### RJC "RANGERS" OPEN SEASON TONIGHT AGAINST DECATUR

The Ranger Junior College "Rangers" play host to the Decatur Baptist College team from Decatur at 8:00 p. m.

The team from Decatur defeated the Rangers last year by one point. The visitors are reputed to have a first class ball club for this year, due to the large number of returning squadmen from last year's team.

Both of the Rangers coaches believe that they have the team that can defeat Decatur if the club will play good clean ball. The College team was given a light workout, without pads, yesterday as the final work before the game.

The probable starting offensive line-up will see Buddy Hamrick of Ranger weighing 168, at Quarterback; Kenneth Burton, Houston, 206, at fullback; Caddo Sanders, Hulsboro, 145, at half back; and Rusty Talbot of Electro, 160, at the other half back post.

In the line on offense will be Tommy Wilson, Graham, 175, at end; Leon Jones, Wodson, 178, end; Jimmie Jones, Comanche, 185, tackle; Gene Gilly, Weatherford, 230, tackle; Earl Keller, Mineral Wells, 180, guard; Joe Angel, Birdville, 185, guard; and Jerry Compton, Graham, 190, will be at the center position for the Rangers.

Coming in on the defensive play for Ranger will be Walter Matthews, Electra, 165, back; Wayne Morrow, Rotan, 185, tackle; and Bobby Gene Boynton, Quanah, 175, center. These defensive men will replace the offensive men as linebackers. Burton will shift to left end on defense and Boynton will replace him as center, with the other two backing the line.

### Bobby Matthews Returned Home

Bobby Matthews, son of Mr. and Mrs. Fred Matthews of Olden, formerly of Ranger, who has been in Hendricks and Gonzales Hospitals with polio the past year has been returned to his home.

Bobby was three in February and was stricken with polio on July 17, 1950. He first went to Hendricks Memorial Hospital in Abilene and was then transferred several months later to Gonzales.

Mr. and Mrs. Matthews were living in Ranger when their son first contracted polio, but when they were told that they would be able to bring him home, they moved from Ranger to Olden to a larger home. They now reside near the warning light at Olden.

Bobby is recovering well from the effects of polio, he is able to walk with the aid of crutches and assistance. He has gained weight and strength in his recovery.

### Man Kills His Nephew; Dumps Body In Creek

LONGVIEW, Sept. 13 (UP)—Earl Benjamin Pollick, 200-pound Lubbock fry cook, was under charges of murder today after admitting he had beaten his 130-pound nephew, then dumped his body into waist-deep water in Cypress Creek in Harrison County.

The charges were filed yesterday shortly after Pollick led officers to the place where he had thrown Archie Burk, 27, the father of four small children. Burke's wife was Pollick's niece.

Pollick was arrested near Alto yesterday several hours after residents in the Lafano community north of here had reported an early-morning fight "between a large man and a small one."

The interior of Pollick's car was splattered with blood which matched that found in pools at the fight scene.

Pollick admitted the beating after hours of questioning but Sheriff Noble Crawford said he had learned no motive for the killing.

### Hit And Run Killer Reports Himself To Cops

GALVESTON, Sept. 13 (UP)—Detective Chief Willie Burns said today that a Galveston man, who had been sought for 18 hours in the traffic death of an Indian merchant seaman, voluntarily surrendered late yesterday.

Chief Burns said Donald J. Lane, a grain inspector for Galveston wharves, came to police headquarters with his attorney, Marsene Johnson, and said the car involved was the one for which police were searching.

The dead seaman was Mozammel Ali, a British citizen serving aboard the SS Lloyd George. His body was found late Tuesday night. Nearby a headlight, torn from a car, was found by police.

### No More Public Dining At NTSC

DENTON, Sept. 13 (P)—Public dining at North Texas State College will be eliminated, following complaints by Denton cafe owners of unfair competition.

The policy change was announced by Dr. J. C. Matthews, NTSC president, after a conference with restaurant representatives who charged dining halls at NTSC and Texas State College for Women gave reduced rates to service and civic clubs.

