## Next Move On Talks Up To Reds

### US AND KOREAN DIVISIONS BEAT OFF SCREAMING ATTACK

8TH ARMY HEADQUARTERS Korea, Sept. 17 (UP)—Four U. S. divisions and their South Korean Allies beat off screaming waves of Communist attackers along a broken 60-mile front today.

Hundreds of North Koreans were mowed down by accurate United Nations artillery, machine-guns and rifle fire on the east-central and eastern fronts. The UN line held firm.

The Reds seemed oblivious of mounting losses in their desperate but so far futile attempts to win back strategic high ground.

Lt. Gen. James A. Van Fleet, commander of the 8th Army, said Sunday night that the North Koreans had suffered such heavy losses on the eastern front in the last few weeks that they no longer are capable of launching an extended offensive.

Rather, they seem to be frittering away their strength on a series of uncoordinated counterattacks at separate points along the front stretching from Pyongyang at the apex of the old central front "Iron Triangle" to the Japanese sea.

The 8th Army still was wary of a possible all-out Communist offensive, however. The North Koreans comprise only about 25 per

cent of the Communist forces facing the UN troops along the Korean front. The rest are Chinese Reds, plus an undetermined number of Eastern European Communists.

The latest Communist counterattacks were aimed against the 1st South Korean Corps, stretched along the East-Central and East-eastern fronts.

The Reds launched repeated Banzai charges against the unyielding UN line, screaming and shouting as they charged into a vicious hail of Allied fire. Hand-to-hand combat raged in some sectors.

### Stunt Plane Kills 13 Spectators

FLAGLER, COLO., Sept. 17 (UP)—An inquest was set today into the deaths of 20 persons—13 of them children—who were killed when a stunt plane roared into a crowd of spectators at an air show.

At the same time, a mass funeral for most of the victims was planned for Thursday.

Every home in the hamlet of 850 residents was touched by the accident Saturday. In addition to the dead, 25 persons were injured, 10 of them seriously.

The Civil Aeronautics Board, meanwhile, examined the wreckage of the silver and blue plane. Cab Chief R. P. Parshall of Kansas City said "it is obvious that there were violations (of CAA regulations) involved. The pilot obviously was too close to the crowd."

The plane, piloted by 1st Lt. Norman L. Jones of Denver, failed to come out of a slow roll only 100 feet from the ground and screamed into the line of spectators and automobiles.

The crash put a tragic end to the annual Flagler harvest festival. It was the first time in the history of the community that an air show was the feature of the carnival.

High point of the festival in the past has been a rodeo, but officials decided to modernize this year's affair.

Flagler's streets were still gaily decked with bunting announcing the show, but townfolks today gathered in quiet little groups to mourn the dead, known to each of them.

### Desdemona Man In Korea Is Promoted To Cpl.

WITH X CORPS, US ARMY IN KOREA—Paul S. Arnold, 25, of Desdemona, fighting on the X Corps mountainous front with the hard-hitting 78th Field Artillery Battalion, has been promoted to corporal.

Young Arnold, assigned to the communications section, was ordered to the Oriental theatre of war last March with the Virginia Reserve battalion, first Reserve combat unit to go into action on the Korean front. His highly-touted unit is backing up X corps troops with deadly biggun firepower.

The Texas artilleryman was recalled to active duty with the Army last October. He had previously served in the Army in 1949.

A graduate of Desdemona high school, he worked for the Magnolia Petroleum Company, Vanderbilt, Texas, in the natural gas department.

His parents, Mr. and Mrs. John W. Arnold, live in Desdemona.

### Body Sent To Oklahoma

MINERAL WELLS, Sept. 17 (UP)—The body of L. A. Decker, 37, has been sent to Cyril, Okla., for Tuesday funeral services and burial. Decker was killed early Sunday when his truck left the highway 14 miles north of here and plowed into a row of roadside trees. Officers said Decker may have fallen asleep, or the truck might have skidded from the pavement during a rainshower.

### Missing Con Was Sleeping On Creek Bank

QUINCY, CALIF., Sept. 17 (UP)—A San Quentin convict slept on a creek bank near the prison fire-fighting crew's camp here while statewide bulletins notified police of his "escape."

As a result of the convict, Howard James Leempt, 29, a Los Angeles burglar, was locked up today in Quincy jail for safekeeping while assistant Warden R. L. Eklund investigated his story.

Leempt had walked a short distance from the camp and fallen asleep after dinner Saturday night he said. An all-points bulletin went out two hours later when his absence was noted.

### Delegates To Draft Puerto Rico Laws

SAN JUAN, PUERTO RICO, Sept. 17 (UP)—Ninety-two delegates met today—the anniversary of the adopting of the U.S. Constitution in Philadelphia in 1787—to draft a constitution for Puerto Rico.

