BULLDOGS READY AND RARING TO GET AFTER CISCO LOBOES

Other than a light workout this afternoon the Bulldogs have completed their preparation for the first conference game at Cisco Friday night.

For the past three days Coach Warden and Aills have been working harder with the team than before any of the past games. The hours have been longer and the scrimmage sessions harder. Through repetition and instruction the coaches have tried to put the finishing touches on the team as a whole and on the individual players.

What the outcome of the Cisco game tomorrow night now rests in the hands of the squad. If they play as a team, play as hard as they possibly can, there is no doubt in anyone's mind associated with them as to the outcome of the game.

The boys seem to have their heart in the game, undoubtedly have the ability, and they should be sure of the support of the Ranger fans. The coaches have been quick to criticize after mistakes and just as quick to praise the good points; the squad seems to take both in stride.

As a whole a better bunch of men could not be found in any place that is better morally, physically, or mentally than the Ranger Bulldogs.

Optimism High On Talks Will Start Again

UN ADVANCE BASE, MUNSAN, KOREA, Oct. 18 (UP)—United Nations liaison officers for the first time expressed optimism today that Korean armistice talks may be resumed soon.

U.S. Col. Andrew J. Kinney and James C. Murray emerged smiling from a 105-minute meeting with Communist liaison officers in a tent in Panmunjom and told UN newsmen:

- 1. There are grounds for optimism. 2. The UN delegation submitted a compromise proposal designed to eliminate the main obstacle to resumption of the armistice conference—the size of the neutral zones around the UN truce camp at Munsan and the Communist camp at Kaesong. 3. The liaison teams arrived at a substantial agreement on one or two positions which have been in dispute. 4. Col. Chang Chun San, Chief Communist liaison officer, agreed there now was "very little difference between us."

Change is expected to give his reply to the UN's new compromise proposal at a liaison meeting at 10 a.m. tomorrow (8 p.m. today EST). It calls for three-mile neutral zones around both Munsan and Kaesong instead of the five-mile zones sought by the Reds and the 3,000 yard-zones originally suggested by the UN.

The turn for the better in the liaison negotiations coincided with disclosure that the United States had asked Russia to "act" to persuade Communist negotiations in Korea to stop stalling and agree to a "realistic" armistice.

Cisco Will Wet Field Down For Game Friday Nite

Later reports on the condition of the playing field at Cisco show that the sand that was put on the field to level off spots worn down in scrimmage, has been on there since last summer.

Due to the lack of rain the past few months it has not been washed and settled into the field. The playing field will be wet down for the game Friday night to avoid the loose footing.

Some people have indicated that they believe the sand was purposely placed there to hinder the Ranger team; it was placed on the field to improve the condition.

RUSSIA VOICES SUPPORT TO NORTH KOREAN AND CHINESE RED, KOREAN PEACE POLICIES

WASHINGTON, Oct. 18 (UP)—The United States today hoped to avoid an atomic showdown with Russia in the face of new evidence that Moscow will do little to break the Korean war impasse.

A new chill was cast over world peace hopes through the Kremlin's revelation that it is standing behind North Korean and Chinese Red efforts to win a Korean armistice on the 38th Parallel.

Also dampening peace hopes was the Kremlin's sudden action in revealing recent confidential American-Soviet talks in the Soviet capital on the Korean War and other east-west issues.

The Soviet action was interpreted by the State Department experts as rejection of a move by the United States to break the Korean stalemate as a prelude to international negotiations to ease world tension.

But officials said the United States would take every possible action to try again to negotiate with the Soviets.

Atomic bombs in the hands of both sides spurs the search for peaceful settlement of disputes, they said.

The American bid for Soviet support to end the Korean war by getting the stalled armistice negotiations going again was communicated on Oct. 5 by U. S. Ambassador Alan G. Kirk to Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei Y. Vishinsky. Kirk offered a four-point armistice plan.

Vishinsky replied Monday with a "propaganda blast" blaming the United States and Gen. Matthew B. Ridgway for the Korean war and the stalled truce negotiations. He added it was "only barely possible to imagine" that American-Soviet relations could be worse.

