#### **Second Explosion Indicates Development Of Compact Bomb**

(UP) - Results of the second held in daylight. atomic explosion in the current series of tests on the Nevada desert indicated today that atom scientists have developed a compact aerial bomb that can be used to support troop son the battlefield.

The Atomic Energy Commission at the Frenchman's Flat proving ground yesterday, apparently by dropping a bomb from a B-29 Superfortress, and the detonation se a purple cloud mushrooming 30 000 feet in the air.

The detonation was neither as great as those held at Bikini Atoli n the South Pacific nor as tiny as the "baby a-bomb" blast set off here last Monday, indicating it was a medium-size atomic weapon that could be used on the battlefield.

It was difficult for observers to determine whether the explosio was as powerful as the five that rocked the desert proving ground and lighted up the sky early th





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#### **Houston To Probe Report Of Police** Licensing "Girl"

HOUSTON, Oct. 29 (UP) ndicated today they will investigate a charge by one of the com-mittee members that a 14-year-old Houston girl was "licensed" as a prostitute by Port Arthur police.
