PTA SPONSORED LUNCH ROOM AT YOUNG SCHOOL COMPLETED

The recently completed Young School Lunch Room will hold open house Friday, August 31, from 8 until 11 a. m. The public is cordially invited to attend the opening at the Young School.

This lunch room was started to do very hard work by the members of the Young School Parent-Teachers Association.

A movement was started to raise money and equip a lunch room at Young to serve hot meals to the students in September of 1950. A committee was appointed by the PTA to further this idea with action and money instead of words. Mrs. F. R. King was appointed chairman of the committee and served with Misses Ed Schubert, Owen Bray, Arthur DeFolch and Eddie Bobo.

Money for purchasing the new, modern equipment for the kitchen of the lunch room was raised by various means. Five hundred dollars was raised at the Halloween Carnival sponsored by the PTA. Plays, operation of a noontime confection at the school, and the PTA members cooked and donated the food for hot meals that were sold to the students at Young to assist in the fund raising.

A new stove, sink, hot water heater, dishes, and other equipment needed to fully equip a kitchen was purchased from the funds raised. At the present card tables from the playroom at the school will be used as dining tables.

Much time and labor was donated by the faculty of Young School and the following men: Ed Sanders, George Wright, Thad Parker, Owen Bray, Earl Blackwell and Eddie Bobo.

When the lunch room opens Mrs. J. B. Rayfield and Mrs. Joe Young will prepare the meals for the children. The meals will probably be twenty-five cents each, including a half-pint of milk for each plate.

Crippled Girl Named Queen Of Aircraft Carrier

SAN DIEGO, Calif., Aug. 30 (UP)—Jane Taylor, 17, crippled with cerebral palsy since birth, will be Cinderella today, with 2,027 attentive escorts.

Jane is the homecoming queen of the aircraft carrier U. S. S. Princeton, which steamed into San Diego Bay yesterday after a nine-month tour in Korean waters.

During their time overseas, the 2,027 men aboard the 27-ton flat-top decided to select a new sort of homecoming queen—a girl who had known the toughest breaks.

A committee flown here in advance of the ship selected Jane for the honor, and the Princeton's crew raised \$5,000 to provide a trust fund for her.

She will be honored at a reception aboard the Princeton today and will return over a homecoming ball from her wheelchair tonight.

AIR FORCE REPORTS LOSS OF TWO PLANES LAST WEDNESDAY

8th ARMY HEADQUARTERS, KOREA, Friday, Aug. 31 (UP)—Two battalions of North Korean shock troops fiercely attacked United Nations positions on the east-central front at 6:30 p. m. Thursday. The issue was still in doubt at last report.

Up to 2,000 of the Communists made a frontal attack on the UN lines on "Bloody Ridge," where fighting has raged since Aug. 13.

They were met by mass artillery fire and a lashing attack by allied planes.

The Reds attacked in an attempt to surprise the Allies after trying to infiltrate their positions during the day. Enemy infiltration tactics were a serious danger early in the war, but they met little success this time.

One Red unit slipped through UN positions north of Yangju on the east-central front last night and forced Allied command post to withdraw, but a counter-attack routed the enemy.

Sixty other North Koreans were intercepted and killed by an Allied tank force northwest of Yangju.

GIs Expected Break In Truce Talks, Says Vet

FORT WORTH, Aug. 30 (UP)—An artillery officer who returned home after 11 months in Korea, says that bogging down of the Korean truce talks came "as no surprise to the GIs in the line."

Capt. J. C. Altman said troop morale was good and the average soldier was shrugging off the breakdown as "one of those things."

He said they were hopeful, naturally, but weren't really disappointed when the talks broke down.

"They thought the Reds were stalling all the time, anyway," said Altman.

AIR FORCE REPORTS LOSS OF TWO PLANES LAST WEDNESDAY

Clear skies enabled UN fighters and fighter-bombers to hit Communist railway lines and marshalling yards throughout North Korea.

B-29 Superfortresses led the parade of destruction with a 50-ton raid on the yards at Yongmi, north of Sinanju in Northwest Korea.

The Air Force announced belatedly the loss of two planes in Wednesday's raids. One was a twin-jet British Meteor, the first lost since the new-type planes went into combat recently.

The Meteor was one of eight piloted by Australians which joined 20 American Sabrejets in a brief but furious air battle with about 40 Communist Mig-15 jets over Northwest Korea. Communist bullets set the Meteor crashing to earth.