Hereafter, service in the NTSC dining hall will be limited to students and their guests, faculty members and guests, college guests, and college-sponsored activities.

Restaurant owners said they hoped to confer on the matter soon with the president of TSCW.

### Reds Hurl More Accusations At United Nations Armies

TOKYO, Sept. 13 (UP)—The Communist radio bombarded the United Nations today with new charges to keep alive Red allegations of Kaesong neutrality violations and gave no sign of desire to get the cease-fire talks started again.

There was nothing conciliatory about the broadcasts. But no official Communist reaction came to yesterday's UN apology for the accidental strafing of Kaesong by a UN plane.

On its part, the UN made no comment on the Communist command's rejection of Gen. Matthew B. Ridgway's proposal to pick a new site for the cease-fire talks.

It was felt here that two moves were now possible to get the talks resumed:

Ridgway could send a new message to the Reds asking that the talks be resumed at Kaesong since the Communists do not want another site, or the Reds might feel the UN apology for one of 11 Communist-claimed neutrality violations is face-saving enough to let them agree to their suspension of the negotiations.

If both sides stand where they are now—as seems likely—the Reds probably will continue to make propaganda out of the incidents they claim and the UN's one admitted attack on Kaesong.

In that case the Korean war is expected to explode into all-out fury.

The Chinese Communist radio claimed the 8th Army was "openly inviting war" by its series of "General Ridgway admits this strafing," the broadcast said, "but every plane that has invaded the skies over Kaesong and bombed and strafed the area is an American craft."

Other Red broadcasts attacked Ridgway's note admitting the Kaesong strafing, degrading which quoted Communist correspondent Wilfred Burchett of the Paris newspaper Ce Soir. Burchett charged that Ridgway had sent "insulting denials and rejections" of the Communist protests of neutrality violations and "has ordered the Air Force to carry out further incidents."

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### Negro Killed As Car Falls Two Floors

FORT WORTH, Sept. 13 (UP)—A garage employe plunged to death last night when he drove an automobile into an open elevator shaft, apparently believing the elevator car was waiting when he entered.

Robert Holt, 39, was pinned in the wreckage of the auto when it crashed atop the elevator two floors below. He died three hours after the fall as rescuers attempted to extricate him.

Holt remained conscious most of the time as firemen, policemen and metal workers toiled to remove him from the late-model auto draped over a beam on the elevator roof.

"Get a jack and get this car off of me," Holt pleaded with a reporter. "Oh Lord, get me out of here."

A doctor injected a narcotic into the Negro to relieve his suffering. Holt lapsed into unconsciousness and died a short time later.

R. C. Knight, operator of the Winfield Garage, said Holt was bringing the auto from the fourth floor to make a delivery.

The gate on the freight-type elevator was up and Holt apparently thought the lift was in place. Two-foot skid marks in front of the shaft entrance indicated he discovered, too late, that the shaft was empty.

The auto turned a flip as it hurtled down the shaft. It landed on its top and bent into a "U". Rescuers hoisted the wreckage from atop the elevator four hours after the plunge and removed Holt's body.

Another employe, Jessie Rowlin, 24, was sitting in an automobile inside the elevator car when Holt's auto crashed. Rowlin was not hurt.

### Allies Ban Czech Liners

FRANKFURT, Germany, Sept. 13 (UP)—Allied occupation authorities have banned all flights by Czechoslovak air liners over Western Germany, it was announced today in what was believed to be a retaliation for the imprisonment of American newspaperman William N. Oatis.

The ban, imposed by order of the United States, British and French high commissioners, was made effective at midnight Tuesday. The Czechoslovak Communist government was notified of the ban Monday, it was disclosed.

There were hints also that the return of a Czech engineer train, which a Czech engineer drove across the border into the American occupation zone in Germany, might be delayed in connection with the Oatis case.

Oatis, an Associated Press correspondent, is under a 10-year prison sentence as a "spy."

