LeBlanc Stakes Hadacol Gains On Politics

NEW ORLEANS, Sept. 18 (UP)—State Sen. Dudley J. LeBlanc staked a part of his Hadacol fortune on winning the Louisiana governorship but a pile of money appeared to be the only thing on his handwagon today.

LeBlanc, who built a patent medicine into a multi-million-dollar enterprise, dramatically opened his campaign by dumping a pile of cash from a hand bag on to a bed in his hotel room yesterday.

He said the pile contained \$200,000 enough to insure him the top spot on any ticket, and that moment also marked an apparent move by a prospective running mate to break away from him.

Lt. Gov. William J. Dodd failed to come in person when invited to the hotel conference to discuss the possibility of forming a coalition ticket with LeBlanc.

Dodd instead sent Orleans Parish Sheriff John Grosch to represent him, but LeBlanc refused to discuss politics with the sheriff and indicated his plan of joining forces with Dodd were off.

But the senator was obviously in the market for a running mate. He said Judge Robert Kennon of Minden could have the No. 2 spot on his ticket if he wanted it, but Kennon was running for governor himself.

HEALTH TALKS

Your doctor is in a spot where this reducing business is concerned. If you are 20 pounds overweight, he is most eager for you to get back to normal size as good health insurance. But he's not eager for you to reduce the wrong way, by picking up fad food schemes which may end up injuring your health even more than the excess poundage. Knowing human nature as he does, however, he knows that when you suddenly get the urge to reduce you probably won't consult him as to how to go about it. So rather than have you go off on some dangerous tangent, he is willing to point out to you the safest way for you to reduce if you insist upon reducing and refuse to get medical advice.

You eat less of the seven basic food necessary to good nutrition than you burn up in your daily activities. That is how you reduce. You include each of those seven basic foods, cutting down on some more than others, such as omitting none. Milk, fruits, bread, potatoes, vegetables, meats and eggs, and butter are all included in a same reducing diet and if your disposition or physical well-being is affected adversely on such a diet, you have no business staying on it.

Such a distribution of calories and food values must be spread over three meals a day, but can be further divided into mid-morning or mid-afternoon snacks if the proper balance in calories, minerals and vitamins is still maintained.

Daughter Killer Dies In Chair

MILES CITY, Mont., Sept. 20 (UP)—Three teenagers, two of them girls and one a boy, were sought as far as Houston, today for questioning in the robbery-murder of a ranchhand.

high cowboy boots. The "brains" of the gang was one of the girls, nicknamed "Wildcat."

The three were identified as Tommy La Fave, Evelyn Williams and Lillian Hirsch, all 16 and from Miles City.

A fourth member of the gang. "The three were said to be dressed in western garb of Levis and

a 15-year-old prolee from the State Industrial School told authorities the teenagers beat up John Hoffman, 38.

"We lured this man outside of a cafe on the pretense of going to a better place to eat," the youth said. "Tommy hit him and I kicked him—we got a little more than \$45 out of his pockets."

Hoffman died of his injuries last Friday. His home was Le Mars, Iowa.

After the attack, the youth said the gang stole a car and headed south. The youth left the others at Smithfield, Utah, and returned to Montana where he was picked up.

The other three were heading for Houston, where one of the girls was said to have a boy friend.

Rats Cause Loss And Disease In Texas Homes

AUSTIN, Sept. 20—Because of the economic losses they cause to industry and commerce and the annoyance they create in homes, rats have been considered a serious menace to mankind since long before rats as vectors of disease was understood. Today at least six diseases which are transmitted to man from the rat are known to medical science, according to Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer. These diseases include the dread plague, typhus, trichinosis, a form of jaundice, tapeworm, and food poisoning. The whole history of the role rats play in the transmission of disease remains as yet unknown.

"It is necessary to public health," Dr. Cox said, "that a continuous rat control program be maintained in every urban and rural area throughout Texas. This is of especial importance on farms where rats may flourish by feeding on grain and other farm products."

The doctor pointed out that rats, like other living things, require food and shelter if they are to propagate and increase in number. Destroying their shelter and breeding places includes the employing of ratproof design in building, the use of ratproof materials in construction, employing ratproof methods of construction and installation, and providing for periodic inspection of buildings to insure permanent safety. This program will force the rat out into the open where its destruction may be accomplished.

