



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

Pineapple Sponge (Serves 4-6)

One envelope unflavored gelatin, ½ cup cold water, ¼ cup pine-apple juice, ¼ cup sugar, ¼ tea-spoon salt, 3 tablespoons lemon juice, 1 cup canned crushed pine-apple (drained), ½ cup evaporated milk 2 cur whites milk, 2 egg whites.
Soften gelatin in cold water.

Heat pineapple juice, add sugar and salt; stir until dissolved. Add to gelatin mixture with lemon juice, crushed pineapple and evap orated milk. Chill in refrigerato until mixture is slightly thickened. Beat 2 egg whites stiff; fold in gelatin mixture. Place bowl in ice water and beat until mixture holds its shape. Refrigerate until needed.