The constitution will give Puerto Rico full control of its internal affairs. However, it will not affect this country's status as a U. S. possession.

It is expected it will take the delegates about six weeks to write the constitution.

### Childhood Game Ends In Death

CORPUS CHRISTI, Sept. 17 (UP)—The childhood game of "cops and robbers" was blamed today for the shooting death of seven-year-old Steve Murphy, killed Sunday by the charge from a .410-gauge shotgun.

Investigating officers said the lad was fatally wounded by a gun in the hands of his eight-year-old brother, James.

The lads had "borrowed" the weapon for their game, officers said, and slipped a live shell into it before "beginning" their play. The accident followed shortly.

### Weekend Shows Sixteen Deaths By Violence

By United Press Week-end violence took at least 16 lives in Texas, with ten of them traffic victims and the others including an electrocution, a snake bite a fall from a horse and numerous shootings.

Kathleen Doucet, 9, was bitten by a five-foot rattlesnake while playing at her home near Beaumont and she died three hours later.

At Corpus Christi, Steve Murphey, 7, was shot accidentally by his brother, 8-year-old James, as they played cowboy and robber with a .410-gauge shotgun and one real shell.

Leon Retzlaff, 9, of Lexington was killed when his horse fell.

Other traffic victims included Macon Tatum, 32, Ferris, died from injuries received Saturday night in a collision at Dallas.

Gracie Moffat Hickey, 43, Bowie, killed when an automobile overturned eight miles south of Deatur yesterday afternoon.

L. A. Decker, 37, Cyril, Okla., killed early yesterday morning 14 miles south of Mineral Wells when his truck left the highway and smashed into a tree.

Jesus Hernandez, 65, San Antonio, killed when an automobile rammed a bridge near Fredericksburg during a rainstorm Saturday.

Maria Huerta, 15, La Paloma, killed near Brownsville Saturday in a truck-car collision during a blinding rain.

Howard Eugene Gilbert, 16, of Conroe, killed near Houston yesterday in a head-on collision.

The electrocution death was Jose H. Arrendondo, 44, of San Perita, who stepped on a live wire blown down in a rain storm.

The shootings included: Edward Dillins, Jr., 32, shot about midnight Saturday at a Ft. Worth cafe.

Claud Gary, Greenville used car salesman, shot Saturday night by a cafe cook during an argument at Greenville.

### Military Court In Romania Sentences Ten

BUCHAREST, Romania, Sept. 17 (UP)—Ten men, including two high Roman Catholic clergymen, were sentenced to prison terms of 10 years to life today by a military court on charges of espionage in behalf of the Vatican and Western governments.

Five were given life terms, the others sentences ranging from 10 to 18 years.

The prosecution had demanded the death sentence for four of the accused.

Sentences included: Catholic Bishop Augustin Pacha, 81, 18 years in solitary confinement and a fine of 1,200,000 Lei (nominally \$8,000). The fine was imposed for "illegal transfer of currency."

George Sandulescu, 44, former inspector general of schools, hard labor for life.

Lazar Steanescu, 47, former member of Parliament, hard labor for life.

Erasto Pintori, 36, Italian citizen and former employee of the Italian Legation, hard labor for life.

The Rev. Josef Schubert, 61, Catholic Priest, solitary confinement for life. The prosecution said Schubert was secretly promoted to Bishop for spy work.

The court, it was noted, sentenced those over 60 to solitary confinement, the rest to hard labor. The prosecution demanded the death sentence for Sandulescu, Steanescu, Pintori and Schubert. The defendants were not in court when sentence was pronounced. All had pleaded guilty.

### Runaway Cars Stop Traffic

DALLAS, Sept. 16 (UP)—An East-West Dallas thoroughfare was blocked temporarily Sunday by a pair of runaway rail cars.

Police said brakes on the cars apparently were released by small boys playing in the area, and the units rumbled along a spur, though its end and derailed on Mockingbird Lane.

The meeting, to continue through Saturday, will include an address by Lorne D. Duncan of New York, president of the national organization which has more than 30,000 members.

### Ridgway Suggests Immediate Liaison Arrangement Meeting

TOKYO, Sept. 17 (UP)—Gen. Matthew B. Ridgway told the Reds today that he still is ready to reopen truce talks and suggested an immediate meeting of liaison officers to arrange it.

The Supreme United Nations commander's latest mild but firm message to the Communists did not mention his previous proposal—already rejected by the Red commanders—to shift the suspended armistice conference from Kaesong.

Instead, Ridgway said: "I again emphasize my concern in the achievement of a just and honorable military armistice."