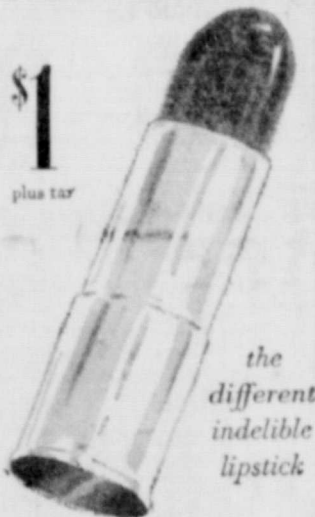
Of equal importance as a con-

trol measure is the elimination of all food supplies. This consists of storing all foods in ratproof buildings or in ratproof containers, the proper storage and disposal of garbage, and careful feeding of stock to prevent waste food from being picked up by the rats. By observing these control measures, the community will benefit not only in the eradication of a nuisance and economic menace but in improved health conditions and the prevention of rat-borne diseases.

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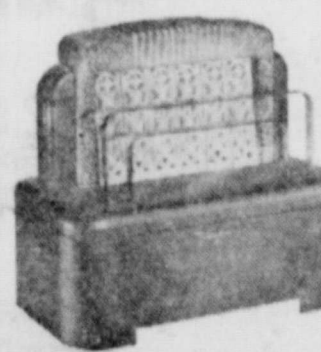

Panther Hunters Tree Bob Cat In San Antonio

SAN ANTONIO, Sept. 20 (UP)—San Antonio's big game hunters early today bagged what they called conclusive evidence that the city has a suburban panther—an "awful big" one.

The only tangible prize of a night-long hunt through Comanche Park and the Salado River bottom, however, was a bobcat tree by a trio of "cat" dogs and a host of shotgun and rifle-equipped sheriff's posse members.

The hunters, led by deputy sheriff Jack Young, found tracks in mud along the river bottom which Ed Townsend, a panther expert from the Joe Anderson ranch, said were made by the well-padded feet of an "awful big panther."

Townsend, whose job is to keep the Anderson ranch clean of feline marauders, said "definitely there's a big panther out there."

More stories of the big cat and his 10-day prowling of east San Antonio poured in. One man reported seeing a black panther "jump over a box car" in the freight yards. An excited woman told the posse she saw "a cat as big as a yearling."

The organized hunt began shortly after midnight, and Anderson ranch hounds promptly jumped a trail. The hunters discovered they were running the wrong animal two hours later when they treed the bobcat.

The hounds then picked up the cold trail of the "panther", and worked it toward the coliseum on the east side of the city before losing it. The posse encountered a railroad switchman, who said he saw a panther near Camp Cushing, World War II prisoner-of-war camp, Wednesday.

The search ended at 4:30 a.m. after a course which covered 10 miles. The baying hounds were followed by seven off-duty sheriff's deputies, a group from the honorary sheriff's mounted posse, and volunteer hunters.

Townsend and the Anderson ranch dogs, from Cotulla, remained in San Antonio. The posse plans an earlier start on another hunt tonight.

Thus far, the "panther" is credited with terrorizing dozens of east San Antonians, mutilating a chicken and a large German Shepherd dog, eating out of park garbage cans and taking strolls along highways.

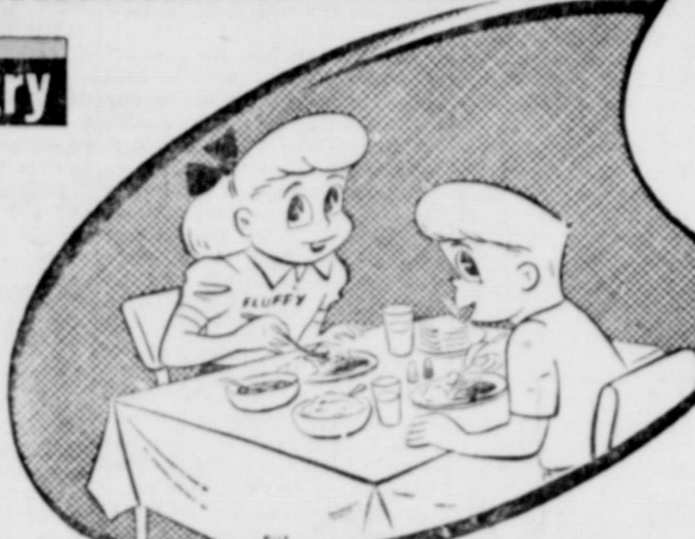

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Communist Moral At Low Point: More Red Troops Surrendering

9th CORPS HEADQUARTERS KOREA, Sept. 20 (UP) — The United States Army's second ranking commander in Korea said today that the morale of Chinese Communist troops is weakening and that surrenders have reached an unprecedented rate.

