Two Worthless Checks Cashed By Ranger Stores; One Redeemed

A check cashed at the Quality Food Market Wednesday turned out to be worth less than the paper on which it was written. The check was made out payable to a Mr. Frank Barnes, Box 441 of Route 2, Ranger, and had Mr. C. B. Pruett name on it as the account that it was to be charged against.

Bobbie Johnson, cashier for the Quality Food Market, said a man came into the store, and handed her the check in the amount of ninety-one dollars, and wanted to know if they would cash it. She said she turned around, showed it to the manager, who glanced at it, and gave her permission to cash the check.

The check was marked payable to Mr. Barnes and had written down in the corner "for one call." After attempting to contact Mr. Pruett, and being unable to find him, the manager called Mrs. Pruett and asked about the check. Mrs. Pruett told the people at the store that as far as she knew her husband had not purchased a calf that morning and that the check was no good.

Further checking showed this to be true. The police were also called into the case but were unable to find the man giving the check to the Quality.

The clerk described the man cashing the check as being between 45 and 50 years old, black headed, with a dark complexion, and dressed very neatly in a gray western shirt and western, gray

pin stripe pants. A little earlier another check was cashed at Greer's Boot Shop by a man answering this same description. Mrs. Greer said that after she had cashed the check for part payment of merchandise and given him the rest in money she called the person whose name appeared as the payee and found that he had not given a check in that amount for "five pigs" as was written on the check.

Mrs. Greer found the man who cashed the check a few minutes earlier and demanded the return of her money, which he returned. The check cashed at Greer's was prior to the one given at the Quality Food Market.

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Woman 113 Dies After Watching Six World Wars

BERWICK, Pa., Oct. 20 (UP)—Mrs. Mary O'Neill, believed to be the oldest woman in the United States, died at the age of 113 yesterday after watching six world wars and the other six wars her life had spanned. "There have been so many wars," she had said, "and so many young lives lost."

The snow-haired mother, who was born in England the year after Queen Victoria began her reign, was known throughout this Susquehanna River area as the "Little Old Lady of Stone Crusher Hill."

She died yesterday in the house at nearby Koonsville to which she had moved a month ago when her bungalow atop Stone Crusher Hill because her mountain home was accessible only by a steep, crazy path. She moved under doctors' orders after being hospitalized three times this year for pneumonia and general weakness. Mrs. O'Neill left her hilltop home only twice in the last two years—to see a neighbor's new-born child and to move.

British Truck Ambushed In Latest Canal Fight

U.N. TANKS ENTER KUMSONG; RETURN WITHOUT CASUALTIES

8th ARMY HEADQUARTERS, Korea, Oct. 20 (UP)—United Nations tanks smashed into Communist-held Kumsong today and shot up the vital road junction city for one hour before withdrawing without a casualty. Two companies of 34-46 Patton tanks rumbled into Kumsong's outskirts at 4 p.m. (2 a.m. EST), thrusting ahead of the main Allied lines which were less than two miles from the burning fortress town.

After raking enemy positions despite heavy Communist anti-tank and artillery fire, the tanks pulled back without losing a man. Just outside the city the tanks halted and grouped to support infantrymen still fighting for hills held by the Chinese Communists south of Kumsong.

The tankers had not given a full report of their raid at 9 p.m. (7 a.m. EST) but United Nations briefing officers said Kumsong apparently was occupied by few—if any—Communist troops.

"They have known we were on the way, so they have probably taken out their troops and as many supply stores as they could," one officer said. The tanks drove into Kumsong, 29 miles north of the 38th Parallel, after sweeping ahead of the advancing infantrymen in the valley leading to the city. When their "exploration" mission proved successful, they went all the way into the city.

Another mile to the south, Allied infantry fought last-ditch Chinese defenders in a whipping wind and rainstorm for control of the last major ridgeline south of Kumsong.

An 8th Army communique reported UN infantrymen only 2,500 yards south of the city, with enemy resistance weakening. Gains of from 800 to 1,500 yards were recorded along the assault front during the morning, the communique said.