His denunciation was communicated to the United States at about the same time President Truman was making a new "peace" to Russia in a speech.

Producer Will Film Mahatma Gandhi's Life

HOLLYWOOD, Oct. 18 (UP)—Movie producer Gabriel Pascal said today he will film the life of Mahatma Gandhi, tracing the great Indian leader's career from his work as a young lawyer in South Africa to his assassination in 1948.

Pascal said he recently concluded a year of negotiations and research with the Indian government and the Gandhi trust.

U. S. charge d'affaires Hugh S. Cummings, Jr., in Moscow that Russia wanted an end of the Korean war and offered to discuss improvement of international relations.

But the possibility of Russia actually carrying out these statements was blasted in the state department's view, when Moscow last night made public the Soviet-American talks with new attacks on the United States.

The State Department had anticipated the Russian move because of a similar action in May, 1948, when former Ambassador Walter Bedell Smith talked over Soviet-American relations with the Russians.

Kirk, paying a farewell call on Vishinsky, strenuously objected to the "incomprehensible" actions of the Chinese and North Korean truce negotiators in demanding the 38th parallel as an armistice line.

Allies Smash Through Reds Near Kumsong

By Jack James United Press Staff Correspondent 8th ARMY HEADQUARTERS, Korea, Oct. 18 (UP)—United Nations forces smashed through the outer fringes of the main Communist winter defense line to within 5,000 yards of Kumsong today.

UN infantrymen captured two hills and swept across a valley in a 600-yard advance under withering Communist fire toward the big central Korean base 29 miles north of the 38th Parallel.

On the western front, Communist resistance suddenly collapsed west of Yonchun. Allied troops who had been attacking for two days against fierce enemy opposition started northward unopposed and captured four hills and several "additional key terrain features," an 8th Army communique reported.

The three UN divisions converging on Kumsong from the southwest, south and southeast ran into stiffening Communist resistance Wednesday night.

A front dispatch said a hail of enemy mortar, artillery and machine gun fire halted one UN spearhead temporarily after it had stabbed across a valley approximately three miles south of Kumsong.

Further south, the Allies tightened their stranglehold on the remnants of five Communist battalions bypassed in the thrust toward Kumsong. Crumbling resistance within the encirclement indicated that the Chinese had suffered greater casualties from Allied artillery fire than first thought.

At least one hill was taken inside the encirclement area and UN troops were advancing toward the crest of another. An estimated 800 Chinese Reds were inside the trap when it was sprung early Wednesday.

Kirk, who is now in the United States, asked that the United States views on the "explosive" possibilities of a breakdown in the armistice talks be communicated to Premier Josef Stalin.

Vishinsky replied 10 days later that the question of an armistice line is "organically connected with the question of termination of military action and consequently cannot be passed over in the armistice negotiations." He stepped aside from direct Soviet participation by nothing that Russia "is not a party to these negotiations."

The Soviet diplomat suggested that the best way to assure favorable armistice action would be for the United States to instruct Ridgway to avoid creating "incidents" and to drop demands to change the sight of the truce talks.

Vishinsky and his Kremlin comrades apparently were deeply impressed by Kirk's reference to "unbearable consequences" if the Korean negotiations fail.

"Is it permissible first of all to ask exactly what 'undesirable consequences' or 'unpleasantnesses' the American government has in mind?" Vishinsky asked. "If it is a question of the possibility of further worsening of Soviet-American relations then it is only barely possible to imagine that these relations can worsen even more after President Truman stated to the whole world that agreements with the Soviet Union are not worth the paper on which they are written."

"In such circumstances is it possible to take seriously statements about a wish to improve Soviet-American relations?"

Eleven Jurors Selected In Sanity Case

MIDLAND, Tex., Oct. 18 (UP)—One more juror was needed to complete the twelve who will decide the sanity of Richard McGee, 27, condemned murderer from Lubbock.

Only two jurors were chosen yesterday. Fifteen men remain in the 200-man panel as the Thursday session began.

McGee is under death sentence for the 1948 slaying of R. L. Allston, Lubbock grocer.

