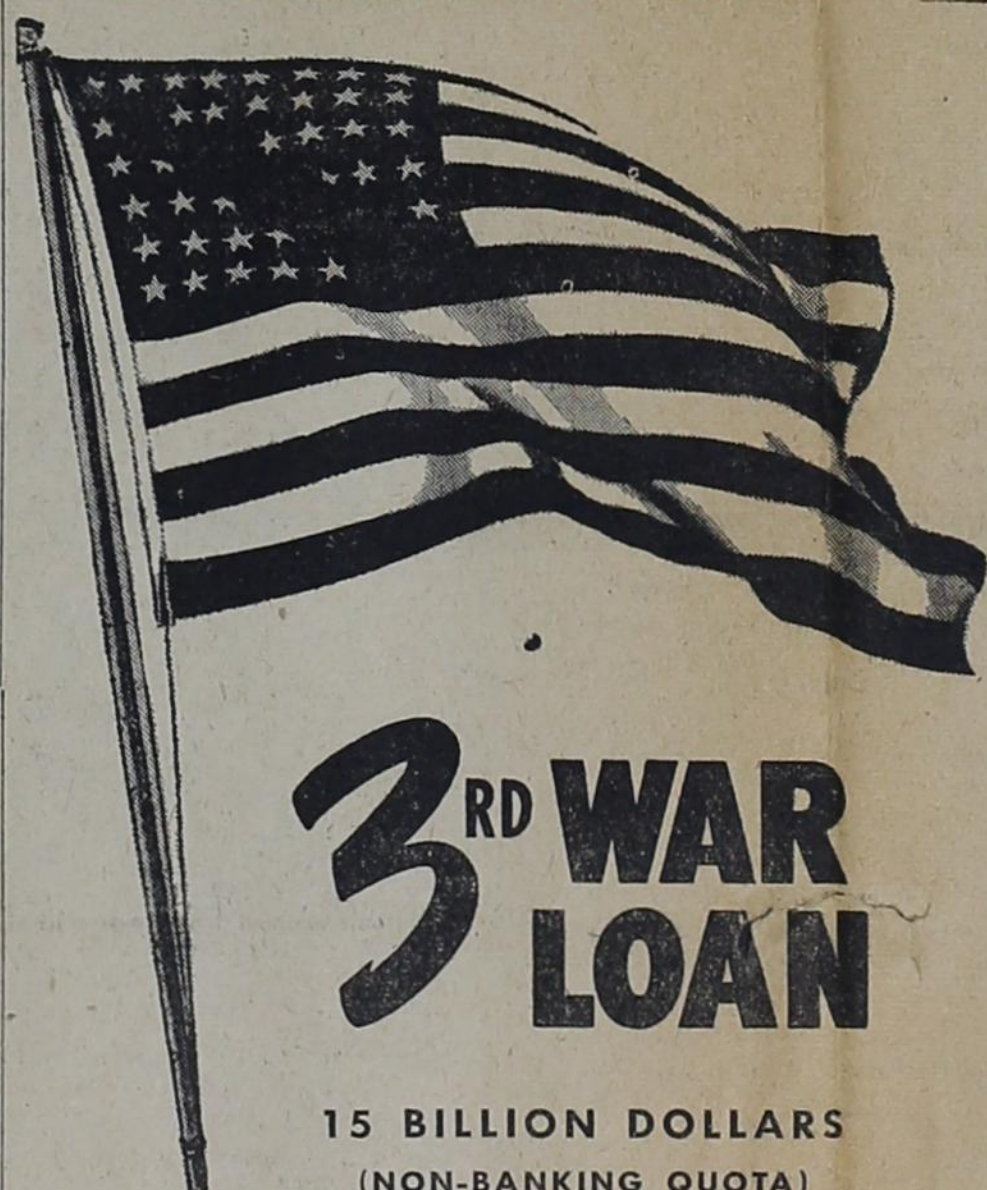

COUNTY AGRICULTURAL AGENT
TEXAS A. & M. COLLEGE EXTENSION SERVICE

The interest is unusually good among exhibitors at the Castro County Fair this year. In the Hereford Division H. C. Beard, George Burch, Hunter Brothers, H. Robbins have signified they would bring a group of five Hereford calves to the Fair. This will make this year's Fair have the best Hereford show it has ever had and after seeing these cattle I can guarantee that you will see an awful nice bunch of registered Hereford cattle which is representative of the many good ones we have in Castro County.

