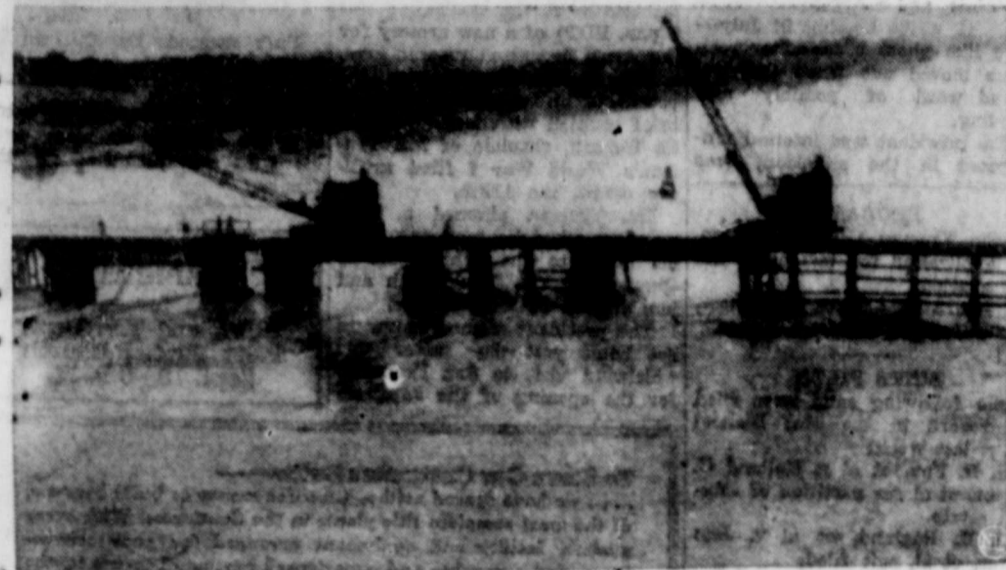

## Chinese Troops And Russian Made Tanks Hit Allied Lines

**8TH ARMY HEADQUARTERS** Korea, Sept. 6 (UP)—Chinese troops and Russian-made tanks smashed three miles into Allied lines on Korea's western front today in an ominous thrust down the classic invasion route toward Seoul. It was possibly the first move of the awaited all-out Red offensive.

A force of 2,500 Chinese, backed up by two full Chinese divisions in the immediate area and thousands of Soviet "puppet" troops a few miles to the west, cut off one American unit which was fighting back to UN lines as night came.

The attack moved down a broad valley west of Yonchon, 35 miles north of Seoul, then swung over the bordering ridge line to the east to cut behind Allied forces holding the northern-most positions of the UN line. An Allied armored column twice ran a gauntlet of heavy enemy fire to reach the surrounded outfit and bring back its wounded.

The attack was the first by either side on the quiet western front since before the truce talks began July 10.

By nightfall Thursday the enemy attack had been slowed. A UN officer on the suddenly flaming front said the cut-off force was strong enough to beat off further attacks.

## TRUMAN WILL INSPECT NEW FLOOD THREAT WHILE HOME

**KANSAS CITY, MO., Sept. 6 (UP)**—President Truman, worried over new flood threats in Kansas and Missouri, scheduled a personal tour today of the danger area still sodden and mudladen from the disastrous torrents of last July.

The chief executive, who arrived yesterday for a five-day visit at his home in Independence, called together top local and federal flood experts for a close-up inspection of the low-lying area threatened anew by rising waters.

Mr. Truman particularly wanted to see the multi-million dollar flood relief program in action.

After luncheon in the White House suite of the Muehlebach Hotel in downtown Kansas City, the president planned to motor through the Kansas and Missouri lands bordering the Kaw River.

# Russia Suffers First Loss Of Veto At Peace Conference

## FIRST ATOMIC AIRPLANE IS IN THE DRAFTING STAGE

**WASHINGTON, Sept. 6 (UP)**—The world's first atomic plane—a sky giant that may dwarf the B-36 bomber—now is taking shape on the drawing boards of General Electric engineers at Fort Worth.

"The whole project is top secret," said Arthur C. Eosenberg, manager of Convair's Fort Worth Division. "There isn't much more to say."