BRITAIN TAKES ONLY SPAN ACROSS CANAL AFTER BATTLE

By Walter Collins United Press Staff Correspondent CAIRO, Egypt, Oct. 18 (UP)—British forces cut off the Suez Canal Zone from the rest of Egypt today after killing a number of Egyptian troops who tried to stop them.

Two to five Egyptian soldiers died in a brief, bloody battle yesterday on the approaches of strategic El Ferdan bridge, only span across the canal, 10 miles north of Ismailia. It was the first armed clash between the British and Egyptian armies.

A British announcement delayed by censorship said two Egyptian soldiers were killed and five wounded. Egyptian officials said five Egyptian soldiers were killed and 24 others captured by the British.

The 24 prisoners were reported to have been released 12 hours later, after Egypt sent its director of army operations to negotiate with British authorities.

The British seized not only the sole bridge across the canal, but also ferries and key installations throughout the zone. They halted all traffic in and out of the zone and isolated Egypt proper from its territories in Southern Palestine.

Egyptian Premier Mustapha Nahas Pasha announced last night his government is preparing "action" against the British.

There were these other swift developments in the Anglo-Egyptian crisis:

- 1. A Cairo newspaper reported 10,000 university students there demanded the government arm them and declare war against Britain. 2. British authorities in the canal zone seized all newspapers coming by train from Cairo, thus depriving zone residents of any newspapers. 3. All police commandants in the zone proclaimed a total state of emergency until Sunday. 4. Egyptian laborers began building a new rail bridge across the canal to connect its home forces with troops in Palestine. 5. The remaining members of Britain's 3,000-strong paratroop brigade were arriving from Cyprus to swell the British garrisons at the Suez to more than 12,000.

The bridge clash occurred after British forces took it over from the privately-owned Suez Canal company. Built by the British in World War II, it has been a source of constant friction between the British and Egyptians.

The British announcement from the Middle East Land Force Command in the canal zone said the Egyptian troops provoked the conflict by shooting at British soldiers as they approached the El Ferdan bridge spanning the canal. No British soldiers were wounded, it said.

The bridge, only one across the canal, is close to the town of Ismailia where on Tuesday British troops opened fire on civilian demonstrators, killing at least eight of them and wounding over 70. The demonstrators had overturned British Army trucks and set fire to a British service club.

Britain has announced its intention to meet force with force if Egypt tries to oust the troops in line with the Cairo government's scrapping of the 1936 Anglo-Egyptian Treaty. The treaty permits Britain to station no more than 10,000 troops in the Suez area.

WASHINGTON—President Truman said today that Gen. Douglas MacArthur's statement that this government planned at one time to let Formosa fall to the Communists was not based on fact.