The other allied plane lost was an American F-80 Shooting Star jet shot down by ground fire in another action.

On the ground front, South Korean troops captured three hills northwest of Kansong on the east coast Wednesday, but lost one of them to a heavy North Korean counter-attack. An estimated 232 Communists were killed in the fighting.

Veteran Captured After Two Of Planned Victims Killed

KANSAS CITY, MO., Aug. 30 (UP)—A World War II combat veteran who shot and killed a university professor and an aged woman told police today his capture halted a plan he had for the murder of four other persons.

Richard Donaldson, 29, calmly told officers of pumping five shots into Alfredo Ortiz-Vargas, 56, yesterday at the fashionable apartment of the University of Kansas City language professor who had befriended him.

He said that a short time later he shot 77-year-old Mrs. Eliza Lay at her house across town.

"I also planned to kill my aunt, my mother-in-law and a negro, and I tried to kill my landlady, but you arrested me before I could finish the job."

"The killings weren't connected in any way," Donaldson told homicide Sgt. Leo Hoedl.

He said he had a variety of reasons for wanting to kill his other four intended victims, ranging from revenge to "I just didn't like her."

Hoedl arrested Donaldson at the latter's combination self-service laundry and apartment shortly after Ortiz-Vargas was slain.

Donaldson, a much-decorated veteran with a record of 38 combat missions, was carrying a loaded .25 caliber automatic. He had 41 extra cartridges in his pocket. He offered no resistance.

"Which murder are you taking me in for?" he asked.

"What do you mean?" Hoedl asked. "The Ortiz-Vargas killing, of course."

"Well, I might as well tell you that I just killed another one—right around the corner," Donaldson said.

Officers followed his directions and found the body of Mrs. Lay, a Negro, in her apartment above Donaldson's laundry.

He signed a complete statement admitting the slayings.

Donaldson said he met Ortiz-Vargas, a native of Bogotan Columbia, while attending Spanish classes at the University. He said the educator loaned him \$2,000 to help open the laundry.

"Vargas wanted to take over the laundry," Donaldson said. "I went to his apartment to protest."

Houston Taxicabs Are Working In Full Force Again

HOUSTON, Aug. 30 (UP)—Taxicabs roamed Houston streets in full force today after 700 striking drivers agreed to return to work.

Fares were unchanged, but the drivers' immediate goal of their three-day walkout was achieved.

The city council late yesterday denied the drivers' petition for an emergency fare increase of 3¢ cents for the first one-half mile, and 10 cents for each extra passenger. The boost would have doubled present rates.

However, Councilman George Marquette told the drivers they would be granted a full hearing Sept. 10 on their petition.

The cabbies walked out Monday night in protest of the council's denial in hearing their petition.

The strike idled 400 cabs hauling 25,000 passengers daily. Only Negro taxicabs remained at work.

Actors Salaries To Be Studied

WASHINGTON, Aug. 30 (UP)—Dagmar's upward salary curves and those of other entertainment stars will be studied by a special committee to determine whether they upset the salary stabilization program.

Dagmar, buxom blonde star of television whose real name is Jennie Lewis, recently was granted a \$2,000 a week salary boost by the American Broadcasting Company.

Roy Hendrickson, former agriculture department official, was named to head a three-man panel to study the case. It is the only big one filed so far. Other pay raises in the entertainment world will have to be studied.

Peace Talks May Be Resumed Soon

Service Pipe Line Awards Line Contract

Service Pipe Line Co. has awarded contract to C. L. Rogers Construction Co. of Wichita Falls to take up and recondition approximately 23 miles of 10-inch pipe in Platte county, Wyoming, that comprised a part of the company's Wyoming-Missouri truck line. General Manager C. M. Scott said today.

The loop was no longer required since larger pipe was installed in this section of the system some time ago. After it is reconditioned at Casa, Wyoming, the pipe will be shipped to Texas where it will be re-used in the construction of a line between Wason and Denton, Scott said.

Construction is part of the half way mark on Service's 123-mile 10-inch pipe extension to its system from Bowie, to the Old Glory area in West Central Texas. Smith Construction Corp., Fort Worth, is building 57.3 miles from the Brazos river to Jud, and O. R. Burden Construction Co., Tulsa and Wichita Falls, 65.7 miles, including the Brazos river-crossing.