It had been forecast that the plane ban would be imposed unless the Czechs freed Oatis. It means that Czech air lines will have no direct access to any country in Western Europe.

American officials refused to comment on the ban, and there was no official admission that the delay in returning the "refugee" train was part of a campaign to put pressure on the Czechs to free Oatis.

Two youths arrested yesterday as suspects in a \$12,000 bank robbery at Boyd were cleared of the crime when bank employes failed to identify them late yesterday.

William E. Holland, 19, and Homer Strickland, 18, both of Fort Worth, remained in custody, however, because they admitted three minor burglaries.

Failure to connect the pair with the Tuesday holdup at Boyd left officers without a "live" lead in the investigation.

## UN Gains Up To Five Miles

### Courtesy Meter For Ranger Has Been Approved

For the benefit of those who forget to watch the time on the parking meters, a courtesy meter has been approved by the city commission.

The purpose of the courtesy meter is to allow you to avoid a dollar fine by putting five cents in a special meter at the city hall, within one hour after the ticket was written.

The tickets issued by the police department for over-parking, from now on, will be marked with the time issued. The courtesy period expires one hour from the time marked on the tickets.

All parking tickets not paid within one hour at the courtesy meter will be assessed the usual fine of one dollar. City Secretary Lester Crowley said that the tickets that are not paid either by the courtesy method or by regular fine will be strictly enforced and the full extent of the law used to collect the fines.

Mr. James underwent surgery a week ago and appeared to be recovering when he suffered a heart attack Tuesday.

R. D. James attended the funeral, but Mrs. Matthews did not get to go because of illness in her family.

### New Dallas Church Gets Noted Pastor

FORT WORTH, Sept. 13 (UP)—An instructor in Greek and New Testament history at Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary here will become pastor of the newly organized Welsh Baptist Church in Dallas. He is Rev. Huber L. Drumsright, a graduate of Baylor and of the Seminary.

Attending the convention are delegates from more than 200 local unions in approximately 30 states and six Canadian provinces from coast to coast.

### Nationwide Search For Gambler Ends At Atlantic Race Track

NEW YORK, Sept. 13 (UP)—Big shot gambler Harry Gross said today he was "a bit upset" by anonymous death threats against his wife and children when he decided to flee town as the state's key witness in a \$1,000,000 bribery trial of 18 policemen.

"Regarding the threatening letters," Gross said, "I was a bit upset. But I told my wife there was nothing to worry about and I walked out the front door. I didn't know where the cops were that were supposed to be guarding me."

The former head of \$20,000,000-a-year Brooklyn gambling syndicate set off a nationwide search yesterday. He had strolled out of his Long Island home Tuesday night, eluding "protective custody" detectives and speeding off in a big convertible.

The dark-haired, 35-year-old gambler was found yesterday at the Atlantic City racetrack in New Jersey where he had been playing the horses all afternoon while Brooklyn detectives sweated out his search. Gross, whose monogrammed tie clasp gave him away to track police, was returned here this morning by FBI agents and Brooklyn district attorney Miles McDonald.

The gambler, who has been on \$25,000 bond awaiting sentence after pleading guilty to 65 counts of gambling and one of conspiracy, will be arraigned on the federal charge of flight of a witness. It was expected authorities would recommend that he be jailed without bail to prevent another escape.

McDonald admitted that if Gross hadn't been found it would have meant the end of his case against the 18 police officers the gambler has admitted paying off for protection for his syndicate.

"I am terrifically relieved," McDonald said. "If we hadn't found him it was 20 months work out the window."

Gross said he hadn't intended to go away forever. "I wanted to get away for a few days," Gross said, and play a few horses. I got fed up having two cops around all the time—it got embarrassing."

### Gains Bring Allies Close To Red Strongpoints Of Supply

8TH ARMY HEADQUARTERS Korea, Sept. 13 (UP)—United Nations troops closed in on a Communist stronghold commanding Red supply lines to the central front today as they burned and blasted their way up to five miles deeper into North Korea.