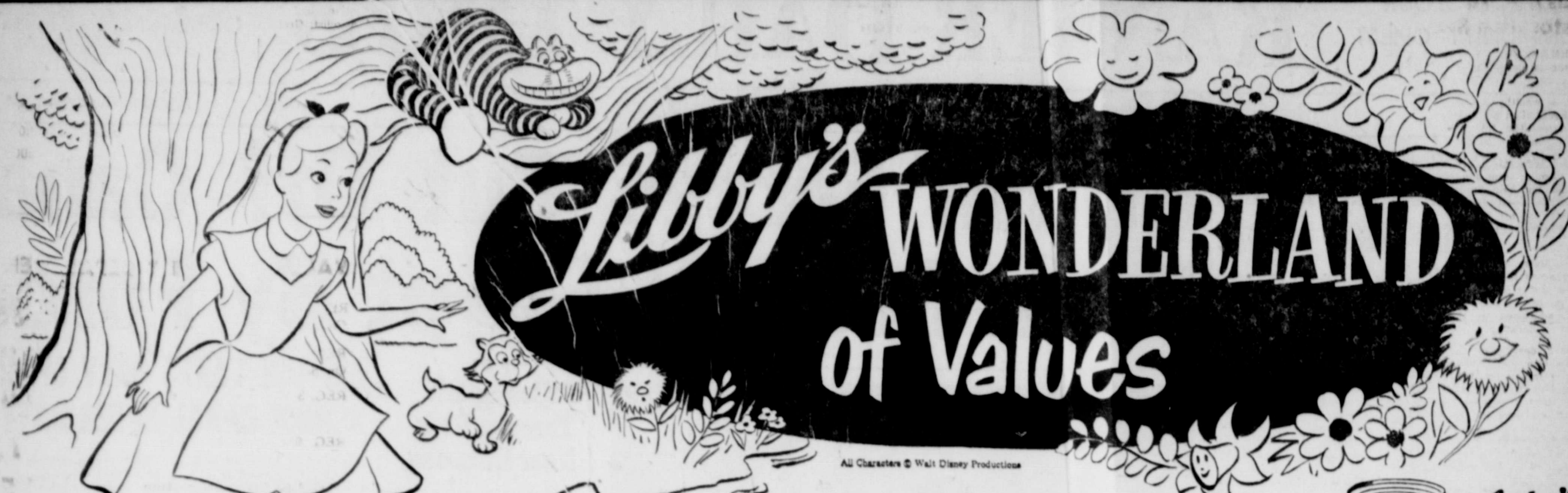

**Wealthy Ginner Wills Eyes To Restoration Bank**

SHERMAN, Oct. 18 (UP)—Joe Etter is dead, but his eyes will see again.

Etter, a wealthy Sherman cotton ginner, willed his eyes to the blind couple who for years had sat behind his pew in church.

He died yesterday at the age of 80. A cornea transplant operation could not help the sightless couple whose cast first excited Etter's pity, so his doctor carried out an alternate provision in the will.

Dr. Ike Bates, a Sherman specialist, removed the eyes immediately after Etter died. They were rushed to New York aboard an airliner, addressed to the bank for sight restoration.

Etter, a deacon in the First Baptist church here, always occupied the same pew. Behind sat Mr. and Mrs. C. M. Curlee, two ardent church workers whose blindness promoted the bequest.

The businessman often had discussed the eye-transfer operation, Dr. Bates said. When he found that it would do no good for the Curlees, Etter added the provision which gave his eyes to help "some other blind person to whom they would be useful."

**Crooner Assists Wife On Divorce**

SANTA MONICA, CALIF., Oct. 18 (UP)—Bow-tied crooner Frank Sinatra gave his wife a helping hand today in obtaining a divorce that will clear the way for his marriage to sultry actress Ava Gardner.

Through his attorney, Edward R. Brand, the singer waived service of any papers in the action yesterday and asked that Mrs. Sinatra's case be tried as a default case as soon as possible.

Sinatra currently is fulfilling television engagements in New York.

Mrs. Sinatra filed suit to end their 12-year marriage Monday, charging extreme mental cruelty. She won a decree of legal separate maintenance from the crooner here last year.

**Building Higher Than Last Month**

AUSTIN, Oct. 18 (UP)—September construction awards in Texas were some \$25,000,000 under the same month a year ago, but were still some \$23,000,000 greater than those of August, the trade publication Texas Contractor said today.

The September total was \$63,845,236, the magazine reported. Of this, \$31,861,421 was for non-residential construction, while residential building amounted to \$18,644,430. Engineering projects accounted for \$13,319,385.

In the residential classification, \$2,828,350 went for low-cost homes; \$9,323,500 for homes costing more than \$7,000; \$6,239,780 for apartment buildings and \$272,800 for duplexes.

**Tear Gas Ousts Defiant Couple**

SAN ANTONIO, Oct. 18 (UP)—An elderly San Antonio man and wife who defied the city of San Antonio and its tear-gas squad for love of their river-bank home were held in a hospital for observation today.

The couple, bearded George E. Thayer and his wife, Gertrude, both in their 60's, were taken to the hospital yesterday after being chased from their ransack home by the cloud of gas.

It ended their armed vigil against "trespassers" and cleared the way for San Antonio to erect a new bridge and highway across the San Antonio River, and also straighten out the river.

Hospital attendants said the Thayers would be held "two or three days" to check against possible reaction to the tear gas.

But from the city's point of view, the Thayers were in doubt: The two had never straggled for a new home in which to live.

The lack of rent on their house seemed to intensify the Thayer's love for the place. The cluster of cars crossing an ancient bridge 100 feet away bothered them not a whit.