The 4-H boys who are winners of the Sears-Roebuck pigs will exhibit them at the Fair. The county winners will be judged and the boy having the grand champion

will thus win the right to show him at Amarillo on October 9th, where he will be awarded a registered Jersey heifer by Sears-Roebuck and Company. Other County winners will be awarded baby chicks by Sears-Roebuck and Company.

All indications are, after visiting many of the Jersey and Milking Shorthorn breeders over the county, that we will have by far the best show we have ever had of these two breeds of cattle at this year's Castro County Fair. We started three years ago and I believe that it will be surprising to many to see what progress has been made in the county in the way of better Milking Shorthorns and Jerseys in just three years.

TOMATO CANNING RECIPES GIVEN; H. D. A

While canned tomato or tomato juice are "firsts" when it comes to utilizing tomatoes, there are other tomato products which make mighty good accompaniments to winter meals, according to Miss Leia Petty, County Home Demonstration Agent of the A. and M. College Extension Service. Recipes like these are worth using and filing for future reference.

Tomato Catsup

Select good tomatoes, cutting out all green and hard places. Remove skin and seed and press through fine sieve (as for tomato juice)

5 lbs. tomato puree, 1 1/4 cup sugar, 6 Tbs. salt, 1 cup vinegar (strong 5% acetic acid)

Spices tied in a bag:
1 Tb. celery seed, one-third tps. mustard seed, one-third tps. cinnamon bark, 1/2 tps. paprika, one-sixth tps. Cayenne pepper, 1 slice onion, chopped.

Strain puree of tomato through cloth, separating yellow liquid from red tomato solids. Boil liquid rapidly to one-half its volume. Add tomato solids and hang spice bag into the boiling catsup. Boil rapidly 30 or 40 minutes. Stir to prevent sticking and scorching.

Add vinegar, salt and sugar 5 minutes before the end of the cooking period. Boil rapidly and stir carefully. Remove bag of spice. Seal at once into hot sterilized bottles or jars.

NOTE: Spices can be added or omitted to meet individual taste. Allspice, cloves, and black pepper impart a dark color.

Chili Sauce

Chili sauce might be considered catsup that has been strained. More onion is chopped and added to the tomato. Tomatoes are first cooked down to one-half weight.

Then chopped onion added, spices hung into boiling sauce and prepared as for catsup, boiling 30 to 40 minutes, adding vinegar, sugar and salt 5 minutes before the end of processing period. Remove spice bag. Seal at once into hot sterilized bottles or jars.

Green Tomato Mincemeat
4 qts. sliced green tomatoes, 1/2 tps. allspice, 2 qts. pared and sliced tart apples, 1/2 lb. seeded raisins, 1/2 lb. currants, 5 cup brown sugar, 4 tablespoons of cinnamon, 2 cups vinegar, 4 tablespoons citron, mixed; 2 cups water or more later and less vinegar if the latter is very acid.

Chop the tomatoes and the apples fine. Add the other ingredients and boil the mixture slowly until the tomatoes are very tender and the mincemeat is thick but not watery. Stir it occasionally to prevent burning. If desired this may be sealed in scalded jars for later use. The quantities given in this recipe should make about three quarts of mincemeat.

Fresh Tomato Juice
Mrs. C. J. Mapes, who lives west of Dimmitt, shares this recipe for fresh tomato juice: Select firm fresh tomatoes, cut in halves, and extract juice by using the fruit juicer on the electric mixer. Put in fruit jars and store in refrigerator until ready for use. Naturally there would be some waste to this method, so she heats the part of the tomatoes that is left, strains it then heats again and seals it in sterilized jars.