The Air Force's announcement yesterday that the aircraft corporation has been given a contract to build the atomic plane's body was somewhat belated.

Authoritative quarters said that Convair was picked as long ago as last February for the challenging undertaking and preliminary planning is underway.

The designs are far enough along to require close cooperation between Convair, General Electric Co., which has been working on the atomic engine, the Air Force and the Atomic Energy Commission.

After five years of preliminary research, top atomic and aircraft experts are convinced that the plane can be built, and that it will be capable of flying non-stop around the world at incredible speed.

They don't know yet how long it will take to complete it, but few expect the flight-testing to take place before 1955 or 1956.

Thus the atomic plane is far behind the atomic submarine, which is already being built at Groton, Conn., and may be launched within two years or less.

Together, the atomic-powered craft will revolutionize air and sea warfare. Their great advantage will be almost unlimited range.

## RIDGWAY DEMANDS NEW SITE FOR CEASE-FIRE CONFERENCE

**TOKYO, Sept. 6 (UP)**—Gen. Matthew B. Ridgway demanded a new Korean cease-fire conference site tonight and told the Reds to halt their "constant deceit" unless they want to break off the talks for good.

The United Nations supreme commander threw back at the Reds as "false and malevolent" their charges that UN forces had violated Kaesong's neutrality. The Reds themselves, he said, manufactured the evidence and he called in the name of the UN for an end to "these despicable practices which have received worldwide condemnation."

Ridgway's message to North Korean Premier Gen. Kim Il Sung and Communist Chinese Gen. Peng Teh Hui was viewed as a "put up or shut up" challenge to get the cease-fire talks going again if the Reds really want to end the war.

"That you should permit the forces of your side to indulge in their constant deceit and invective is incomprehensible," Ridgway's message said, "unless you have the ulterior motive of com-

## Conference Way Ahead Of The Schedule; Signing Saturday

**SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 6 (UP)**—The 52-nation peace conference today moved ahead of schedule with machine precision toward weekend signing of the Japanese peace treaty with vetoless Andrei Gromyko prevented from filibustering by war rules.

The Kremlin representative shot his wad during initial sessions and found himself helpless to obstruct Allied progress for the first time at a post-war international parley.

From Secretary of State Dean

Acheson on down, the American delegation was surprised that the conference was far ahead of schedule. U. S. officials predicted the treaty would be signed Saturday by all nations except Russia, Poland, Czechoslovakia and, perhaps, Indonesia.

This surprise and optimism was clouded, however, by pessimism over what the Soviets and their Communist allies may be cooking up for retaliation against their rough treatment here. Some experts believed Red guns, planes and tanks might launch a new offensive in Korea.

While Gromyko made it clear that the Communists threathome at the conference would not sign the present Japanese treaty, Mexico, the Dominican Republic, Bolivia and Chile spoke for the treaty. El Salvador, Norway, Haiti, Nicaragua, Egypt, Laos, Ceylon, Pakistan, France and the Philippines were to notify the conference today of their plans to sign the pact. And some of these nations will speak for others.

Gromyko had his day yesterday and he didn't get to first base despite help from Poland and Czechoslovakia.

At the morning session, the Kremlin agent lost his fight to get unlimited debate and to bring Red China to the peace table. The conference ruled 48 to 3 for a set of rules allowing each country only one hour to talk.

Gromyko came back quickly with his speech. He rejected the American-British treaty, a 13 amendment to the western treaty and was told they would not even be considered.

Most delegates thought the Russians were trying to set the stage for a new peace conference to be attended by the Soviet Union, Red China, India, Burma, and Indonesia—if it does not sign here.

Gromyko will be heard from again before he walks out during or after the final conference session. But he had suffered Russia's first major post-war defeat at a conference table. He lost the veto.

**Civil Service Examination For Medical Officer**

The U. S. Civil Service Commission has announced new examinations for Medical Officer, to fill the following positions in St. Elizabeths Hospital, Washington, D. C.: Rotating Intern, \$2,200 a year; Psychiatric Resident, \$3,400 to \$4,200 a year; Surgical Resident, \$4,200 to \$4,700 a year; and General Practice Resident, \$3,400 to \$4,800 a year.