House Committee Wants Look At Justice Files

WASHINGTON, Oct. 20 (UP)—Attorney General J. Howard McGrath, accused of hindering prosecution of tax scandals, stood firm today against congressional demands that he unlock Justice Department files.

McGrath and a special House Ways and Means Subcommittee headed by Rep. Cecil R. King (D-Cal.) came to loggerheads on the question during a three-hour closed session yesterday.

McGrath offered to consider subcommittee requests for files only on "a case by case basis." And he admonished the group for prodding into some of the tax scandals that have popped up recently across the nation.

McGrath told reporters that he had given the subcommittee "some good counsel" in the case of former Boston tax collector Denis W. Delaney, who has been indicted on charges of taking money to influence his official decisions.

King revealed that McGrath "admonished" the subcommittee for going into the Boston case because it might "prejudice" the government's case against Delaney.

He said McGrath gave the subcommittee "a very plausible explanation" of charges that the Justice Department had stymied prosecution of former St. Louis tax collector James P. Finnegan, who has been indicted on charges of taking bribes.

McGrath told newsmen that Federal Judge George H. Moore of St. Louis had called him for help in presenting tax cases which were not even in the hands of the department. McGrath flatly denied that Moore had requested help in breaking a roadblock against prosecution of Finnegan.

King revealed that he has talked to Moore about the controversial call, and that there may be no conflict in the stories of the two men. He said Moore is willing to appear before the subcommittee "if necessary."

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CAIRO PLACED UNDER STATE OF EMERGENCY DURING CRISIS

By Walter Collins United Press Staff Correspondent CAIRO, Egypt, Oct. 20 (UP)—A British military truck was ambushed on a lonely Egyptian desert road west of the Suez Canal today and the driver wounded by a fusillade of shots. It was the first bloodshed in the Anglo-Egyptian dispute since Wednesday. The attackers were not identified.

British Army sources said the truck was one used by the NAAFI—The British Post Exchange Service—and was manned by two Egyptian employees. When the driver fell wounded, his companion took over the wheel and raced the truck back to its base.

The ambush came in the midst of these other developments in the Anglo-Egyptian crisis: 1. All Cairo was put under a state of emergency. 2. Egyptian director of education in the Sudan left by plane for the Sudanese capital in defiance of a British ban on his return.

3. Egyptian Foreign Minister Mohamed Salah El Din Bey threatened to take the Anglo-Egyptian dispute to the United Nations. 4. Britain further increased its strength in the canal zone against a possible showdown with Egypt over the right of British troops to guard the canal. Reinforcements totalling at least 6,000 troops and seven warships have arrived in the trouble zone since the first of the week.

The British truck was ambushed on a lonely stretch of road across the desert between Quassassin and Tel-El-Kebr, about 30 miles west of the Suez Canal. The last previous bloodshed occurred early Wednesday, when British troops guarding the only bridge across the Canal killed two to five Egyptian soldiers after the Egyptians opened fire on them.

British truck convoy also was fired upon between Ismailia and Tel-El-Kebr, not far from the latest ambush, on Thursday, but no one was killed or wounded on that occasion.

Mohamed Abdel Hadi Bey, Egyptian Director of Education in the Sudan and one of two Egyptian officials banned from the territory by its British-nominated governor yesterday, left Cairo by plane for the Sudanese capital, Khartoum, in open defiance of the British.

The pro-government newspaper Al Misi said Maj. Gen. Abel Fattah El Basha Bey, chief of staff of Egyptian troops in the Sudan, also has been ordered to return to the Sudan as soon as he recovers from his present illness.

The newspaper said Robert G. Howe, British-nominated governor of the Sudan, no longer has any authority in the Sudan because it was annexed by Egypt earlier this week.

The whole dispute stems from Egypt's cancellation of its 1936 treaty with Britain. The treaty provided for joint Anglo-Egyptian administration of the Sudan and permitted Britain to station troops in the Suez Canal Zone for the protection of the Canal.