In Kansas, Engineers Limited Pipe Line, Denver, Colo., contractor for the construction of 2.3 miles of 12-inch line from near Seymour to the Standard of Indiana refinery at Neodesha, has completed preparation of right of way and installation of casing under a river crossing, tunneling under a railroad and six streets besides the highway. 1,870 feet of the line will be encased in concrete within the city of Neodesha. The job got under way August 7 and completion is scheduled for early September.

The last of three new 167,000 barrel tanks at Service's Manhattan, Illinois, pump station will be completed late this month.

Local Minister To Hold Revival

The First Baptist Church will begin revival services Sunday, Sept. 2. Preparation continues through tonight and Friday night in the way of cottage prayer meetings in various homes of the city's eight zones.

The Rev. Ralph Perkins, pastor of the First Baptist Church, will preach both the morning and evening services beginning Sunday evening. Rev. Perkins has recently observed his one year anniversary with the church here. He reports he has enjoyed a fine year in his work here.

Nip Peacemakers Get Tips On The Western Manners

TOKYO, Aug. 30 (UP)—Japan's delegation will take a booklet on western manners to the Japanese Peace Treaty Conference in San Francisco next week.

The Japanese foreign office pamphlet warned the delegates against:

1. Taking off shoes and wiggling toes in public.
 2. Imbibing alcohol until violent—even though from "ancient times in Japan this has not been considered shameful."
 3. Belching at the table.
 4. Squashing a hat down to the ears.
 5. Going into a corner to blow your nose, thus attracting undue attention.
 6. Making too much noise while gargling.
- "We don't realize it," the pamphlet said, "but it has been said that foreigners can tell Japanese are in the next room by the noise they make like ducks while washing."

Slayer Acquitted For Second Time

VICTORIA, Aug. 30 (UP)—Vance West, Aransas Pass tourist court operator, was acquitted last night after his second trial for the pistol slaying of Bink West of Houston, no relation, in the Silver Dollar Cafe at Bandera Aug. 12, 1948.

A jury verdict of innocent was returned in a court room packed with cattlemen in high-heeled boots and amid some drama.

Mrs. Christena West of Houston, mother of the dead man, was escorted from the court room after breaking into tears and shouting to Victoria County Sheriff W. L. Crawford as he stood near the jury box.

"He killed my son. They can't do this."

There was no demonstration among spectators and Vance West received the innocent verdict calmly.

ARMISTICE AGREEMENT NOT PROBABLE IN NEAR FUTURE

TOKYO, Aug. 30 (UP)—The United Nations command said today that Korean peace talks may be resumed soon, but there is "little prospect of an armistice agreement."

"The resumption of the talks no longer seems to hold the promise of a possible agreement on a cease-fire that it did a month ago," the UN command said in a broadcast to Korea.

"The initial enthusiasm that the war soon might end has died down as it has become obvious that the Communists do not care how long the war goes on..."

The broadcast came as the Allies were awaiting the official Communist reply to Gen. Matthew B. Ridgway's latest offer Wednesday to resume the suspended armistice talks.

The reply may not come until sometime Friday or Saturday. It took the Red Commanders 52 hours to reply to the Supreme UN commander's last previous message.

Some indication of the nature of the Communist reply was seen, however, in a Chinese propaganda broadcast by Radio Peiping.

Although somewhat milder than previous Red broadcasts, it nevertheless charged that Ridgway had "lied," "distorted facts" and "slandered" the Communist in his denial that a UN plane had bombed the conference city of Kaesong the night of Aug. 22.

It was on the pretext of this "raid" that the Reds broke off the cease-fire talks the next day, Ridgway said. An on-the-spot investigation the night of the incident showed only that the "raid" had been faked.

"The latest note from the Communists may contain some hope for resumption of the talks," the broadcast said. "The tone is somewhat subdued, and the language is milder..."

"But what then? ... The initial enthusiasm that the war soon might end as died down as it has become obvious that the Communists do not care how long the war goes on, how many of their installations are ruined by the daily bombing of UN planes, or how many of their front-line troops die in suicide attacks."

New Directors Appointed For Ranger C of C

J. D. Nichols, Pat Thomas, James A. Smith, H. C. Henderson and Gaston Dixon were elected by the City Commission at their meeting Tuesday night to serve as directors of the Chamber of Commerce for a three-year term. The five were selected from a list of the names of 15 men submitted by the directors of the Chamber of Commerce.

