

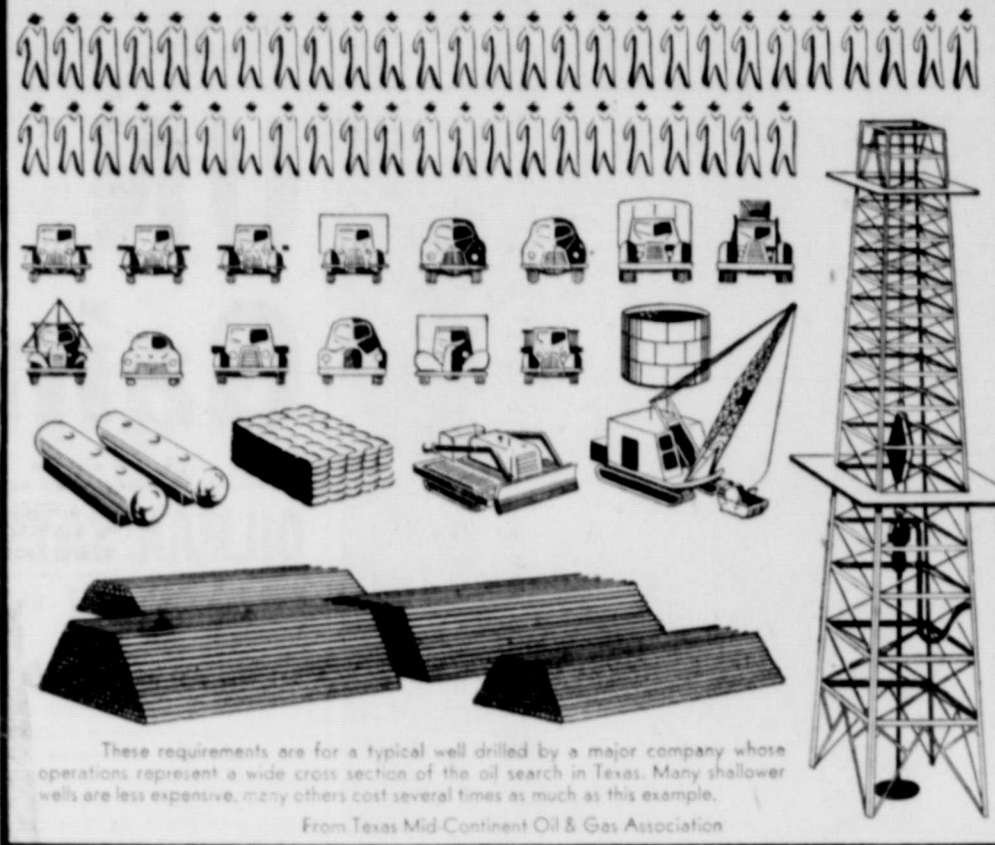

A MORE gentle reception of an emotional outburst was never given a love story than was given mine by Crazy Horse, that very Indian who shall probably go down through white legend as the blood-red wretch of them all. "My brother," he answered, soberly, when my tale of the morning's events had spilled out, "I am my people's leader. What I say now is thus spoken. You cannot have this woman so long as she will not have you. But in our eyes, holiness is a personal thing. That of Star's being here to keep or abandon as she sees fit. So long as she wills to remain pure, so long will the price of her holiness be held at the last drop of Sioux blood on these prairies. It is fair to set down here the fact I respected the Sioux beliefs and taboos so long as I was among them without, at the same time, sharing them. At no time was Star anything to me but a woman, the most desirable in the world, true, but always and simply a woman. Could I take her in compliance with Dacotah custom, I would, if not, I meant to have her anyway. Crazy Horse signified the council was over. Casting about for some means of strengthening my contact with him, hence increasing any chance I might come upon to win Star honorably, I resolved to tell him of the plan which caused me to quit the Army at Fort Phil Kearney; the plan on which Car-

campaign for the coming wagon-train season along the Bozeman Trail. When he traveled I went with him, meeting most of the serious Sioux chiefs and warriors. Because of these wide rangings up and down and across the Sioux land, his name and new tribal status became familiar throughout the Indian nation.