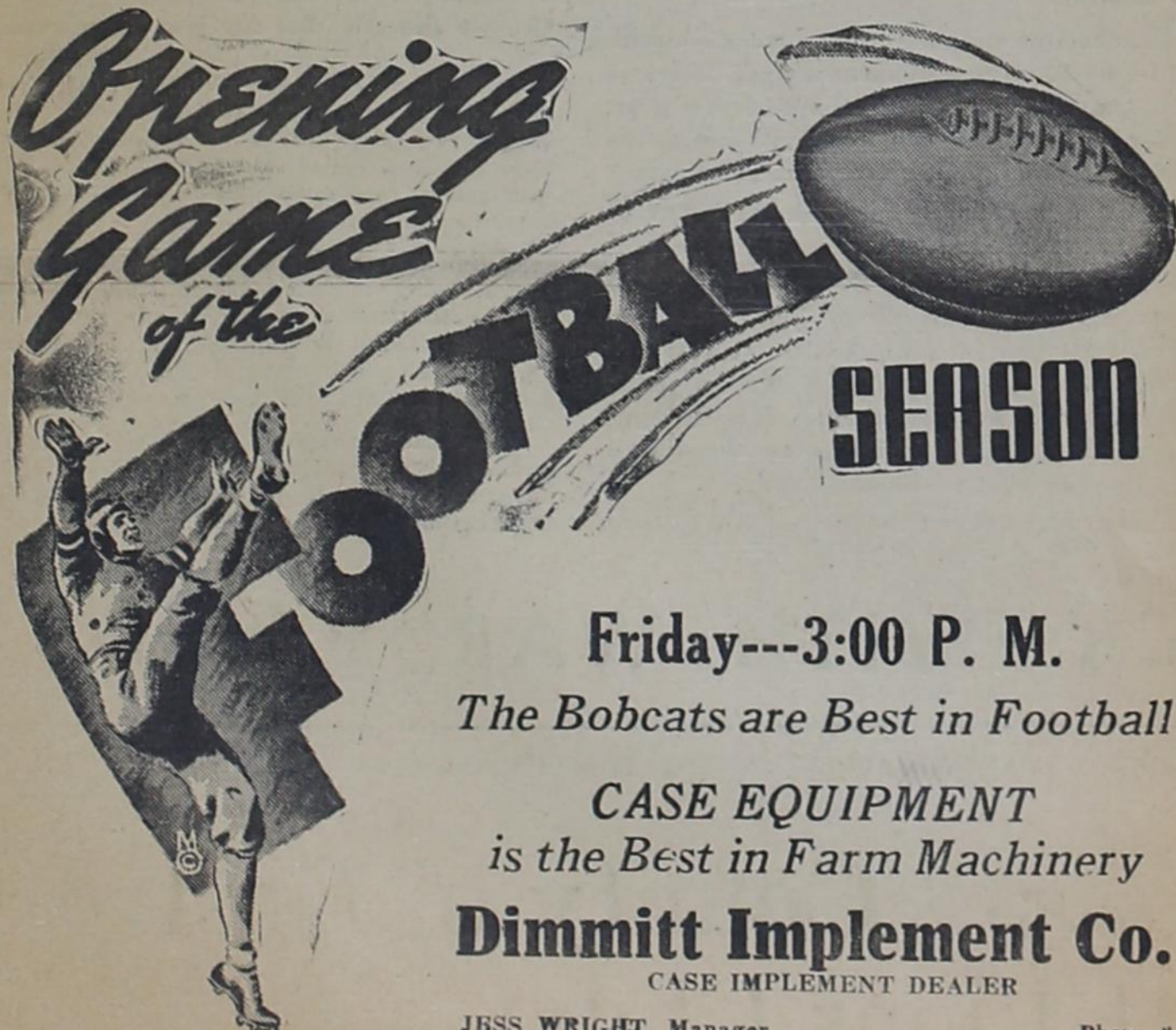