Each year the terms of five directors expire and the city charter provides that the names of three men for each director whose term expires are to be submitted from which the new director is selected.

Henderson and Dixon were re-elected, and Thomas, Smith and Nichols will take office on Oct. 1, the beginning of the fiscal year, and will be serving their first terms.

Tuesday, Sept. 4 is the date for the regular monthly meeting of the Chamber directors and those newly selected will be asked to sit in on the meeting.

The regular monthly meetings are held at the Gholson Coffee Shop at 6:30 p. m., with each director paying for his meal. Usually all business is transacted by 8 o'clock, enabling those who have social engagements to get out in time to fill them.

Since the directors have been meeting at 6:30 they have had about 100 per cent attendance of those who were in town at the time of the meetings.

Negro Given Death Sentence For Assault

HOUSTON, Aug. 30 (UP)—A 20-year-old Negro truck driver, Louis Allison, received the death penalty for a Houston jury yesterday for the criminal assault of a 32-year-old mother as her two children looked on.

Allison, who showed no emotion during the three-day trial, insisted to the end that he was innocent.

Traditional Get-Together Ends In Traffic Deaths

DECATUR, Aug. 30 (UP)—Two sisters were killed near here yesterday as a traditional birthday observance ended in tragedy.

Mrs. Norma Elizabeth Barnett, who would have been 72 years old today, and her sister, Mrs. A. A. Stripling of Nocona, died in a traffic accident eight miles north of here on Highway 81.

Mrs. Barnett was a granddaughter of the first mayor of Waco, Col. R. N. Gooden, and a resident of Houston for 54 years.

Dr. A. A. Stripling, a Nocona dentist, was hospitalized at Decatur with serious injuries.

The Texas Highway Patrol said the car overturned several times after the dentist passed a truck and apparently struck the front of the larger vehicle as he cut back in.

Mrs. Stripling's birthday was last Sunday and her husband's was on Monday. For years, the couple and Mrs. Barnett have shared their birthday observances.

Doctor and Mrs. Stripling had visited Mrs. Barnett at Houston for several days and the three were en route to Nocona when the accident occurred.

Truman May Use Taft-Hartley To Get Copper Workers On Job

WASHINGTON, Aug. 30 (UP)—President Truman was prepared today to use the Taft-Hartley Act to get striking copper workers back to producing the sorely-needed vital defense metal.

There remained, however, an outside chance that secret negotiations reported last night between the Leftist Mine, Mill and Smelter Workers Union (Ind.), six other unions, and Kennecott Copper Corp. would end in a settlement.

An agreement with Kennecott would mean peace with other strike-bound companies which together produce 95 percent of the nation's copper.

The talks last night were said to have opened shortly before the Wage Stabilization Board reported to Mr. Truman that the mine, mill and smelter workers had rejected its second back-to-work plea.

Mr. Truman already has picked his fact-finding board, it was learned, in case he invokes the Taft-Hartley Act. After that board reported, he could direct the Attorney General to seek a court injunction to stop the strike for 60 days while efforts are made to settle the dispute.

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OPS Announces 6% Adjustment

FORT WORTH, August 30.—The Office of Price Stabilization Sunday announced a 6 per cent adjustment increase to ginners for ginning, bagging and ties. The action is covered by Supplementary Regulation 2 to Ceiling Price Regulation 34. It permits ginners to increase their rates by a flat 6 per cent for ginning, bagging, and ties over rates charged during the 1950 season, rather than using the graduated percentage rates now allowed under Section 8 CPR 34. Also the amended regulation applies to all cotton ginners regardless of the number of employees, whereas, under Section 8 of CPR 34, a distinction is made between services which employ more than or less than seven persons. Any gin that increases its prices under this amendment must report the new price to the Ft. Worth District Office of Price Stabilization, 2900 W. Lancaster, Fort Worth, within 10 days after changing prices.

