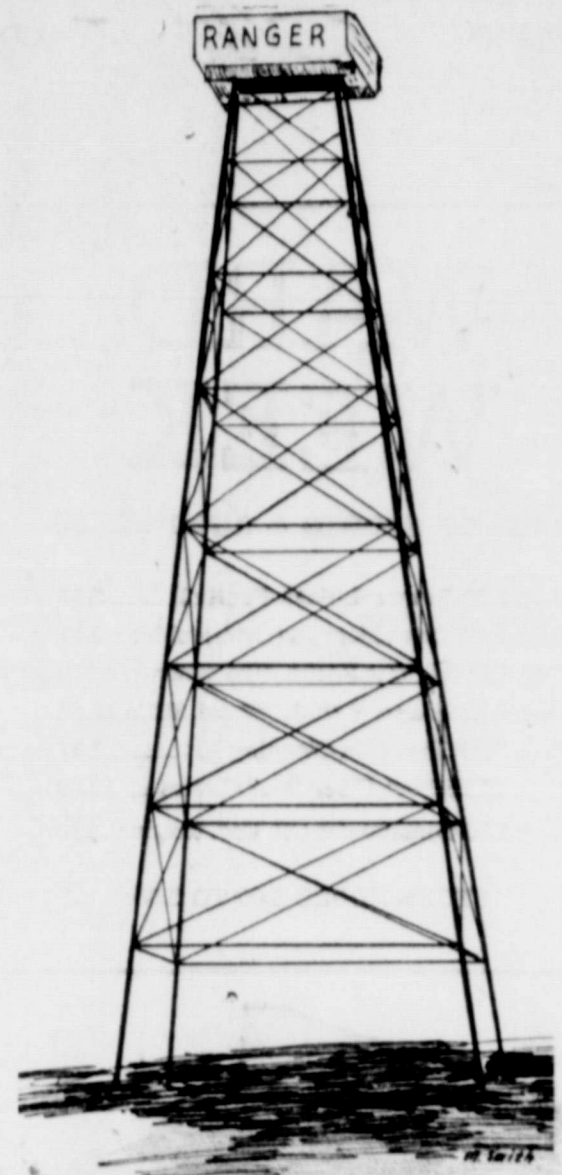


UN JETS VICTORIOUS IN BIG AIR BATTLE WITH RED MIGS

Egyptian Premier Call Britain An Enemy On Return To Cairo

CAIRO, Egypt, Oct. 23 (UP)—Police fired over the heads of demonstrating students and hurled tear gas bombs today to disperse an anti-British parade through Cairo streets.

Today, former Egyptian Army chief of staff Aziz Al Misi Pasha, one of Britain's bitterest foes in the Middle East, revealed he may head a nationwide underground movement against the British.

Al Misi said he has received invitations from "several political parties" to launch the underground campaign. He said a meeting will be called shortly to discuss formation of the resistance group under his leadership.

The British-operated Near East Arab Broadcasting Company described Al Misi as a former pro-Nazi interne. It said a large gathering of Egyptian youths of all political opinions nominated him as their underground leader.

The Egyptian premier addressed cheering crowds at the railroad station upon his return to Cairo from Alexandria. Referring to last week's Canal Zone clashes with British troops, he said: "This enemy has lost his head and is laboring under a sweeping fit of fright—we are in the process of bringing him to account."

Farmers Will Harvest Crop Scrap Metal

Farmers, always on the vital job of producing food for our fighting men, and civilians, as well, will begin harvesting a new crop this week. This time it will be a crop of scrap metal—old refrigerators, automobiles, and smaller items, and with present prices for "scrap" they may expect it to be rather profitable.

At the request of NFA, more than 3,000 Department of Agriculture state and county mobilization committees are organizing local scrap groups to help move farm scrap to the mills. Additional sub-committees are being organized to reach farmers individually at the township level.

Mr. Tutt emphasized that only scrap is wanted now, and that the campaign is not a farm-to-farm drive for tin cans. It is pointed toward recovering such heavy items as broken and worn-out machinery, plows, harrows and old horse drawn equipment; also old mill and water towers, broken tools, anvils and sweeps.

### Artificial Breeding Has Been Success, Say County Dairymen

The quality of dairy animals over the county are expected to improve annually through artificial breeding to outstanding bulls believes A. Z. Myrick, Cisco, president of the County Dairy Association which sponsors the breeding program.

going would not go over 120 to 140 pounds per cow."

When the second generation of heifers from artificial insemination comes into milk both the butterfat and production is expected to materially increase, was his opinion and the opinion of a number of dairymen in the group who breed their cows artificially.

Some of the best dairy bulls in the United States are on the North Texas Artificial Breeding Farms near Dallas who are cooperating in the local breeding program. These bulls are available to anyone who has a dairy cow within thirty miles of Cisco for a reasonable fee by Clyde Hickson, Cisco, breeding technician. Hickson has been on the job performing this service for the past 11 months.

Those wishing their animals bred are asked to call 605 W at Cisco before 10 a.m. on the day they wish the service and leave their name and directions for getting to the place and making sure that the cow is kept up and if possible away from other animals.

### Texas Volunteer Parole Boards To Their Work Well

AUSTIN (Sp) — Secretary of State John Ben Shepperd stated in a report to J. F. Tucker, Chairman of the Eastland County Voluntary Parole Board that the Texas Voluntary Parole System is functioning economically and satisfactorily.