Truman's Letter To Senator Taft

WASHINGTON, Oct. 20 (UP)—The White House has released the text of President Truman's letter of Oct. 17 to Sen. Robert A. Taft.

Mr. Truman wrote the Ohio Republican in reply to a letter from Taft in which the senator requested a copy of a congratulatory note he sent the president after the 1948 election. The Truman letter said: "Dear Bob: I finally found the letter of congratulations which you wrote me on Nov. 6, 1948, and I am enclosing you a copy of it. I appreciated it very much when I received it and I still think very highly of it and I am glad to send you a copy of it. It was written in longhand on board the Vulcania and evidently mailed when that ship arrived at port. I see you have thrown your hat in the ring and I suppose you will have all the fun that goes with that sort of a decision. Sincerely yours, Harry S. Truman."

Congress Hurries To Pass Bills To End Long Session

WASHINGTON, Oct. 20 (UP)—Congress scrambled toward long delayed adjournment today with some \$15,000,000 in spending bills awaiting final action. Harming "last-minute" hitches, Congressional leaders expected to finish with the remaining appropriations bills and to adjourn sometime this afternoon or tonight. Whatever the hour, the 1951 session was sure to be one of the longest continuous sessions in history.

Nearly all the money provided in the three remaining appropriations bills was earmarked for foreign aid or national defense and related activities. These bills included: The world's population is about 2,400,000,000 compared to 2,200,000,000 in 1939, according to Rand McNally's new Cosmopolitan World Atlas.

"It is my conviction that faith is stronger than disbelief; faith can overcome fear and hopelessness. Surely mankind needs a rebirth of faith during the present war for men's minds," he said in predicting that the cause of freedom will be victorious.  
"For each individual, the par-

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amount need is to develop within himself the rounded faith without nothing really worthwhile is accomplished...  
Mr. Kaiser recounted experiences demonstrating that faith generates a driving power in practical daily living, gives individuals the courage and energy to achieve their finest dreams, raises men out of disasters, rallies together men of faith and opens up limitless opportunities.

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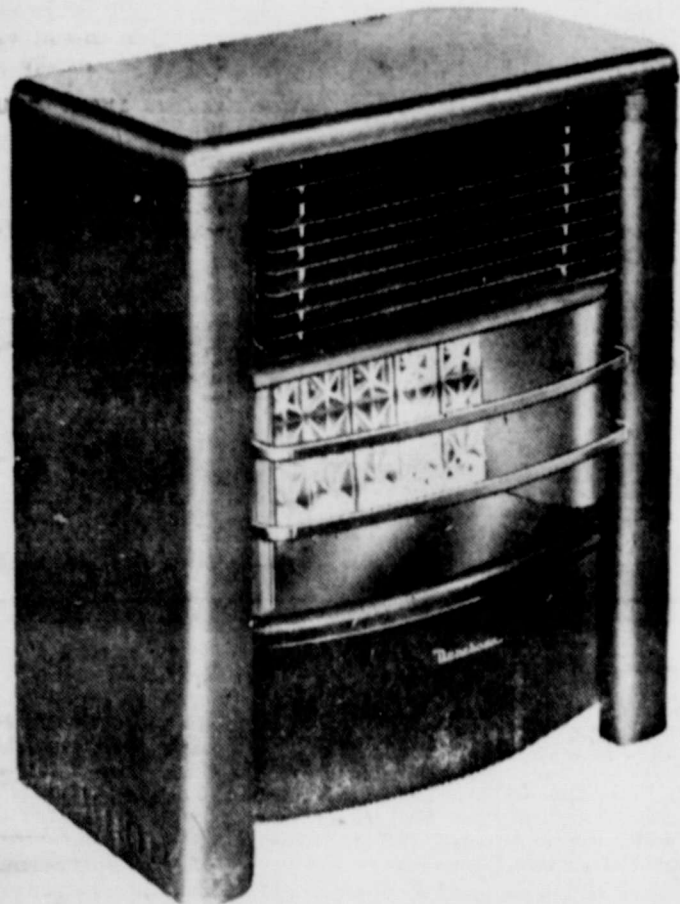