Baptist Will Have Meeting In Dallas

DALLAS, Aug. 30 — Texas Baptists have set Tuesday, September 4, as check-up time on their 1951 campaign to win 250,000 converts to Christ. Some three to four thousand Baptist form all over the state are expected to attend a special evangelistic conference in Dallas the 4th. The conference is to be held at the First Baptist Church in connection with the regular quarterly meeting of the executive board of the Baptist General Convention of Texas. The evangelistic session has been called by William Fleming, Fort Worth layman president of

the Baptist convention Dr. J. Howard Williams, convention executive secretary, and Dr. C. Wade Freeman, state superintendent of evangelism, both of Dallas. It was Mr. Fleming who first suggested 250,000 objective at the annual meeting of the Baptist convention in Fort Worth last November. The crusade officially began January 1 this year and still will end December 31. Baptist officials say there is no way to estimate how near the goal the denomination has come. However, Dr. Freeman reported that a check on 600 of the 3,000 Baptist churches showed they had baptized more persons in the first six months this year than during all 12 months of 1950. All Baptists have been invited to next Tuesday's conference with emphasis on the attendance of pastors, Sunday School superintendents, Training Union directors, Brotherhood and Woman's Missionary Union presidents, district and associational missionaries.

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The executive board meeting will begin at 9:30 a.m. and close at 11:00 a.m. The evangelistic conference will last from 11:00 to 4:00 p.m. Two recommendations will be made to the group: that September 16 be a special day of prayer and evangelistic effort in all Baptist churches, and that particular emphasis be given to revivals in all churches during the last four months of the year.

Children Should Have Pre-School Physical Check

DALLAS, Aug. 30 (UP) — In a statement directed to boys and girls of school age, William J. Rogers, Regional Director of the Wage-Hour and Public Contracts Divisions of the U. S. Department of Labor here, today urged all young people who have not graduated to return to school this fall.

"Don't short change yourself of your country," he said. "Get all the education you can—stay in school."

Rogers said he realized that pay checks look good to young people who have been working during the summer, but he asked them to look ahead and to realize that education and training are needed now more than ever before. He pointed out that business requires trained men and women, that the Armed Services advise young people to get all the schooling they can, that industry wants skilled technicians, and that modern life itself puts a premium on good education.

He added that Federal Laws make it unlawful to employ children under 16 years of age in interstate commerce or in production of goods for interstate commerce, in most instances. In agriculture it is unlawful to employ children under 16 during school hours if the farm products go into interstate or foreign commerce.

That law, he said, applies equally to local resident children as well as to migratory alien children, but not to the farmer's own children working on their parent's farm.

He explained that "school hours" is meant those hours when school is in session for the district where the child under 16 is currently living. Farmers themselves are responsible, he said, if they employ under-age children during school hours.

Children Urged To Return To Their Studies

AUSTIN, Aug. 30 (UP) — "Children are not really ready to enter school until they have had a complete physical examination," Dr. George W. Cox, State Health Officer reminds parents. "All boys and girls enrolling in the kindergarten or first grade class of Texas schools should be taken to their physicians, or to a public health clinic for an immediate physical check-up if they have not had such an examination in recent months."

"It is important to act as promptly as possible. This is recommended in order to allow time for medical treatments or corrections that may be necessary before school opens. No child should be permitted to begin a school career with less than the best possible physical equipment."

"As most parents know, vaccination against smallpox is necessary. Those who received this immunization in infancy should be vaccinated again in order to assure a high degree of immunity and those who have never received this protection should be vaccinated without delay."

"Diphtheria immunization is also an important safeguard for all boys and girls about to enter school. Those who have never

several days during a peak harvest season it would not be considered as being in session at that time. Furthermore, he said, the Federal law sets no minimum age for the employment of children in agriculture before or after school hours on any school day, or at any time on school holidays, or during school vacations.

But when the bell rings on a regular school day, children of school age are expected to be in school, he said, adding that "we are going to do our best to see that they are not illegally employed and so kept out of school."

been immunized against this disease should receive toxoid shots now. Children who were inoculated against diphtheria when they were babies should now have a "booster dose" in order to maintain their immunity at a sufficiently high level.

"Other immunizations that the individual physician may recommend are also desirable as further health protection. Whooping cough, typhoid fever and tetanus are among the diseases against which the doctor may advise safeguards."

Court Order Stops Sale of Sanger Bros.

RENO, Nev., Aug. 30 (UP)—Sale of Sanger Bros., Inc., large Dallas department store, was temporarily restrained today under terms of an order issued by District Judge A. J. Maestretti.

Stockholder John A. Purse, Jr., of Dallas, filed suit yesterday in district court to block sale tomorrow of the store's assets to Federated Stores. Sangers is incorporated in Nevada.

Attorneys for Sangers promptly petitioned a hearing tomorrow before Maestretti to dissolve the order. Maestretti indicated he would make a prompt decision.