"If you are now disposed to terminate the suspension of the armistice negotiations which you declared on 23 August, I am still

prepared to order by liaison officers to a meeting at the bridge at Pan Mun Jom to discuss conditions that will be mutually satisfactory for a resumption of the armistice talks."

Pan Mun Jom is the Communist outpost on the southern rim of the Kaesong neutral zone.

Ridgway's brief message again rejected all Communist charges of UN violation of Kaesong neutral zones except the accidental strafing of the area by a UN night bomber Sept. 10.

The UN commander addressed his message to Gen. Kim Il Sung, North Korean premier and commander in chief, and Gen. Peng Teh-Hai, commander of Chinese forces in Korea.

It was broadcast by the Armed Forces Radio at noon (8 p.m. Sunday CST) and delivered personally to Communist representatives at Pan Mun Jom by Lt. Col. Herman Edwards of Diamond, W. Va., an Allied liaison officer.

Two helicopters carried the UN liaison party, including an Allied newsman and a photographer, to the Communist check point.

Ridgway's message again put responsibility for the suspension of the armistice talks and the opportunity to resume them squarely up to the Communist commanders.

At the same time, he made it clear that he has no intention of accepting the Communist demand be acknowledged responsibility for imaginary UN violations of the Kaesong neutral zone as a price for resumption of the conference.

### First Cotton Bought Here At \$34.10 Hundred

The first bale of cotton ginned here this year has been purchased by the operators of the gin.

The first bale was brought to Ranger by D. J. West of Morton Valley on August 29, and he received a premium of \$50 from the local Chamber of Commerce for the bale.

The cotton graded 15-16, middlin, burr cotton and was purchased for 34.10 cents per pound by the local concern.

### Burglars Believed To Be Escaped Cons Elude Police

BIRMINGHAM, Ala., Sept. 17 (UP)—Two fleet-footed burglars believed to be Draper Prison escapees, eluded the entire Birmingham night police force in the darkened thrill ride section of a mammoth amusement park before dawn today after a one-sided running gunfight.

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Authorities said the fugitives slipped through a police cordon thrown up around the state fairgrounds here. Thought to be two of the remaining six Alabama convicts still at large, the men were chased into Fair Park by officers who surprised them letting a nearby grocery store. Police fired on the men and believe they wounded one of them.

The fire was not returned.

The shooting-chase climaxed a wild run in Alabama during which relentless authorities clapped five more of the original 19 Draper escapees behind bars. The cons fled last night and have been the object of widespread manhunt.

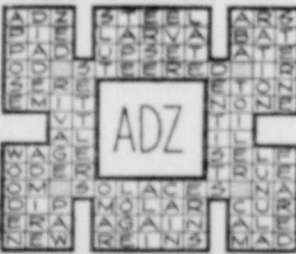

CROSSWORD PUZZLE

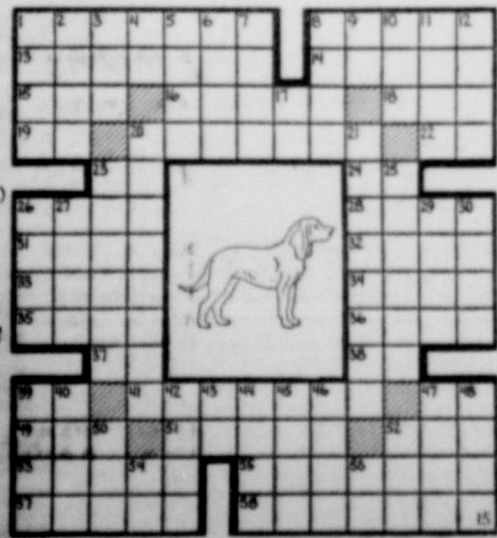

An official said the increase will be about one or two cents a pound.

But until new dollars-and-cents retail ceilings on beef and pork are announced in separate orders, the present ones remain in effect.

The new wholesale beef ceilings vary from area to area. They represent an overall increase—a hike of one cent a pound, on the average, in the case of beef sold by the carcass.

The agency said the increases were necessary to restore "fair" profit margins to packers, they recover their losses through sales of such by-products as hides and tallow.

But hide and tallow prices have dropped sharply and many packers are in a "critical position", an OPS official said. There in the Cleveland area closed down last week. Later the Earl C. Gibbs Company reopened, saying it was convinced OPS would give them relief.

The new wholesale ceilings, which are to go into effect Wednesday, represent a certain amount of "readjustment to reflect more accurately the relative value of each cut," OPS said. While most cuts will cost as much as five cents more the ceilings on some better grades were reduced by that amount.

To the housewife, this means that meat from chucks and rounds will go up slightly in price, choice loins ought to go down by a few cents, and ribs will stay where they are, an official said.