When the city announced it was claiming the property under its rights of eminent domain, Thayer scorned the action of his 20-odd neighbors who promptly moved. He barricaded his own place for a long "siege."

He erected signs on his lot and on his door threatening trespassers with "gunfire."

He also berated the "politicians" in city hall for "Moscow tactics" and circulated handbills about the city.

Thayer charged that "commissioners" were "poisoning unknown tens of thousands of our tax dollars down the rat hole of corruption to buy and destroy land" to be used in the river-straightening bridge-building project.

Neighbors reported seeing Thayer sitting long hours by a window with a shotgun over his

**Baptists Will Gather In Oct. At Houston**

HOUSTON, Oct. 18—The more than a million Baptists in Texas will plan their 1952 denominational program in sessions here Oct. 23-25.

It will be the annual meeting of the Baptist General convention of Texas. An estimated 5,000 "messengers" from outside of Houston will be on hand at the city's new Coliseum building for three days of reports, planning and inspiration. William Fleming, a layman from Fort Worth is convention president.

State conventions of the Woman's Missionary Union and the Baptist Brotherhood will meet Monday and Tuesday, prior to the opening of the general convention Tuesday evening.

At Dallas Dr. J. Howard Williams, executive secretary of the convention, reported that Texas Baptists number 1,100,000 members in 3,445 churches. Each congregation is autonomous but works in cooperation with the denominational program on matters of promotion, education, benevolence and missions.

Souls and denominational finances will be given primary consideration in the week's deliberations, according to convention officials. The convention has as its goal the winning of 250,000 new converts this year. It will consider the adoption for the third consecutive year of a financial budget of \$10,000,000 for 1952. Half the money would be raised through the churches and half would be sought in large gifts by individuals.

Reports from Texas Baptist educational and benevolent insti-

tutions, from the various departments through which the convention carries on its work, and from mission activities of the Southern Baptist convention will be heard.

Inspirational speakers will include Dr. A. B. Rutledge of Marshall, preaching the convention sermon; Dr. Duke K. McCall, president of the Southern Baptist Theological Seminary at Louisville, Ky.; Dr. J. D. Gray of New Orleans, president of the Southern Baptist convention, and Billy Graham, the evangelist. ## Veteran Plane In For Overhaul At West Coast Base

SACRAMENTO, CALIF., Oct. 18 (UP)—A biplane B-29 named "Bub" with the picture of an old man on its side was here for overhaul today after 107 Korean missions in which it dropped 1,000 tons of bombs.

The "Bub," oldest B-29 in the Far East Air Force, had logged more than 2,800 hours in the air, including World War II service. The 11-man crew, which brought the ship to McClellan Air Force Base here yesterday, has a total of 412 individual missions over Korea. Only 10 of those were together in the "Bub."

The crew included S-Sgt. M. Mann, El Dorado Springs, Mo., and S-Sgt. Harold H. Coel, San Antonio, Tex.

## Cockroaches Not Carriers Of Polio Virus

GALVESTON, Oct. 18 (UP)—Cockroaches have been eliminated as a carrier of the polio virus, Dr. Chin Min Hsiang of the University of Texas' medical branch revealed today.

Dr. Hsiang, aided by Dr. John Micks and Dr. Morris Pollard, is conducting a series of experiments to eliminate as many insects as possible as polio carriers.

The cockroach experiment, he said, required eight months. He said they were chosen because they were known to be frequent carriers of dysentery virus.

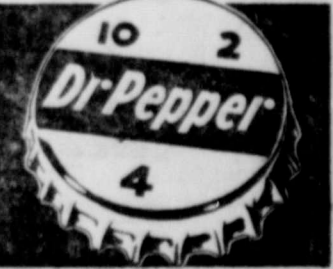

The Schreiner Mountaineers are currently the league's best offensive team with a total of 1,611 yards gained from scrimmage in passing and running. The Mountaineers also lead in passing with a total of 933 yards.  
The Arlington State Rebels are far in front of the field in the running department with a total of 1,039 yards. The Rebels are trailed by Ranger, which has piled up 896 yards in four games.