Purse claimed in his suit that Sangers' assets for shares in Federated stores under terms of the proposed agreement would be against the interests of stockholders. He also questioned the legal right of Sangers to dispose of the assets for any value other than money.

Purse owns 11,486 shares of the 237,071 shares issued by Sangers.

Uncle Sam Is Short Pennies

WASHINGTON, Aug. 30 (UP)—Strike out that piggy bank—Uncle Sam hasn't got enough pennies.

Nellie Taylor Ross, director of the mint, said that if every family would put 10 pennies back into circulation, the government would save 1,260 tons of scarce copper and five months' production in U. S. mines.

She said the mints are now working a 60-hour week and can't keep up with the demand caused by "the level of business activity."

In Atlanta, a "penny panic" subsided recently when youngsters emptied their piggy banks in response to pleas from local bankers.

VA Relaxes GI Bill Rules

WASHINGTON, Aug. 30 (UP)—Veterans who finished high school or college under the GI Bill this spring can go on to higher institutions this fall despite the July 25 cut-off date for the GI training program.

Under the GI Bill, the veterans administration said, most veterans not enrolled in school on July 25 lost their right to further training at government expense. Exceptions have been made, however, VA said, for students who had been pursuing their courses satisfactorily and were taking summer vacations at the time of the cut-off.

U of Houston Professor Dies

HOUSTON, Aug. 30 (UP)—Ivan C. R. Stone, 52, assistant professor of government and public administration at the University of Houston, died yesterday at a hospital after a severe heart attack followed by a cerebral hemorrhage.

The retired Army Lieutenant Colonel, a member of the University faculty since 1947, had been critically ill for several days.

His long and colorful career in the military service started when he served as a private under General Pershing in the Mexican Border campaign, in the expedition searching for Pancho Villa.

1950 Rushing Record Set By Border Back

ABILENE, Aug. 30 (UP)—When Whizzer White, Abilene, State of Texas back, set the 1950 rushing record of 1,502 yards, he handed the border conference its fifth national rushing championship.

Halfbacks from Hardin-Simmons, also of the Border Conference, were leaders in 1942, 1946 and 1947.

Fred Wendt, Texas Western

halfback, set the 1948 rushing record when he raced for 1,283 yards.

In 1946 Mobley again led the nation's ball carriers, but failed to do so in 1947. He galloped 1,281 yards to equal his 1942 mark.

Wilton (Hook) Davis, Hardin-Simmons' 1948 All-Southwestern halfback was the national leader in the rushing department in 1947, carrying for 1,173 yards in ten regular-season games, and picking up 236 more against the San Diego State in New York Harbor Bowl contest.

Hardin-Simmons' Camp Wilson, running from a fullback position was third in the nation in 1942. He carried the ball 196 times in nine games for a net of 981 yards an average of 5.01.

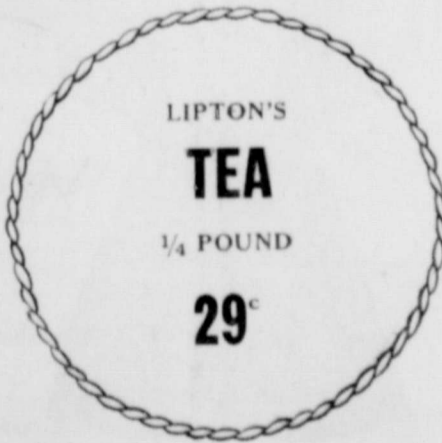

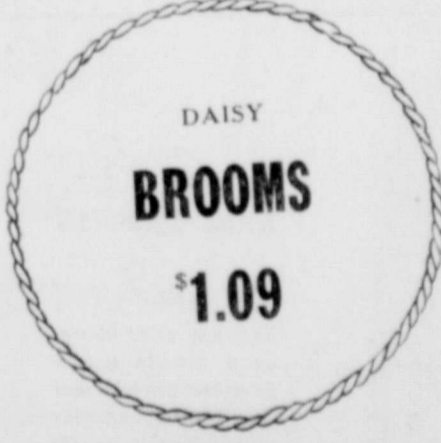

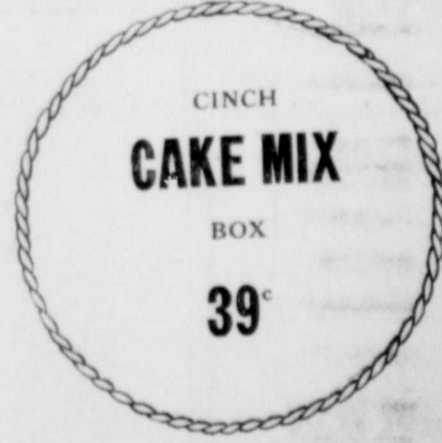

Herbert Hoover Present Day Lawmakers

DES MOINES, Ia., Aug. 30 (UP)—Former president Herbert Hoover said today that "public tolerance of scandalous behavior" in Washington could destroy the nation.

