Let's Go Hunting
By Onous Dick
Looking ahead to the coming three-day weekend holiday, the Executive Secretary of the Game & Fish Commission listed some suggestions to Texans planning to take advantage of the north zone dove season beginning Saturday noon.

Besides urging alertness to the ordinary rules of safety, he admonished sportsmen to be extremely careful with fire in the fields or brush country.
"Unless substantial rainfall comes in the drought areas, there will be great danger of damage to property and game stocks from grass and brush fires," said the Executive Secretary.

He went on to observe that the extreme heat, unless broken, may cause heavy losses in spoiled game. It was suggested that harvested doves be picked and drawn as soon as possible.
"Bacteria grows very fast in extremely hot weather and it takes only a short time for game to spoil," he explained.

The executive secretary appealed to sportsmen to safeguard various wildlife species seen on their trips after mourning doves.
"It will be a temptation at times to bang away at a quail or other small game," he said.

He reminded hunters that the dove season this year is limited to afternoons—from noon until sunset—and that the limit is ten per day or ten in possession.

Do You Know That Texas raises more wild turkeys than any other state.

A Federal stamp is not required to hunt doves although they are migratory birds.

The brown pelican is strictly a coastal bird, usually being found within sight of shore.

Texas white-tailed deer seldom weigh more than 100 pounds.

There are more than 600 kinds of earthworms in the world; 90 different kinds in North America.

Rifles as a means of shooting doves or waterfowl are barred under both State and Federal Law.

Texas educational authorities hope to reach school children of all ages with the story of urgent need for wildlife conservation.

History shows that disaster to insectivorous birds invariably precedes insect plagues.

Shore line shrinkage does not necessarily mean better fishing although fish are concentrated in a smaller area. This is because the smaller fish are easier prey for the larger fishes which feed upon them.

Accountant Is Charged With \$250,000 Fraud

NEW YORK, Aug. 30 (UP)—Maurice Smith, an accountant, was arrested and charged with a \$250,000 tax fraud yesterday after he testified for two days before a subcommittee of the House Ways and Means committee investigating administration of the Internal Revenue laws.

Saypol said Smith was charged with filing a false affidavit in an attempt to defraud the government of more than \$250,000 in taxes on behalf of Patullo Modes Inc. and five individuals.

"Bread Madness" Cause Found

PONT-SAINT-ESPRIT, France, Aug. 31 (UP)—Officials announced today that an outbreak of ergot poisoning, the first in nearly 900 years, caused the "bread madness" which took four lives and terrorized this town's 4,400 inhabitants.

The poisoning, they said, was caused by ergot, a fungus disease which attacks wheat and other grains. The disease prospers in wet weather.

The diagnosis was made by professor Jean Oliver, chief of a marseilles laboratory, and announced in Paris.

Identity Of Dalton Still An Issue

STANTON, MO., Aug. 31 (UP)—The identity of the late J. Frank Dalton as oldtime bandit Jesse James remained an issue today when a \$10,000 reward was offered for disproving Dalton's claim.

Dalton died recently in Granbury, Tex., at the reported age of 107, still claiming to be the notorious Missouri train robber. Rudy Turilli of Meramec Caverns, a one-time James' gang hide out now set up as a tourist attraction, said he would pay the reward to anyone who can prove that Dalton "was not the original Jesse Woodson James."

Turilli said he traveled more than 90,000 miles during the past two years seeking to establish Dalton's claim. He said he talked to old time members of the gang ranging in age from 90 to 112 years. They positively identified Dalton as James, he said.

Dalton claimed the man killed by Bob Ford on April 3, 1882, at St. Joseph, Mo., actually was Charlie Bigelow, and James went free to become an Oklahoma legislator and still later a school teacher.

Expelled Cadets, Pollard, Blaik Choose Careers

WEST POINT, N. Y., Aug. 31 (UP)—Two of Army's dismissed football stars made different decisions today—Al Pollard agreeing to play pro ball with New York grid Yanks and Bob Blaik choosing to enter Colorado College.

Pollard, on his way to Ripon, Wis., to join the Yanks in training, said he had signed with them on Aug. 17. His salary was estimated at \$7,000.

"Since the Yanks drafted me originally," he said, "I decided to live up to the contract and give them the very best I can. I hope I can make their team and I'm pretty sure I can, even though I know pro ball is a lot different from college ball."

Pollard, the only one of the dismissed West Pointers who was eligible to play pro ball, was Army's leading scorer last year with 83 points.

Blaik, Army's first string quarterback last year and son of West Point football coach Earl (Red) Blaik, said he would like to enter Colorado College, providing he can pass the academic requirements.

Condemned Man Gets 3 Day Stay

AUSTIN, Aug. 31 (UP)—Gov. Allan Shivers granted a three-day stay of execution yesterday for Bob Wall, sentenced to death from Waco for murder. The stay extends the execution date from Sunday, Sept. 16 until the following Wednesday.



Dewey Addresses Foreign Veterans

NEW YORK, Aug. 31 (UP)—Gov. Thomas E. Dewey said that the United States should draw a line in the Pacific and "tell Moscow: Beyond that line you shall not go."

Dewey, who arrived here last night after a 45,000 mile Pacific tour, made a report on his trip to the 52nd annual encampment of the veterans of foreign wars.

"The time has come," Dewey told the veterans, "for us to stop dealing with Asia in bits and pieces as we have done in dealing with our problems in Europe. We cannot treat individually with nations in that vast area. Our 150,000,000 people would not survive long in a sea of 2,000,000,000 Communists."