To qualify for these positions, all applicants must have had appropriate education in an approved medical school. Applicants for psychiatric, surgical, and general practice resident must also have completed a 1-year internship. In addition, applicants for surgical resident appointments must have completed a 2-year residency in surgery. No written test will be required. The maximum age limit is 35 years.

Further information about this examination may be obtained from the Commission's Local Secretary, Mr. O. L. McDonald located at local post office from Civil Service regional offices, or from the U. S. Civil Service Commission, Washington 25, D. C. Applications will be accepted until further notice by the Committee of Expert Examiners, St. Elizabeths Hospital, Washington 25, D. C.

The Civil Service also announces an examination for filling vacancies in the position of Nurse at entrance salaries ranging from \$3100 to \$3825 per annum. Employment will be with various Federal agencies in the State of Texas. Application forms and additional information may be secured from the post office or from the Regional Director, Fourteenth U. S. Civil Service Region, 210 South Harwood Street, Dallas, Texas.

### Rapist Declared Sane By Doctor

AUSTIN, Sept. 6 (UP)—A Texas prison system psychiatrist believes Billie George McCune, facing execution Sept. 26 for the rape of a Fort Worth housewife, is sane.

Dr. C. A. Shaw reported to the three-man state board of pardons and paroles yesterday that McCune "appears to be well oriented and well aware of his surroundings. He talks in a sane and coherent manner and is able to discuss his situation."

The psychiatrist said that the 23-year-old former sailor is "of low mentality," but he added that McCune is "well able to distinguish between right and wrong and the nature and consequences of his acts."

McCune was convicted of criminally assaulting a woman on a Ft. Worth parking lot on Feb. 3, 1950. On Feb. 16 of this year, while held in the Tarrant County Jail at Ft. Worth, McCune obtained a razor blade and served his sex organ from his body.

Three attorneys and a child welfare worker pleaded before the board yesterday that this act alone would indicate his insanity and merit commutation of the death sentence.

Those urging clemency were George Trenary and Charles Murray of Fort Worth, court-appointed attorneys; Douglas Boyd, Waco attorney who said he was volunteering his services without payment, and Miss Emaline Bryant, a Waco social service worker.

McCune, they testified, spent five and one-half years in the first grade and was later committed to a state institution for the feeble-minded.

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**Dr. Acquitted Of Manslaughter**

MUSKOGEE, Okla., Sept. 6 (UP)—Dr. Perry A. A. Hewitt, Jr., prominent brain specialist cleared of manslaughter charges in the death of a woman patient, said today he would resume his \$40,000-a-year practice.

Hewitt said he would rest a few days and then reopen his office.

Charges that the 40-year-old physician drunkenly injected drugs into Mrs. Allen Shuler, 38, were dropped yesterday after five doctors testified at a preliminary hearing that they didn't know what caused the death.

Several witnesses at the hearing testified they considered Hewitt drunk when they talked to him a short time after Mrs. Shuler collapsed.

One said Hewitt told him: "I'm drunker'n hell."

Hewitt admitted on the stand he tried to give the Berger woman a shot of gin after he injected intracaine in her neck and she collapsed.

He said Mrs. Shuler, who was visiting Muskogee relatives, came to his office Aug. 8 and complained of severe headaches. He decided to give her a hypodermic injection of intracaine.

"I had put in three or four drops and she seemed to change her position some," he said. "She collapsed" after a few more drops were injected.

"This occurred so suddenly that as she slumped, the needle bent," he said.

The silver-haired specialist said he tried to revive Mrs. Shuler with caffeine, coramine and metrazol, but none of the drugs was effective.

"I ordered a pint of gin and gave her approximately a dram. But it did nothing but run out the corner of her mouth."

Mrs. Shuler was removed to a hospital. She never regained consciousness and died Aug. 9, 17 hours after being treated.

Dr. Paul Whitman, a dentist, was one of those who said Hewitt appeared intoxicated.

"His eyes seemed to have a glassy look," Whitman said.

"He turned to me and said, 'I'm drunker'n hell,'" Whitman added.

Dr. W. N. Weaver testified he talked with Hewitt several hours after Mrs. Shuler was stricken. Weaver said Hewitt was intoxicated.

City Judge J. F. Beavers ordered the charges dropped after he conducted the hearing. He said he believed Hewitt became intoxicated after treating Mrs. Shuler.