This deterioration has occurred despite increased enemy fire power and improvement in transport, Lt. Gen. William M. Hoge of Lexington, Ky., commanding the 9th Corps, said at his headquarters.

Hoge's statement led to immediate speculation on the possibility that the Communist high command might have agreed to resume armistice negotiations partly because of its knowledge that the Red position was weakening.

"The enemy is going to suffer horribly this winter," Hoge said. "The Chinese and North Koreans have an almost incredible endurance that enables them to make

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long marches on frozen feet. But it is a question whether they will be able to repeat these sacrifices in the coming months.

"I don't know what the Chinese are doing in this war anyhow, and I guess quite a few of them are asking the same question and are beginning to have some doubts about the lies told them by their leaders.

"Rather than face the prospect of another brutal winter here some are taking the easier way out," he said.

"More prisoners are being captured in one sector today than we got along the entire front during the summer. Desertions, which were a rarity a few months ago, are increasing daily. Some of the Red troops show such a desire for freedom that they swim across rivers to surrender—and the water is mighty cold at this time of year."

Hoge pointed out how badly the veteran Communist troops have been chewed up. The new men, he said, are better equipped and well supplied with fire power but are far below the calibre of the men the Communists used against the United Nations forces last year.

The Red artillery, which once fired three to four rounds a day, now is firing 200 to 300 rounds a day, Hoge said, but there is no accuracy in the fire.

"They just seem to point the guns south and let fly," he said.

8th ARMY HEADQUARTERS, KOREA, Sept. 20 (UP)—The United States Marines called helicopters into action today to take combat troops to the eastern front where the Allies fought a murderous, merciless uphill battle against fanatic Reds.

It was believed to be the first helicopter airlift of combat troops in history.

A fleet of 94 of the Marines' new "whirlbird" Sikorsky helicopters were summoned to fly a Marine reconnaissance unit to the

blazing front and supply it in an isolated, important mountain position inaccessible by road.

The huge whirlbirds flew from an advanced base with Marine infantrymen carrying full packs. They landed in the front lines at one minute intervals without the loss of a man and formed lines an aerial supply train throughout the day. They laid wire communications and took in supplies and ammunition after all troops were landed.

The helicopters flew in a total of 228 troops and 17,772 pounds of gear.

Communist resistance on the whole eastern front was intensifying steadily and aerial scouts reported an increase in enemy road traffic toward the front.

Hills were taken both by allied and red troops, only to be lost in counter-attacks.

Texas Employees Get Back Wages

FORT WORTH, Sept. — Back wages amounting to \$26,733.11 were paid to 203 employees by 49 Texas employers during August according to figures compiled by P. D. Riley, Fort Worth supervisor of the Wage and Hour and Public Contracts Divisions of the U. S. Department of Labor.

Such restitution of back wages due, Riley said at his office at 1109 Burk Burnett Building here resulted from Federal investigations under the Fair Labor Standards Act.

The payments were restitution

for failure to comply with the minimum wage and overtime provisions of the Federal Law, which applies to employees engaged in interstate commerce, or in processes closely related and directly essential thereto.

The Federal Wage and Hour Law restricts the use of child labor, and requires that overtime be paid to all but specifically exempted employees at a rate of at least one and one-half their regular rates of pay for all work after 40 hours in the workweek. Last year the minimum wage for covered employees was increased from 40 cents to 75 cents an hour.

The amount of restitution of such back wages paid by Texas employers during August ranged from a low of \$11.84 to a high of \$2,712.97. For the total of

203 employees to whom restitution was paid, the average payment amounted to \$131.69.

Restitution during the month just passed was made by firms or employers in 33 Texas cities and towns, including Alpine, Aransas Pass, Austin, Blanket, Brownsville, Burnet, Cleburne, Dallas, El Paso, Flatonia, Fort Worth, Grand Prairie, Houston, Iowa Park, Kermit, LaGrange, Leonard, Livingston, Lubbock, Marlin, Mt. Pleasant, Navasota, New Braunfels, Paris, San Antonio, Snyder, Taft, Terrell, Tyler, Waco, West, Wichita Falls, and Yoakum.

Mass Executions Reported In China

HONG KONG, Sept. 20 (UP)—Communist China has executed 28,332 persons since last Decem-

ber in Kwangtung Province, independent reports from Canton said today.

In addition, large numbers of Red troops were said to be staging wholesale desertions. Reports from Macao said Communist forces shelled hills only a few miles from the Portuguese colony in an effort to smoke out the deserters.