Shepperd reported that when he assumed the duties of Secretary of State in February 1950 there were 600 paroles unaccounted for in Texas. He commended the Texas Voluntary Parole Board members for their cooperation and assistance in enabling the Department to reduce the number of missing parolees to 60.

The Texas Voluntary Parole System, Shepperd stated, is a positive and constructive program designed to aid the parolees in becoming worthwhile citizens of the community. Parolees, he reported, are released from prison on recommendation by the Board of Pardons and Paroles to the Governor or for the granting of clemency. After clemency has been granted, a parolee is under supervision of Parole Board members until expiration of his sentence.

The Parole System, Shepperd reported, has proved to be a sound program as a method of progressive public protection. The Annual Report of Texas Board of Pardons and Paroles shows that in 1949 there were 11 per cent parole violators. This figure was reduced to only 3.8 per cent in 1950.

These men, the Secretary of State reported, are supervised at the very low cost of only 4 1/2 cents daily for each parolee while it costs the Texas Prison System 82 cents daily for each inmate. This figure, he stated, does not take into consideration the amount spent by the State in caring for the dependents of those incarcerated. The Department of Public Welfare shows in their Audit Report for that \$212,426.27 was spent in aiding these families.

In comparing the costs of the Texas Volunteer Parole supervision with that of other states, the Secretary of State cited the fact that the state of New York spends \$62 for each parolee yearly; Massachusetts \$54 yearly; Virginia \$60 yearly; Wisconsin \$34 yearly.

while Texas only spends \$16 yearly for each parolee.

Shepperd also praised the work of the members of the Voluntary

Parole Board and cited several cases where through their efforts delinquent have been restored from the prison system to daily

pursuits of everyday life.

Other members of the Eastland County Voluntary Parole are: Jim Ingram, Ranger; M. L.

Perdue, Cisco; W. E. Tyler, Rising Star.

The Houston oilman, who protested last week about being "stuck" with the check for the general's junket, was happy to receive the cash and the canned goods. But he refused to comment on the \$5,000 check mailed to him by a fellow oil man, Sam E. Wilson of Corpus Christi.

Previously, McCarthy had declined an offer by Hugh Roy Culen, another Houston millionaire, to pay all or any part of the MacArthur bill.

The \$1.93 in hard money came from an auction at Athens, Tex. Duncan Robertson, a professional auctioneer, inflated the price of a can of beans to the high figure and sold it to L. A. Payne, an Athens businessman. Payne sent both money and peas to the McCarthy-MacArthur fund.

## HEALTH TALKS

"What the average community needs is a well organized health department which emphasizes five types of activities to protect the child's health," says Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer. "These activities are: (1) The safeguarding of child health and motherhood; (2) the control of contagion; (3) accurate recording of births and deaths; (4) support of public health laboratories; and (5) sanitary control of diseases spread from human waste and by vermin and insects."

"The full time local health unit gives due emphasis to each of the above mentioned activities. To illustrate how these 5 essential functions are inter related, the in-

terest of the various divisions in the new born baby, preschool and school child may be cited as an example. Child health is safeguarded by providing information and instruction to the mother. Through the use of vital statistics complete and accurate birth registration is kept, as well as records indicating deaths which occur among children from preventable diseases.

"Contagion is prevented or controlled against further spread through the encouragement of immunization early in life, through the prompt reporting of infectious disease. Public health laboratories and sanitary engineers provide additional bulwarks of protection for child life.

"Adequate health organization and wholehearted support on the part of various state and lo-

cal agencies are essential if these activities are to be successfully maintained."

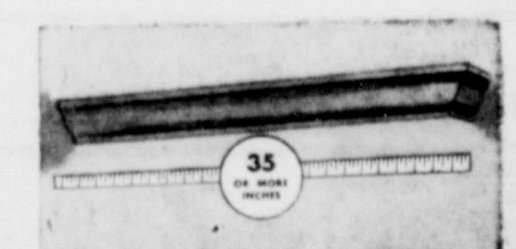

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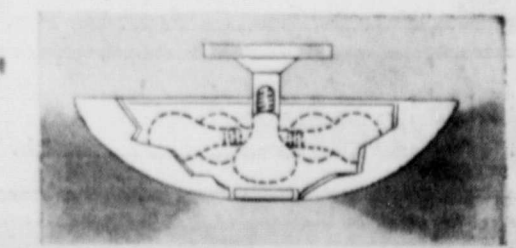

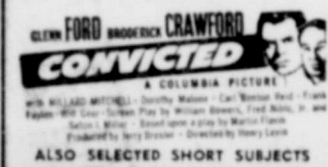

#### Shivers Will Speak Tonight To City Heads

MINERAL WELLS, Oct. 23 (UP)—Gov. Allan Shivers will speak here tonight at the closing session of a two-day meeting of the Texas League of Municipalities.

About 500 delegates are expected to attend the banquet and hear the governor's address.

State Attorney-General Price Daniel spoke out at yesterday's session against "overcentralization" of powers in the federal government. He said Washington is "robbing" states, cities, and individuals of the political rights and revenues.

Daniel cautioned city officials to "preserve your integrity and independence" by paying close attention to the responsibilities of local government. He also recommended that cities decline further aid from the federal government as one method of cutting

down centralized power. Several other groups are meeting in conjunction with the league at the Baker Hotel here.