But somewhere in the red hierarchy was a warrior who loved his whiskey better than his native land. The whiskey runners had a full report of my intentions before I moved a moccasin in their direction. So efficient was Slatemeyer's intelligence he not only had my plans but my complete history since joining the Sioux, my capture, convalescence and subsequent journey to Star.

MY scouts had located the barges of the whiskey runner frozen in on the Missouri, just south of Fort Kiowa. Slatemeyer, it appeared, had tried to squeeze in a last trip the season before, being caught by early ice. I had no idea he would be so close, assuming that this time of year would see him in Kansas City outfitting for the spring trip up the Big Muddy. I made another wrong assumption; that he had been caught by the ice on his way out, with empty barges.

So I started south for Fort Kiowa six weeks ahead of the expected spring break-up on the Missouri, having changed my mind about waiting for spring, fearing now to find his barges still frozen-in, sitting ducks for the shooting. With me went my first Indian command, 10 young Ogala men, hand-picked by Crazy Horse. My plan was simple: find the barges and fire them. There were three of these small ones without living quarters aboard. This meant the crews would be winter-camped ashore, possibly at Fort Kiowa, but more likely in the vicinity of the boats. Even with the Army's sub rosa compliance, the runners usually observed surface precautions. They would hardly dare in this case, I thought, to winter in an Army post where their presence would need some explanation. (To Be Continued)

Baby Kidnaped In Chicago Is Found In Texas

HOUSTON, Oct. 15 (UP)—The FBI today reported that five-month-old Donna Marie Van Erman, kidnaped in Chicago Sept. 11, had been found and that a search was underway for the couple charged with kidnaping her.

A. F. Lorton, Jr., FBI agent in charge, identified the couple as Robert Lee Gore, 26, and his wife, Billie Dolores. He said they left the baby at the home of Gore's brother, Mack C. Gore. Lorton said that on Sept. 10, the baby's mother, Mrs. Donna Van Erman of Chicago, left the infant with some friends in the Chicago hotel where she lived and went out for the evening. The FBI agent said the friends turned the baby over to Gore and his wife.

The next morning it was learned that the Gores had left the hotel, taking the baby with them. A Federal kidnaping charge was filed a week later.

It was known that Gore had relatives in Houston, and a close watch was kept on their home.

Lorton said Gore appeared at his brother's home late Saturday night and left the baby with his sister-in-law. She later telephoned the FBI.

The agent said Gore left two notes with the baby. One was purported to be from the baby's mother, giving Gore permission to take the child. The other was written by Gore and said he had permission.

Houston police reported that the man identified as Robert Lee Gore by the FBI was listed in police records as Lee Robert Gore. They said the record showed him to be a clemency violator from the Texas prison system.

COLLEGE STATION, TEX., Oct. 15 (UP)—One of Texas A & M's top defensive backs, Aggie Saxe, is lost to the Aggie football team for the season, trainers said today.

The senior halfback fractured his arm near the elbow Saturday night shortly after dashing 39 yards for a touchdown in A&M's easy 53-14 win over Trinity.

The injury may end Saxe's football career. Also out of the Aggie lineup is end Walter Hill. His trick knee was operated on in Houston Friday, and he'll see no more action this season.

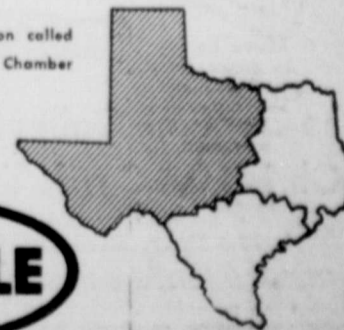

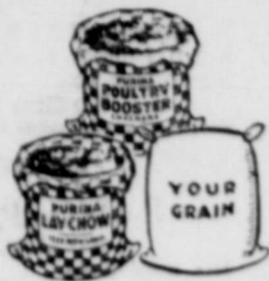