As for pork, an official said wholesale prices have been forced

ing pork retailers to operate at a loss under their retail ceilings, and in the case of pork chops and roasts these ceilings already have been adjusted.

Another order to be issued today will increase the ceiling price of the utility grade of live cattle from \$21.80 to \$23.45 per 100 pounds.

This grade is used by canners for the army and some other wholesale customers, and represents less than 10 per cent of all beef sold at retail, the agency said.

The increase, it added, is mandatory under the so-called fugate amendment to the controls law as passed by congress. The amendment says the government may not set a ceiling price on any grade of agricultural commodity at less than 50 per cent of the price for that grade which prevailed last May 19, the agency said.

The live cattle ceiling is the maximum average price packers may pay for cattle. The new utility cattle ceiling, plus the wholesale price hike, will bring about an increase of four cents a pound the price of utility beef sold by the carcass, OPS said.

Typhus Shots Urged For All In Flooded Area

WESLACO, Sept. 17 (UP)—Dr. W. T. Glass, Weslaco health officer, today advised residents of the 60-block area flooded here to start taking typhoid immunization shots as the floods slowly receded.

Radio stations broadcast Glass' warning as sewerage, spread over the area by floodwater more than two feet deep, raised the threat of epidemic. About 4,000 persons live in the section.

There was no heavy rainfall yesterday and the worst danger appeared past here and at Kingsville.

An 11-inch cloudburst late Friday night and early Saturday clogged the Weslaco drainage system and turned the gigantic mass of water into a flood.

City officials said the water was draining slowly, but they declined to make a damage estimate until all of it was gone.

Jack Sims, Red Cross disaster relief chairman at Kingsville, estimated damage north of Kingsville at \$100,000 as the rampaging Tranquia Creek dropped slowly back towards its channel. Fed by a deluge, it spread out as

Paul looked at me, grinned and shook his head. I looked at Sonya. She smiled. "Hello, Jim."

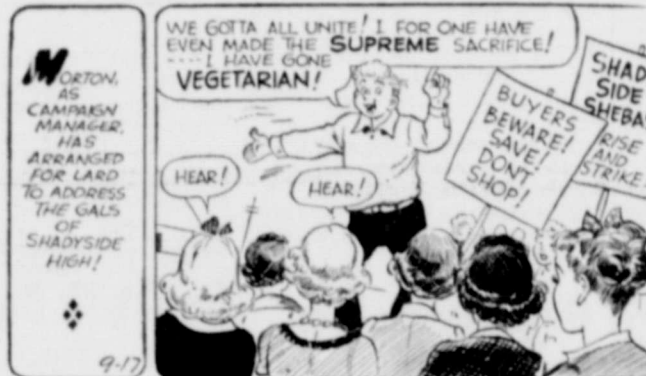

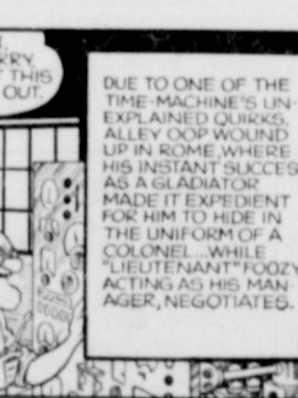

**FOR** Sunday's family dinner, pineapple sponge is an easy and delicate answer. It uses evaporated milk, excellent for desserts, as it adds smooth texture and rich flavor. This dairy food is also easy to store and is both economical and high in food value.

**Pineapple Sponge**  
(Serves 4-6)

One envelope unflavored gelatin, 1/2 cup cold water, 3/4 cup pineapple juice, 1/2 cup sugar, 3/4 teaspoon salt, 3 tablespoons lemon juice, 1 cup canned crushed pineapple (drained), 1/2 cup evaporated milk, 2 egg whites.

Soften gelatin in cold water. Heat pineapple juice, add sugar and salt; stir until dissolved. Add to gelatin mixture with lemon juice, crushed pineapple and evaporated milk. Chill in refrigerator until mixture is slightly thickened. Beat 2 egg whites stiff; fold in gelatin mixture. Place bowl in ice water and beat until mixture holds its shape. Refrigerate until needed.

**French Chocolate Cream**  
(Serves 6)

Four squares unsweetened chocolate, 1 tablespoon butter, 1 cup hot water, 1 1/2 cups evaporated milk (1 tall can), 1/2 cup sugar, 2 tablespoons flour, 2 eggs, separated, 2 teaspoons vanilla, 6 marshmallows, crisp cookies or biscuits for serving.

The customers, celebrating Mexican Independence Day, were trapped in the jammed club when the panic stricken crowd surged against the only doorway which opened inward.

Bystanders outside could not force open the doors to help the screaming mob. Firemen finally chopped their way into the club with axes.