The central front drive gained 1 and one half miles and swept up four hills while U. S. Marines on the eastern sector burned stubborn Reds off a key ridge-line and two hills with flame throwers and point-blank tank fire. A five mile advance was made on the western front.

The capture of the four hills brought the UN troops close to a strategic enemy concentration guarding the main Communist supply routes from supply areas to the front. There was no estimate of Red strength in the

mountain area controlling routes south from the enemy supply bases of Pyongyang and Kumsong.

Perfect weather brought the war's greatest night air assault, ending at dawn today, and the Reds threw their Russian-made jets against UN fighters again for the sixth consecutive day. A propeller-driven UN F-51 Mustang was shot down by three Communist jets in Thursday's first air combat. The Air Force said there was no chance the pilot survived.

On Wednesday's air battle, three Communist jets were damaged and one American F-84 Thunderjet was shot down—but the pilot was saved.

Night fighters and bombers made 119 sorties through the night—four more than the previous record—and boosted the arm's 18-day toll of Red supply vehicles to 8,853 destroyed or damaged.

The Reds threw more than 75 jets into the air Wednesday. In the main skirmish over Sunan, above Pyongyang, 30 U. S. Thunderjets and 35 MIG-15s fought for a half hour at altitudes ranging from near ground level to 30,000 feet. The U. S. pilot who parachuted from his plane was promptly picked up a rescue plane.

Thirty F-86 Sabrejets sweeping MIG Alley intercepted 30 MIGs trying to streak south from their Manchurian sanctuary. The Reds turned and fled back across the Yalu to avoid combat. Two other MIGs made an "ineffective" attack on F-80 Shooting Star jets bombing rail targets near Sonchon in northwest Korea and another flight of MIGs approached over P-80's but did not attack.

The only enemy plane reaching the front was one single-engine plane which dropped three hand grenades behind UN lines near Kumsong.

North and northeast of Kumsong, UN infantrymen smashed ahead from 2,500 to 2,800 yards. They captured a 1,500 foot peak in a 16 hour and 25 minute battle up the slopes through thick mud, took a 1,700 foot hill nearby after an 8 hour and 15 minute struggle and stormed two others against only light resistance.

Allied fighter-bombers poured rockets in to the enemy hilltop positions, then covered them with blazing napalm to help the UN advance. Fifty-four big allied guns hammered for hours at the rock bunkers and cave entrenchments before the UN troops won their objectives.

Marines on the eastern front inched relentlessly up two hills through a tough Communist defense line. Point-blank tank fire and deadly flame throwers were turned on the dug-in Reds until the liquid fire drove them screaming from their holes or burned them to death.

On the western front, west of Korangpo, attacking UN troops drove five miles forward "to take the kink out of the line" against little or no opposition. Large numbers of Communist troops were spotted and artillery fire was poured in on them.

The gains north of Kumsong netted a big store of enemy mortars, machine guns, Russian rifles and 3,000 hand grenades. On one of the four hills, 231 dead Reds were counted and 54 prisoners were taken.

The Army disclosed Thursday that the Allies had withdrawn from two commanding mountain peaks south of Pyongyang Tuesday. The move was planned and there was no enemy action. The Reds first took the hills Sept. 7, and the UN recaptured them in bloody fighting Sept. 10. Before withdrawing the Allies destroyed Red bunkers and carted away four truckloads of enemy war equipment.

### Georgia Tech Warned To Clean House

ATLANTA, GA., Sept. 13 (UP) — Officials at Georgia and Georgia Tech today were warned to clean house by the state board of regents, who deplored the "exaggerated" help offered athletics by the two senior colleges.

In a resolution adopted by the regents, both schools were admonished to correct a "bad situation" in their grants-in-aid programs.

Other regents, the system authorities indicated they were ready to take formal action, possibly to the extreme of ending grants and other expensive facets of big-time football.

In offering the resolution, regent Sandy Deaver said: "Under the present system, athletes are looked upon as a stable of fine horses. But it can be worked into a dignified proposition if handled correctly."