But, he said, there were signs that the nation was returning to a course where "moral indignation" would assert itself.

The nation's only living ex-president spoke at the Iowa State Fair, where he accepted the Iowa award, in recognition of his services to the nation and to the state.

"Our greatest danger is not from invasion by foreign armies, for no army on earth can land on our shores," he said.

"Our dangers are that we may player around now who was on hand when the league was founded.

commit suicide from within by complaisance with evil, or by public tolerance of scandalous behavior. Or by cynical acceptance of dishonor. These evils have defeated nations many times in human history."

Mr. Hoover said the redemption of mankind by America will depend upon our ability to cope with these evils right here at home. The United States, he said, is "turning its face away from the maudlin leftisms."

"We sense the frauds on men's minds and morals," he said. "Moral indignation is on the march again."

Urging a return to the virtues expounded in the ten commandments, Hoover said America currently "has a cancerous growth of intellectual dishonesty in public life which is mostly beyond the law."

"Congress can well widen the laws so as to clutch the new kinds of bribes and benefits they have discovered," he said. "But congress cannot reach intellectual dishonesty. In its frustration, the congress is groping for some sort of code of ethics. But the con-

gress is confronted with the fact that sacred honor cannot always be tested by legality or enforced by law."

Mr. Hoover said that some persons seem to think that political and intellectual dishonesty is a necessary evil in a free government, or that it is smart politics.

"Those are deadly sleeping pills he said. No public man can be just a little crooked. There is no such thing as a no-man's-land between honesty and dishonesty. Our strength is not in politics, prices or production, or price controls. Our strength lies in spiritual concepts, in public sensitivity to evil."

"Turning briefly to the nation's foreign policy, Hoover said that "certain secret commitments were

entered into at Tehran and Yalta which sold the freedom of half-a-billion people down the river."

"Those commitments were not disclosed to the congress or to the American people," Mr. Hoover said. "Does anyone believe that had they been submitted to the American people for debate and

to congress for decision, that they would ever have been approved? That is where we lost the peace and wondered into the land of hot and cold wars."

Yankees Still In Flag Race

NEW YORK, Aug. 30 (UP)—The Yankees may not know whether they are the American league's champions for a third straight year until they have played 27 more games but they have already won permanent possession of Ned Garver, the Browns' star curve-baller.

The junior circuit's race, had that old look—all knotted up—and one good reason is the humidity made the clocks run 15 minutes slow. And condensation inside the elevator signal apparatus prevented operators from hearing floor signals.

Garver retired only one man before the Yankees had pounded him for four hits and five runs. They went on to blast 17 hits, including homers by Mickey Mante and Gil McDougald, as Allie Reynolds breezed to an easy two-hit victory. Reynolds probably would have had a shutout except that catcher Yogi Berra dropped a foul pop fly by Ken Wood just before the Browns outfielder hit a two-run homer in the fourth inning.

The victory was the Yankees' 17th in 20 games with the hapless and helpless Browns and marked the end of the Yankees' fourth and final western trip. They are now in almost exactly the same position as they were last season on the same date when they went on to win the flag. A year ago

they trailed the Tigers by two percentage points.

The national league race remained unchanged as both the Dodgers and Giants won. The Dodgers blasted 16 hits including Gil Hodges' 35th and 36th homers of the season to submerge the Reds, 13 to 1.

Dick Cole won his first big league game on his 21st birthday, although Bob Chipman had to retire the last two hitters, as the Braves beat the Cubs, 4 to 1, and Gerry Staley won his 15th game thanks to fine relief pitching by Harry Brecheen as the Cardinals defeated the Phillies, 3 to 2. Robin Roberts suffered his 12th defeat for the Phillies.

Ted Williams hit his 27th homer as the Red Sox beat the tigers, 7 to 5, and the senators defeated the White Sox, 2 to 1, in 13 innings in other American league games.