NEW YORK, Sept. 13 (UP) — There's not much chance of anybody paying attention to baseball today after the big Ray Robinson-Randy Turpin fight, but this has to do with a couple of ball clubs that don't have much chance anyway—the Red Sox and the Giants.

Still you can't count 'em out. Things certainly went their way yesterday and as long as miracles do occur, just take a look at their chances. The Red Sox picked up a big half game yesterday by going out and winning a tight, 2 to 1, decision over the Tigers in 10 innings and they now trail league leading Cleveland by 4 1/2 games and the runner-up Yankee by 3 1/2.

The Giants didn't even have to flex one muscle to pick up half a game on the Dodgers. They were rained out in St. Louis while the sixth place Reds befriended them and defeated the Braves, 6 to 3, on Lloyd Merriam's three-run triple in the seventh inning. That left Brooklyn 2 1/2 games to good and kept their magic number at 11, meaning that any combination of 11 Dodger victories and Giants defeats, clinches the flag.

Don't anyone tell them different, let them find out the hard way Friday night, that they are making a mistake.

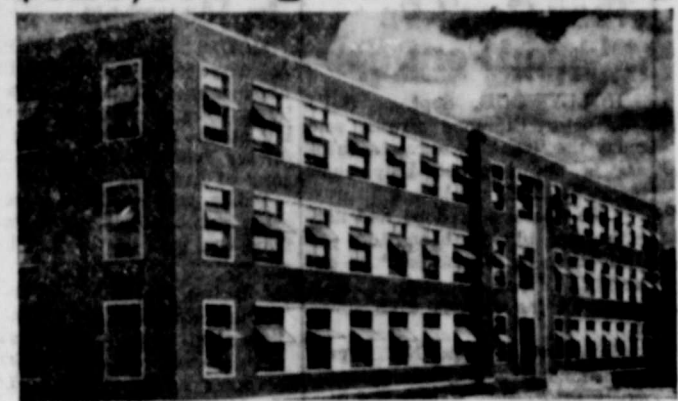

### Service Takes Over Two More Systems

TULSA, OKLA. — Service Pipe Line Co. September 1 took over operation of two West Texas crude oil gathering systems it obtained from Magnolia Pipe Line Co. and B. C. Pipe Line Co., C. M. Scott, Tulsa general manager, said today.

The system formerly owned by Magnolia Pipe Lines serves the Dean (West Levelland) area. It includes approximately 25 miles of 2 to 4 inch pipe connecting 94 wells on 22 leases producing approximately 1,600 barrels of oil daily, subject to Texas Railroad Commission allowances.

Purchased from B. C. Pipe Line Co. are gathering facilities connecting the Yellowhouse pool in Hockley county with the Consumers Cooperative refinery at Levelland. The facilities consist of approximately 20 miles of 6 and 4 inch pipe and handle about 950 barrels of oil daily from 17 leases, subject to allowances.

## HEALTH TALKS

Carbohydrates, the fast burning fuel of the body, are allowed in a reducing diet of 1500 calories not only for energy but also to fill you up, since they are good appetite-satisfiers. And the more carbohydrates in a food, the more satisfying that food is.

Take potatoes, for instance. They come under the heading of 20 per cent carbohydrate vegetables because after you take about 75 per cent off for the water in the potato and two per cent off for the protein in a potato, you have 20 per cent of that potato left which is carbohydrate.

One-half cup of potato or one medium sized potato will weigh in at about 100 calories. That is the daily allowance of potato on this 1500-calorie diet. Since the diet is also computed on a budget basis of \$1.50, that potato will cost 10 cents on the diet.

There are substitutes for the

potato, if you like, a half-cup of noodles, macaroni, rice, spaghetti, green corn or shelled beans. If you add butter or cheese to any of those 20 percenters, that comes off your fat allowance or your milk product allowance.

It really isn't so complicated. It just takes a moment of thought. One teaspoon of butter would mean you have four left for other purposes during the day and a one-inch cube of cheese would cost "8 cents" of your "33 cents budget" for milk and milk products, as would a fruit-juice glass of milk. If you use milk and cheese both to cook your macaroni, then knock off 16 cents from your milk budget on the basis of a inch-cube of grated cheese and a 4-ounce glass of fresh whole milk.

But don't knock off the potato or potato substitute. That 10 cents is supposed to be spent for that purpose in order to include the daily essential foods.

One of the best ways to get variety into a reducing diet is to use the three per cent carbohydrate vegetables, which includes most of the salad ingredients, in a combination salad. Three leaves of lettuce, five slices of cucumber five radishes, one-fourth of a medium sized tomato and a stalk of celery would leave you one cent of your five cent allowance for vegetables. You could add

vinegar to such a salad at no calorie cost, or you could add mayonnaise, salad dressing or salad oil at the cost of some of your butter allowance for the day.

These vegetables fit not only into a reducing diet but are also part of the basic seven foods which are required by everyone every day for good nutrition. The fact that only 5 cents or 50 calories of the \$1.50 or 1500 calorie diet is allotted doesn't mean the vegetables are unimportant; you just get more for your diet money as far as vegetables are concerned.

The six per cent carbohydrate vegetables would be in your 5 cents allotment according to the following proportions:

Fresh beets, steamed and diced, one half cup, 5 cents; canned beets, 4 cents; half cup carrots, 3 cents; half cup kohlrabi, 2-1/2 cents; one medium sized raw onion, 3 cents; half cup pumpkin, 3 cents; and half cup turnip, 2-1/2 cents.

Here, again, salads are the answer to variety for the meal, whether the vegetables are three percenters or six percenters. In preparing a salad, the simplest way of computing would be to make a big batch, counting the caloric value of the whole thing, and serve it in equal portions to dieters or non-dieters alike, dividing the calories by the number of portions.

Careful planning should result in a meal regime that would allow a vegetable salad for supper, say, while another vegetable plus potato is served with the main meal of the day; the salad at the main meal could come from the fruit allowance.

The Chief Clerk of the Game and Fish Commission announced Saturday that drawings for the 1951 antelope hunt will be made in the Commission offices in Austin next week.

He said 536 permits will be issued for the nine-day season on prehorned antelope. Each entitles the holder to one male antelope.

The Commission decided 536 of the fleet West Texas game animals could be harvested on the basis of a recent herd survey.

The 1951 hunt will be conducted in three consecutive periods beginning October 1 and ending October 9. The hunt is closely supervised.

The Chief Clerk said the names of each person filling out a \$5 application will be placed in a capsule. The capsules will be drawn out of a container at a public drawing. The name of the person inside will be recorded as they are drawn.

The Chief Clerk pointed out that persons who got a 1950 antelope license but could not make the trip and then returned the permit in time for it to be re-issued, automatically get licenses this year.

First priority in the drawing will go to Texans who have never had an antelope permit. Second choice will go to hunters who last had an antelope shooting license in 1948. After that comes persons under 18 years of age, non-residents and those who hunted antelope last year.

**Civil Service Exams Given To Fill Vacancies**

The United States Civil Service Commission today announced a new examination for filling positions in all branches of engineering. The salaries range from \$2,100 to \$10,000 a year. The positions are located in Washington, D. C., and vicinity. Sanitary engineer positions in the United States Public Health Service throughout the country will also be filled.

Applicants will not be required to take a written test. To qualify for the \$2,100 jobs, they must have completed a professional engineering course leading to a bachelor's degree, or they must have had 4 years of technical engineering experience. Students who expect to complete the required courses within 6 months may apply. For the higher grades, additional professional experience is required. Graduate study in engineering may be substituted for part or all (depending on the grade for which application is made) of the professional experience. The maximum age limit for the \$2,100 jobs is 35 years (waived for persons entitled to veteran preference). There is no maximum age limit for the higher grade positions.

Persons who have received eligible ratings since January 1, 1951 in any Engineer examination announced by the Commission's central office need not apply for this new examination as their names will be combined with those on the new register.
